





# Diver Says Spanish Treasure Doesn't Belong To Texas, Sadler

AUSTIN (UPI)—A diver who helped recover part of the controversial Spanish treasure off Padre Island says the loot does not belong to Texas and "it damn sure doesn't belong to Jerry Sadler."

Representatives from Platoro Ltd., the Indiana firm contracted to recover the treasure, also testified before a court appointed commission Tuesday. They said Sadler's claims that pirates made off with the treasure were without foundation.

Sadler, the state's land commissioner, came under heated criticism for his handling of the recovery operations.

Jeff Burke, of Rio Hondo, a diver who worked for Platoro during the recovery operations and a critic of Sadler, said the treasure belonged to the person who found it.

"It doesn't belong to the state, and it damn sure doesn't belong to Jerry Sadler," Burke said.

Burke predicted the salvage firm would win a suit against the state over ownership of the treasure.

"When they do it's going to open the door to every treasure hunter in the country, some good and some unscrupulous," Burke said.

Tom Sharpe, an attorney from Brownsville, Tex., representing Platoro, said the salvage firm had "the impression

in writing and orally that there was a contract" between Platoro and Texas.

Sadler allegedly contracted Platoro to recover the treasure and agreed the company could keep 50 per cent of whatever it recovered with the rest going to Texas. Sadler later denied such a contract existed.

Sharpe said Platoro filed suit in federal court to get possession of the treasure it recovered because Sadler denied the existence of the contract.

Both Burke and diver Bill Algeo, who also worked for Platoro, said more treasure remains to be recovered. Burke said the wrecks of 50 more ships remain along the Texas coast.

Sadler said the sites, where the treasure under question was recovered, was salvaged by pirates who gathered the booty from two-man submarines. He said only craters remain where the ships once were.

Platoro Secretary Max Znika said however submarines could not take the treasure and said its recovery would not leave craters.

Znika said Sadler could find no ship skeletons at the sites because the 400-year-old wooden ships disintegrated under weathering many years ago and whatever gold, silver and artifacts are on the gulf's bottom lie buried in the sand and encrustations and are scattered over 60 to 90 acres of the ocean floor.

Platoro President Orville J. Tittle said his firm returned all the treasure it recovered to Sadler "because we were under the impression that if we did return them at Mr. Sadler's request that the Texas authorities would not look with favor on us and allow us to continue salvage operations."

All recovery operations were halted by a court order while the three-man committee, appointed by a Nueces County

TREE TRUNK FOUND TRENTO, Italy (UPI)—Scientists said today a petrified tree trunk unearthed during a building excavation here was 80 to 100 million years old. The eight-foot long, 10-inch wide trunk was sent to the Trento Museum of Natural History for further analysis.

# Nine GIs Killed By Wild American Fire

SAIGON (UPI)—An American tank fired into a U.S. position during a Communist attack, killing nine Americans, military spokesmen said today. Four other U.S. troops and a news photographer died when a helicopter exploded in the air.

New fighting broke out in the area between Saigon and the Cambodian border Tuesday and the action included a battle 32 miles northwest of the capital in which five men of the U.S. 25th Infantry Division were killed. Twenty-three Communist troops were slain.

The tank accident occurred Tuesday at a U.S. 1st Air Cavalry Division artillery base near Quan Loi, 60 miles north of Saigon. It was later determined the shell came from an American tank. The military said the incident was under investigation.

An Army UH1 helicopter was struck by Communist ground fire and exploded in flight Tuesday during a battle outside Tam Ky near Da Nang on South Vietnam's northern coast.

Four American crewmen of the helicopter and Oliver Noonan, 29, of Norwood, Mass., a photographer for the Associated Press, were killed.

The helicopter went down 18 miles west of Tam Ky in the area where U.S. American Division infantrymen killed 155 North Vietnamese troops.

Noonan was accompanying his third combat assault of the

day when the helicopter was hit.

Noonan had formerly worked for the Boston Globe and the Boston Herald-Triangler.

In a battle near Go Dau Ha, 32 miles northwest of Saigon, American troops fought Communist forces from armored personnel carriers and called in help from U.S. Air Force Phantom jets and Super Sabre jets, helicopter gunships and artillery in a five-hour battle.

Marines killed 12 Communist troops who attacked a U.S. camp seven miles southwest of Da Nang. The Marines suffered 14 wounded.

# Husband Reports Sharon Tate Had No Premonition About Murder

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Roman Polanski telephoned his wife Sharon Tate from London Aug. 8 and she had no premonition that a few hours later she would die with her four guests in a macabre mass murder.

Polanski, the brilliant Polish film director who made "Rosemary's Baby," said Miss Tate talked of trivialities when he called her "a few hours before the tragedy occurred."

"She wanted to know if I wanted a birthday party (Polanski was 36 Monday). I said, yes, let's hold one. She said a little kitten had come in from the hills and she was trying to feed it with an eye dropper," Polanski said.

"There was no indication of a party that evening. There wasn't any party that evening," Polanski recounted his last talk with his wife at a news conference Tuesday called because of the "unbearable and horrible things" said about her.

Blinking back tears and sometimes breaking into sobs, Polanski related what he believed were the circumstances of the deaths at the secluded Benedict Canyon es-

tate leased by him and his wife.

Miss Tate did not use drugs, he said, "although two of the victims, Voltyek Frokowsky and Jay Sebring, were known to smoke marijuana. "Sharon didn't use drugs, she didn't touch alcohol, she didn't even smoke cigarettes," Polanski said.

Frokowsky once brought a man to a party at the home because so objectionable he had to be thrown out. Polanski gave the name to the police but not to newsmen.

"There was a lot of talk about parties in our home," he said. "They are true. There was a constant party. There wasn't an evening without friends."

He said marijuana was smoked at the home by guests but he didn't think it was out of the ordinary among their circle of Hollywood friends.

He said of his wife: "All of you know how beautiful she was. She was one of the most beautiful women—not the most beautiful woman—in the world.

"But few of you know how good she was. She was vulnerable.

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## Quirks In The News

### ATTEND CONGRESS

LISBON (UPI)—Medical authorities from 38 countries sailed Friday aboard a Portuguese cruise liner on a 20-day voyage to discuss one of man's most troubling afflictions—asthma.

The 300 delegates, guests of the Portuguese government, will attend the 6th congress of the International Association of Asthmology aboard the liner Principe Perfeito during its cruise off Northwest Africa.

### PRODUCTION UP

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Federal Reserve Board says industrial production increased 0.7 per cent in July to a record 175.2 per cent of the 1957-59 average. Auto assemblies increased 6 percent production of most household goods showed little change and the output of farm equipment remained at a low level. The board also reported Friday nonfarm payrolls increased in July by 192,000, a smaller advance than in recent months.

## Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI)—The recent action of the stock market is "part of a bottoming process" expected to extend over the next two months, company says. New lows may occur during this period, and if they do, "the decline will be short both in terms of distance and time" it advises investors, against any further liquidation of stock on balance and to use periods of market weakness to reinvest funds.

No evidence is at hand that inflation has topped out, but the economy is cooling off, Bache & Co. says. It observes that prices are continuing at an all-time peak with output failing to keep pace with demand. Regarding the stock market, Bache says it has achieved a "psychological prop" in its recent successful test of the 800 area of the Dow Jones industrial average.

Hardy & Co. says the security market is "ready for a significant recovery," adding that "all that is needed is a little assurance from the Federal Reserve Bank and the government that it does not intend to create a depression." The company says an investor may find temporary relief from inflation by keeping too much money in fixed income situations while security prices fall. However, "a sound investment program calls for a balance between fixed income and variable income investments," it adds.

### WOODCUTS STOLEN

HAMBURG, Germany (UPI)—Two Renaissance woodcuts by the German master Lucas Cranach, valued at more than \$10,000, have been stolen, police reported Tuesday. The prints were first missed from an exhibit at Hamburg City Library July 26, but until now the management believed the prints had been moved to another place, police said.

### GIFT EXPLODES

ATHENS (UPI)—A new speed boat given by Aristotle Onassis to his wife Jacqueline last week caught fire and blew up Monday, injuring the second mate of Onassis' yacht Christina. The boat was reported to be one of Onassis' presents to the former Mrs. John F. Kennedy on her 40th birthday.

## The Lighter Side

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Every now and then you see an item in the papers about scientists somewhere needing thousands of lightning bugs for experiments.

At such times there is usually an offer to pay small boys a nominal bounty for all of the glowworms they can capture and bring in alive.

If you give more than a passing thought to these items, you probably begin to wonder what in the name of lampyridae and elatridae those scientists are doing with so many incandescent insects.

And if you have ever considered these items in conjunction with other items in the paper, dark suspicions may have started to form in your mind.

You may have noted that certain news items seem to fall into a fixed pattern. First there will be a series of items about electric power shortages along the East Coast. Then there will be a series of items quoting power company officials as assuring everyone they are working on the problem and have a plan to prevent future shortages. Then there will be an item about scientists needing thousands of lightning bugs.

The suspicion that has started to form in my mind is that those really aren't scientists who are collecting the bugs. They are power company engineers.

I further suspect lightning bugs may have a key role in the plan for overcoming future power shortages.

## Testing, Testing.. Unfair To Ghetto Kids?

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Standardized intelligence tests, will go the way of school segregation if some educators have their way.

IQ tests now given in schools, they argue, are designed for white, middle class children, and represent an alien world to kids who grow up in the ghetto.

Questions asked on standardized IQ tests, for instance, assume that all children have fathers, know what a tree is, and live in middle class surroundings. Put a substantial number of ghetto children have no fathers, rarely see a tree in their asphalt world, and are more familiar with rats than ponies or other creatures that middle class children learn to know. Even the language used

on IQ tests is alien to ghetto residents.

Our present IQ tests are not likely to "judge fairly" the abilities of ghetto children, writes Frank B. Womer in a publication of the National Education Association. Dr. Womer, in "Test Norms: Their Use and Interpretation," states that existing tests generally assume equal educational backgrounds. But, he warns, learning opportunities vary greatly between middle class and ghetto children.

Robert Coles, a Harvard psychiatrist, feels standardized IQ tests are a mockery when used with ghetto children. "My children would flunk their IQ test" if one were devised on the experiences and the "rich and vibrant" language of the

ghetto, he declares. Dr. Coles goes further and charges that intelligence testing in general is a "naive and simple-minded way of looking at human beings" of all colors and races.

While it is generally agreed that primary mental abilities are inherited, there is growing realization that we have much to learn in the way of developing more accurate methods of measuring these abilities, particularly of minority children with different cultural backgrounds. Professor Thelma Guinn Thurstone, writing in the NEA pamphlet, "Your Child's Intelligence," notes "the environment that a child grows up in and the strength of his desire to do well have a good deal of influence on how effectively he uses his

abilities" — and scores on IQ tests.

Professor Thurstone feels it is "much more useful for the school to know what each student's mental profile is than to know merely what his IQ is." (By mental profile, she means the total picture of a child's abilities, aptitudes, etc.)

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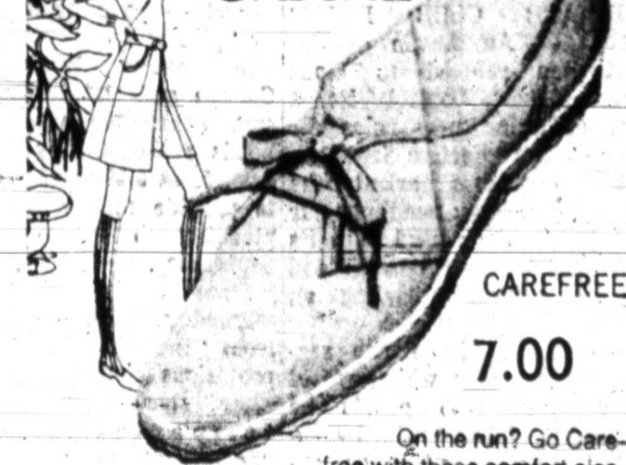
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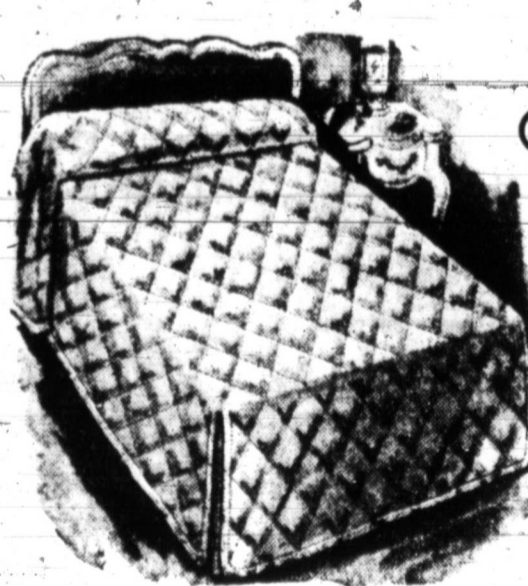
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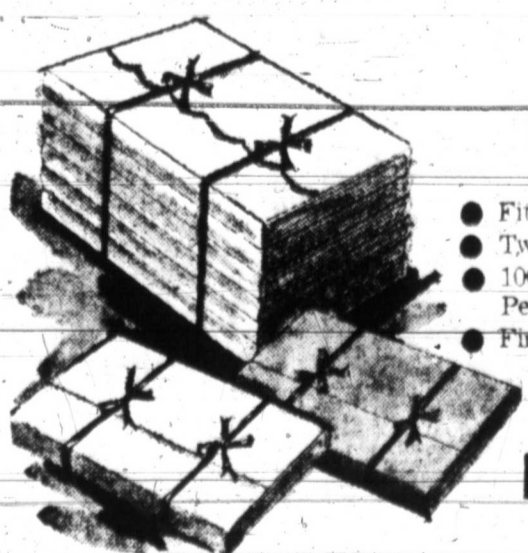
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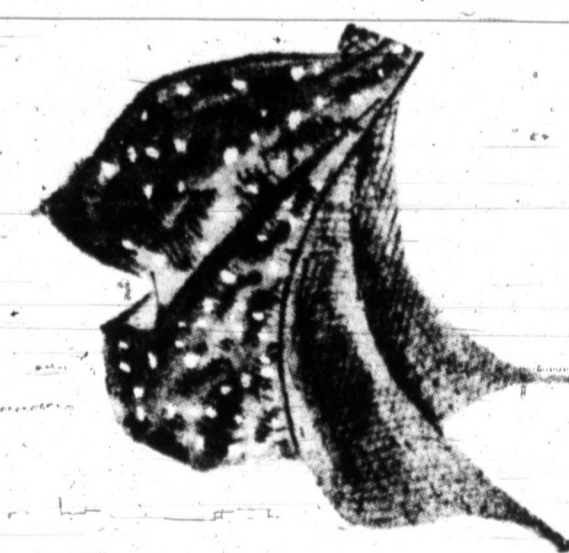
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# Highlights And Sidelights From The State Capitol

AUSTIN — Legislature is roaring through the final full week of a called special session with accomplishment of its major goals — adoption of a budget and a tax bill — in sight.

Senate scored a major breakthrough on its tax bill after a four-hour floor debate and days of gloomy predictions of a deadlock.

Here are how tax bills passed by the House and Senate stack up, pending conference committee adjustment:

**SENATE** — An increase in the sales tax rate from three to 3.25 per cent with the levy extended to beer-liquor and telephone-telegram services; four cents a pack increase in the cigarette tax, from 11 cents to 15 cents; 50-cent raise in corporation franchise tax rate (to \$3.25 per \$1,000) with base for computing the tax expanded to include 25 per cent of out-of-state sales; boost in the natural gas production tax from seven to eight per cent and addition of a new documentary stamp tax of 50 cents per \$500 value on land transfer documents.

**HOUSE** — An increase in the sales tax rate to 3.5 per cent; a new services tax of the same amount on telephone and telegraph, professional entertainment, auto, appliance and jewelry repairs, parking, laundry and dry cleaning; a five cents a pack raise in the cigarette tax and a 10-cent transactions levy on sale or purchase of stocks and other securities.

Total yield of the House bill was calculated at about \$325 million. Senate bill originally was figured at \$360 million, but a delay in its effective date may reduce the take sharply.

Senate bill would share with those cities levying a local option sales tax the new income from tax on telephone and telegraph and alcoholic beverages. House bill didn't propose such sharing from services levy.

Differences in the \$1.2 billion Senate and \$1.1 billion House general revenue budgets also are being hastily adjusted.

**WELFARE BENEFITS TO RISE** — Proving that what comes down eventually will go up, state welfare benefits will increase Sept. 1.

Aid to families with dependent children (AFDC), sharply reduced May 1 due to fund shortages, will rise at least 50 per cent.

Maximum grants to the aged also will increase from \$110 to \$125 a month. Aid to the disabled maximums will go up from \$84 to \$100 and aid to the blind from \$96 to \$110.

Increases were made possible by voters' Aug. 5 adoption of the constitutional amendment to raise the welfare spending ceiling from \$60 million to \$80 million a year.

Public Welfare Board authorized an increase in AFDC to 75 per cent of budgeted family needs. AFDC checks were reduced May 1 to 50 per cent of budgeted needs.

**PRIVATE CLUB RULES STAND** — An Austin district court has refused to block Texas liquor control board from enforcing new rules for private clubs effective Sept. 1.

Club operators asked the Board for a delay pending their appeal, but the Board said its rules appear clear enough and will be enforced pending an adverse court order.

Primarily at issue are sections of the rules which would require that club guests be personally introduced by a regular club member or accompanied by a member and that bills incurred be sent to and paid by a member. Latter would ban cash sales by clubs.

**APPOINTMENTS** — Gov. Preston Smith named Joe

Frazier Brown of San Antonio as executive director of Criminal Justice Council in his office. Council met last week to consider \$1.1 million in action grants to implement the state's war on crime.

Smith appointed to the new Polygraph Examiners Board San Antonio Police Sgt. Gene Ralph Danish; Hyden Allen Albert of Austin, supervisor of Texas Department of Public Safety polygraph section; Bobby Harvel Musser of Houston; James Davidson Williams of Dallas; William Dodge Starcher of Lubbock and Dee Estes Wheeler of Fort Worth.

Dr. Billy R. Walker, Ph.D., of Abilene was named Saturday as superintendent of San Angelo Center for Mentally Ill and Mentally Retarded. He has been assistant superintendent of Abilene State School since 1967.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES** — State Board of Ins. can consider insurance company investment income in setting auto-coverage premium rates, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held in a new opinion. But Martin said he could offer no advice as to whether the Board should take investments into consideration in rate making.

In other recent opinions, Martin held that:

New theft-of-fish law may be enforced by Parks and Wildlife Department officers if the offense is committed in their presence of view and fish taken from the fish farm have value in excess of \$200. Otherwise, enforcement lies with regular peace officers.

Dimmitt Feed Yards Inc., a custom cattle feeding lot, is not obligated to furnish to county tax assessor a list of the names of those owning cattle located within its confines on Jan. 1.

**WATER STUDY** — Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake introduced a resolution creating a legislative-citizens study committee to take a full look at the Texas Water Plan, now that the voters refused to approve the \$3.5 billion state bond issue to help finance the 50-year water program.

Committee would be composed of three private citizens, three senators and three representatives. They would investigate other possible ways of financing the state water plan. Opponents of the bond issue raised the question that the effect of 67 reservoirs and two large canals on the ecology of the state had not been given enough consideration by the Texas Water Development Board. Committee would hold hearings over the state on that.

Recommendations would be made to the Legislature in 1971, thus making it possible for a new election to be held that year or in 1972 on a finance plan.

**SHORT SNORTS** — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler claims sites of three Spanish shipwrecks off Padre Island — which may contain valuable treasure as did earlier site explored — have been plundered by "pirates."

Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, sold \$14,000,000 worth of the bonds authorized by the voters Aug. 5, at 5.41 per cent interest to provide money for students planning to enter college in September.

State Board of Ins. has warned insurance companies from "tacking on" unnecessary provisions to automobile policies after learning that some companies have been "declining" to write policies unless applicants purchased "additional coverages which provide no substantial benefit to them" since this, in effect, is "requiring a premium in excess of that prescribed by the Board" and a "violation of the

automobile premium rating laws." Texas Aeronautics Commission has given approval to Rio Airways to operate a commuter service to major South Texas cities and approved

a request of King Airlines of Wichita Falls to double the size of the aircraft it uses in its commuter service between Wichita Falls and Dallas. Texas Council for Liquor Control, made up of industrial

leaders, has formed to support liquor law enforcement. About 10,000 Texans are driving "illegally" because they have circumvented the state's safety responsibility law, according to Southwestern Ins-

Information Service. Robert McLellan, under-secretary of U.S. Department of Commerce, will address the Legislature Aug. 19 to launch Texas Industrial Commission's "E" Awards for promoting

sales of American products abroad. Water Rights Commission is investigating a complaint from landowners downstream from Stamford's city lake that Stamford is not releasing water

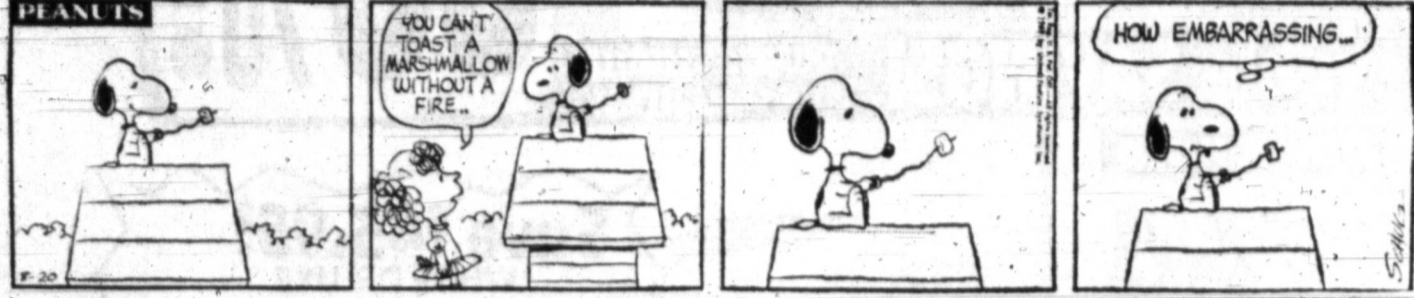

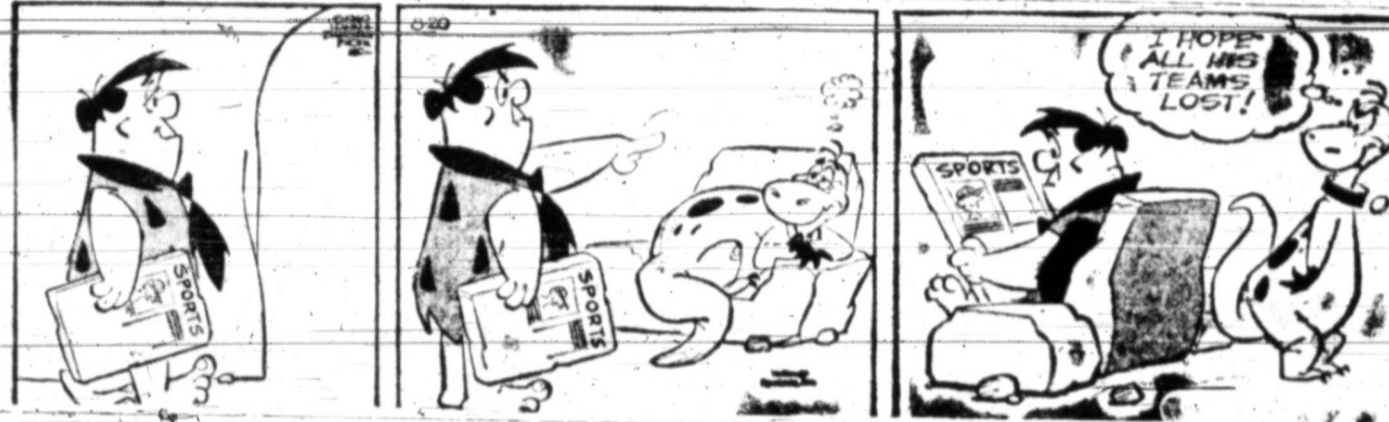

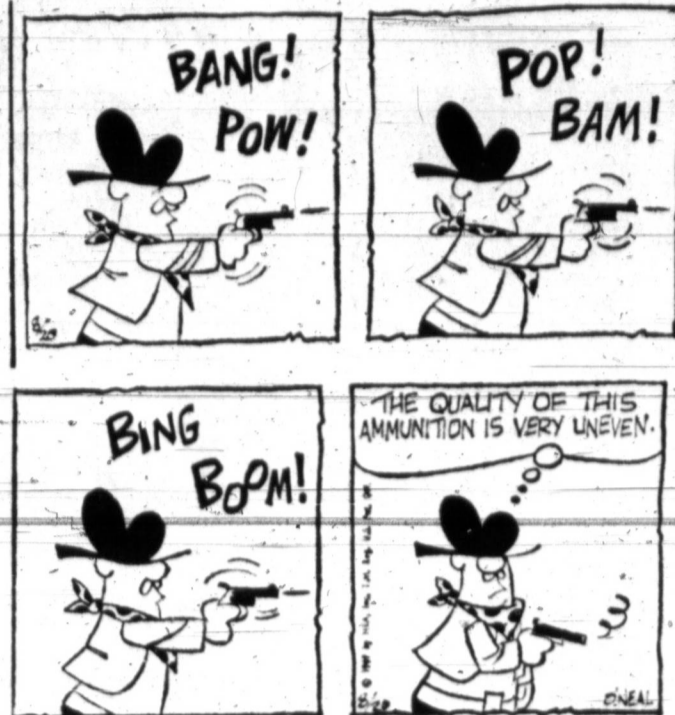
