## Dedication At WTC

Congressman George H. Mahon of the 19th District of Texas Friday formally dedicated Western Texas College "to the happiness of the people it serves - the happiness that comes only from achievement
Speaking to a crowd of several hundred persons in the central courtyard of the college campus, Mahon's address climaxed a morning filled with activity on the WTC campus.
"You are in something big," Mahon told the administration, faculty and students of WTC. He noted that there are 46 iwo-yeal colleges in Texas, over 1,000 of them in the United States and that they have a combined enrollment over $2^{1 / 4}$ million.
While senior colleges and universities have seen their enrollments double in the past decade, the community colleges enrollment has quadrupled Mahon said.
Expressing amazement at the facilities that have emerged since Nov. 9,1970 , when he spoke at ground breaking ceremonie on the barren campus, Mahon said he envied the students.

Wouldn't it be fun to go to school here?" he asked. "If I lived close enough, I would like to take a course in conversational Spanish. I took a Spanish course down at HardinSimmons in my younger days, but it didn't rub off much," he said, commenting on the fact that many adults find community colleges the answer to their hopes to pursue courses they are interested in.
'The miracle here is that the community was able to get together and build this," Mahon declared. "You get happiness only by achieving something and achievement is impossible without training. I dedicate this college to the happiness of the people - the happiness that comes only from achievement." A number of special guests and groups were recognized. Some of the major memorials and gifts include the campus, which was contributed by Mrs. Jonisue Stiff; the Christian Student Center which is made available to the college by the East Side and Thirty-seventh Street Church of Christ
congregations; the Sentel Memorial Stage, contributed in memory of the late John E Sentell by Mrs. Sentell and family; the Forest Sears Carillon system, contributed by Mrs. Sears and her daughter Carolyn; a statue in the fine arts center and a fountain by C. T. McLaughlin; and a new gift announced today, a sunken garden to be contributed by Mrs. Edith McKanna.
Dr. Tom Hatfield of the coordinating board staff in Austin, had praise for WTC. Noting that he had visited over 250 campuses of colleges and universities all over the world he said that WTC best reflects the hopes of people seeking quality education. He complimented the administration and board of trustees, declaring "They could serve on any university board anywhere." He predicted that WTC would be sought out by planners from all over the country as they seek to build new educational institutioins.
W.A. (Bill) Jones, president of the board of trustees of the college, welcomed the audience to the dedication, and Dr. Robert Clinton, WTC president presented the steering committee which achieved the groundwork that ultimately led to the application for authority to create the college district.
Other guests also were in troduced by Dr. Robert Clinton Several area colleges and universities were represented at the ceremonies by their presidents or other ad ministrators These included mexas Toch Sul Ross Sta Texas Tech, Sul Ross State University, East Texas State University, West Texas State University, McMurry College Hardin-Simmons University and South Plains College.
Mahon was introduced by Edwin Parks, member of the board, while Bentley Baize, another board member, recognized the museum com mittee. Board Member R. C Patton introduced represen tatives of the Texas Education Agency, and Board Member Dr. Robert H. Hargrove Jr. introduced representatives of the
Dean Morgan, director of the Christian Student Center on the campus, gave the invocation, and the Rev. John Gordon pastor of First Presbyterian Church, the benediction.

Are you in favor of a constitutional amendment which would prohibit forced busing of chool children or forced consolidation of school districts solely to achieve racial balane?"
So, if you mark your ballot "For" such an amendment or "For" no student being required to attend a particular school, you are voting "Against", busing.

Now that you asked me, here is my assessment of the candidates for public office as they line up to face one another in the primaries of May 6. The post is pretty crowded this year, particularly for the position of governor. I don't even know the names of all the candidates, but I am familiar with the records of most of them - in both parties.
If I were voting in the Republican primary, I would have to go along with Hank Grover. He is a proven vote getter, having served in the House and Senate for a number of years. But the ability to garner votes doesn't mean you are worth a cent - look at the Kennedys. Mr. Grover is the most conservative of the Republican candidates. He has a voting record to prove that he votes where his mough is. He should also appeal to conservative Democrats, since he was a Democrat for years before witching parties for philosophical reasons (those reasons seem to be more obscure today than in 1964). This year above all, the Republicans cannot expect any cross-over votes in their primary due to the intense feelings in the Democrat primary. But Hank Grover would, in my opinion, be able to pull more Demorrat votes in the state race in November than any of his Republican opponents.
Right here and now, let me remind all voters that come November, you can vote for whomever you please. Many people have been led to believe that they are either bound by law or honor tosupport the complete ballot of the party in which primary they voted. That is simply not so
hogwash - you have been brainwashed, and don't let anyone intimidate you
But should I choose to pull the lever in the Democrat primary, my choice would be Dolph Briscoe. Not that I am a real son of a gun about Dolph, or identify in every way with his political philosophy, it is more a case of protection from all those other people running. I do think Mr. Briscoe is honest he is a rancher which appeals to me. He should be aware of and know a solution for problems confronting the rural people and areas. Ben Barnes is by far the most experienced of any of the candidates in either party - but whoowee - he is so experienced in the ways of politicians that he scares me. You realize how young he is - which will appeal to the 18 year old voter, I spec but I just wonder about that. He is a terribley wealthy man which is great money provides jobs for folks. But he has been in politics most of his adult life which makes me wonder just when did he have time to get out and honestly earn all that money. So far, he has been cleared of any connection with the Sharp scandal - there you can't help but ponder.
Then there is Cissy - she shore is purty - speaks good too. But I believe that lady is more than skin deep - she is supported by labor which classifies her as too liberal for my way of thinking. She seems to have an axe to grind on every issue. Course, lady governors are not unknown to Texans, but I don't think 1972 is the year for the

## Antelope Count

According to the Permian Basin aerial antelope census just completed, Garza County has 98, and Borden County has a total of 589 antelope
The census, taken in eight counties by personnel of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, tallied 1,870 animals, consisting of 690 bucks and 1,180 does. Project leader George Litton said final figures indicate a decrease of 5.4 per cent.
Outstanding in the count was one ranch in the area that revealed an overall increase of approximately 33 percent from last year, the result of moving domestic sheep from the area.
In addition to Garza's 98 and Borden's 589, Glasscock County has 77, Midland County 150 and Howard 39, with the balance in Mitchell, Reagan and Sterling counties.

Judge Toombs reported he had received word from Governor Smith that under the General Revenue-Sharing Bill which was approved by the House Ways and Means Com mittee, Borden County will receive $\$ 10,518.00$ under the first year allocation. The allocation will be retroactive to January 1, 1972.

The funds must be used for certain "high priority expenditures" designated by the Congress. There is a prohibition against the use of any of the money for programs that discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex. Priority expenditures include for maintenance and operating expenses, public safety (including law enforcement, fire protection), environmental protection, public transportation. For Capital expenditures, funds may be used for sewage collection and treatment, waste disposal systems and road and street construction.
