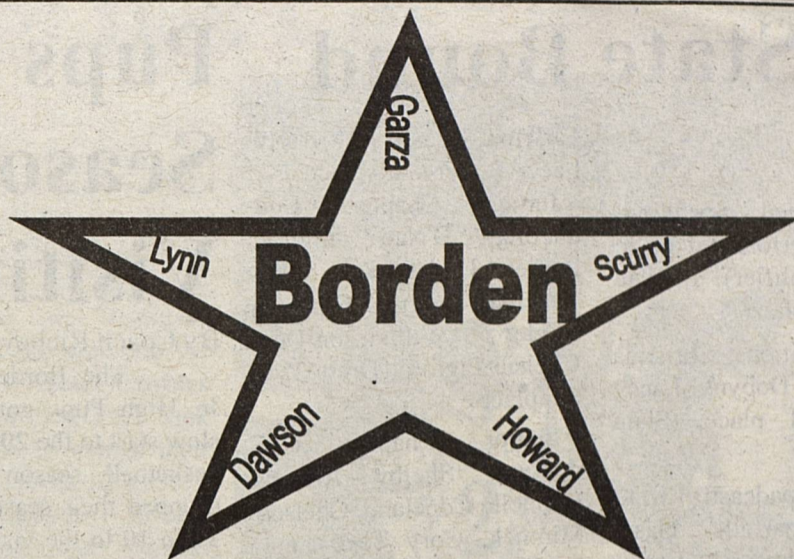

Regional Champions: *Coyotes Upset Dell City 68-50*

The Borden County Coyotes won a big football game last Saturday night in Pecos defeating the 20 point favored Dell City Cougars by 18 points and capturing the Division II Regional title. The victory gives the Coyotes a much wanted rematch with district foe Jayton Jaybirds who defeated the Coyotes three weeks ago by 7 points. The Jaybirds took a little easier road for the last two weeks being the district champion, and the district runner-ups had to go through two very tough teams to force the rematch. The Coyotes defeated Grandfalls-Royalty by two points and Dell City by 18 points, both teams were supposed to end the Coyotes season, but neither did.

The Coyotes had to kick the ball to the Cougars to start the game, their #22 had his first touchdown of the game on the return and the Coyotes tackled him with only a 17 yard return. On his third carry of the game though he broke loose for a

50 yard touchdown run, with 8:56 left on the clock the kicked PAT was good Dell City took the lead, 8-0.

The Coyotes were quick to answer though as they took their opening drive down and scored with 5:46 left in the first as Quentin Shafer caught a 33 yard pass from Clint Chapman. The PAT kick was good by Michael Bullinger to tie the score at 8 each.

With 5:32 left in the first, and on the first play of this possession the Cougar speedster again found paydirt as he scored from 45 yards out. Their PAT kick failed and the Cougars went ahead 14 to 8.

The Coyotes would regain the lead with 4:13 left in the first period with a 32 yard run by Bullinger. Bullinger also kicked the PAT good and the Coyotes took a lead that they would never relinquish, 16 to 14.

Both teams took a turn with the ball to end the first period and failed to produce points before turning it over. The Coyotes were the first to score in the second period

with 9:03 left Shafer caught a 20 yard pass from Clint Chapman. Bullinger's kick was good to go up ten points, 24 to 14.

With 7:29 left in the second the Cougars connected on touchdown pass from 21 yards out. The PAT kick was blocked and the Coyotes led 24 to 20.

With 3:01 left in the half the Coyotes score from 7 yards out on a run by Shafer. Bullinger kicked the PAT good and the score was 32 to 20.

With 2:51 left in the half the Cougars scored from 1 yard out. Their kick failed and the Coyotes lead was reduced to 6 points, 32 to 26.

With 1:07 left on the clock the Coyotes extended their lead as Bullinger scored from 7 yards out. Bullinger kicked the PAT good to make the score 40 to 26.

The Cougars were moving the ball and it looked like they were poised to score before the first half would end when Bullinger intercepted a Cougar pass. The Coyotes had just over 0:30

The Pups again started which resulted in a 17 to 5 deficit after one period. Both teams had a hard time making their shots in the 2nd quarter, in fact the Wildcats were held to only one field goal in the quarter, but the Pups on managed a pair to cut the lead to 19 to 9 at half. In the second half, the Wildcats extended their lead as they outscored the Pups 19 to 15, but the Pups did play much better in the 2nd half as they showed a lot of improvement from game 1

seconds left on the clock to go get another score before the half. A first down was made and then another completion to Flynn Chapman who then lateraled to Shafer, but Shafer was run out of bounds just as the buzzer went off. The officials ruled the half was over. It would have been nice to get another score on the Cougars just before half. The Coyotes would have the ball first in the second half and a score here would have put the Coyotes with a more comfortable lead, but it could not be that easy.

To begin the second half the two teams would exchange the ball once a piece before the Coyotes would put the ball in the end zone with 5:58 left in the third as Bullinger scored from 2 yards out. He kicked the PAT good once again to extend the lead to 22 points 48 to 26.

The Cougars would score next with 4:47 left on a 15 yard run; they kicked the PAT good to reduce their deficit 48 to 34.

With 1:34 left in the third period Shafer scored for the Coyotes on an 8 yard pass reception from Clint Chapman, Bullinger's kick was good to make the score 56 to 34.

The Cougars would score next with 9:52 left in the fourth period on a 40 yard pass play that got behind the Coyote defense; the kick was good to pull the Cougars to within 14 points, 56 to 42.

The Coyotes would have to punt their next possession away and the Cougars would take advantage of this opportunity and scored with 7:20 left on a 15 yard run by their spread back. Their kick was good for two to bring the Cougars to within 6 points of the Coyotes 56 to 50.

With 6:23 left in the game the Coyotes scored on a 52 yard catch and run from Clint Champman to Zane Williamson. Zane caught the pass for a 5 yard gain, then stiff armed two would-be tacklers on his way into the end zone. The Coyotes missed their first PAT kick of the game to extend their lead by six points, 62 to 50.

The Coyote defense would stop the Cougar offense one more time and the offense scored with 2:06 left on the clock with an 18 yard run by Bullinger. The Coyotes missed their second PAT kick of the game to go up 18 points 68 to 50.

The Coyote defense would stop the Cougars once again on downs and just simply had to kneel the ball to run out the clock.

What a game, this Coyote victory would have to be the upset of the week in six man football. The Coyotes have been over looked all season and no body had them to get this far into the play offs, especially after getting second in district and had a very tough road to fight through the play offs. That hard road has made the Coyotes a better play off team and a lot tougher opponent to beat going into a rematch game with the Jaybirds.

Three Coyotes had super games offensively as they put up great numbers in the fight. Quarterback Clint Chapman completed 11 of 19 passes for 179 yards and 3 touchdowns. Clint had 11 tackles on defense.

Michael Bullinger carried the ball 22 times for 174 yards and 4 touchdowns, he completed a pass for 37 yards, returned two kick offs for 57 yards, had 10 tackles and one interception on defense.

Quentin Shafer carried the



ball 13 times for 91 yards and one touchdown; he caught 6 passes for 117 yards and three touchdowns. Shafer had 8 tackles and broke up 3 passes.

Freshman center Flynn Chapman caught four passes for 41 yards; he had 5 tackles and broke up one pass.

Zane Williamson had 2 catches for 58 yards and a touchdown. Zane had 8 tackles on defense.

Dore Rodriguez was forced to leave the game in the second period with a sprained ankle. Hopefully he will be back for the Jaybirds this week.

Asa Rutherford recorded 5 tackles on defense and broke up one Cougar pass.

Logan Howard had 6 tackles on defense, recorded one quarterback sack and broke up a Cougar pass.

Michael Cooley replaced Rodriguez offensively when he left with an injury and Cooley did a great job blocking and running routes. Cooley was also used on the defensive side of the ball rushing the Cougar quarterback; he had a tackle and a quarterback hurry.

Miller Valentine did the deep snapping for the Coyotes extra point team and

the punting team.

Brendan Tarleton, Karl Lamming, Pascual Espinoza and Cory Teel got see some action as they went into the game to run the clock out at the end.

The Coyotes produced 469 yards of total offense to the Cougars 339 yards. The Coyotes had 38 rushes for 259 yards and 5 touchdowns. We were 12 of 20 passing the ball for 210 yards and 4 touchdowns with out throwing an interception. The Cougars had 191 yards on 23 rushes; they completed 5 of 16 passes for 148 yards with 2 touchdowns and one interception. Each team was penalized three times each and each team punted once each.

The Coyotes did what they had to do to get the rematch with Jayton. We took the harder path and we are still alive. The game looks to be the makings of one of the biggest games in school history. The game will be held Friday at 6:30 in Merkel and we are the visitors. It will be cold so bring your coats and blankets and let's get all Coyote fans to Merkel to cheer us on. See you at the game.

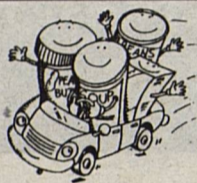

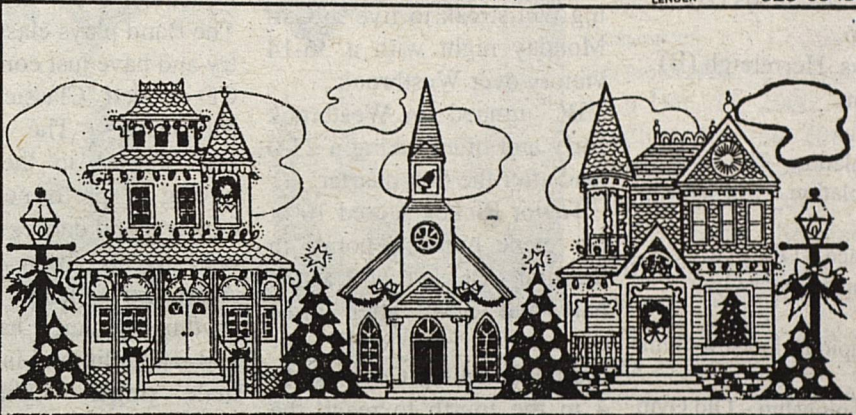

Thomas competed with other summer maintenance technicians from throughout the 13-county district.

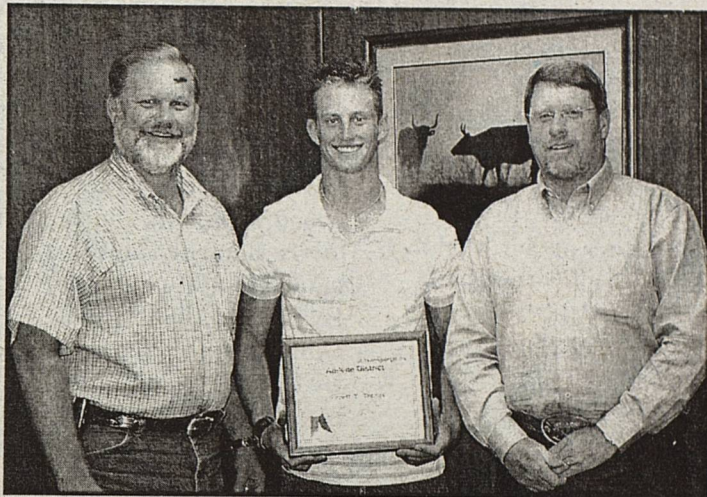

NRCS Sign-Up Deadline Set for 2007

Environmental Quality Incentives Program

The USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Texas has set a Dec. 15, 2006, sign-up deadline for the 2007 Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP).

"The funds allocated for EQIP will help farmers and ranchers improve natural resources on private working lands in Borden and Scurry Counties," said Kevin Wright, District Conservationist in Snyder. "The program provides cost-share and incentives payments to producers applying approved conservation measures that help solve natural resource problems."

Natural resource concerns were established in each county by local work groups, who identify the most important natural resource issues in the area. In Scurry County the priorities are 1) brush management 2) irrigation improvements, 3) erosion control on cropland and 4) livestock water developments. Borden County identified their priorities as 1) brush management 2) erosion control on cropland and 3) livestock water developments. Through EQIP, NRCS also funds projects that address

special statewide resource concerns recommended by the Texas State Technical Committee. The 2007 statewide resource concerns are animal waste, invasive species (Salt cedar), plant condition, water quality, water quantity, and wildlife emphasis areas.

Immediately following the end of the sign-up period, all applications will be ranked. Producers with an approved application will work with an NRCS conservation planner to develop a contract and a plan and will begin implementing conservation practices next spring.
