Italian Fascist Plot Charged By Martin Of UAW

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1 (AP)—Home Martin, president of the United Automobile Workers' Union, told House investigators today on Italian vice consul, Giacomo Ungarelli, had attempted to persuade American citizens of Italian ancestry in Detroit to support the "Fascist Government."

Testifying before a committee investigating un-American activities, the union executive said: "This meant that American citizens were being asked by the Italian government to be traitorous to their country and carry on actively in support of Fascist Italy."

Police said the 18-year-old suspect in cattle thefts (Duncan Ford, name possibly not privileged in Texas) lowered a 25-foot blanket rope from his cell window, apparently not realizing it was 55 feet short of reaching the ground. 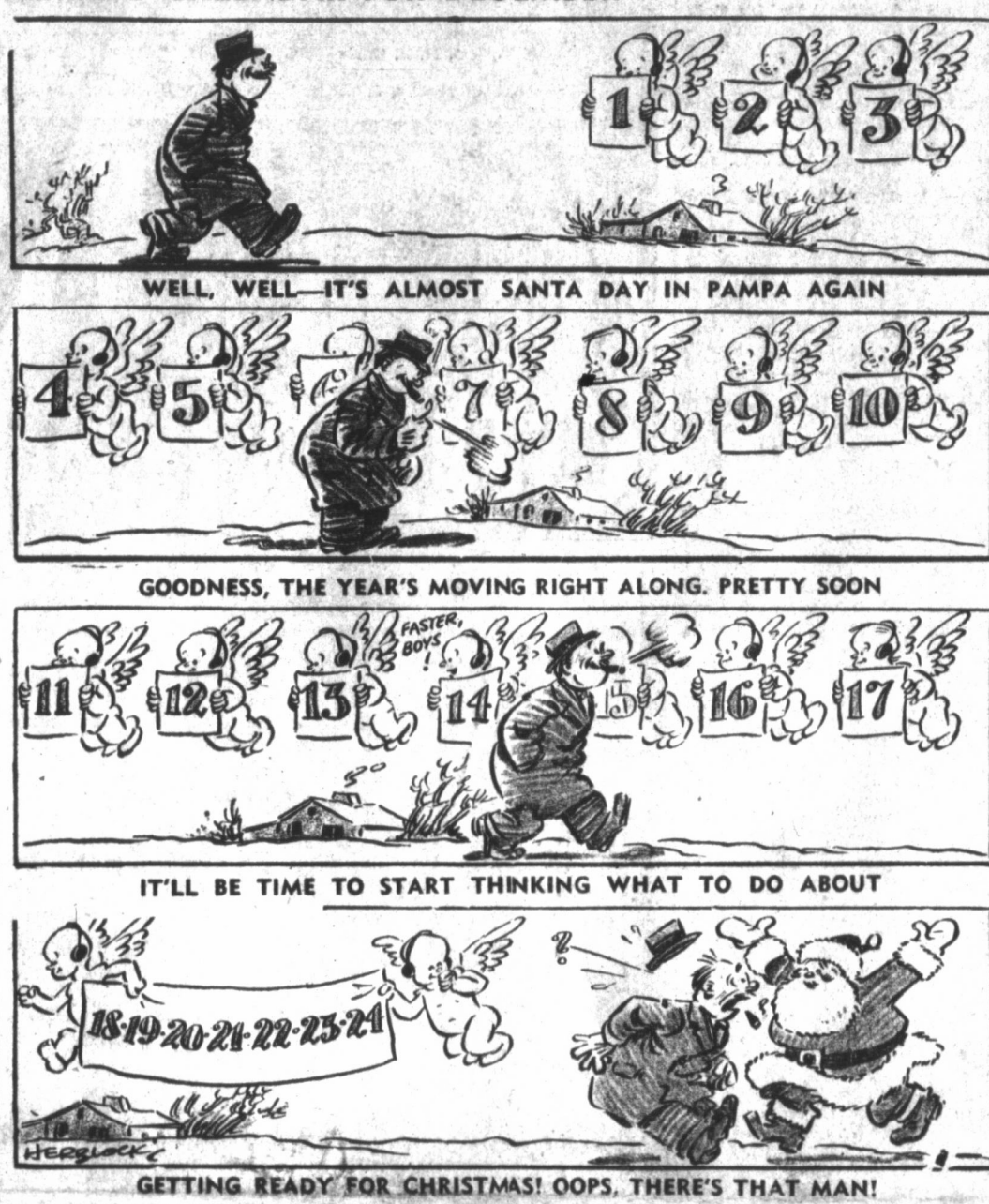
Embargo Shuts Down Chicago Stockyards

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 1 (AP)—A fast freight train crashed into a loaded school bus near here today, killing 26, and seriously injuring at least a dozen others.

Un-American Activities In U. S. Cited By Anson Judge

In a Dallas theater three boys rose and gave the Nazi salute as news-reel pictures of Hitler were shown. In Cincinnati last May 30,000 persons marched. In the parade were red flags but not a single American one. In San Antonio there are 90,000 persons who belong to organizations that are alien. These were cases cited by Omar T. Burleson of Anson, Lions International governor of district 2-T, as he addressed Lions of Pampa. Wheeler, Miami, McLean, and Clarendon in a group 3 banquet held at 7:30 o'clock Wednesday night in the basement of the First Methodist church. "It is our indifference and apathy to our surroundings that does not cause us to be unduly alarmed at these things," Mr. Burleson said. "In our schools we have supplanted the American mythology with a study of waterworks, so that the average American schoolboy doesn't know whether it was the Andy of Amos n' Andy or Andrew Jackson who won the battle of New Orleans." The district governor exhorted Lions to protect liberty against venomous attacks by being good citizens. While he valued that part of the Lions code dealing with the principle of good government and good citizenship, the district governor warned his audience that a slogan was of no avail unless it was a rally call to action. "These times demand the utmost of our powers to preserve liberty," Mr. Burleson said. Youth of today are being swayed by the glamor surrounding dictators, who are "looked upon as heroes upon an opera stage," as the speaker described them. Mr. Burleson emphasized the need of inculcating in youth the spirit of American "mythology," his term for American traditions that are not always correct in every historical detail, but are, in the main, he cited the classic example of Washington crossing the Delaware as one of these. Ford Favors Admission Of Jew Refugees

DETROIT, Dec. 1 (AP)—Henry Ford, who has been accused by some critics of being anti-semitic, believes the admission under immigration quotas of Jews seeking a haven from Nazi persecution would give a "new impetus" to American business.

The automobile manufacturer, who was decorated by the German government on his seventy-fifth birthday last July 30, made the assertion in a statement last night after conferring in his Dearborn office with Rabbi Leo M. Franklin of Temple Beth El, Detroit.

Referring to the grand cross of the Order of the German Eagle which Chancellor Adolf Hitler conferred on him, Ford said:

"My acceptance of a medal from the German people does not, as some people seem to think, involve any sympathy on my part with Nazism. Those who have known me for many years realize that anything that breeds hate is repulsive to me."

Ford said "it is my opinion that the German people, as a whole, are not in sympathy with their rulers in their anti-Jewish policies, which

is the work of a few war-makers at the top."

"I believe that the United States cannot fall at this time to maintain its traditional role as a haven for the oppressed," Ford stated. "I am convinced not only that this country could absorb many of the victims who must find a refuge outside of their native lands, but that as many of them as could be admitted under our selective quota system would constitute a real asset to our country."

"Because of their special adaptability in the fields of production, distribution and agriculture, they would refer to the business of this country a new impetus at a time like this, when it is badly needed."

"I am confident that the time is near when there will be so many jobs available in this country that the entrance of a few thousand Jews, or other immigrants, will be negligible."

It was two years old and Williams said any hunter would have been misled by the deceptive appearance of its horns. What aroused Williams' anger most was the fact that the deer had been abandoned by the hunter who killed it. Had the buck been brought in, he added, it is unlikely a complaint would have been filed because of the freakish appearance of the horns.

League Adopts Canadian Rugby Kicking Rule

CHICAGO, Dec. 1 (AP)—A method of ending means over the football games will be given a trial by the North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference in spring training, and if successful, it will be used next fall.

From Canadian rugby came the idea conference coaches decided to try. It is the "rouge"—a point scored by the kicking team if its kick into the end zone is not returned to the field of play by the defensive eleven.

Representatives of North Dakota University, North Dakota State College, South Dakota State, South Dakota University, Iowa State Teachers,orningside College and Omaha University voted yesterday to test the adaptation of the rugby rule to American intercollegiate football.

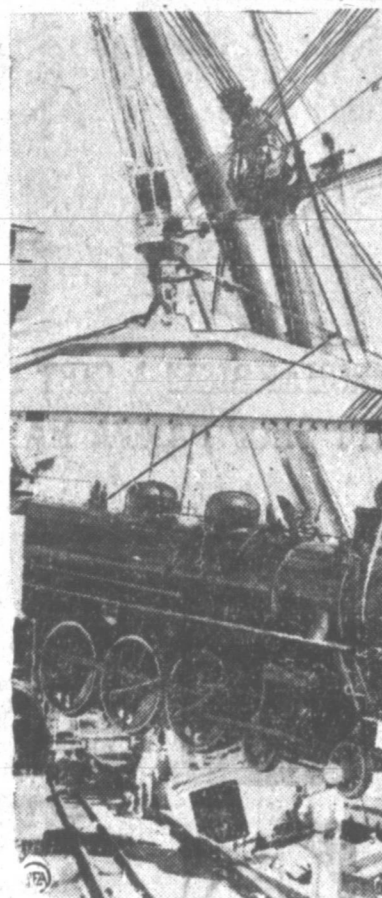

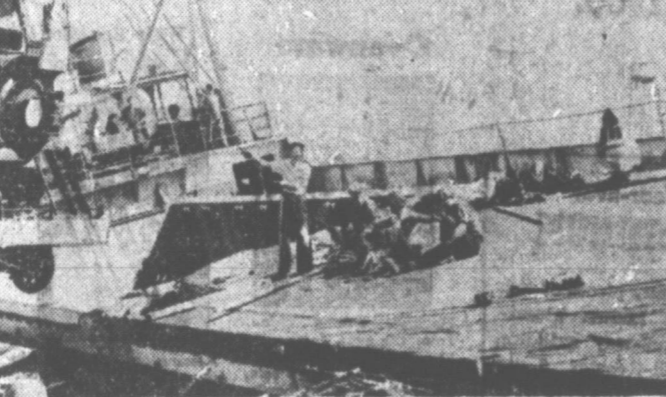
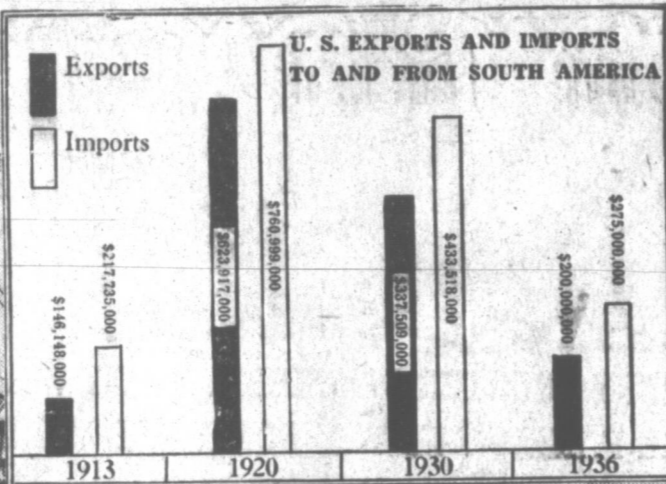

Army Would Avoid Errors Of 1917-18

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1. (AP)—The army gave orders today to streamline preparations for production of munitions.

Louis Johnson, assistant secretary of war, told more than 200 army procurement specialists that in the event of war the high command did not want the experiences of 1917-18 repeated.

Designs for arms and supplies must be simplified and arrangements speeded for mass production, he advised.

"We hope Congress will give us a sufficient stock of munitions to tide us over until industry is ready," Johnson said.

The large, partly bald assistant secretary, one of the President's principal advisers on the prospective rearmament program, summoned the army officers to the first national conference of the kind.

The War Department has been making industrial mobilization plans since passage of the 1920 national defense act.

"We have selected 10,000 plants to which we have given definite schedules of production," Johnson said.

"There are still more than 25 per cent of our items, many of them vital to our cause, for which specifications and drawings have not been completed," he said.

He said in the single-seater fighter airplane of that country, the self-starter had been left out.

As immediate objectives, Johnson specified: 1. Establishment of standard types for all critical arms and supplies.

2. Completion of organization and training of personnel needed to expand supply organizations to war strength.

3. Training of factories by means of current and "educational" orders.

5. Early completion of simple contract forms "adequate for all anticipated war conditions."

BUCHAREST, Dec. 1. (AP)—With King Carol emerging firmly as a strong man ruler, Rumania ordered a purge of terrorists today to obliterate forever the fascist-patterned iron guard.

The country was calm but police acted lest there be any disturbance as the aftermath to the deaths of Corneliu Zelea Codreanu, chief of the illegal guard, and 13 of his followers.

They were shot, authorities said, when they tried to escape from a prison guard detail.

Orders to police were to shoot ruthlessly anyone caught at crime or violence. "Talk later" was the effect of the instructions.

There had been reports the past several days that the guard's secret councils marked several prominent government leaders for death.

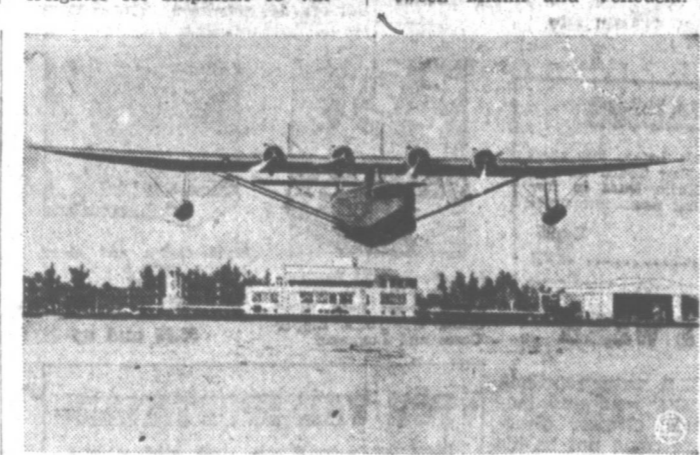

Nazis' Anti-Jewish Drive Furthers Decline Of House Of Rothschild

By MILTON BRONNER. NEA Service Staff Correspondent. LONDON, Dec. 1-Baron Alfons de Rothschild, member of the once-powerful Austrian branch of the financial family, is today living in England, an exile from his home and a possible applicant for British citizenship.

The Rothschild fortunes were founded by Mayer Rothschild, who lived in the ghetto of Frankfurt and died in 1812. He had five sons. Anselm stayed in Frankfurt and carried on the family banking business there. Nathan settled in Great Britain, Solomon in Vienna, Charles in Naples and James in Paris.

It was the English house which made a big fortune by getting first news of Napoleon's defeat at Waterloo in 1815. The English Rothschilds went from triumph to triumph. The second one of this branch, Baron Lionel Nathan Rothschild, was four times elected member of the House of Commons from London before he was allowed to take his seat, the disabilities imposed upon Jews being abolished in 1858.

In France, too, the Rothschilds had stunning successes, surviving triumphantly all changes in the form of government. James, who established the French house, became the great friend of King Louis Philippe.

Down to the time of Leon Blum's Premiership, Rothschilds were regents of the all powerful Bank of France. They ranked among the leaders in the 200 families who are supposed to rule France. The present generation still has vast interests in the French railways.

Julius Streicher, famous as the premier Jew-baiter of Germany, sneeringly remarked: "The era and dynasty of the House of Rothschild, as well as that of the Hapsburg emperors, is over and done with."

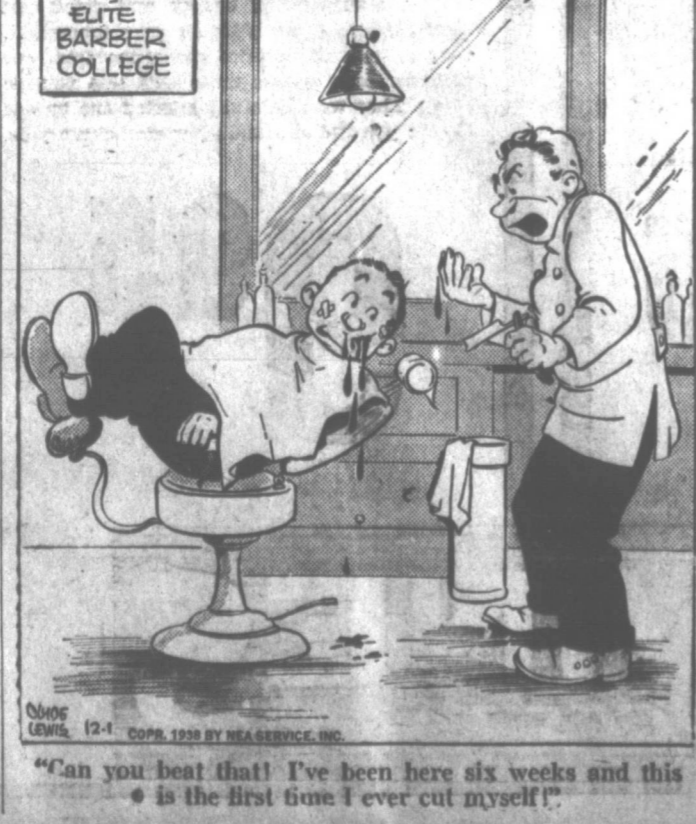

Death Claims Both As Bull Moose Lock Great Horns In Finish Battle For Mate

By BILL GEAGAN

 KOADDO, Me., Dec. 1—A spectacle, which as far as is known, has never been witnessed by a white man, took place recently in the wilderness that sprawls north of this far-flung village when two bull moose, believed to have weighed 900 pounds each, locked horns and died in battle.

Ed Lowell, game warden, and Ray O'Donnell, a guide, found the remains of the warriors on the bloody and badly torn battle ground. They found the huge heads pressed tightly together with the antlers so tightly locked that four men were unable to pry, pull or pound them apart.

This is the first time that such a discovery has been made in Maine's 15,000,000 acres of forest land for many years.

Although dead only three days at the most, nothing remained of the animals but the heads, hides, and legs.

Nearly all the flesh and bones had been devoured or dragged away by bears, bobcats, foxes, hawks, owls, and other furred and feathered predators of the big woods.

The death struggle was apparently brought about by the call of a cow moose that echoed through the forest and instead of attracting one bull, brought two.

SPEAKING OF BATTLES OF THE CENTURY
 Old Indians who have witnessed death battles between bull moose say they are the most horrible and the most sickening spectacles imaginable.

The female seeking a mate lifts its huge antlerless head and utters a long, raspy cry.

A bull within hearing will answer the call with a deep bellowing followed by a series of loud grunts.

The cow, holding its position, continues to call, and the bull, answering at intervals, moves rapidly thru

the wooded hills. The calling continues until the animals are united. Frequently the call of the cow moose is heard by two bulls. This usually means trouble . . . results in a fierce conflict in which one of the animals and sometimes both, are killed.

Arriving at the spot where the cow is waiting, the bulls, seeing each other for the first time, become enraged. Snorting and grunting angrily, the giants immediately prepare for battle.

BULL'S HEAD-ON CHARGE WOULD WRECK AUTOMOBILE

Slowly they circle, tramping down bushes and other obstacles. With manes bristling, nostrils spread, they charge each other with every ounce of their great power.

There is a resounding crash as the sprawling antlers of the brutes collide. When it is considered that one head-on charge of a bull moose will completely wreck a moving automobile, some idea of the terrific impact when two moose come together, can be conceived.

For hours the monsters battle furiously . . . circling, ripping, slashing and charging. Frequently the animals' eyes are gouged out. Their huge bodies are torn and bleeding but they fight to a finish. Nothing but death can call a halt.

Another terrific head-on lunge echoes through the forest and the

huge antlers become locked, the harder the animals try to pull apart the tighter the deadlock becomes.

Finally one of the brutes, becoming completely exhausted, drops to the ground, dragging the other with him. Locked head, necks broken and great bodies heaving and steaming, the animals await death.

Attracted by the clamor, flesh-eaters of the forest gather like fiends for the feast.

Canal Zone Spies Purged As Uncle Sam Cracks Down - - Area Espionage Hotbed

The boys who try to sell U. S. military secrets would like to

know all the workings of this defense weapon.

PANAMA, Canal Zone, Dec. 1.—Whatever the darkening European picture presages for America, the United States has already moved in to action to safeguard the keystone of its security—the Panama Canal. Alarmed by increasing spy threats, and the possibility that the new

world may be involved in any war abroad, the U. S. army has notably tightened defenses within the Zone here, clamped down new restrictions. Following the recent arrest of four alleged Nazi spies every civilian employe of German or Italian citizenship was discharged. The Japanese, long since expected

of espionage, have been generally cleared from the Post Exchanges. Maj.-Gen. David L. Stone, commanding general of the Panama Canal Department, is taking no chances. Under his direction there is a sharp new watch these days—and nights—at all the delicate points in the powerful Canal defenses.

It was directly a result of General Stone's orders that the three men and one woman now awaiting trial for espionage were arrested at Fort Randolph where they were found photographing secret fortifications.

SWATTING THE SPIES
Recognizing that the whole strategy of United States defense rests on ability to keep the Panama Canal open for free fleet movement between both oceans, all branches of the U. S. Intelligence on the Isthmus have pressed into intensive action.

Under the impetus of the Rome-Berlin-Tokyo accord, a new liaison of German, Italian and Japanese agents is believed to be in full operation here. Even though the United States might not be directly involved in war abroad it is realized here that European nations using the Canal, such as Great Britain, might have ships sabotaged in the area. Great Britain is the Canal's second best customer.

There is the equally grave danger of the activities of international spies in the Canal Zone who trade in everything of a secret military nature, irrespective of the country concerned. Lying in wait today about the various soldier haunts of Panama City, these agents are on a constant lookout for army men without funds who might be bought.

PROFAGANDA HERE, TOO
A series of incidents in the area led the army to tighten restrictions and augment its guard. These included activities of Japanese barbers who were said never to have trimmed a head of hair and Japanese "fishermen" who fished spots not with linen lines and baited

hooks but with special steel tapes for taking surroundings.

Before the arrest of the four alleged Nazis, officers detected two



Maj.-Gen. David L. Stone, commanding general of the Panama Canal Department, men lurking in the vicinity of the big 16-inch coast artillery guns at Fort Kobbe on the Pacific side. Sentries fired and wounded one of the prowlers but both escaped. Earlier came the discovery thru

a dead letter of a plot to deliver a foreign government a highly valuable secret military document.

At the same time the government faces the problem of the constant flow of Nazi and Italian propaganda in the countries immediately adjoining the Canal.

The Germans have been especially active in Nicaragua, through which country the United States long has considered building a second great canal as a supplement defense measure. Japanese colonists are increasing in Corinto, in Colombia, two hours south of the Canal by plane. And in Costa Rica at a point two hours from the Canal by air Japanese have leased a large flat tract of land for growing cotton.

PRECAUTIONS APLENTY

So the vigilance of the U. S. army is necessarily increasing. Sentries watch every vessel passing the all-important locks.

Restrictions on flying over the 10-mile wide zone are even more rigid. Windows on passenger planes cannot be opened. Private planes must have special permission to fly over the zone at any time.

The army alone knows the full extent of its Canal defenses. Its huge 14-inch and 16-inch guns, placed "somewhere" along the Canal, are reportedly the largest owned by the United States.

'Girl Friend' Of Hitler Surprised At Newspaper Ad

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 1 (AP)—Lena Riefenstahl, German actress, sports-woman and motion picture producer, who came here to visit winter resorts, felt the chill today of local opinion and retorted—"I am surprised."

The attractive dark-haired woman, who denied on her arrival she was "Hitler's girl-friend," issued a formal statement in reply to an advertisement in a film trade paper by the Hollywood Anti-Nazi League, which proclaimed:

"There is no room in Hollywood for Lena Riefenstahl."

Said she, "I am surprised that a lady making a vacation trip in America to see the most interesting places of this land should be thus personally attacked."

"Already at my arrival in New York, I informed the press that my trip is absolutely private and that I have no official orders to carry out."

"I should like to assert further that I never held an official position in Germany, and could never have been called head of the Nazi film industry."



Terraces And Contour Tillage Given Credit For Good Crops

LITTLEFIELD, Dec. 1 (AP)—Terraces and contour tillage made possible the production of good crops on my farm with only three and a half inches of rainfall in the growing season this year because moisture from the heavy rains of last year was stored in the subsoil," says J. E. Hureska. He owns and operates a 177-acre farm near here.

"If my land had not been terraced and farmed on the contour, I probably would have made no crop at all this year."

When Hureska decided to adopt a soil and moisture conservation program in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service CCC camp at Littlefield in 1936, his land was being damaged by wind erosion and there was considerable gullying and sheet erosion.

First, he abandoned straight-row methods of tillage and the practice of planting his field solid to cotton. Terraces were constructed to hold most of the water where it fell and crops were planted on the contour. Sudan grass was planted on the terraces to strengthen the structures and prevent blowing. The field then was strip cropped, 24 rows of cotton being alternated with 12 rows of grain sorghums.

As a result Hureska harvested a bumper crop in 1937, cotton yielding 91 bales from 125 acres and the sorghum strips producing a ton of threshed grain to the acre. "This year, only three and a half inches of rain fell after I planted my cotton," Hureska said. "Moisture stored in the soil from rain the previous year resulted in a uniform stand of high grade cotton. Despite the low rainfall in the growing season, I have harvested around a half bale of cotton and three-fourths of a ton of grain to the acre. Erosion on my farm has been checked because I head the sorghums by hand and leave a good stubble which furnishes protection against blowing in the alternate cotton strips."

Hureska also planted a tree windbreak around his home in the spring of 1936 and the trees now have attained heights of 10 to 12 feet.

Gold Medal Milch Cow Invited To New York's Fair

WINTERS, Dec. 1 (AP)—Pilgrim's Queen Ruby, gold medal milch cow, has been bidden to the New York World's Fair next year. She is owned by M. E. Loeman, who was invited to exhibit one or more of his registered Jersey herd at the exposition's "Dairy World of Tomorrow."

It is proposed that the unit display a milking herd composed of representative animals of all major breeds. They are to be housed and cared for by a commercial organization in its half million dollar building under rules and conditions governing the use of dairy cows by dairy breed associations. Forty or fifty animals of each breed, which must be free of communicable disease, will be exhibited. They will be milked three times a day, the milk weighed and tested for butterfat.

Pilgrim's Peer Ruby is believed to be one of few gold medal dairy animals in this section. Her dam is Libby's Devotion, and she was sired by Pilgrim's Peer.

Registered of merit requirements are 300 pounds of butterfat in 305 days. Pilgrim's Peer Ruby produced 11,592 pounds of milk, 5.49 per cent butterfat, containing 636 pounds of butterfat, in that period.

CAT FOOLS CONVICTS.

FOLSOM, Calif. (AP)—After convict workers had bricked up a hole in the foundation of the dentist's shop, they heard from within the maw of Rusty, the prison cat. Tearing out their work to rescue him, they were just in time to see the cat walk calmly out of another hole many feet away.

Tech Interested In Beet Demonstration

LUBBOCK, Dec. 1 (AP)—Experiment in commercial production of sugar beets is being carried on at Texas Technological college under the direction of Dr. A. W. Young, head professor of agronomy. Two acres planted on the college farm yielded 17 tons an acre.

The total yield on the south plains this year is estimated at 35 to 40 carloads, 20 loads being shipped to a plant at Rocky Ford, Colo. Advance tests showed a sugar content of 14.3 to 20.3 per cent.

The average yield varies considerably from 17 tons an acre on the Tech plot and 20 tons around Muleshoe, down to five tons in other places. Shipments have been made from Lubbock, Lockney, Muleshoe, Hale Center, Roundup, Anton and other points.

Maverick Successor Leases Apartment For Congress Term

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1 (AP)—Texas representative-elect from San Antonio and his wife have solved the first and probably the most vexing problems faced by all first-term Congressmen.

They've settled the housing question—at least for six months.

After next Jan. 3 Mr. and Mrs. Paul Kilday will be at home to their friends in an apartment house overlooking beautiful Rock Creek Park in northwest Washington. It is some four miles from the capitol.

It isn't "exactly what we wanted," said the attractive, dark haired Mrs. Kilday, but it at least will do until they have more time to look around. The Kildays, married in 1932, have two children. They hope to find some place for the youngsters to play and may move to a residence with a yard in the suburbs when their present six-month contract expires.

The former prosecuting attorney of Bexar county who undoubtedly will be referred to during his first days here as the "man who beat Maury Maverick," did other things besides apartment-hunting during a brief visit to the capital.

He gained virtual assurance of space in the new House office building on the sixth floor.

Most of the Texas members of Congress are located in the new building. Notable exceptions are Reps. Summers of Dallas and Lanham of Fort Worth, whose offices and committee rooms are in the old House office building, and Majority Leader Sam Rayburn of Bonham, whose suite is in the capitol. Maverick's office was in the old building.

Kilday and his wife left the capitol Nov. 21 by automobile for San Antonio. They will return when the session opens after the Christmas holidays.

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SOUTH AMERICA GOES FASCIST, SAYS FLYNN, BUT NOT PRO-GERMAN

Are Europe's Fascist powers penetrating politically as well as commercially into South America? This is one of four articles written for The Pampa News by John T. Flynn, noted journalist-economist.

By JOHN T. FLYNN.
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The trade drive of the fascist powers in South America has become seriously mixed up with the question of the drive of fascism and nazism there.

Travelers go to Brazil, Chile, Peru, Ecuador and come back with what seems to be wholly differing reports. One assures us these countries have not gone fascist. Another tells us with emphasis that they have. The contradictions arise entirely out of a failure of the several reporters to understand what fascism is.

Most people imagine that it is an essentially German or Italian product and that going fascist means teaming up with Germany or Italy. Therefore one writer tells us these countries have not gone, into a German gang agreement, hence they are not fascist. The idea that a country may go fascist and yet be utterly hostile to Germany does not seem to occur to them.

First, therefore, we must know what fascism is. Fascism is a form of economic nationalism organized to control and direct the capitalist economic system with the object of

making it work, under the domination of a dictator. All the dramatic excesses—the mob scenes, the marching shirt brigades, the swastikas, the hounding of Jews, the militaristic jingoism—are merely the external trappings.

The central core of fascism is an attempt to make the economic system work by controlling it. This of course is what Socialism attempts. But Socialism abolishes profit and private property. Fascism seeks to preserve profit and private property. It divides the nation into two sections. The political life it leaves to legislatures, public officials geographically arranged. The economic life it turns over to groups arranged by trades.

Each industry has its governing body chosen within the industry. But this governing group is chosen chiefly by the employers. Labor has a voice but through certain repressive policies that voice is kept very low. Over this economic life the political officials have little to say. But the dictator is the final authority of course.

The dictator is essential to this set-up. It won't work in a democracy. It attempts minute regulation of the conduct of every business. It is impossible to get compliance unless there is a ruthless dictator. And where you have a dictator you have appeals to the basest prejudices and to violence until the dictator has killed off all opposition.

By this standard there is no doubt

that South American countries are on their way to fascism.

In Peru, for instance, Benavides suspended the constitution, surrounded himself with storm troopers, subjected regulation to minute economic regulation, adopted numerous social laws—old age insurance, collective bargaining, three months notice to workers before dismissal with severance pay, restaurants for the poor, model villages, huge public works programs, military preparation.

In Brazil Vargas, by a coup d'etat, overthrows the constitution and writes his own, proclaims the corporative state, gives military in a big way. Because of this some writers said he had led Brazil to fascism. But because he took measures against German propaganda and their antics, others said he had not gone fascist. These latter made the mistake of supposing that going fascist means teaming up with Germany or Italy. Beyond a doubt Brazil is going fascist as are most of the other countries with the possible exception of Colombia.

There is opposition to it. In Chile the popular front has just won an election by a slim majority. The defeated candidate, don Gustavo Ross, leader of the rightists, however, would have given the state a complete fascist regime had he won.

But he is violently anti-German—anti-foreign, in fact.

Indeed, this is the key to South America. Her countries suffer from serious economic disintegration. They are commodity countries like many of our states are commodity states. The dislocation of the world's commodity markets has seriously hit countries like Brazil with her coffee, Chile with her nitrates and copper, Argentina with her wheat and beef.

In seeking to repair their economic life they turn to the fascist pattern. They do not call it that. Indeed many do not realize it. But the fascist pattern means nationalism. South Americans are intensely nationalist. They are suspicious of foreigners. They dislike German penetration or American penetration, or English exploitation. They are fascist but not pro-German.

Of course the Germans carry on intensive propaganda. There are Nazi parties. They operate a powerful short wave station which floods every country with programs interspersed with propaganda. The Transocean News Service—a German corporation—operates as a domestic South American concern. Professors are furnished to schools free. Literature, magazines, books, lecturers swarm over the country.

In spots such as Santa Catherine province in Brazil, where Germans are congregated, they turn the schools into Nazi propaganda hives, teach the children to drill, sing the

Horst Wessel song and "Hell Hitler" instead of "Viva Brazil."

But the most level-headed Americans in South America say the best answer to all this is to let the Germans alone. Already South Ameri-

can countries become indignant at this. In Brazil laws have been adopted to break up German population clusters and to limit immigration, while propagandists have been expelled. South Americans are al-

lergic to drilling, saulting, singing Nazis.

The sum of all this is that South America is going fascist but not Nazi or pro-German. But how is the United States faring amid all

this? That's the point to be considered in tomorrow's article.

to the end, a native flicked it over oxen he was driving and on the rebound the wire pierced his heart. He died almost immediately.

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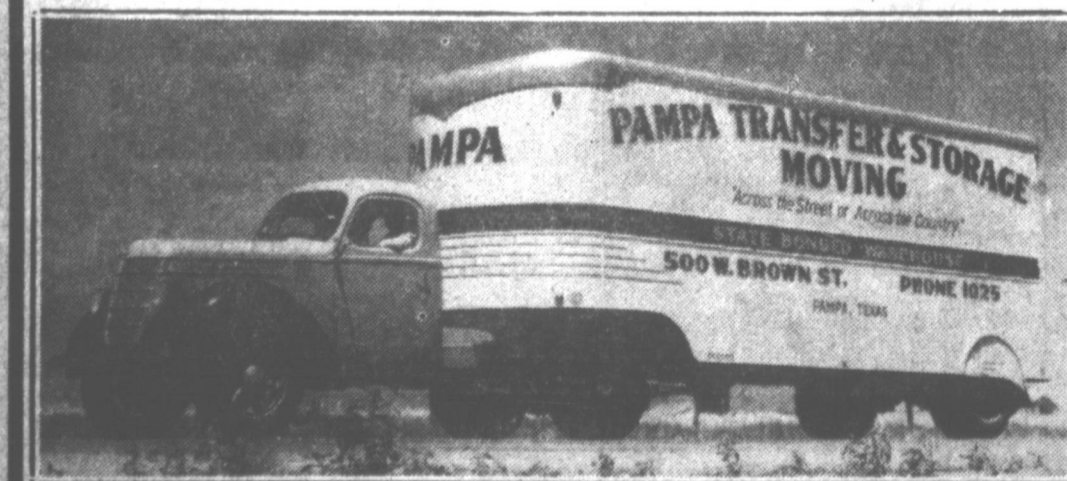
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
