## VIOLENCE CONTINUES

### Truckers Split On Agreements

A split in the ranks of the independent truck drivers over acceptance of a government settlement offer today triggered new violence in the 9-day-old drivers' strike.

Even so, there were indications that more trucks were on the road than at any time this week and that truck stop business was returning to normal.

Two truck drivers were shot and wounded, one critically, in Ohio early today. In Pennsylvania, a truck traveling on Route 22 near Hollidaysburg was struck by a bullet fired from a passing car. The slug failed to penetrate the cab and the driver was not injured.

The Mississippi Highway Patrol reported three trucks fired on during the night. Two lumber trucks were hit by bullets and a third one was fired on by two white men armed with shotguns. No one was injured.

Two drivers have been killed thus far as a result of violence connected with the strike by drivers for lower fuel costs and higher freight rates. One driver was shot to death and the other

was killed when a rock thrown through the windshield of his truck caused him to lose control and crash.

Lawrence Huff, 48, New Waterford, Ohio, was shot in the stomach today while driving on Ohio 11 near East Liverpool for the Ray Molder Carrier Corp. Snipers opened fire on his rig and another that had been following close behind, police said.

Another truck driver was shot in the leg near the Elyria exit on the Ohio Turnpike. The Ohio Highway Patrol said he was standing beside his truck when he was fired on by someone in a passing car.

Today's violence came only hours after many drivers across the country shouted against a compromise proposal reached Thursday in Washington that did not meet all of their demands. There were threats to continue the walkout.

Meanwhile, more and more grocery outlets reported dwindling food supplies.

In Washington Teamster President Frank E. Fitzsimmons, Nixon's staunchest labor supporter, condemned the strike Thursday and urged all of his members to keep the trucks rolling.

More than half the independent drivers who own their own rigs are members of the Teamsters. But many of them were forced to join in order to remain in business and are hostile to the union.

The agreement reached after negotiations in Washington provides for truckers to get all the diesel fuel they need, to pass on increased fuel prices to the firms that hire them and for government monitoring of prices and supplies.

There were reports that truck traffic picked up after the agreement was announced, but on-the-scene observers said the increase was not large enough to make much difference.

Traffic Higher  
Transportation Secretary Claude Brinegar said late Thursday that a review of the situation with several governors indicated that "truck traffic is higher today than yesterday and that the truck stops are returning to more normal operations. In the key central states of Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan and Pennsylvania, truck traffic flows are reported to be up significantly."

Some Panhandle school systems which had closed last week reopened in the middle of the week.

### Schools Report High Absentee Rates Again

A spot check of four Pampa schools this morning indicated the number of students absent in the system today would be around 20 percent for the third straight day, Superintendent James F. Malone said.

Dr. Malone indicated exactly how many students did not attend class because of flu, strep throat and other illnesses rampant in the city and the rest of the Panhandle would not be known until this afternoon, when the schools phoned in their completed attendance reports.

He said two of the schools checked reported less than 20 percent absent and the two others reported slightly more than 20 percent not in class.

Absenteeism in system schools was 20.11 percent Wednesday and slightly more than 20 percent yesterday.

Perryton and Shamrock closed their schools earlier this week with plans to reopen Monday.

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### Natural Gas Rates Increase Expected

An increase in natural gas rates in Pampa can be expected within the next couple of months.

That increase for the immediate future could amount to as much as \$1 a month on the average gas bill.

City Manager Mack Wofford said today the increase would come about through local approval of a recommendation by a 12-man steering committee, representing 58 cities on Pioneer's West Texas distribution system.

The recommendation is that Pioneer's request for a monthly cost-of-gas rate adjustment be allowed in order to keep the company competitive in gas production, meet rising exploration and production

costs and to assure an adequate gas supply for local consumers.

Pampa Mayor R.D. Wilkerson, City Manager Mack Wofford and City Commissioner Ray Thompson conferred with utility company officials yesterday in Amarillo. Pioneer officials at the meeting were K. Bert Watson, company president; W.H. Lampe, vice president and secretary, and James McCoy, manager of Pioneer's branch office in Pampa.

The conference was called at the request of the City of Pampa to seek answers to several questions in the company's adjustment request.

Wofford said city officials still are studying the request and all city commissioners were to be briefed on the results of yesterday's conference.

The city manager added that it now appeared that no action will be taken at next Tuesday's regular meeting on the gas rate matter, but an ordinance is expected to be prepared for consideration at the commission's regular meeting Feb. 26.

Pampa's gas rate currently lower than most cities on Pioneer's West Texas system.

The city manager said that was because the rate established some years ago for Pampa was based on the fact that all of the gas consumed in Pampa came from the local area.

At present, city officials were told by the utility company yesterday, 75 percent of the gas Pioneer supplies to Pampa is produced from other fields.

# Skylab Astronauts Return After Longest Spaceflight

## TO DISCUSS DISPUTE

### White House Lawyers, Jaworski Hold Meeting

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Watergate Prosecutor Leon Jaworski and White House lawyers held a "lengthy meeting" today, apparently to discuss the latest dispute over obtaining further evidence from President Nixon for the grand juries investigating the scandal.

There was no indication precisely what was discussed, or whether any progress was made toward meeting Jaworski's recent request for more tapes and documents short of a court battle.

The special prosecutor and White House special counsel held a lengthy meeting this morning. Jaworski's office said in a terse statement. "The matter remains under discussion."

The White House had no immediate comment.

Meanwhile, U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell was reported to be preparing an order, to be issued later in the day, dealing with Nixon's refusal to honor a Senate Watergate Committee subpoena for five of his secret tapes.

The committee voted unanimously Thursday to stall issuance of its final report until May 28—a three-month delay—at Jaworski's request.

At this morning's meeting, held at the special prosecutor's office, were Jaworski,

his deputy, Henry S. Ruth; Nixon's chief Watergate lawyer James D. St. Clair; and another presidential counsel, John A. McCahill.

It was understood they discussed the "lengthy communication" Nixon sent to Jaworski earlier this week in response to his request for an unspecified number of additional materials to present to the Watergate grand juries prior to issuance of indictments, which are expected shortly.

In his State of the Union message last week, Nixon said he already had provided Jaworski everything he needed to complete his investigation, apparently signalling he would resist surrendering any more evidence.

The Senate Watergate Committee said Thursday it will ask the Senate to extend its life three months from the current Feb. 28 deadline and to appropriate an additional \$300,000 for the committee's work. The committee already has received \$1.5 million.

At an executive session of the committee Thursday, Sen. Howard Baker asked that a new probe be launched into the CIA's involvement in the Watergate scandal.

Baker, after asking the committee staff to leave the meeting, asked for a probe into charges the CIA was more

deeply involved in the Watergate break-in and bugging than has been testified to so far, informed sources reported.

While committee members were hesitant to comment, Sen. Lowell P. Weicker, R-Conn., said "There was an involvement, there will be a continuing scrutiny to see if there was more."

The decision to delay the final report came one week after Jaworski requested such a delay, fearing his prosecution of defendants in the case would be prejudiced by publicity.

### Simon Urges States To Plan Ration Systems

The increasing trend toward gasoline rationing was given a boost Thursday when federal energy chief William E. Simon urged states to set up their own rationing systems.

In many places the systems are regional rather than statewide, creating a checkerboard effect. Thirteen states now have some form of gasoline control within their borders.

In Albany, N.Y., Assistant U.S. Secretary of Transportation Robert H. Binder, said the various gasoline allocation plans adopted by various states should be considered interim steps and urged the country to prepare for possible full-scale rationing.

In his telegrams to governors urging the introduction of rationing programs, Simon said an optional form of rationing would "discourage a rash of panic buying which has caused time delays, personal inconvenience and extra traffic problems around service stations."

The most popular form of rationing is the so-called "Oregon Gas Distribution Plan," where motorists with even-numbered license plates get fuel one day and odd numbers the next, with Saturday as a free-for-all gas-buying day.

Binder, who spoke at a seminar on the impact of the energy crisis on transportation, has asked that all metropolitan areas have contingency plans for energy conservation ready by March 15 and that the plans be implemented by May 1. His request went in letters to the governors of several states.

New York, Massachusetts, Washington, D.C., and Washington state have announced plans to start gasoline controls next week.

Cities that have introduced rationing plans include several in populous northeastern New Jersey and Connecticut. Counties in Florida and New York also have rationing plans in effect.

ABOARD USS NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — The last Skylab astronauts landed on target in the gentle Pacific today from man's longest spaceflight, an 84-day, 34.5 million mile journey that opened the way for a trip someday to Mars.

"It's good to be back," said mission commander Gerald P. Carr as he, Edward G. Gibson and William R. Pogue chatted with recovery forces in helicopters hovering overhead their landing capsule.

The Skylab 3 astronauts splashed down about 6,000 yards from this veteran recovery ship. The astronauts indicated they were in good shape after spending nearly three months in weightless space.

"Well done," said Pogue as he and his crewmates took pulse readings to see how well they were adjusting to the rigors of earth gravity. They wore special pressure pants to prevent blood from pooling in their legs.

A crane hoisted the Apollo, with the astronauts inside, aboard an aircraft elevator on this ship at 10:56 a.m. CDT—only 39 minutes after splash-down.

America's first space station was left behind in a 269-283 mile high orbit where it is expected to drift like a ghost ship around earth for at least five to eight years. Stowed aboard was a "time capsule" containing equipment for possible retrieval by visiting spacemen in the future.

The astronauts returned to earth on their 1,213th orbit and, like the beginning of the \$2.6 billion project nine months ago, a technical problem had to be overcome. Just before reentry, the pilots discovered one of two redundant control rocket systems was leaking. The astronauts used the other system without difficulty.

After three parachutes eased the Apollo landing ship into the ocean, Gibson asked how close they had come to the New Orleans.

"Looks like three miles to us," replied recovery officers.

"Not bad for the first time," Gibson said.

The astronauts began their day when they awakened at 10 p.m. Thursday night and spent 8½ hours closing down the 96-ton laboratory.

"It's really been a useful machine," Carr told mission control in Houston after the astronauts moved away from Skylab in the Apollo command ship they rode back to earth. "I hate to think we're the last guys to use it."

The recovery ship New Orleans is expected to dock in San Diego Saturday and the Skylab 3 spacemen are due back home in Houston Sunday night for a long-awaited reunion with their wives. They must remain away from their children, however, for another week to give them time to adjust again to earth's germs.

### Price Opposing Salary Increase

WASHINGTON — Congressman Bob Price acted yesterday to oppose a proposed 7.5 percent pay raise for congressmen, federal judges and high level government executives.

Under current procedures, these pay raises will take effect 30 days after being recommended to the Congress by the President, unless either House of Congress acts to kill the increase.

Price has signed a discharge petition to force to the House floor for action a bill which would change that procedure. He also introduced his own bill in this regard.

The bill would force Congressmen to vote publicly on pay raise proposals. The discharge petition is to force a similar bill from the House Post Office & Civil Service Committee.

Under the rules, discharge petitions take effect upon the signature of half the members of the House.

Doctors predict it will take the spacemen about three weeks to readapt to the rigors of gravity after spending so long without it in orbit. Medical tests aboard Skylab during the past few weeks, however, showed they were in excellent shape.

The spacemen undocked from their trusty, eight-room home in space at 5:34 a.m. CDT and began their long trip back.

After undocking from Skylab, the astronauts circled the big orbiting laboratory for a final inspection. They reported it showed the effects of numerous repairs made to it during the past nine months.

"I'll tell you, this vehicle sure looks like she's been worked over," Carr reported. "It's been a good home."

The three quiet, introspective astronauts spent their final hours in space much as they had the three months since launch on Nov. 16, working cheerfully on the task before them.

Mission scientist Gibson, a solar physicist living out a lifelong dream during the flight, sent valuable data on the sun back to Earth up to the final minute before he had to turn off Skylab's solar observatory forever.

### Terrorist Group Holding Heiress

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI) — Police said today that the terrorist group which says it kidnaped publishing heiress Patricia C. Hearst apparently has more evidence to back its claim.

The Symbionese Liberation Army, an underground organization that previously said it assassinated the Oakland, Calif., school superintendent, said in a letter Thursday that it was holding Miss Hearst, 19, in "protective custody." The letter warned she would be killed if attempts were made to rescue her.

A gasoline credit card was enclosed in the letter to authenticate the message and the victim's father, publisher Randolph A. Hearst, identified the card.

Police Lieutenant David Johnson of the Detective Division revealed early today that Miss Hearst's fiancé, Steven Weed, told investigators her wallet was taken by the abductors who burst into her apartment Monday night, beat him and fled with his hostage.

Johnson speculated there would soon be "another communique" and said additional items from the wallet would probably be enclosed.

It was Johnson who also "speculated" late Wednesday night that the kidnapers would be "heard from in the next day or so."

The letter was received the next day by Berkeley radio station KPFA.

Johnson told newsmen he felt the terrorists "probably mean what they say about execution."

"Our first consideration is the safety of the girl," he said.

Weed said Thursday he will not testify against the kidnapers if Miss Hearst is returned unharmed.

Bates said it would be "up to the family" to decide if authorities would press their search.

### Freight Train Car Derailed Near Kingsmill

WHITE DEER — One car of an eastbound Santa Fe freight train jumped the track this morning approximately one mile west of Kingsmill, causing a slight delay in operations of the track.

Delbert Thurman, Santa Fe agent here, said the car was in a ditch on the eastbound main line when it derailed.

Thurman said there were no injuries in the mishap and very little damage done to the car or the track.

Eastbound traffic on the line was switched to the westbound main line in the mishap area until necessary repairs were made, Thurman said.

### School Paper Supports Seven-Man Board Issue

Pampa High School's professional people employed by the district have been obtained on petitions available at the schools.

Besides the petitions at each school in the city, people who are registered voters who wish to sign a petition may do so at the school business office and at Carver Center. Individuals are also circulating petitions.

John Gikas, co-owner of the Coney Island cafe and former member of the school board, said today he had 300 signatures on a petition at his business and added, "I only have room for six more names on the petition here." Gikas estimated between 500-600 signatures have been collected city-wide.

Deadline for the filing of the petition with County Judge Don Cain is March 6, slightly less than a month away.

## Man Still Not Too Far From Animals?

Two recent television specials have given us some food for thought, and may even hold some lessons for us.

One was the Jane Goodall study of "The Baboons of Gombe." The baboon troop is dominated by a powerful male who rules over it. In the words of Robert Ardrey, baboons live in "an authoritarian society of compulsion and compliance, threat and punishment" — in other words, a society of tyranny.

The other show was "Primal Man — the Battle for Dominance." The characterizations of early Neanderthal man seemed highly speculative, and at times even somewhat silly. Yet, if

there was any truth in those characterizations, the society of stone-age man was also one dominated by the strongest males.

The idea of dominance has carried down to today's society, as illustrated in the program by all-male bars and clubs, sports which demonstrate the dominance of one or of a team over another, and in our political system where candidates seek dominance over others by majority vote.

One segment of the program described an experiment at Stanford University, where one group of students was given the role of prisoners, and another group played the role of guards. Within six days, the experiment had become so realistic that the

professor in charge cancelled it. The guards had turned to brutal tyrants, while the prisoners had submitted almost completely to their will.

The "prison experiment" is not a doomsday message — it's a warning," said the commentator. "It shows us how easily man accepts the impersonal rules of order as substitutes for human understanding; how conditioned he has become to respond to dominant symbols of authority — to a job, a role, to a label in society that forces him into patterns of behavior which dehumanize him and destroy in him the sense of responsibility for his own actions."

"We have refined dominance from the use of physical strength one against one, to the

creation of institutions — the law, the state — by which power can be symbolically extended over entire populations."

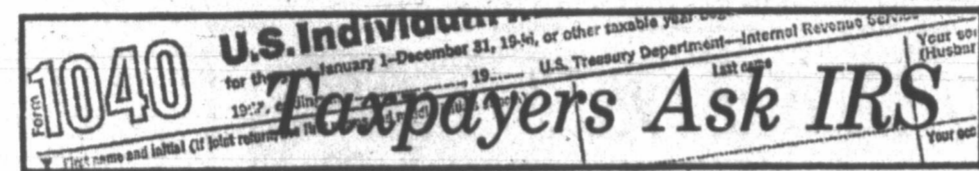
It appears to this observer that man's society has advanced toward civilization little beyond that of the baboon. We have only refined our methods of asserting dominance through modern day institutions. The prison experiment showed what short way we have come, and how tenuous is our hold on traits that we consider to be human.

If we accept "civilization" as a state of high development of our human characteristics, as opposed to the animal, we must agree that our present civilization is indeed primitive. A society marked by world terrorism from the motiveless murders in San Francisco to the terrorism of Ireland and the Middle East can hardly be called civilized.

Dominance as depicted on this week's television is a holdover from the baboon society. If we are to find true civilization man must learn the difference between dominance and leadership. Leadership implies the setting of example or being out in front, followed voluntarily by those who accept the leader.

The forceful domination of a society by an individual or a group is tyranny. Its forced conformity limits the individuals' ability to improve their condition, and therefore limits the ability of the entire group or society to progress toward a better civilization.

Man discovered long ago that individuals working in voluntary association with each other can provide more human satisfactions than a coercive system of dominance. As more and more individuals recognize that truth we will advance toward a truly human civilization.



This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q. Can you still deduct state gasoline taxes on your Federal income tax return?

A. Yes. If you itemize on your 1973 return, state and local taxes on gasoline, diesel fuel, and other motor fuels are deductible if they are separately stated and passed on to the consumer. Use the table in your Form 1040 instructions to determine your deduction.

Q. Is there a "revenue sharing" question on 1973 returns?

A. For purposes of revenue sharing, the only information you have to give on your return is your county of residence. See the instructions for either Form 1040 or Form 1040A.

Q. My son earned more than \$750 last year. Can I still claim him as a dependent?

A. If, regardless of his age, your son was a full-time student for some part of each of any five months of 1973 or was less than 19 years old at the end of the year, you can claim him as a dependent regardless of how much money he made. Of course, all other dependency tests must be met, including furnishing more than one-half of your son's total support.

Q. What happened to Schedule B of my tax form—the schedule I used to detail interest and dividend income?

A. Schedule B has been eliminated, since a detailed listing of dividends and interest is no longer required. Simply report your total dividend and interest income in the space provided on the front of your Federal income tax return.

Of course, you should still keep a record of your individual dividend and interest receipts.

Q. I received a short form 1040A in the mail. How can I tell if I should use this short form or the long form 1040?

A. If you received a short form 1040A in the mail, it was sent to you based on the return you filed last year. But your situation may have changed and you may save money by filing Form 1040 instead. This is especially true if your itemized deductions are substantial, or if you are eligible for the retirement income credit. Just use the short formula set out in your Form 1040A instructions to help determine whether your tax could be lower if you itemize deductions.

Q. The person I paid to fill out my tax return has not signed it. Should I make sure that he does?

A. Yes. Anyone who prepares your return for compensation is required to sign it in the space provided. Spaces are also provided for the preparer's employer identification number

or social security number, his address, and the date he signs the return. If he refuses to sign, you should print his name in the space provided.

Q. Will the IRS still figure out a person's tax liability, if he or she wants it to?

A. Yes. If you use Form 1040, the Internal Revenue Service will figure out your tax if your adjusted gross income is \$20,000 or less and was only from wages or salaries and tips, dividends, interest, pensions and annuities, you take the standard deduction and file your return by the due date.

If you use the short form 1040A, the IRS will compute your tax, regardless of the amount of income you have, if your income consists only of wages or salaries and tips, dividends and interest, and you file by the due date. For more details, see your tax form instructions.

In earlier years, the jump responses of three spades over one spade, three hearts over one heart, three diamonds over one diamond, and three clubs over one club, have shown 13-15 points and four or more trumps. And, of course, these responses were forcing bids.  
 During the past decade and a half, more and more experts have been using this type of response (1S...3S, etc. as "limit" bids, showing 9-11 points, counting distribution. These limit responses, naturally, are not forcing.  
 The hands with which these bids are made are those where, over an opening bid of one heart, for example, one would like to bid 2 1/2 hearts. For instance: (S) 72 (H) K953 (D) A K 64 (C) 863. The objectives of these limit bids are: (1) to convey precise information to partner and at the same time (2) to pre-empt the opponents out of bidding space should the latter possess the better cards.  
 Today's deal depicts the limit bid in action. The bid worked out well — but only because the trump king happened to be located favorably.

Although North's "limit" bid response of three spades showed only 9-11 points, South decided to gamble on the small slam despite the fact that he had only a 20-point hand.  
 After winning the opening lead with his ace of hearts, declarer led the six of clubs to dummy's jack. He then laid down the jack of trumps, and when East followed with the four-spot, South played the three. With the jack winning.

# Squatters Occupy Empty Building

LONDON — For 10 years the concrete- and-glass slab has thrust its 33 stories into the London sky — unrented, unoccupied, but climbing in value to 2 millions to 5 million pounds (\$4.4 million to \$11 million) a year.

Physically and figuratively the building has been a

monument to property speculation. But recently the deserted monolith suddenly came alive. The vacant windows leered with irreverent signs: "Homes not Offices" and "Occupied by the People."

Centre Point, the empty office tower dominating the intersection of Tottenham Court Road and Oxford Street like a 300,000-foot gravestone, was

inhabited for the first time since built — by 80 defiant but disciplined squatters.

**Concern for People**  
"We are concerned about ordinary people wanting homes to live in," explained a spokesman for the not-so-ordinary band of lawyers, teachers, labor union leaders, left-wing demonstrators, and homeless families squatting inside.

without tenants to pay the sky-high rents.

Centre Point's ghostly companions include, at last reckoning, a 12-floor glassy tower near Paddington Station, vacant 11 years; a sleek round complex near Centre Point unrented six years; a 22-floor block overlooking the River Thames empty five years.

Judging by the din of car horns that sometimes drowned out his words ("Honk if you're with us," appealed placards), the protest aroused wide sympathy among characteristically law-abiding Londoners.

"This building," said a young physician, son in hand, who joined 2,500 supporters at a rally Jan. 20, "represents the clearest symbol of what's wrong with England today: putting profits before human needs."

The squatters departed voluntarily after the rally. But behind them they leave the issue of property speculation looming as large on the British political skyline as an empty skyscraper.

**The New Tycoons**  
At a time when inflation, a slumping stock market, and a foreign-trade deficit are undermining other sources of wealth, the developers of property on this space - short island are the new British tycoons.

At least 110 persons are reported to have become millionaires (twice-over millionaires in dollar terms) in the property market since World War II.

Among the richest 10 percent of Britons, property investments now rank as the second largest source of wealth (behind the stock market), latest government figures disclose.

So lucrative is some commercial property that a few new but fast-fading office buildings, such as Centre Point, continue to appreciate the value

of the growing pressure increasingly generates political rumblings.

**Owner Criticized**  
Two successive ministers in charge of housing in the Cabinet of Prime Minister Edward Heath have publicly criticized Harry Hyams, owner of Centre Point and 42 other London buildings.

And the normally pro-business Cabinet proposes to slap an annual fine of 30 percent of market value on property developments delayed longer than four years.

The opposition Labour Party's Socialists would go much further. They would flatly nationalize all "land required for development."

"Something is clearly wrong," the party's program last year said, "when over 10 million square feet of London space stand empty at a time when over 100,000 London families are on (public housing) waiting lists."

## The Lighter Side

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Upright, unassuming and as sincere as a regimental stripe necktie, Gerald R. Ford looked like the ideal choice when he was first named vice president.

But now both President Nixon, who appointed him, and the Democratic Congress that confirmed his nomination are beginning to realize they may have made a ghastly mistake.

Within a short time after his swearing-in, public opinion polls gave Ford a national popularity rating equal to or surpassing that of any Democrat lusting after the 1976 presidential nomination.

Whatever it is the electorate sees in Ford had been largely invisible during the years he served as House GOP leader.

**His C-Tef Qualification**  
In fact, his apparent lack of presidential prospects was regarded by Democrats as Ford's chief qualification for the vice presidency.

Thus his sudden looming in the early trial heats as a stronger potential candidate than their own guys has filled Democrats with regret and dismay.

But if they rue the day they so blithely voted him into his new office, imagine how much Nixon must have felt like kicking himself when he saw this week's Gallup Poll.

For it showed that a plurality

of voters—46 per cent to 32 per cent, if you are keeping score—would rather have Ford than Nixon in the White House for the next three years.

If there is anything the President doesn't need at this stage of the impeachment fight it is a backup man with a larger following than he has.

Democrats and Nixon supporters with whom I discussed these surveys were understandably pretty bitter about Ford's rise in public esteem.

"This is outrageous," one Democrat told me. "We voted to confirm Ford in the expectation that he would restore the vice presidency to its traditional role of political anonymity."

**Almost Breach of Faith**  
"For him to become more appealing presidential material than the Democratic aspirants is almost a breach of faith."

I pointed out that Ford had made no effort to thrust himself

forward for presidential consideration and therefore was not personally to blame for his standing in the polls.

"Maybe he hasn't overtly sought mention as a possible candidate," the Democrat replied darkly, "but he can't divorce himself for the responsibility for his own popularity."

A Nixon supporter was even more hostile.

"What right does Ford have being more revered than the President?" the Nixonite demanded. "He got that job precisely because he was not a threat to anyone in either party."

Ford I'm sure, didn't deliberately make himself adorable. But somehow he has got to learn to curb his lovable nature.

## Report to Shareholders

The oil industry of this country is taking a beating these days. Under attack by environmental groups, government at every level and, sadly, much of the press (which doesn't seem to understand that if the drive to discredit and nationalize the oil industry is successful the press, itself, could be next), the industry is having an extremely difficult time getting its message across to the public.

These facts are cogently pointed out by Rawleigh Warner, Jr., chairman of the board of Mobil Oil Corporation. In a recent report to the company's shareholders. ## Question Box

QUESTION: Have we in fact regressed to the point where honest men can not discuss an idea on its merit, and blend the ideas so that it will be good for most people?

—L.W.

ANSWER: This question is most important in our view. There have always been differences between people of different beliefs, religious, political, economic. In the United States, those differences frequently have resulted in violence. Probably nothing ever tore the people in this nation apart so much as the question of slavery. Yet there were economic considerations as well as the question of human slavery which led to the holocaust which was the war between North and South.

One wise observer of the nation's history once reminded us that the nation outlawed human slavery after the Civil War Between the States, and had a half century of comparative progress until slavery was authorized by means of the income tax and the military draft. Those two steps have changed the entire life of the country and have resulted in new divisions of the American people.

The military draft bore out the predictions of Daniel Webster, that the ability to force men into military service would permit sending them throughout the world to advance the objectives of the politicians in power. The income tax, combined with the ability to issue unlimited paper currency through the Federal Reserve System, provided the politicians with the ability to finance the international war-making and regulatory controls over the people of the nation.

It was this international activity by the politicians of both parties which brought about the downfall of the present administration.

When the successor administration was unable to end the events as quickly as the public had been led to expect, the attacks started against the present administration.

Now people on both sides of the political spectrum are inclined to point the finger of blame at those of the other side.

"Unless there is a willingness to agree to return to some universal standard of right by men of good will, we are not optimistic that there will be a change from the present regression.

## INSIDE LABOR Shultz Is Told Of New Heavy Oil Flow Into United States

By VICTOR NIESEL WASHINGTON — A mighty live and well-informed CIA spook told Treasury Secretary George Shultz during a regular closed departmental chiefs' morning conference the other day that this country soon would come in out of the cold. The intelligence officer assigned to briefing Shultz, who is, in effect, head of the joint chiefs of economic staffs, reported that considerably more petroleum soon would be pouring into the U.S.

There are few secrets to which ex-Marine George Shultz isn't privy. He can see the President virtually any time he wishes even if Gen. Haig called the Army to stop him. Shultz has spent as much as an hour and a half alone recently with Dick Nixon. And George is virtually the only man in government whom the President now heeds — and needs.

Yet Shultz has been trying to leave for over a year. He's physically fatigued — for, his travel record is second only to that of other university chaps, Henry Kissinger. He is mentally and morally weary because of his distaste for the infighting and intrigue which began involving him back in September 1972. At that time John Dean attempted to pressure the Internal Revenue Service into harassing some 575 persons on an "enemy list." Treasury chief Shultz killed that one.

And recently he has had to ask the Secret Service, also under him, to protect private citizen Spiro Agnew. And he has had to tolerate the infighting on the labor front, the bitter feud between special presidential assistant Bill Ueary and Labor Secretary Pete Brennan, who said recently, "Just so there is no mistake, I am the President's No. 1 labor adviser."

All of which hasn't eased Shultz's dealing with labor chief George Meany, who went off to midwinter labor conferences (thus snubbing the Senate's Subcommittee on Production and Stabilization now holding hearings on what's left of wage and price controls.

There are critical moments in a nation's history when an indispensable man appears. This is such a moment! He is George Shultz. The President knows it and is putting the heat on him to stay. Shultz is that blend of man who is respected by all sides, militant and moderate, labor and management, the White House and the Congress.

Much hangs on Shultz's ability to get a sensible economic stabilization law through Congress, and the trade bill, tax reform, and dollar bolstering international policies as well.

volatile both these fronts are now. If inflation really blows — there could be street rioting. What would happen if the Middle East blows is unthinkable.

The Cost of Living Council (COLC) has virtually abdicated from wage and price controls. There is no control on prices actually of everything from bread to auto tires. True, the steel industry was stepped on recently when the COLC rejected bids for requested steel price increases.

But that's the fashion of Prof. John Dunlop, czar of what once was Phase Four. He is reported to have told the steel industry it is out of luck only because it is so visible. Permitting it to increase prices now would bring howls from the professional self-appointed protectors of the consumer. So Bethlehem Steel is planning to sue the council. It's all very ragged and explosive.

Also chaotic. No one seems to know exactly what to propose despite the tons of position papers which are falling on the Senate subcommittee — now getting virtually no coverage though its decisions will hit the pocketbook more than did the shows down the hall.

It all needs George Shultz's "cool it" approach. He is convinced the burst of inflation will ease off in the final quarter of 1974. And that there won't be recession-type unemployment despite the new statistics. And now along with Dr. Kissinger and President Nixon, he believes the oil will flow — not enough to make everybody happy but enough to keep them from being unhappy, just grousing.

And if he means what he tells intimates truly, he'll just fade away quietly in August or September.

But he'll bolt immediately if anyone in or out of the White House again attempts to position him. (All Rights Reserved)

WILL THE TRUTH MAKE THEM FREE?

"This I dedicate: To all those who did not live to tell of it."

Thus begins Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn's most recently released book, *The Gulag Archipelago, 1918-1956*. "It is a magnificent work, a stunning denunciation of Soviet tyranny, an agonizingly human narrative.

The story is true. "In this book," notes the author, "there are no fictional persons, no fictional events." It is also a horrible, terrifying saga of police terror, the slaughter of millions of innocent people, and the hopelessness forced upon a nation by a ruthless police state.

The title refers to the network of slave labor camps in the Soviet Union between 1918 and 1956. "...and yet there were many who did not even guess at its presence," writes Solzhenitsyn, "and only those who had been there knew the whole truth." He had been there for eleven years. The book is based on his own experiences, along with those of 220 other camp victims whom he interviewed. The manuscript was finished some years ago, but the author explains that "For years I have with reluctant heart withheld from publication this already completed book. My obligation to those who are still alive outweighed my obligation to those who are dead. But now that State Security has seized this book anyway, I have no alternative but to publish it immediately."

"State Security" discovered the manuscript in the hands of a woman last August. She and the book were seized; after she was released, following a long period of

"interrogation," she handed herself. Which shows you the extent to which the Soviets have mellowed.

Were Solzhenitsyn unknown in the West, he would already have been arrested and put through the tortures he describes in his book. But the Soviet Government may not be able to risk doing that to him now, lest the West's rose-colored glasses suddenly clear up. The Soviets cannot afford that clarity of vision; they need technology and trade from us.

"In their own countries," notes Solzhenitsyn, "Roosevelt and Churchill are honored as examples of statesmanlike wisdom. To us, in Russian prison discussions, their systematic shortsightedness and stupidity stood out as astonishingly obvious. How could they, in their descent from 1941 to 1945, fail to secure any guarantee whatsoever of the independence of Eastern Europe? ... And what military or political sense was there in the surrender by them, to death at Stalin's hands, of several hundreds of thousands of armed Soviet citizens determined not to surrender?"

We did it before, we can do it again. Where do our obligations lie? With the oppressed Russian people yearning for freedom — or with their government yearning for strength through detente? The American Way Features

### Saudi Future Afflicted By Succession Question

By ROBERT S. ALLEN WASHINGTON — Saudi Arabia, wallowing in oil (with 21 percent of the world's known reserves) and in billions in gold and dollars, is also wallowing in highly volatile royal family trouble.

King Faisal, 67-year-old absolute ruler, is feeble and seriously ailing, and literally scores the male relatives are intently scheming and conniving over the succession.

Prince Khalid Ibn Abd Al-Aziz, 63, Faisal's brother from the same mother, is the latter's choice as heir to the throne — but there is a big question whether he will get it.

Strikingly indicative of the reason why, and the extent and nature of the dynamite-loaded succession scramble, is that there are at least 300 male Faisal kinsmen with definite claims and pretensions to the throne. Of this number, more than 50 are immediately related to him (brother, half-brothers, etc.); the others lesser so in varying degrees.

This huge and complex royal genealogy goes back to King Abd Al-Aziz Ibn Saud, Faisal's father, a warrior desert sheikh who founded the dynasty after wresting the Arabian Peninsula from the Turks in World War I.

Saud was able to do that through alliances with numerous tribal sheikhs and sultans. In return, he cemented these alliances and tied them directly to his newly-created monarchy by marrying their daughters — and begetting scores of "royal" grandchildren of the local chiefs.

All of these male Saud descendants, and their sons, have claims to the throne — some of them very vigorously.

That's why Prince Khalid's prospects are so uncertain — despite Faisal's blessing. Khalid has two strikes against him:

(1) Aloof, autocratic and ill-tempered, he personally is not popular either in the family, or among Saudi Arabia's 8 million largely desert population. (2) Faisal took over the throne by deposing his older brother, erratic and unstable Saud Ibn Abd Al-Aziz, in 1964.

Faisal pulled that off with the armed and other aid of leading tribal sheikhs and sultans — with royal grandchildren, some of whom now have very active designs on the throne.

More Trouble In some respects the most serious menace to Prince Khalid's succession is the quiet but strong opposition of the two most powerful men in the Faisal regime — Emir Sultan Al-Aziz, Minister of Defense, and Emir Faud Ibn Abd Al-Aziz, Minister of Interior.

In effect, they largely control Saudi's domestic affairs, and the excellently equipped and trained 40,000-man army.

crack air force and small but modern navy.

The Western-educated and trained officers corps is reputedly far more oriented towards these officials than toward Faisal, and much less so his heir-designate Khalid.

In a country with no constitution or legislative body, Faisal's rule is nominally absolute. Not only is he the monarch, but commander-in-chief, prime minister, foreign minister, supreme judge and top religious leader. But he is sick and weak, and the real day-to-day authority now rests in other hands.

It is exercised by Faud, Al-Aziz, key tribal sheikhs and sultans, and a relatively new and steadily growing class of foreign-educated and capable younger men who, as career bureaucrats, have a big voice in formulating policy and executing it.

It is this well-paid and increasingly influential element that is now really running Saudi.

They are definitely against both the idea of Faisal and selecting his successor and his choice, Prince Khalid — who in various ways has indicated dislike and distrust of these career officials with their modern concepts, life styles and dress.

Outcome of this seething backstage royal family struggle could have far-reaching impact not only in Saudi but in the Arab world and the world at large.

It could have sweeping effect on Saudi's oil policy. Important elements in the country favor trading oil for carefully planned and organized industrialization and modernization — instead of peddling it for billions in gold and cash reserves. These now are piling up at an estimated rate of more than one-half billion a month.

Horace Bailey, senior vice president of the Chemical Bank of New York, estimates that by 1980 the leading Arab oil producers will have upwards of \$175 billion in reserves.

While these countries have vast land masses, none of them have the population or other natural resources to effectively use these billions — most of which went to Russia to pay for its huge military supplies. Libya also sent more than \$500 million to Egypt and Syria, also to finance Soviet armaments.

And these Russian weapons shipments are continuing. Following is an authoritative intelligence report on this:

In the past two months, Egypt has received 600 Red Tanks, advanced T-62s on T-55s, 100 MIF-21 jet fighters; 40 SAM-3 and SAM-6 anti-aircraft missile batteries; and a large quantity of other hardware ranging from radar to infantry rifles.

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## Did You Know This About OUR RELIGIONS?

**Churches in Northern U.S. Are Cutting Down On Fuel**  
 Many churches and synagogues in the northern part of the U.S. and Canada are conserving fuel this winter by restricting most of their weekday meetings to weekends. Where daily masses are celebrated some Catholic churches are reducing heat, in keeping with a custom long observed in European countries. Protestant church women's organizations tend to move their meetings to Monday instead of Wednesday or Thursday as in the past.

The fuel shortage has created problems for churches not only from the standpoint of supply, but also the effect of rising oil cost on the church budgets.

**Question: Is it true that Mary Magdalene, mentioned in Luke 8:2, was a prostitute before her conversion by Jesus Christ? — Tacoma, Wash.**

**Answer:** There is absolutely nothing in the Scriptures to support that claim. The reference in the Gospel of Luke says that "seven demons" had gone out from Mary Magdalene. This probably indicates that she had suffered from mental illness and had recovered. She is mentioned in connection with Joanna, the wife of Chuza, who was one of the officials in the household of King Herod.

As was the case with Joanna, it is altogether probable that Mary Magdalene was a woman of high reputation and standing in the Jerusalem community, despite her previous illness.

Some people have tried to identify her with the woman mentioned anonymously in

Luke 7:36-50, but there is nothing in Scriptures to support that association.

On the positive side, it is known that Mary Magdalene was a financial supporter and that she took an active part in the evangelistic and missionary work led by Jesus in Galilee. These facts are suggested in Luke 8:1-3 and in Mark 15:40, 41.

**Question: In the Bible, what is the difference between the "minor prophets" and the "major prophets"?**

**Answer:** Three of the prophetic books are recognized as works of the major prophets. They are Isaiah, Jeremiah, and Ezekiel, although many scholars believe that Isaiah was the work of two, or possibly three writers.

The minor prophets are 12. They are shorter books and were written by or attributed to Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah and Malachi.

**Question: How many Jewish rabbis are there in America? — Grand Forks, N.D.**

**Answer:** According to the Synagogue Council of America, which includes a majority of the national Jewish organizations, the approximate number of rabbis in the United States is 6,400. The total Jewish population in the U.S. is about 5,870,000.

# The Weekly Message Of Inspiration

Many theologians and church leaders no longer accept the Bible as the infallible Word of God. They don't believe that "if it's taught in the Bible, then it

ought to be observed." They have doubts about the trustworthiness of the Bible.

Many who are paid to preach from our pulpits and teach in our church-supported colleges and seminaries, and whose duty it is to proclaim the truth of God, in the name of science and scholarship, are sowing seeds of unbelief, and are gradually destroying the faith of those to whom they are ministering. There's a massive attack being launched against the Bible today — not merely by atheists and wicked men, but by leading spokesmen within our churches. They say that the Bible's language is old-fashioned, and that its ideas are those of men who lived in a pre-scientific age. They contend that the words of the Bible are not reliable, and that the supernatural events are simply unbelievable. As a result, the view of inspiration which the church has held down through the centuries, is being thrown aside.

Paul says in II Tim. 3:16, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God," and he states in I Cor.

2:13 that he writes the things God has given him "Not in words which man's wisdom teacheth, but which the Holy Ghost teacheth." And then in II Pet. 1:21 the Bible says, "Holy men of God spoke as they were moved by the Holy Ghost."

Any book which gives such accurate prophecies concerning future events, so many of which have already been fulfilled as was written, must have as its author, the One who knows the future — and the only one who knows that is God.

The crowning evidence of the inspiration of the Bible is the testimony of Jesus. Jesus declared in John 10:35, "The scripture cannot be broken." He put His seal on the Old Testament when He quoted Exodus 3:6 (as recorded in Matt. 21:31) and said, "Have ye not read that which was spoken unto you by God?" And again in Lk. 4:17-21 when He read in the synagogue from Isa. 61:1-2 and said "This day is this scripture fulfilled in your ears. During His earthly ministry Jesus quoted from all parts of the Old Testament. He spoke of man's creation, the institution of marriage, the days of Noah, the destruction of Sodom, manna from heaven, lifting up the brazen serpent, God's appearing to Moses in the burning bush, the life of David, the glory of Solomon, and the sign of Jonah. And in all this record we have of Jesus' words, there is not the slightest intimation that the scriptures might be untrustworthy at any point. He never contradicted nor disagreed with anything in the Old Testament.

To Jesus the scriptures were the infallible Word of God. Not one statement could possibly be broken. Why would man part company with Jesus and say that He was mistaken?

The Bible is God's Book, and for this reason you can build your life and your eternal destiny on what it says. The scriptures tell us about Jesus Christ. His atoning sacrifice, God's plan for our salvation. They remind us how we have sinned; they assure us that whosoever believeth on Jesus, shall not perish, but shall have everlasting life. The Bible was written to reveal a person. It was written that men might believe, know, love, understand, and follow Jesus Christ. (John 20:30-31)

## Evangelicals Beginning To Be More Liberal?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Evangelicals, usually stereotyped as theological and political conservatives, are beginning to talk in ways that could plunge some heretofore conservative churchmen into the unfamiliar world of liberal and even radical social and political action.

A group of evangelical leaders have called for an early spring conference at Calvin College, Grand Rapids, Mich. The purpose, they say, is to give "added focus and impetus to the sudden surge of interest by American evangelicals in social and political concerns."

Some liberal churchmen might consider it ironic that the evangelical concern is coming at a time when the leadership of the more mainline Protestant denominations is experiencing withdrawal symptoms from social activism after being burned by grass roots defection from their stance.

**President's Strongest Backers**  
Irony that it may be, the problem of constituent disaffection is certain to plague

evangelicals — generally considered to be staunch supporters of the political status quo and some of President Nixon's strongest backers — as much if not more than it did liberal churchmen.

The growing evangelical concern did not come about in a vacuum. Last year Calvin College hosted a similar workshop and at Thanksgiving time a group of prominent evangelicals, including Cal F.H. Henry, former editor of the publication Christianity Today and one of the most influential of Biblically orthodox churchmen, issued a "declaration of evangelical social concern."

The declaration, which one secular newspaper suggested might ultimately be the most important church-related event of 1973, called on evangelicals to "attack the materialism of our culture and the maldistribution of the nation's wealth and services."

"We recognize that as a nation we play a crucial role in the imbalance and injustice of international trade and development," it said. "Before God and a billion hungry neighbors, we must rethink our values regarding the present standard of living and promote more just acquisition and distribution of the world's resources."

**Civil Religion**  
In addition, the declaration struck at what many liberals believe to be the evangelicals' worst failing, a tendency to combine patriotism and religiosity into a form of civil religion.

"We must resist the temptation to make the nation and its institutions objects of near-religious loyalty," it said.

At this year's Calvin conference, the evangelicals will focus on the question of political power and the highly charged question of the dynamics of church lobbying.

Both issues raise a problem the evangelical intellectuals have yet to face, a problem more liberal churchmen have yet to solve: how to translate conferences and statements into political power and actions.

Liberals will be watching as closely as the evangelicals for the answer to that.

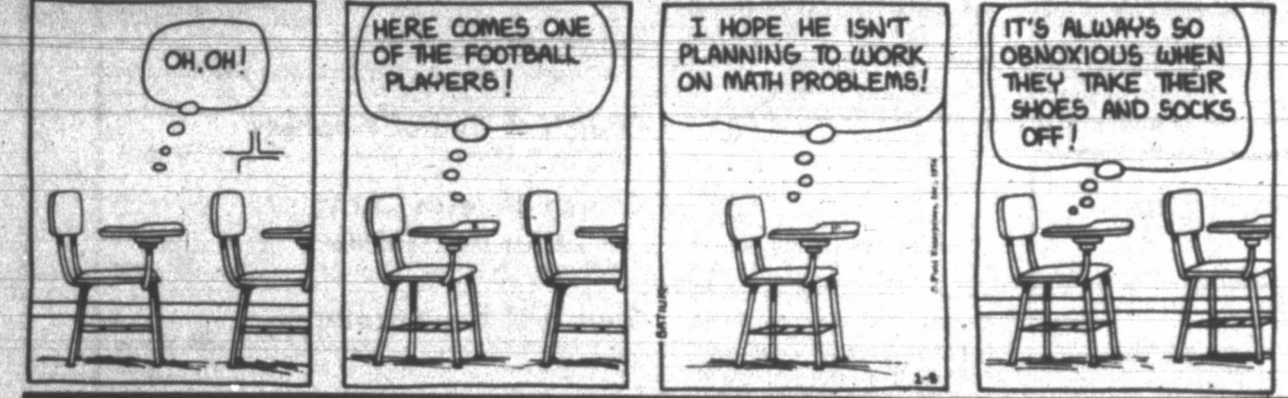
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# IT HAPPENED LAST NIGHT There's Night Life In Nightville

## TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH Vaginal Infections Are Disturbing

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I am 22 and have been doctoring for vaginal infections for almost a year — I have itching and a heavy discharge.

I have used several types of suppositories and my husband also has taken some medication.

My doctor has said I had three types of infections — yeast, monilia and trichomonas.

I seem to get one cleared up and then get another. He said some women are prone to these infections but I'm getting so discouraged. Could this be caused by birth control pills?

—Mrs. D.M.

Let's start by admitting that some women have much more of this trouble than others, and that some cases can be stubborn. Having three types makes it even more difficult (although it is not unusual for more than one type to be present).

Still, if you pursue the proper course of treatment for each form of vaginitis, you usually will be successful in clearing it up.

The trichomonas was the type for which your husband also had treatment. That is caused by a micro-organism called a protozoan, which often bothers women but rarely has any symptoms in men even though it is present.

The husband should take treatment for from 10 to 20 days, and at the same time the wife is being treated, so he will not pass the infection back to her once she is cured.

## ROMANCE IS STILL ALIVE Postal Service Planning To Give Help To Cupid

Romance is still very much alive and the Postal Service's traditional spirit, is going all out to advance the worthy cause.

Swains and maids in almost all the states will forward Valentines, by the thousands, for cancellation and mailing, to such post offices as Romance (Ark.), Valentine (Tex.), Darling (Miss.), Venus (Tex.), and Loveland (Okla.).

Likewise the post office with the smooch-sounding name, Kissimmee (Fla.), and the one with the same name as the god of love in Greek mythology, Eros (La.).

The postmasters of these offices will, as a labor of love, cancel the mail sent to them for that purpose and get it into the mail flow with that special message right on the face of the envelope.

They expect, as usual, to be very busy, just before Feb. 14, with St. Valentine's Day mail, under the auspices of Cupid.

Regional Postmaster General Carl C. Ulaner points out that postal automation will, by no means, stand in the way of this happy cancellation custom.

"We have a standing program especially for just such occasions," he says, "with a 'local cancellation only' drop box in all post offices where their mail is being cancelled by the equipment at a sectional center. In other offices the local postmark goes on routinely."

"Our postmasters always give special attention to letters forwarded by mail from out-of-town or out-of-state (as most of it is) asking for the local cancellation."

Because of the size of these offices, most of the Valentine mail is hand stamped.

St. Valentine's Day mail is the second largest mailing of its kind, where special cancellations are requested, to mark a special day, Christmas, of course, is first.

More than 12,000,000 Valentines are expected to swell the mail volume in the Dixie post offices between the usual mailing dates of February 10 to 13.

There are still some other lovable post offices in the Southern Region who get in on the act, like Sugartown (La.), Lovejoy (Ga.), Friendship (Ark.), or, if there is any doubt about the status of the romance, how about Experiment, (Ga.), or Song (Miss.).

# And He Doesn't Need A Map

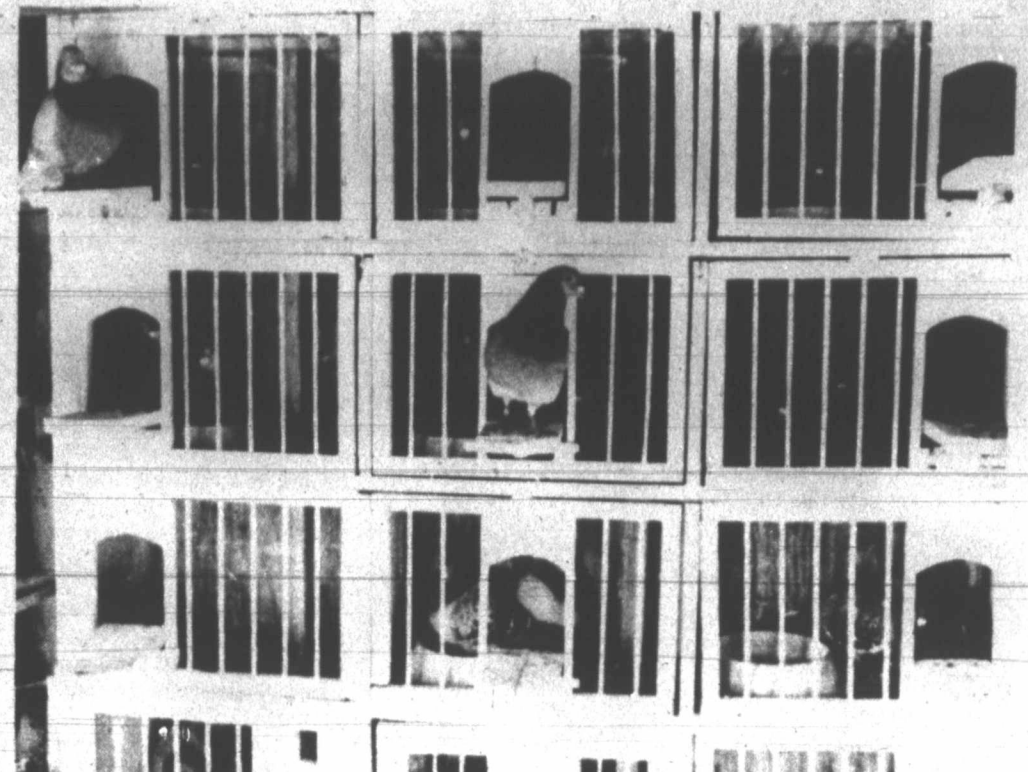

Animal instinct is a fascinating subject and there is one creature that makes it particularly so — the homing pigeon.  
If nature had its Seven Wonders of the World, this fabulous bird would unequivocally be among them, possibly the First Wonder.  
How a bird, when released great distances from home, finds its way back to the loft is beyond the comprehension of even the greatest scientific minds. Institutions such as Rutgers and the University of Missouri have researched the homing pigeon's inborn talent countless number of times, but have yet to come up with a

definite explanation.  
Besides the scientist, there is another individual interested in this bird — the pigeon racer — and this man's number has spread throughout the country in recent years.  
This particular man uses the homing pigeon (homer) in a competitive way — a race — in much the same way one would race slot cars or remote control airplanes. This race, using homers which are specially bred and trained for competition, is catching on as a sport, not only here, but in Europe.  
The American Racing Pigeon Union has approximately 15,000 members and is the largest single organization for pigeon

racing in the world. The International Federation (IF) has around 10,000 racers and the United States of America Racing Pigeon Union (separate from the ARPU) has around 8,000.  
Locally, you find your pigeon racers in such clubs as the Top O' Texas Racing Pigeon Club and the Amarillo Racing Pigeon Club. The Top O' Texas club includes men from Pampa, Borger and surrounding communities.  
Publicity director of the ToT club and a hard-shelled racer, R. W. McPhillips, Jr., is an authority on the homer, knowing practically everything about the bird except what makes him "do his thing." "It's a mystery," says McPhillips.

They are released and, because they have already surveyed the area in the preliminary training, fly back home. This doesn't involve a lot of instinct; since the birds have already studied the landscape, they don't need instinct to make it back.  
Then the rigid training starts. The birds are released from approximately 15 miles, then 25 and 50. "After that, you can take them anywhere. I have even trained them for 35 miles before they're ready to race," says McPhillips.  
The bird, although less than three months old, is ready for a 100-mile race. Some young birds are even ready for the 300-mile events, which isn't too great a distance considering yearlings sometimes race in 600-plus mile events.

home," says McPhillips, "but most of the time he can't. He has to go the long way home and the birds fly straight. With this new speed limit, he will never beat them back." The birds fly at a speed of around 35-40 miles per hour.  
"Whenever the birds start coming in, we take the individual countermarkers off the birds, put them (the countermarkers) into a capsule and put it in a clock. It stamps off the birds' time onto a paper tape like a time clock."  
The top 10 finishers are awarded "diplomas."

Both schools suffered losses in the second-half openers Tuesday night as Pampa fell to Caprock, 54-51, and Tascosa lost to Palo Duro, 73-60. It was the second Harvester loss in a row, the first being a 68-62 loss to Borger last Friday.  
Overall, the Pampans are 20-7 and are 4-2 in district play. Tascosa is 13-14 and finished 1-4 in the first half of district play.  
"We need to win the rest of them," said Harvester coach Robert McPherson following

the Caprock game, "but we're still in good shape."  
The Harvesters defeated the Rebels, 73-54, in Harvester Fieldhouse in the first half. In that contest, four Pampa players scored in double figures — Howie Lewis with 17, Ray Powell with 12 and Randy Warner and Rick Beesley with 11 each.  
High for Tascosa was little (5-7) Byron Carter, who hit eight field goals and scored 20 points.  
Besides Carter, who is a guard averaging 16.6 points in six district games, Rebel coach Dave Camfield will probably start 6-7 post Tom Simms (7.7 in district), 6-1 post Greg Jenkins

(6.7), 6-3 forward Frank Koenig (15.2) and 6-0 forward Jeff Hamilton (5.2).  
Chris Vechan, a forward, started for Hamilton against Palo Duro but did not score. Camfield was undecided on if Vechan will start tonight.  
McPherson will probably go with 6-6 post Randy Warner (8.9), 6-3 post Billy Wilson (10.7), 6-5 forward Howie Lewis (10.3 and 11 rebounds), 6-2 forward Rick Beesley (9.5) and 5-10 guard Ray Powell (8.3).  
The Shockers and Tascosa junior varsity will square off at 6:30 p.m. today. Mickey Wilson's junior varsity lost to Caprock Tuesday and is 19-7 for the season.

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# If You Feel Like Yawning, Don't Stifle Yourself!

Next time you feel the urge to yawn, don't stifle yourself.

Yawning has been traditionally regarded as an insignificant, useless function of the human body — one of those unnecessary and, at times, embarrassing physiological quirks people have.

But new research shows that yawning is good for you, according to the Family Economics Bureau of Northwestern National Life Insurance Co., Minneapolis.

Physiologists know what a yawn is — an involuntary opening of the mouth and inhalation of breath, often associated with stretching — but they've never quite got around to finding out why people yawn.

Everyone thinks it's because you're bored, sleepy or hungry — right?

You may be yawning even as you read this, but — if you've ever yawned at exactly the wrong moment — you should be aware that a yawn is not necessarily a sign of boredom. In fact, yawning is often a reaction of your body to anxiety

— just the opposite of boredom.

Think of the poker player across the table who, feigning boredom, casually yawns as he looks over the cards you've just dealt. He goes on win the hand with four-of-a-kind. Or think of the amateur musician and public speaker, who just before confronting their audiences, let go with a series of muffled jaw-breakers.

Yawning is a form of nonverbal communication that few people understand. These people are probably not bored — they're tense, and yawning lets them release pent-up nervous energy. Behavioral scientists term this kind of yawning a "displacement" activity.

Most yawning, however, is a result of your body trying to regulate itself — a "maintenance" activity.

An unstifled yawn pumps a sizable amount of oxygen into the lungs, then into the blood stream and to the brain. In addition, the stretching which often accompanies a yawn primes the muscle fibers for action, according to Northwestern National.

In other words, a yawn is invigorating and stimulating — a natural activator that puts you on alert. This explains why most people use up their day's ration of yawns to clear up that morning lightheadedness and get into gear for the activities ahead.

Be warned, however, that any

nimbleness of mind you might gain from an all-out gape would hardly be beneficial if performed in your boss' office; nor would it be appreciated during an intimate candlelight dinner.

If you yawn before retiring in the evening, it's because of fatigue, or poor circulation from sitting too long in a stuffy room — not merely because you're sleepy. Of course, the deep-breathing motions of a yawn can be relaxing late at night, when everyone else is too lethargic to care if you yawn anyway.

Yawning has been recognized but studiously ignored by medical researchers ever since 500 B.C. when Hippocrates noted in a treatise on diseases that yawning precedes fevers. He thought because of a fever "considerable amounts of air mass together in the body" which has to escape through the mouth in a yawn, just as "steam rises from a pot of boiling water."

His reasoning was off the mark, but Hippocrates' observation was right. Yawning often precedes the fit in some intermittent fevers, emotional disturbances and spasmodic asthma, and yawning may be a real disease for some whose yawns become frequent and compulsive. Persons suffering from heart disease may be liable to yawning fits due to poor circulation.

Physiology texts gloss over

yawning — together with hiccupping, sighing, snoring, crying and coughing — under such subheadings as "nonrespiratory functions of the breathing movements" and "nonchemical influences on respiration." Considered unworthy of serious study, yawning has been labeled a sign of sleepiness or boredom.

But intensive studies of animal behavior by scientists in Italy, Germany, France, and South Africa suggest that yawning is an ancient, ingrained behavior pattern common to most, if not all back-boned animals.

Yawning has now been identified in numerous species of apes, lizards, birds, dogs, cats, fish, turtles and a host of other animals besides man.

For example, two University of Florida zoologists who spent three years in South Africa studying the habits of the native ostrich observed that the primary purpose of yawning is to synchronize the life cycle the birds share with one another.

Yawning assures excited ostriches that there is no danger present and it relaxes tension among them. At the end of rest, yawning stirs up the ostriches. Until their research was announced, the scientific community had accepted as dogma that birds do not yawn at all.

A German biologist concluded that yawning does not trigger sleepiness, as is commonly

thought, but has just the opposite, arousing effect.

A team of pharmacologists at the University of Cagliari in Italy have found they can induce yawning in animals with injections of a "stress" hormone — similar to yawning due to anxiety in people.

One aspect of a yawn that still baffles researchers is its infectious nature. The mere sight of another person yawning

gives you a barely controllable, compulsive urge to rip off a yawn yourself.

In fact, yawning is so contagious that we may soon see a new wave of bumper stickers about it...  
"Yawning is Fun!"  
"Yawning is Free!"  
"Yawning is for the 'Whole Family!'"  
...and the ultimate:  
"Yawning is Catching On!"

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## Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Television often saves its biggest hoopla for high-toned specials, but there's nothing wrong with down-to-earth, colorful entertainment shows, and the networks have a number of these entries coming up. For instance:

On Feb. 28, Gloria Swanson, a fantastic and seemingly ageless star who thrives on work, will be the headliner of a suspense drama on ABC-TV's "Tuesday Movie of the Week" series, an anthology of teleplays.

She will appear as "an aging matriarch dominating her family and terrorizing a town by her strange power to control a hive of murderous bees." The ABC-TV outing is a 90-minute presentation, and is entitled "Killer Bees."

March 2, another 90-minute ABC-TV anthology series, the Saturday "suspense movie," offers a fictional work built around "the struggle to return the Apollo 13 astronauts safely to earth after their moonbound spacecraft was damaged."

The network says this teleplay, entitled "Houston, we've got a problem," is "based on events that occurred in April of 1970, when America's third moon-landing mission was aborted."

According to ABC-TV, "Richard Nelson's fictional screenplay tells of mission control's grueling efforts to bring Apollo 13 home, against a backdrop of personal crises besetting members of the mission control team."

Adds the network: "The movie was filmed with the cooperation of NASA... The actual voices of astronauts Lovell, Haise and Swigert—taped from in-flight transmissions following the Apollo 13 (problem)—are heard in the film."

Among the performers in the teleplay are Robert Culp, Gary Collins, Clu Gulager and Sandra Lee.

CBS-TV, meanwhile, has announced that its planned adaptation of the Broadway comedy "8 Rms Riv Vu"—with Carol Burnett and Alan Alda in the video version—will be broadcast March 17 as a 90-minute presentation.

In the play, Miss Burnett and Alda portray "two people who are married, but not to each other, who meet in a vacant New York apartment while looking over the place as prospective tenants." The play was written by Bob Randall and also adapted by him for the home screen.

Miss Burnett, of course, has a variety series on CBS-TV, and Alda is the star of the weekly comedy "MASH" on the same network. CBS-TV says in its latest announcement that "8 Rms Riv Vu" will be codirected by Alda and Clark Jones "and taped before a live audience at the Ed Sullivan Theater in New York City."
