**Judge Refuses** SLA's Request

- Two imprisoned Symbionese Liberation Army members may make a statement on the kidnaping of Patricia Hearst despite a judge's denial of their request for nationwide television time to present a proposal for the abducted girl's release.

John Bain, an attorney for one of the two men, said Tuesday, "I think it's about time the defendants had a chance to make a statement of some kind."

Randolph A. Hearst, Patricia's father also said he was disappointed by the decision of Superior Court Judge Sam Hall who ruled Tuesday that the television appearance might create an atmosphere that would make it impossible for the defendants to get a fair trial "in California or the United

Russell Little, 26, and Joseph Remiro, 27, have been seeking the television time while being held in jail on charges of murdering Dr. Marcus Foster, Oakland superintendent of schools last November. They are members of the SLA which kidnaped Miss Hearst Feb. 4. Both the SLA and Hearst

given the television time. 'I don't see how any statement that might possibly bring about the release of our daughter could keep the defendants from getting a fair trial." Hearst said after hearing of Judge Hall's

Hearst was reported to have met with the judge for an hour in his chambers Monday, the day before the negative ruling on the SLA members' petition.

William Gagen, attorney for Remiro, asked the judge if he might change his ruling provided he could view in advance a film of the proposed television statement, which the two SLA members have prepared.

'No, it would make no difference," the judge said. Another hearing was scheduled for today in neighboring Alameda county on the request by Russell and Little for television time. It appeared unlikely that Oakland Municipal Court Judge Stafford A. Buckley would grant the petition in view of Tuesday's denial.

BEIRUT (UPI) - Libya pledged today to maintain the oil boycott unilaterally until the United States proves it is "neutral" in the It was the President's Middle East conflict.

A high Libyan official will visit the United States, the Soviet Union and Britain within days to "explore the real situation and define who is the friend and who is the enemy," a commentary broadcast by the official Libyan radio said.

The radio said Libya will maintain the embargo 'until Washington proves by acts and not words that it is no longer hostile to the Arabs, but is neutral in the Arab-Zionist conflict."

The commentary was part of a campaign launched by Libya against the decision taken by seven Arab countries in Vienna Monday to lift the five - month - old embargo, originally imposed because of America's pro · Israeli

Libya and Syria opposed the decision. Algeria said it will reconsider it next June. Similar denunciations of the embargo-lifting decision were made by newspapers in Lebanon and Kuwait, and the guerrilla group Popular Democratic Front (PDF) called it a "cruel stab to the Arabs struggle for

liberation. Beirut's English-language newspaper Daily Star said the decision meant the "Arab unity of the last few months...has finally given way to the old fragmentation."

The Libyan radio commentary said the Libyan-Syrian rejection of the lifting of the oil embargo was a 'rejection of maneuvers, deceptions and lies of American policy.

"It is as if Arab ears have grown deaf to the noise of American weapons which are being used against the Arab liberation forces in the Golan Heights, the Jordan West Bank and Sinai," the radio said.



# Economic Czar Plans Tough **Anti-Inflation Operation**

By VICTOR RIESEL WASHINGTON - Soon some whispers of Phase X will be coming your way. Don't let it throw you. It's part of the patois of the professionals deep in the most secluded government think tanks. It's the phrase used by special insiders for the phase which, after April 30, will phase this nation out of the hysteria · ridden Phase Four wage and price

controls.

As were the other phases. the White House expects it will be run by that one . man army of technocrats. ex-Harvard dean John Dunlop, turly a 59 - year - old grumpy genius, I grudgingly admit. Further, President Nixon expects Dunlop and Phase X to bring down the nation's price pressure, though virtually all wage and price controls will be jumked in

fashion or another. # Labor Bureau Projects Job Prospects In 1984

By PAUL HARVEY Look over the top of 1974 and beyond to 1984 and you'll see some exciting opportunities.

You'll have to look over the top of the energy shortage, beyond the fiscal revolution that's now going on, into the tomorrowland where you'll be using many products that aren't yet

even in the dictionary. But if you are school - age and searching for a career or if you are in one job and want to prepare yourself for a better one, let's see what the Bureau of Labor Statistics projects for 1984.

Over the next 10 years the number of farm workers will decrease further and there will be only a limited demand for farm managers. Job opportunities for teachers will be less.

Most of the jobs that will be opening up will be for clerical workers (we're talking numbers now). After clerical workers. professionanl workers and then technical workers.

Neal Rosenthal of the BLS Manpower Division predicts an unemployment rate. more or less permanent by the mid-1970s. In 10 years, death

retirement will vacate 41 million jobs; each year almost 5 million brand-new jobs will be created. Many of those new jobs

will call for technical training and for technically trained managers. Both industry and government will be seeking individuals with administrative or managerial ability. By contrast, there will be

less demand for self employed managers or proprietors due to the trend toward bighess in business. The small independent businessman, stifled by regulation and paperwork, will go the way of the corner

The opportunity for semi

self - employment will be mostly in franchise operations.

There will be increased use of computers and bookkeeping machines to handle routine clerical work, yet increasingly competent clerks will be required to prepare materials for the computers.

Half the number of all persons employed in clerical jobs by 1984 will be secretaries, typists and receptionists. Those jobs will continue to offer a high degree of security because such positions will be largely unaffected by technology.

As the manufacturing and construction, industries adopt more technical innovations, there will be a lesser demand for semi-skilled workers.

The opportunities will increase in all kinds of machine operation. The last five years have

been hard times for engineers; the next five will be much better. The demand for persons with technical training has increased 50 per cent in the past year, will continue to increase beyond the displacement largely due to the energy shortage.

Alternative power sources will offer tens of thousands of jobs for workers with mechanical, electrical and-or engineering ability.

A graduate engineer with a bachelor degree can now expect to start at \$1,000 a month.

If you want to be sure of a good job in 1984, become a technician or a secretary. If you want excitement, study electrophysiology. If you want to reach for the ripest apple on the tree, prepare yourself now for a career in TV - and applications of it

# Attempts Being Made To Destroy John Dean

By CLARK MOLLENHOFF WASHINGTON -Republican political leaders and legal defenders of President Nixon now must be wary of being lured into a White House - directed conspiracy to destroy a government witness ormer White House Counsel John W. Dean III.

A fine line often exists between a proper defense of a person under investigation or accused of wrong - doing and criminal obstruction of justice involving destruction of records or tampering with witnesses.

The hazard is recognized by most lawyers. However, six lawyers were among the seven political associates of President Nixon named as defendants in the massive 13-count indictment charging conspiracy. obstruction of justice, perjury, and false statements.

The grand jury charged that the conspiracy started on June 17, 1972, a few hours after the arrest of five men at the Watergate headquarters of the Democratic National Committee

That conspiracy to obstruct justice by hiding the responsibility for the Watergate break-in was still on at the time the indictments were returned on March 1, 1974, and is continuing up to the present time, according to the grand jury indictment. The allegation of a

continuing cover-up should serve as a warning to all of those who have a legal or political responsibility to defend Mr. Nixon against the charges leveled by John Dean and now supported by Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski and the federal grand jury

Certainly the seven defendants must be presumed innocent until proven guilty as charged in the indictment. But the indictment does serve as a warning that political attacks on Dean or other witnesses can have serious repercussions. H.R. Haldeman, John D.

Ehrlichman, Charles Colson and former Attorney General John N. Mitchell may have rationalized their actions as a legitimate political defense. Yet, they find themselves and three others charged with a massive conspiracy to pay "hush money" to the Watergate burglars, destroy the Gemstone files in a paper shredder, condone the perjury of former Nixon aide Jeb Magruder, plan miscellaneous false statements for the FBI and the Senate Watergate Committee and carry

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messages of assurance of executive clemency.

The present hazard for President Nixon's lawyers and Republican political leaders has been pointed up by these recent events:

1. Special Prosecutor Jaworski's comments to U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell that it appeared the White House and other Republican political figures were engaged in concerted effort to destroy a government witness."

2. The serious predicament in which some White House lawyers and Nixon aides have found themselves as a result of testimony by a panel of experts that only a "deliberate manipulation" could have caused the 18 minute gap in a key White House tape dealing with Watergate. The tapes were in the control and custody of the White House and only a handful of Mr. Nixon's aides had access to them in the crucial period of time.

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3. The grand jury indictment of Haldeman for perjury strongly indicates the White House tape of March 21, 1973, corroborates John Dean's testimony that President Nixon said simply "there is no problem in raising a million dollars" for payments to the Watergate burlars, rather than Haldeman's contention that Mr. Nixon had added: "But, it would be wrong." Jaworski and the federal grand jury have that tape and there is no reason to believe that they would or could alter the tape since the White House has a duplicate.

1. The Senate Watergate Committee's action in support of the reasonableness of a series of questions posed to President Nixon by Sen. Lowell Weicker, R-Conn., asking an explanation for the questionable long delays in taking effective action to clean out the White House after the March 21, 1973, date when Mr. Nixon admits Dean called his attention to the seriousness of the Watergate cover-up.

Any lawyers or Republican political figures taking part in the defense of Mr. Nixon from this point on must be aware of the odds they face in challenging the judgments of Jaworski and the grand jury testimony of John Dean and other key witnesses

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
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
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# Why not try to pick up broken pieces?

# Americans Victimized By Whiskey

WASHINGTON (UPI) -Despite public warnings from the government, there is growing evidence that hundreds of Americans are still being victimized by the Scotch whisky investment

racket. Part of the problem is that people who bought warehouse stocks of whisky. stored in the British Isles. three or four years ago are only now finding out that the promised profits of up to 100 per cent on the mature booze are not materiali-

A reader in Englewood, Colo., wrote recently that he bought 5,000 gallons of sixyear-old Scotch in 1971 at \$5.35 per gallon —paying out \$26,750. The whisky will be nine years old this May 1, he adds, and 'the best offer I have been able to get is \$3.94 per gallon, plus the wood ...

If I sell now," he adds, "I will lose about \$6,500 plus storage and insurance ... I will appreciate any tip you have to offer to a small investor trying to make a buck with my limited savings. I am 69 years old." The New York investment

firm which sold him the deal money back. has since disappeared. We asked the Securities &

Exchange Commission what this man could do. They said his only recourse now is to take the matter to court. Whether that route would get back the original investment, considering legal fees, is problematical.

The SEC says that one suit to stop a firm from doing business in this country has been settled. Several others the agency has initiated are still at the appeal stage. The SEC, however, can only try to put the questionable brokers out of business. It can't try to get the victims

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



# Myositis--Muscle Inflammation

Dear Dr. Thosteson: A member of the family has not been able to work for five months. His trouble was diagnosed at first as myositis, which we had never heard of, and later as fibrositis with a possibility of myositis.

Please explain this, and what are the chances of most people of returning to work? The last time he had an EMG test. Would you explain that test?

-M.K.A. Myositis is inflammation of muscle. Fibrositis is inflammation of fibrous tissue - that is, tissue surrounding muscle or joints.

The two have very similar symptoms, which is not surprising. They result from similar causes, and when they occur together, the condition is known as librom vositis. Acute attacks can result

from infection, strain or injury or exposure to irritating chemicals.

Ordinarily with treatment comprising rest, heat, and pain - killers the trouble is short - lived and the patient

However, in certain cases, as in this one, the disorder can become chronic, and when that occurs it is wise to start looking for some focal infection in the body infection in the gums, at the roots of teeth, and in the prostate gland are typical offenders. If no infection is found there, you go on and explore other areas.

In these disorders there usually are trigger points sites of great tenderness and they can be injected with cortisone to relieve the misery.

An EMG test (electromyograph) is a recording of muscle response to electrical stimulation.

In this particular case there are a lot of questions I would ask you if you were right here: whether there was any injury; whether the patient had worked with materials that could be irritants; whether a search had been made for sites of infection; what the EMG

showed, and so on. With such information I

think the answer above will at least give you some guidance as to the nature of the problem.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: What causes a person to become black and blue when bruised or when a vein is pierced with a needle for medication? Is there something lacking in the system, such as iron? I have been taking an iron supplement but to no avail.

In the case of piercing with a needle, the answer is that some bleeding has occurred where the vein was pierced. It may mean that the tourniquet was not removed soon enough, or there was a weak spot in the vein at that point.

But delayed clotting also can be a factor - excessive use of aspirin, or of so-called blood thinners or a deficiency of platelets in the blood (platelets being a type of particle in the blood that is necessary for clotting).

These last three possibilities can apply to excessive general bruising. might be able to explore Iron will not help such a

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Please give information on jogging in the winter months. I enjoy jogging very much.

Presuming that you are in condition, the winter months should be no different. except look out for slippery or icy spots.



### **Social Security** Q And A

WEATHERLY Q. What is Income?"

A. "Supplementary Security Income" is income paid to supplement other income to an individual or to a couple. The maximum monthly payment to an individual is \$140 and to a couple \$210. An individual or couple's needs and other income will have to be considered before any payment can be made.

Q. I am 66 years old. I have already been told by social security that I do not have enought quarters to qualify for a monthly social security check. Will this keep me from qualifying for payments under the Supplementary Security Inome program?

A. Since Supplementary Security payments are based on need, you should talk to someone at your social security office to find out if your income from the sale of your property will preclude payments to you.

A. I have good news for you and for anyone else who is receiving public assistance. Your name will be referred automatically to the social security administration for conversion Supplementary Security income. Therefore, you need take no action unless

Mr. President, the cattle feeders of this country are in the midst of an economic depression that deserves the attention of every citizen in America. Their plight should concern all of us. because, first, the source of one of our favorite food items - beef - is in jeopardy; and second, this is another example of how needless government interference can cripple a

great industry. Let me explain that cattle feeders are those cattlemen who take yearling animals, fatten them with grain and finish them into the choice animals. These finished animals, in turn, yield the choice beef that we all desire.

Last year; cattle feeders in the United States marketed over 25 million animals - enough to supply every man, woman, and child in America with 110 pounds of beef each. That is an 80-percent increase in 20 years.

Texas, the No. 1 cattle feeding state in the nation. fed and marketed 4,412,000 animals last year. Texas became No. 1 in cattle feeding, because of:

First, the abundance of feeder cattle produced in the Lone Star State: second, the availability of grain grown in the state; third, our unique climate that is conducive to cattle feeding; and fourth, the ingenuity of our cattlemen in putting together the capital and systems that permit us to produce beef more economically than other

But many of these entrepreneuring cattlemen - in Texas and in other cattle feeding states - are now on the verge of bankruptcy. And if they are allowed to go broke, it not dropped 20 only will affect the nation's last month. beef supply, it will also have And again, cattle feeders

a depressing effect on all farm and ranch cattle producers, and on the entire

In the last year our cattle feeders have seen their feed costs more than double; slaughter, capital, and transportation increase and the price he receives drop by more than 20 percent. In any industry, this would clearly mean bankruptcy for a great many people.

These cattle feeders are

also victims of government price controls, which the administration so unwisely enforced on the beef industry last June on a selective basis.

At that time, against the advice of cattle industry leaders and economists across the country, the Cost of Living Council discriminated against the beef industry by singling it out to leave under price controls. The result was that fat cattle stacked up in the feedlots; then when the freeze finally was lifted in September, they glutted the market, causing prices to drop 30 percent in 6 weeks.

During the ensuing two months, cattle feeders suffered losses of \$100 to \$150 on every anumal marketed. As you might expect, such losses forced many feeders out of the business.

And I predicted at the time that it would take months for the cattle industry to recover from the unjust government interference.

The remaining cattle feeders were about to get back in the black in January, then came the trucker's strike, which lasted for two weeks in early February. Again, fat cattle stacked up in the feedlots. And now that the trucker's strike is over, cattle prices are again depressed, having dropped 20 percent in the

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are losing big money — this time about \$100 per head on each fat animal marketed. These losses have been going on for three weeks and, on top of the earlier losses, are bankrupting many feeders who six months ago were considered very substantial and

successful businessmen. Businessmen who provided the risk capital, the management, and the work to assure America a continuing supply of nutritions beef. Furthermore, unless something is done immediately to relieve the situation, the losses promise to continue for several

Unfortunately, these lower prices have not been passed on to consumers. Retail prices have not dropped accordingly.

I am strongly concerned that the reduced prices for beef have not been reflected in the supermarket. This is unfair to the consumer and the producer and is causing a buildup of cattle in the feedlots. This is another disruption of the system which must be corrected.

So I call on the chain stores to be equitable with the cattle feeding industry during this crisis - and to help consumers who are

featuring more beef, by offering more specials and by sharing their increased margins with both feeders and consumers. Only in this way will we be able to move more beef.

And only by moving more beef at this time will we be able to assure adequate beef supplies later.

During the month of February, replacements of cattle in feedlots were down about 30 percent. If the cattle do not go into feedlots. they cannot come out six months later as scheduled.

If these reduced placements continue into

Senator Bentsen Supports Cattle Feeders Needs have a reduced supply in late summer. And reduced supplies mean higher prices for consumers.

Also, I call on the nation's meat packers to do all they can to move more beef. By accepting more modest profits - packer profits were at record high levels during the past quarter they can help everyone else in the industry stay in business and help consumers by providing beef at prices they can afford.
