Brooks Criticizes **Spending**

WASHINGTON (UPI) -The chairman of the House committee that reported President Nixon spent \$17 million to maintain his vacation homes says despite blistering White House criticism the report is objective and straightforward."

Rep. Jack Brooks, D-Tex., said Monday the report, the specifics of which are still supposed to be confidential, documents how \$17 million of taxpayers' money was spent that would not have been spent but for the President's desire to maintain three

private homes." "If the President had not bought those houses after he was elected, the American taxpayers would not have been charged \$17 million,' declared the feisty, cigarsmoking Brooks. "It's that

simple. Brooks was reacting to sharp criticism from the White House that he was a partisan Democrat out to 'get'' the President and that the report was purposely biased.

This report is an objective and straightforward analysis of all the data obtained by the subcommittee during an intensive investigation," he

Brooks also rejected the White House position that only \$205,000 was spent to maintain the homes at San Clemente, Calif., and Key Biscayne, Fla., for the past five years.

"That figure is totally misleading in that it relates only to expenditures within the four walls of the home. he said.

"The fact is that \$17 million has been spent. This figure covers all costs incurred in connection with these privately owned compounds including security, communications, office support, helipads, heating systems. landscaping, permanent guard details, and other such items."

Court Overturns 'Flag' Conviction

WASHINGTON (UPI) -The Supreme overturned Monday the conviction of a Massachusetts man arrested for wearing an American flag on the seat of his pants.

The court ruled 5 to 4 that the state law against mistreatment of the American flag was unconstitutional because it was too vague and too broad

In his majority opinion, Justice Lewis F. Powell wrote that the law "fails to draw reasonably clear lines between the kinds of nonceremonial treatment that are criminal and those that are not."

He also said that "flag contempt statutes have been characterized as void of lack of notice on the theory that what is contemptuous to one man may be a work of art to another.

Speaker Carl Albert says President Nixon's remark that the House Judiciary Committee wants to carry away White House Watergate documents in a U-haul trailer is a "wild defensive maneuver" that is almost beneath the dignity of the presidency.

In one of his bluntest statements vet on efforts to impeach the President for his handling of Watergate, Albert also said he believed Nixon had lost more ground with House members in the last two or three months than he did "through the entire previous eight or nine months.

He made the statement Monday on Straight Talk, a weekly interview produced by the National Public Affairs Center for Television and carried by the Public Broadcasting Service. Asked why he thought

Nixon was losing House support, Albert said he believed there is a feeling that the President "bas unfairly attacked the (Judiciary) committee which is given a job when the committee hasn't really given him any occasion to do

"I mean such statements as they might want to take a Uhaul and go down to the White House and carry back all the documents they can find...It seems to me that that statement by itself is a wild defensive maneuver on the part of the President and almost beneath the dignity of the office of President ...

"I'm surprised the President would say a thing like that.

Albert, who would preside if the impeachment issue came to the House floor, said he had reached no personal conclusions as to whether Nixon should be impeached because "I want to preside as speakers always do when they sit in the chair, and that is with absolute impartiality.

Did he agree with Senate Democratic Whip Robert Byrd of West Virginia that Nixon distorted the facts when he said he was cooperating with the Judiciary Committee? "Well, if he's fully cooperating, I haven't been able to find it out."

novel, "A Bear for the FBI," which might be likened to 'Catcher in the Rye.' He has made three

successful albums even entertain and this is pure though the lyrics were not suited for playing on the radio by disc jockeys. And he made a movie.

'Sweet Sweetback's Badassss Song." which generated controversy in his own black community because its presentation was considered crude

Van Peebles has so much talent that he is bound to have his detractors. Obviously, someone must have said the one thing he lacks is the ability to sing. since his previous efforts on records have been confined mostly to recitatives.

If so, Van Peebles has answered the challenge with an interesting album called "What the You Mean I Can't Sing' (Atlantic SD7259).

It's up to the listener to decide whether Van Peebles can sing. One of the tunes. "So Many Bars," is a strong argument in his favor.

Gutter Language But whether Van Peebles can sing or not is immaterial. His lyrics alone in this album make it worth many plays.

Van Peebles may use gutter language in writing his songs but they carry a heavy impact. He is not a Horatio Alger type since his roots are deeply imbedded. Van Peebles had a good upbringing in Chicago and was graduated from Ohio Wesleyan University. His command of the language is easily seen in "A Bear for the FBI." He studied philosophy in Holland before he began producing short films and a highly regarded movie. "Story of a Three-Day Pass."

His first Atlantic album not only contains some salty observations and down - to earth philosophy but it also has some fine instrumentals.

Handling President's Legal **Problems Is Complicated Job**

By GARRY WILLS We live in a surreal period. Our grandchildren are going to wonder how we managed to take it all in stride. To pick up the paper is to plunge through the looking glass. Picking up the paper, one reads on the front page Mr. James St. Clair's explanation of his client's various immunities. He cannot be impeached for allegations of tax fraud, since that "involves the President personally" and not his office. He should be impeached, if at all, only for things done in his capacity as President.

But then, one story over on the same page, we read about Mr. Nixon's attempt to deduct flowers sent to funerals from his income tax. Why? Here's why: "The President holds the view that a public man does very little of a personal nature.

He is a twenty - four - hour a - day President, and nothing but a President, when it comes to deducting wedding gifts from his taxes. But he is only occasionally a President when it comes to the investigation of those taxes for impeachment purposes.

This is not surprising. I guess, if we remember that the President is and is not a resident of any state or district where he maintains one of his palaces. He is a resident for voting and homebuying purposes. He is not a resident when it comes to paying any purposes.

There are snares to catch people who indulge in such nimble maneuvers. Take Mr. St. Clair's claim that Mr. Nixon's tax affairs have nothing to do with his office. If they do not, then what were Messrs. Buzhardt and others doing when they

them? These were White House lawyers, being paid by our taxes - and now Mr. St. Clair tells us they were at work on a private citizen's private concerns.

The tax problems involve

among other things, this President's private homes at San Clemente and Key Biscavne. But he himself deducts all of one house and a quarter of another as office expenses - which seems to make them official matters. Indeed, the recently released Ehrlichman memoranda show that Nixon tried to deduct even more money for the use of each home - e.g., when other government officials happened to be there during his absence. Mrs. Nixon certainly looks after his presidential nickels and dimes. Lawyers cooled his zeal for the extra cash in this case. But he had already cut enough corners

to keep them busy. Mr. St. Clair has, by his own dictum, indicated that other White House lawyers were acting out of bounds when they handled Mr Nixon's tax and real estate explanations. And he has served notice that he will not be engaged in such matters. He told Lesley Oelsner of the New York "Times": "I don't represent Mr. Nixon personally; II represent him in his capacity as President." That seems clear enough; if Mr. Nixon's tax problems come up, this President's representative will simply tell the citizen who happens to be holding

himself a good lawyer - as good a one as he can afford. But who really thinks it will be that simple? Mr. St. Clair claims the tax problems are a private

the President's office to find

Congressman Rodino's committee takes a different view? Will the President's law yer refuse to discuss (or even explore) the matter, as something outside his commission? What then, if it is pointed out that the presidential residences have bee pro-rated for presidential use, and those are part of the tax problem? Will he work on parts of the President's brief and let a private representative work on others?

Of course, he might parcel out his own efforts. moonlighting for Citizen Nixon after he has put in a day's labor for the Office of the Presidency. Tax money would then be paying him by day, and a citizen's pocketbook by night.


The scheme is absurd. So

is the situation. With the whole federal government working to cover up for Nixon, it is silly that we keep paying a little army of lawyers to tie up the Congress in its constitutional effort at making the President accountable to law. There is only one solution. We have been buying this President homes and heating systems and swimming pools - and then hiring him lawyers to prove that we should have bought him the homes in the first place. It is time he hired his own law yers.

Gov't. Agencies Launch Drive On Minority Workers Hiring

WASHINGTON - With all its heaviest legal guns now in line, the government is launching its widest offensive against management and labor to force a swift hiring and upgrading of millions of black. Chicano. Puerto Rican, American Indian, Oriental and women workers. This front will rumble - and grumble for years.

Most of the action will thunder from the newly powerful militant Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC). For it. now has taken from the Justice Department tha power to go into court to punish what it believes to be discriminating corporations, inflict punitive damages and win back pay" awards totaling millions of dollars, force the hiring of blacks and other minority workers on a one to one or two ration with whites, and to deprive "guilty" companies from contracting with the federal

government The new inherent power. newly refashioned, in the hands of government compliance agencies is enormous. There is, for example, the Labor Department's Office of Federal Contract Complainace headed by Phil Davis, Quietly on Feb. 14 it dispatched Order 14 to 19 compliance divisions of such agencies as the General Services Administration and Departments such a. Defense

The order said, in effect, start auditing. Do a sample run - through of the 350,000 firms doing business with the U.S. Here's how to do it. what to look for, what steps to take to conduct the compliance review in search of alleged discrimination against black and other minority workers, the ladies

included. The "implementation date" is April 15. After that - the action. Order 14 was cosigned by Labor Secretary Pete Brennan, Assistant Secretary Bernard DeLury and Davis. It will be tough. How tough can be learned from equally militant action taken by the Justice Department's Civil Rights Division which went after the big corporations. especially the utilities with its "pattern and practice" charges of discrimination against minority workers.

Most famous case is the Justice Department's suit against the Detroit Edison Co. In October 1973 a federal judge hit the utility with almost everything he could. He fined it \$4 million for punitive damages. And back pay not only for most of the 853 (out of 11,500 black employes, but for those who applied and weren't hired since 1965 and those who didn't apply because they believed they wouldn't be hired

Further he ruled, for

Power Co. and eight persons must be hired for every two whites in "trades" jobs; an accelerated hiring in all jobs and maintenance of this formula until 30 per cent of the work force is black. Also the promotion of a

black person to supervisor for every white so promoted. The utility has retained former Secretary of State (former Attorney General) William Rogers for its appeal before the Sixth Circuit in Cincinnati. He'll take it to the Supreme Court if necessary.

A tougher minority hiring. policy was imposed by the EEOC on the El Paso Natural Gas Co. last January. The utility agreed that at least 56.8 per cent of all "new hires" in the home office would be Spanish surnamed Americans. American Indians, blacks and females. In the field these minorities would get 70 per cent of all new hiring. There also was a retroactive salary grant to some employes totaling more than \$250,000

In the Georgia Power Co. case, the Justice Department won a final court order last January for a back pay of no less than \$2.1 million. This money. says the Justice Department, goes to "black victims of job discrimination." This is the largest actual award under final decree. It took five years. Now the company must increase its black employment to 17 per cent of the work force in five years.

electrical workers' local unions were charged with discrimination against blacks. The company was forced to pay \$250,000 back pay - in 1971. Point is, the Detroit and Georgia cases show a meteoric rise in money penalties. Typical of the enforced hiring clauses is the

Piedmont Natural Gas Co., Inc., of North Carolina. It is required to hire blacks in five job categories until the minority workers fill 20 per cent of the jobs. One black must be hired for each white under this pact in some categories. Also, the company wa

ordered to develop a pool of black job applicants.

Or, there is the Louisville Gas and Electric Co. which was ordered to recruit and hire blacks in certain job. classifications on a one - for one basis with whites until the black employe ration reflects the county's black population - 14 per cent. There you have the

instances of "pattern and practice" actions brought by the Justice Department Now John Powell's EEOC swings into action in the private sector, the Justice Department in the public area (cities - states) if asked by EEOC. and the Labor Department will hit th purveyors to the government itself.

PROOF OF DECLINE

OF U.S. SCHOOLS For many years, deeply concerned citizens have been vigorously protesting the de-emphasis on academic studies in many U.S. schools at every level, and the substitution of "frills and follies" for sound education. These straight thinking people have been scorned or ignored by self . styled professional educators who claim to know better, who have insisted that today's young people are the smartest

Now the evidence is in proving that there is indeed a decline in the quality of education in the United States. This evidence is the comparative scores made by high school students taking the Scholastic Aptitude Test before entering college, reported by the Educational Testing Service of Princeton, New

Jersey. These tests have remained basically the same for the past decade. They show a decline from 478 to 445 on the mean verbal scores of all students taking the test from 1963 to 1973. and from 502 to 481 in the mean mathematics scores. There has also been a sharp decline just within the past

year, from 1573 male high

school students attaining highest scores (750 to 800) 1972 to 987 attaining that t level in 1973

Buckley Explodes When Hoax Backfires On Him

By WILLIAM A. RUSHER I may lose my job for this. b this, but America deserves to know.

In the summer of 1971. when the uproar over the Pentagon Papers was at its height, Bill Buckley - the irrepressible owner and editor of "National Review," for which I work - published in the magazine a whole new series of hitherto secret government documents. As in the case of

the original Pentagon Papers stolen by Daniel Ellsberg, it was not entirely clear what these fresh documents tended to prove: but the media pounced on them greedily. For one of the few times in its history. "National Review" made the front page of the New York "Times," and TV watchers saw good gray Walter Cronkite holding up a copy of our little publication.

Two days later the bubble burst. Appearing before an angry clutch of reporters at Kennedy Airport, Buckley blandly told them it was all a hoax. The "documents" had been composed by the editors and staff of 'National Review." demonstrate how gullible the press is when offered some allegedly secret tidbit, however pointless.

Well, great was the gnashing of teeth in the land. Editorial writers huffed and puffed over Bill's "irresponsibility," etc., etc. Meanwhile quite a few people chuckled quietly to themselves.

But it's a long road that has no turning, and I can report that this particular one has just doubled back on itself.

About a month ago Bill

betook himself to Switzerland, to get in a little skiing and write a book. Such an absence on his part presents no special problem at "National Review " The editorial staff is carefully trained to observe the rules he has laid down: A solid respect for the canons of good taste, scrupulous accuracy in quotations. avoidance of unnecessary exclamation points, and the

But Buckley had not said anything about hoaxes - or at least, not anything discouraging So'a couple of weeks ago our spirited little staff composed a whole pageful of editorial paragraphs committing every literary crime Buckley and ever warned against. These were set in type and a few proofs were run off and bound into

of "National Review. which were then solemnly airmailed to Switzerland for the perusal of the editor - in -

chief. I only wish that space permitted me to quote the whole moxied page. It may well constitute the greatest tour de force in deliberately perverse composition since The Screwtape Letters. But the following will have to suffice:

"Justice William O Douglas, that great defender of the people's right to know, recently spoke to students at the University of Wisconsin, no doubt about freedom of the press or something equally close to his motorized old ticker. It isn't clear what he said, however - he refused to let the press bring tape recorders! 'Quod licet Jovus non licent boves,' as Bill Buckley likes to say.

Then silence descended on our office - until yesterday. It would be wrong to say that Bill Buckley exploded. Rather, he grieved. From his long memorandum, I excerpt the portion dealing with the paragraph already quoted:

"Why on earth make fun of Douglas's heart pacemaker? It's like making fun of someone's twisted legs ... I havebegged everyone at NR not to use a Buckley joke or make a Buckley reference. I don't know how to implement this instruction more forcefully without going to the printer and asking him to excise all references to Buckley. And if one has to do it, why not say it right? Or is there a joke and escapes me in changing the nouns from dative to nominative?"

On and on the memorandum goes. mournfully enumerating the errors his affectionate staff had carefully planted for him to discover. By the time he is through, he has counted - to mention only one offense - no less than stx unnecessary exclamation points. I am very sad," he concludes.

Well, we didn't leave him in his agony for long; and I am bound to add that, when the light finally dawned, he reacted not huffily, like so many of his own victims back in 1971, but with the lighthearted good humor that is almost his hallmark. I do believe, however, that henceforth he will appreciate a little more fully just how Walter Cronkite felt.

But when East discarded the deuce of hearts on this lead, declarer's contract became irretrievably lost, for West, with the doubleton K-10 of trumps remaining, couldn't be prevented from

eventually winning a trump trick. Declarer's play of taking the trump finesse was, of

course, correct. But he went about it in the wrong way. At trick two the jack of trumps should have been led out of the South hand. If West played low on this

lead, the jack would have won the trick. Another spade would then be led, and West's remaining K-10 would have been entrapped by the board's A-Q. If West covered the jack of spades with the king (as he undoubtedly would have done), the board's ace would have captured the trick. With East failing to follow suit on this lead. West would now be revealed as having the doubleton 10-3 remaining.

The South hand would next be re-entered via the heart king, after which the nine of trumps would be led It mattered not whether West covered with the ten spot or didn't, for his remaining 10-3 would be trapped by the board's Q-8.

By leading the jack as his first trump lead, declarer would be taking out insurance at no cost against West having been dealt the tripleton K-10-3. But, evidently, our declarer didn't think of this possibility, and played the trump suit in the hope that West had been dealt the doubleton K-x of trumps.





Bulging Ganglion Might Return

By G.C. THOSTESON, M.D. diverticulitis? Following an Dear Dr. Thosteson: I was told by my doctor that the lump at the base of my finger was a ganglion. One day I accidentally hit it and it disappeared. What causes ganglions? What can be done to cure them? Is it possible that mine will return?

-S.H. Quite possible that it might return - about half of them do under such circumstances.

A ganglion is either a cyst or a heriation (a bulge, that is) in the sheath that covers a tendon, and it forms because of a weakness at that spot in the fibrous tissues.

Periodically 1 get questions about a ganglion. and my usual advice is to ignore it since it is not a cancerous lump.

Banging a ganglion with a ook is the classic old fashioned way of handling them - a crude method in my opinion and only temporary half the time.

If a ganglion is unsightly or causing discomfort, it can be corrected surgically without the risk of having it come back.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Can you tell me something about

acute attack is it necessary to remain on a low - residue diet the rest of one's life? What is allowed and what is banned?

No, a low residue diet is not always necessary. You must, however, avoid foods (most fruits and berries) that have hard seeds as well as a few foods that have irritating husks or hulls.

Not unless you are young enough to be still growing. And in that case nature decides it.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I have high cholesterol and watch my diet fairly well, but would like to know why

butter, nuts or chocolate. In your booklet you say these do not have to be avoided. My cholesterol has gone down on a fat free diet.

I think a couple of points are being missed by a good many people who are worried about cholesterol. Reduction of TOTAL gross fats in the diet can have its impact on cholesterol, and foods that contain cholesterol are not the whole

story. The items you mention are not the type of thing that would be a staple part of the diet - wouldn't be eaten every day. Peanuts have a fat content

of 30 to 50 percent, but most of the fat is of the polyunsaturated type, which is preferable if you are trying to keep your cholesterol level down. Same applies to fresh ground peanut butter although some processing procedures increase the amount of saturated fat.

But either way, you don't want to go overboard on peanuts, if only because of the high fat content.

It's interesting to note that one authority recommended seven walnuts a day

fat content.

Chocolate also has a high fat content, mostly saturated in the form we get

So let's sum it up this way. Too much of any kind of fat is not going to be good for your cholesterol level, if for no other reason than fat is high in calories. But for any reasonable person I can't see the point in trying to say, no, you must never eat a peanut or a bite of chocolate.

Although cholesterol has been implicated in heart attacks and other circulatory troubles, it is also vital to human life. Girls In Little League? They Do It In Newark

NEWARK (UPI), N.J. contends the court suit -The Little League, which wants to keep girls off its' baseball fields, just doesn't understand what little girls can do, according to a New Jersey judge. Some of the boys think it's the judges who don't understand.

New Jersey has ordered the Little League to allow girls to play Little League baseball, and the league argued before three judges Monday against the order.

The judges made it known that they feel some girls can hit, run and throw as well as boys but said they will rule later on the state order banning sex discrimination in 1,900 local Little Leagues.

"As a group girls are not as skillful as boys," said Little League lawyer Michael LoPrete said. There are values to be served by boys playing

Judge Milton Conford, the presiding judge, criticized LoPrete's attitude

Philosophically, you're not in tune with the sex discrimination act," Judge Conford said. "The statute was intended to get rid of the stereotyped conceptions of what women are fit for."

Ten-year old Douglas McLanin of Jersey City wasn't interested in the legal arguments. Douglas had purely practical reasons for trying to keep his 12-year-old sister, Susie, and other girls out of his Little League.

"She wants to play, but I told her that's dumb." Douglas explained. "I play catch with her now, but you can't throw it fast because as soon as you do she hollers 'Stop. It hurts.' If you let girls play and they get hit with a ball, they'll just start

The Little League

against its boysonly policy, brought by the feminist National Organization of Women (NOW), has thrown the baseball program in New Jersey into chaos because some teams are allowing girls to sign up and try out and others are planning to suspend operations entirely rather than allow girls to play.

LoPrete argued that the Little League should be limited to boys, just as there are Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, and men's bowling teams and womens' bowling leagues. LoPrete argued that bowling alleys are public accommodations and they have separate leagues.






