Mayes has been tabbed as the district MVP.


Two of Mayes' Coyote teammates, senior Lindsey Smith and junior Valerie Wootan, are also on the all-league team.

Track Teams Spend Spring Break on the Run;

Stipe sets school record in 800m race

Borden High School's track team's began their season March 4 in Roscoe. Then on March 11th, Coach Richey took the teams to Anton to participate in the Amherst Relays.

At Roscoe, the boys' finished with a strong 4th place out of 22 teams from Class A, AA, and AAA area schools.

At Amherst, BHS boy's team narrowly missed out on the championship trophy with a second place finish (scoring 121 points) to champion Anton, who edged the Coyotes in the mile relay.

Other highlights of the two track meets involved one school record and several personal bests.

Sophomore T. C. Stipe continues to prove that BHS has two of the best distance runners in the state (along with Junior Trent Pepper) as he won the 800m run in a new school record time of At Amherst, he 2:03.55. also won the event with a time of 2:09.53.

In the two-mile run which Pepper won (10:02.86), T. C. also had a personal best time of 10:36.34 to finish second.

Pepper also took a gold medal in the mile run later in the day with a time of 4:36.50. Pepper is the Class A defending state champion in the two-mile

event and a 1999 state qualifier in the mile.

Senior Robert Stamper also showed that he will be a contender in the area's hurdles as he won both at Roscoe and at Amherst in the 300m race. At Roscoe, Stamper finished with a new meet record and a personal best of 42.22.

His time at the Amherst Relays, also a first place finish, was

42.56. Senior, Joseph Hardman form returned to Amherst after battling an illness at Roscoe to compete in and place in five events, scoring 30 individual points for BHS.

In field Hardman placed 2nd in the more Payton Brown, 8th long jump (19'10 threequarters inches) and 2nd in the triple jump (40' 8 onefourth inches).

Hardman was also a medalist in three running events: the 100m dash (3rd in a photo finish with a time of 11:47), 2^{nd} in the 200m dash (23.85), and anchor man in the mile relay which placed second.

One other team highlight was the gold metal finish for the "weightman's relay" at 400m Roscoe—a relay which finished in a time of The four boys 49.19. running in this event were: Dunlap, Rowdy Nick Flanigan, Lee Pepper, and T. J. Sharp.



Getting a good night's sleep

Complaints of sleep difficulties are common among older individuals. Typical symptoms for individuals over age 65 include problems falling aand sleep maintaining sleep, early-morning awakening, and excessive daytime sleepiness.

A variety of reasons keep seniors from getting enough rest. They include medical illnesses, medication, psychiatric disorders, social changes and poor sleep habits.

If you are chasing a good night's rest, try these strategies to help you sleep better:

- 1: Gradually cut down on caffeine until you've "decaffeinated" yourself. 2. Avoid eating a heavy meal or drinking alcohol right before bedtime. A full stomach can give you heartburn, which can disrupt sleep, and alcohol can affect deep sleep, allowing you to be awakened throughout the night more easily.
 - Make exercise a part of your daily routine, but plan relaxing nighttime activities before bedtime.
- 4. Set the stage for sleep. Identify factors that include the sleep-wake cycle including excessive light, uncomfortable room temperatures, and ringing telephone. Eliminate as may interruptions as you can.
- 5. Don't use your bedroom as an office/ lounge - paying bills

Bedrooms should be a haven purely used for relaxing.

- If you're in bed, but toss and turn and can't sleep a wink, go into another room and read a book for a while or listen to some music. When you start feeling drowsy, head back to bed.
- Soak feet or legs in a 7. warm bath to provide relief from restless leg syndrome.

If problems persists, take action. Have a clinical evaluation performed by an informed primary care physician or geriatric specialist.

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm 17th Congressional District Stenholm Urges Citizens to 'Claim our Fair Share'

Congressman Stenholm The is continuing his efforts to convince citizens of the 17th Congressional District to "claim our fair share" of federal and state dollars by completing the census which forms will be arriving in homes over the next few weeks.

"The census results are used to allocate federal funds for everything from highways and employment training to Medicaid and education," Stenholm noted. other "If states and counties have a high return rate while a significant number of our citizens fail stand up and be to counted, we'll never receive our air share."

Government's The General Accounting Office (GAO) has reported that. 95 percent of over "formula grant" funding is apportioned using census date in 22 of the 25 largest formula programs.

biggest programs depending o these census numbers are Medicaid. highway planning and construction, grants to local education agencies, foster care, community development grants and the WIC food program. Other grants help provide funding for childcare. Vocational education, adoption assistance and Drug Free Schools.

According to GAO numbers, Texas experienced an estimated net undercount of about 486,000 individuals in the 1990 census. If that undercount had been corrected, an additional \$93 million would have been delivered from Washington to Texas.

Stenholm also expressed concern that Texas will lose out in the 2000 census if the most scientific methods are not so that we're guaranteed or if those the employed results are not released. need," Stenholm remarked.

Estimates have been made that without using state-ofthe-art statistical methods, Texas could fare even worse in this year's count, with more than 600,000 people potentially being undercounted. Under such a scenario, states with rapid population growth, particularly among minorities, fare the worst. would PricewaterhouseCoopers, an independent accounting firm, estimated conservatively that Texas will lose nearly \$2 billion in federal funds over the next decade if the Census Bureau is not allowed to release correct census data derived using the mots modern scientific methods.


