

Officials Attempt To Curb Arms Race

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The United States and the Soviet Union announced Saturday they will begin talks in Helsinki, Finland, Nov. 17, which officials here regard as the most ambitious attempt to curb the arms race since the nuclear age began in 1945.

The long-delayed negotiations are intended to arrange a limitation and possible eventual reduction in the two nuclear superpowers' entire range of strategic offensive and defensive weapons. The implications for world relations could be enormous.

Soviet Ambassador Anatoly F. Debrynin proposed the date and site of the preliminary discussions at a very brief, 3 p.m. EDT meeting last Monday with President Nixon at the White House. The President accepted, and on his advice, Dobrynin discussed details at another secret meeting Wednesday with Secretary of State William P. Rogers.



Harvesters Strike Down Caprock, 24-15 Twice in the drive Partipa

AMARILLO - "The Harvesters Came to Amarillo, Tra-La, Tra-La," and Caprock's visions of grandeur turned into another nightmare for the Horns, the seventh time this season they've had bad dreams.

Pampa overcame several first half mistakes to win their second north zone game, 24-15, before a small, but brave crowd at Dick Bivins Stadium, here Friday night.

The Harvesters upped their season record to 2-5 and zone mark to 1-2. Caprock is now 0-7 for the season and, 0-2 in zone battle.

Pampa was unable to breathe easy until senior Randy Cantrell booted home a 25-yard field goal with 1:08 left to play. He had one other attempt go astray just before halftime when center Moss Hampton and holder Ross Holman failed to make contact. Pampa trailed at halftime, 9-7. formances. Holman found out what pass protection really is and completed five of 11 tosses for 105 yards, including a 21-yard touchdown strike to King. The senior also carried the ball seven times for 14 yards.

Ammons was used on 19 offensive plays the final two periods and hit on one of three


