This person in their lives whose loss they now grieve—and rightfully so—was devoted to her children....to their interests, to their well being, to their education, to their triumphs, and a devoted presence in their struggles....a devotion that comes instinctively from a mother's heart.

She used the threads of joy.

Few people had as beautiful and captivating a smile as their mother did.

And nothing, no one gave her as great a reason to smile, as did her children.

Throughout the years of athletics and cheerleading and academic and musical accomplishments, during the AJRA and stock show years, their mother was there to share those fun times with them. It is what she lived for. And, after the three of them were gone from Borden County Schools, she transferred her joy to the children she taught.

....a word that is easily spoken and spoken of, but one that is hard to get right in so many relationships. Never did she waver in the love she had for the three of them. The sweetest words in her vocabulary were Brice, Ralynn, and Grant. Her success as a person can now be measured not by how wonderfully she always dressed—and she did—or how courageously she fought this disease—and she did.

Her success is now seen in them: In Brice, as a husband and father. In Ralynn, as a wife, a teacher.

And in Grant, as a young man finishing college with a promising future.

The three of them now as brothers and sister will use devotion, joy, diligence and love to hold their family together in the years to come.

The seamstress is no longer with them, but they can wrap themselves in her quilt.

It is her legacy to them

and will warm their broken hearts until they see her in another time, another place.

Murchison was trying to put in some new light bulbs in his apartment in Huntsville. The light fixture was on the ceiling, so Bill got a chair to stand on while he screwed in the light bulbs. Now bill is one of those impulsive types who takes what is handy to get the job done.

closet chair happened to be one that was on rollers.

"It rolled one way and I fell the other way," says Bill. "I was unconscious for a few moments and woke up to find I had broken both wrists."

The doctor put casts on both of Bill's arms and told him to come back in seven weeks to have the casts removed.

Bill happened to be out of town when it was time to take the casts off his arms. So he decided to do it himself.

"I went to Wal-Mart and looked in the tool department. The only thing I found that I thought I could use was hacksaw. I bought it, went to my car and sat in the Wal-Mart parking lot and sawed on the cast. My left hand was stronger than my right, so I sawed the right cast off."

He was exhausted after the ordeal and decided to tackle his left cast later.

"After a day or so, it was running me crazy, says Bill.

He was driving in Henreitta, Oklahoma when he thought he found a solution to his problem.

"I looked to my left and saw a sign that said

'Pawn Shot and Tools.' I slammed on the brakes and came to a screeching halt in front of the place. I told the owner what I needed to do. He said he had a little vibrating tool that would do the job.

"I looked at it and realized it was like what the doctors used to vibrate through the plaster. If it hits your skin it won't cut you. I asked the man if he would let me rent it or just borrow it and told me to go to the back of the pawn shop to take off the cast."

Now Bill's right wrist still didn't have much strength in it and he couldn't bear down like he needed to. The pawn shop owner and one of his clerks went to the back to see how Bill was coming along.

"I told them I wasn't having much luck because of my weak right arm. They offered to help."

The pawn shop owner weighted 300 around pounds. He took vibrating tool and cut right through the cast all the way to Bill's elbow.



Boats require an expended amount of upkeep to preserve safe performance and the watercraft's market value. Take steps to ensure the safety of your boat by referring to your owner's manual to find specific maintenance instruction.

To prepare your boat for open season, Progressive Insurance recommends the following check points:

- 1. Change the Engine Oil and Spark Plugs. Many boats manufacturer recommend that you change the engine oil and filter twice a year - prior to storage and in the spring. During storage, the oil separate causing a condensation buildup that may harm your engine. While you're there, replace the spark plugs. Be sure to set the gaps to the recommanufacturer's mended setting using a gap setting tool.
- 2. Prepare the Outdrive. outdrive has many that need your attention. Check or change the oil in the gear housing, inspect the seals for signs of deterioration, check the power steering oil level and grease the entire drive.
- 3. Check Battery. Clean the cables and terminals with a wire brush and reconnect. Depending on your battery, you may have to fill the cells with distilled water.

- 5. Check the Fuel System. Replace the fuel filter and examine the fuel lines for cracks and make sure they are connected and supported with approved clips and straps. you should also inspect fuel tanks and pumps for leaks.
- 6. Other Basic Maintenance. Be sure to check the belts for signs of wear and tear. Inspect the bilge pump, adjust the steering cables and check navigational equipment.
- Prepare the Hull. Visually inspect the hull for signs of cracking and peeling paint. Seal any cracks with a marine sealant approved for your type of boat, wait for the sealant to cure and prepare the hull for painting below the water line. After painting, apply a high quality wax to the hull above the waterline and deck, avoiding areas where passengers may walk.
- 8. Prepare the Trailer. If you will be towing your boat, don't forget to inspect


the trailer. Check the tires and spare for cracks, worn treads and correct tire pressure. Check and grease the hubs. The back up and taillights should be tested. If needed, replace the bulbs and cracked wires. you may also want to operate the winch to be sure it is working properly.

- 9. Prepare the Safety Equipment. Even after all the mechanical components have been checked, you should never board a boat that does not have properly working safety equipment. Take the time to inspect personal floatation devices, check the expiration dates on fire extinguishers, replace old fire extinguishers, replace old flares, test the radio and sound all warning horns.
- 10. Be Sure You're Covered. After making all the routine checks listed above, be sure to check your insurance policy and review your coverage's to make sure they meet your current needs. (Call 1-888-BOAT-PRO or Independent Agent to get estimates on various boat coverage's.) If you have added any equipment, you'll want to make sure it is covered.

Taking the time to be prepared will ensure an enjoyable and safe boating season.
