## International war games, interference

At first tlance it seems a little curious. All the representatives of the
vaunted "international communuty" have proclaimed all along that
their chief motivation in intervening scolding or lecturing about the war in Bosnia has been to prevent a wider war. Yet when Croatia
aunches an attack on the Krajina region, taken by Serb armies in 1991 and held by the Serbs since then, criticism is curiously muted. so quietly and discreetly urging the Croatians onward.
And, in fact, the Croatian action might just constitute a first step to the end of the bloody war in the former Yugoslavia.
But there is litte evidence that the U.S. State Department understands even now the nature of the conflict or the best way
to bring it to a conclusion. That lack of understanding could end up prolonging a conflict even more. of international institutions whose ambitions have generally
exceeded their resources or will, has become conventional wisdom that local wars must be "contained" by the dominant interwith the pocal conflict being the board and the international play-
ers able to dictate the outcome through strategic moves - a bombng strike here, the insertion of peace-keeping troops there, the Iposition or lifting of an embargo - and achieve containment.
Using the model of rational management and manipulation by wise
itemational players however has probably prolonged the Balkan intermational players, however, has probably prolonged the Balkan ueled by resentment, ambition, or local causes generally end wars whinn ambits ors uns are acce they can win the next battle and the losers are tired of being beaten. At that point, diplomacy can play a constructive role.
It can be frustrating and sad to watch a local conflict and not try o end it. But when well meaning outsiders try to impose a "peace"

## NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON TAX INCREASE

The Gray County Commissioners will hold a public hearing on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in 1994 by 7.99* percent. Your individual taxes may increase at a greater or lesser rate, or even decrease, depending on the change in the taxable value of your property in relation to the change in taxable value of all other property.

The statement above shows the percentage increase the proposed rate represents over the effective tax rate that the unit published on August 17. 1995. The following table compares taxes on an average home in this taxing unit last year to taxes proposed on the average home this year. Again, your individual taxes may be higher or lower, depending on the taxable value of your property.

Under this proposal taxes on the average home would increase by $\$ 16.12$ or 14.62* percent compared with last year's taxes. Comparing tax rates without adjusting for changes in property value, the tax rate would increase by $\mathbf{\$ . 0 4 1 1}$ per $\$ 100$ of taxable value or $10.32 *$ percent compared to last year's tax rate. property.
Criminal Justice Mandate (for counties):
The Gray County Auditor certified that Gray County Has spent $\$ 12,700.00$ in the previous 12 months beginning January 1, 1994, for the maintenance and operations cost of keeping inmates sentenced to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. Gray County Sheriff has provided information on these costs, minus the state revenues received for reimbursement of such costs.
