Maryland Court Disbars Agnew For Dishonesty

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (UPI) - Maryland's highest court has disbarred former Vice President Spiro T. Agnew for "fraud, dishonesty and deceit.'

To do otherwise, the Maryland Court of Appeals said Thursday, would "constitute a travesty of our responsibility.

Rather than stand trial on charges involving a kickback scheme during his years as vice president. governor of Maryland and Baltimore County executive. Agnew resigned as vice president and pleaded no contest to evading federal income taxes of \$13,551.

Agnew had asked that he be temporarily suspended. rather than being disbarred. He asked a special threejudge panel hearing the case Dec. 18 "not to strip me of my livelihood. I can resume a useful place in the practice of law after my suspension," he pleaded.

But the Court of Appeals concluded that "This crime which involves moral turpitude ... is infested with fraud, deceit and dishonesty."

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) Clinton White, who was hired by Black Muslim released four of seven Temple 26 to represent all seven men after their arrests in a massive police dragnet Wednesday.

Alioto, who met with U.S. Attorney General William Saxbe, said afterwards he had appealed to Saxbe to begin a federal investigation of the Death Angels, which he said were dedicated to the murder and mutilation of whites and dissident

blacks. In the Zebra killings, at least 12 white persons were shot and killed at random over a fivemonth period on San Francisco streets. Alioto said the figure could go much higher, to 80 or more killings and assaults throughout California.

'The four who were released will probably be brought before a grand jury," Alioto said. But later he modified his statement to say they "might be" called. White said all seven suspects appeared in a police lineup and their photos were shown to

witnesses. A spokesman said those released were Tom Manney. 31. Douglas Burton, 22.

Revealing the vote you cast in tomorrow's primary election could result in your being fined up to \$500. Voting in more than one primary on the same election day could get you shelling out from \$100 to \$500.

Those are just two of the many laws governing what you may or may not do (mostly may not do) in elections in the state of Texas.

-Use of coercion to influence a vote or to prevent voting can cost \$1,000 and a year in jail.

-Bribery is a third degree felony. Paying someone to vote or not vote a particular way could result in a \$2,000 fine and up

to 10 years in prison. -Voting more than once. \$100 to \$500 fine.

-Illegally voting more than once in the same or different precinct, up to \$500 fine or 60 days in jail.

-Voting if not qualified to vote: two to five years in prison.

-Instigating illegal voting: \$100 to \$500 fine and up to one month in jail.

-Falsely swearing as to your qualifications to vote: two to five years in prison.

-Procuring a voter to swear falsely : up to \$3,000 or



Church Page **Pope Paul** Proclaims **Holy Year** WASHINGTON (UPI) -Pope Paul VI has

proclaimed the year beginning Pentecost Sunday. June 10, as a "Holy Year.'' a traditional observance aimed at the interior renewal of the person.

In practice, Holy Years, marked about every 25 years in modern times, have been purely spiritual, "a manifestation of profound piety and of the unity of the Church," according to Vatican Secretary of State Cardinal Jean Villot.

But this year, while the emphasis will still be on the life of the spirit, it will also be directed outward. emphasizing reconciliation; Christian unity and the search for peace.

A Remarkable Parallel

American Catholics will find a remarkable parallel in a document written by Rabbi Marc H. Tanenbaum spelling out the origins of Holy Year observance in the celebration of the Jewish Jubilee year.

The Jubilee is described in the Old Testament book of Leviticus: "And you shall hallow the fiftieth year, and proclaim liberty throughout the land unto all the inhabitants thereof; it shall be a jubilee unto you; and you shall return every man unto his possession; and you shall return every man unto his family.

According to Tanenbaum. who serves as national interreligious affairs director, the Jubilee "had for its aim the emancipation of the individual from the shackles of poverty, and the elimination of the various economic inequalities in the Jewish Commonwealth in accordance with the

Rodino Responds Negatively To Transcripts

WASHINGTON (UPI) -Following is the text of a statement Wednesday by House Judiciary Committee chairman Peter W. Rodino Jr., D-N.J., in response to President Nixon's issuance of edited transcripts of the subpoenaed Watergate tapes:

To this point in our proceedings my statements and my actions have been dictated by the responsibility I owe to the committee, to the House under its resolution, and to the people under Article I. Section 4 of the Constitution. I shall continue to follow this course

Because of my great respect for the office of the President and for the dignity of the House of Representatives, I, at every turn, as chairman of this committee, have sought to avoid precipitous action in our search for the truth in the matters inescapably before us.

I regret that while we demonstrated time and time again that we were not seeking any confrontation with the President of the United States, we were only seeking evidence -- the best evidence -evidence, the relevance of which under the Constitution and the resolution only we can determine - that we have been delayed by the President





But bear in mind the U.S. government is close to 200 years old. For it to go on a crash reducing program. losing 16 agencies overnight, as Proxmire proposes, might be too great a shock to its system.

Should Be Gradual A young government could drop that much bureaucracy with no harmful effects. But when a government is getting along in years, it should thin down gradually

I recommend that Proxmire and other members of Congress obtain a copy of "Dr. Fatkin's Revolutionary Reducing Plan," subtitled "The High Commission Way to Streamlined Governments.'

Dr. Fatkins has patterned his book after "Dr. Atkins' Diet Revolution," a longtime bestseller that introduces a new concept to losing weight

Rather than have you cut down on calories, as in conventional diets, Dr. Atkins puts the blame on carbohydrates. Which aren't very tasty anyhow. Similarly, Dr. Fatkins attacks the conventional view that the main cause of excess bureaucracy is an imbalance of regulatory commissions.

The real culprit, he insists, is an overabundance of advisory councils. It has long been assumed that bureaucratic obesity begins when the government has more regulatory commissions than there are matters that need regulating.

He Touches on that Point Proxmire himself touched on that point in his statement advocating abolition of the 16 agencies.

Even if all rail, road and barge transportation in the United States were ended, the bureaucracy of the Interstate Commerce Commission would no doubt continue to survive." he said

But under the reducing plan advocated by Fatkins. Congress could go on creating regulatory commissions any time it felt the urge

The spread of regulatory commissions alone contributes little of nothing to bureaucratic extension. according to his theory. Rather, the governmental structure expands in direct

the company, could provide restitution in the way of money or substitute lots to thousands of consumers who purchased land for retirement or vacation homes because of what the FTC contends was deceptive advertising of worthless. land.

According to the FTC. many of the land sales took place at promotional dinner parties where movies showing an attractive. developed area led buyers to

believe that the land they purchased would be similar. In fact, some of the lots were under water, others had no sewer or water systems, and there was no assurance that planned developments would take place. Attorneys in our




