### ROCK MUSIC

If you like rock 'n' roll, you'll love Suzi Quatro.

She realizes the recurring nightmare of every suburban mother with a tomboy daughter. Suzi comes out on stage in black leather with an enormous Les Paul Gibson bass slung on her hip, plants her feet wide apart and rips into a song with the kind of violence traditional to Detroit rock 'n' rollers.

Born and raised in the Motor City, Suzi headed an all-girl rock band called The Pleasure Seekers in 1965, when she was just 15. The band evolved into Cradle and for a while included Jerry Nolan (now of the New York Dolls) on drums.

In 1971, she moved to London and—like so many American musicians—finally made it in Britain and Europe, before most folks on this side of the Atlantic had even heard of her.

Though her first U.S. tour is now history, that situation hasn't changed much. Suzi is still a far bigger star in Europe than in her homeland. But there is a legitimate and growing "cult" interest in her music.

Suzi's band looks like a gang of drunken English street hoods and Suzi tries (rather less successfully) to look like one of them. Faced with an unresponsive audience, her Roller Derby Queen image tends to crumble a bit around the edges, the low-level acrobatics seeming a little forced.

The band is raw and raunchy. Suzi's voice and bass lines perfect. Her music is the most basic, direct kind of rock, with a healthy shot of "what's it to ya" enthusiasm. She can make you laugh at yourself, just by noticing how much you're enjoying it.

Suzi's debut American album, appropriately titled "Suzi Quatro" (Bell 1302), is for folks who like to roll up the rug at parties—non-stop boogie, starting with her big European hit, "48 Crash," and finishing with the classic "Shakin' All Over." It's a lot of fun, which is as much as you can ask of rock 'n' roll anyway.

David Bowie returns for another U.S. tour starting in June. Billed as "an extensive series of theatrical presentations," the tour coincides with release of Bowie's upcoming L.P., "Diamond Dogs." Genesis, in New York for two nights at the Academy of Music, had their guitars stolen sometime between the first night's performance and the second. The thieves contacted the band and demanded a big "ransom" for the instruments, which included a special custom double-necked bass. So they rented some new guitars and went on for the show, one day late...the American Red Cross surveyed high school students and decided Grand Funk Railroad is the nation's most influential band, so they got the all-American boys to roll up their sleeves and give some blood in hopes of attracting more young donors.

## America's Concern For Past Gives Rise To ASCA Group

LUBBOCK, Tex. (UPI)—America's increased concern for its cultural past has given rise to a new national organization, the American Society for Conservation Archeology.

The ASCA was organized at the recent 1974 Cultural Resource Management Conference held in Denver. Its officers hope that the membership eventually will include all professional archeologists engaged in contract work.

"The Environmental Protection Agency and a host of federal agencies which have land as a part of their responsibilities need archeological work performed because of newly passed laws," said Dr. William J. Mayer-Oakes, president pro-tem of the new organization.

Mayer-Oakes is chairman of the Department of Anthropology at Texas Tech University, a position he has held since the department was opened almost three years ago.

"Services of archeologists

are increasingly contracted by the government agencies who want to know the cultural resources of any sites about to be altered by man—dams, roads, mines or other engineering or landscape altering works," Mayer-Oakes said.

"In the past, archeologists have done their work as a reaction to the threat of possible cultural resources losses," he said. "It is time for archeologists to work in a positive way, identifying sites where there is a strong possibility of rich cultural remains which are valuable to all of society."

This will be a part of the task undertaken by the new ASCA, Mayer-Oakes said, along with the two-fold purpose of setting standards for contract archeologists and disseminating information relating to their work.

Mayer-Oakes said he would serve as president pro-tem of the new organization until the membership has been expanded and formally organized. He said new

officers would then be elected.

Approximately 50 archeologists attending the Denver meeting signed up as charter members of the new organization. These first members are from the western states, reflecting the attendance at the Denver meeting.

"The organization eventually should include professional archeologists from throughout the United States and should number about 200 members," Mayer-Oakes said.

The Texas Tech professor has worked in contract archeology in the United States and Canada. He also has done extensive field work in Ecuador and Mexico.

Dr. Floyd Sharrock was named secretary-treasurer of ASCA. He is chairman of the Department of Anthropology at the University of Montana.

## Boating

NEW YORK (UPI)—One major boat manufacturer is optimistic about the future of recreational boating under the impact of the fuel crisis, but he says it is impossible to make any accurate forecast now.

"Because of myriad uncertainties directly related to the energy crisis, fiberglass material shortages and the sale of large yachts, I personally have no faith in current market forecasts or measurements of the economy," says Larry D. Brady, president of Striker Aluminum Yachts.

Brady said his Fort Lauderdale, Fla.-based company entered 1974 with 33 per cent of its annual production already sold, compared with 21 per cent the previous year. He said domestic sales in 1973 increased slightly more than 25 per cent over the previous year.

Striker manufactures large sportfishing and cruising yachts in the \$60,000 and up range. It is a division of Beatrice Foods Co., a corporation that

markets leisure time products ranging from Morgan sailing yachts to Airstream trailers.

"We've completed our production scheduling for 1974," Brady said. "This includes double production of the 54-foot Sportfisherman in anticipation of an increase in the large boat marketplace."

Brady pointed out that Striker's market was considerably different from the boating industry as a whole.

"The man who can afford a Sportfisherman from \$60,000 to \$350,000 usually would be resourceful enough to obtain his fuel requirements," Brady said.

"For example, one Striker owner from Ohio is currently upgrading to a customized Striker 54-footer for delivery this spring. He said to me: 'If I can't get fuel in Fort Lauderdale, I'll base the boat in the Bahamas or Cozumel (Mexico) or wherever diesel fuel is available.'"

Brady said Striker assumes an over-all decline in the total boating marketplace.

"The smaller decline in the large boat segment of the industry," he said, "will be more due to fiberglass material shortages than customer demand."

One certainty, according to Brady, is that prices will rise.

"The fuel crisis combined with the resin shortage in fiberglass boats will create havoc with product pricing," he said.

## The Lighter Side

WASHINGTON (UPI)—In his book "The Psychology of Consciousness," Dr. Robert E. Ornstein says there is a bigger difference in the two halves of the human brain than you might have suspected.

You probably thought the hemispheres of the brain shared everything 50-50 and got along real well together. But being housed in the same cranium doesn't necessarily make good neighbors.

According to Ornstein, the left hemisphere has responsibility for certain functions that are entirely separate and distinct from the right hemisphere's jurisdiction.

Moreover, the right side doesn't necessarily know what the left side is doing, and vice versa. This explains a lot.

The right hemisphere, for example, is the vice president in charge of recognizing faces. Whereas names are stored in the left hemisphere.

Which accounts for what happens when you bump into someone you haven't seen for a long time.

The face may be familiar but if your left hemisphere is having a bad day you won't be able to place the face.

I don't know from my limited reading on this subject how many other functions Ornstein has isolated and identified in each half of the brain.

A number of them are obvious even to a layman, however.

The date of your wedding anniversary obviously is not stored in the same compartment that retains old baseball scores, the casts of musical comedies in the 1940s and other trivia.

A call to pick up a bottle of milk on your way home from work is not handled by the same hemisphere that governs your operation of a motor vehicle.

If an early morning dental appointment registers on the right hemisphere, the setting of alarm clocks is taken over by the left.

It would appear, moreover, that hemispheric differences vary with individuals. With many men, the half of the brain that decides which suit to wear is not the half that selects the necktie.

With other men, the half that determines the size of tips given to cocktail waitresses in Playboy clubs is not the half that writes checks for charitable contributions.

One side of the brain records the calibrations of bathroom scales. The other side controls appetites.

One side determines the amount a person drinks at New Year's Eve parties. The other side establishes the pain threshold of headaches.

Left hemisphere Controls operation of tape recorders.

Right hemisphere Controls issuing of subpoenas.

Baby's Crying A Danger Signal

By G.C. THOSTESON, M.D. Dear Dr. Thosteson: My sister has a new baby two months old...

I have had six, and believe me, I never let one of mine cry that much.

Also she uses these synthetic diapers and the little thing is all broken out.

I wonder what "book" she is referring to. I haven't seen one that recommends any such thing.

Personally I would start checking somewhat sooner than that, but a mother should be guided by the tone of the baby's cry.

A healthy baby can do a little squalling over some trivial feeling of annoyance and then forget about it.

signalling the only way it can (by crying) for 10 or 25 minutes, there's some reason for it.

As to this baby's rash, I would doubt that the type of diaper is the cause.

Thorough cleaning and rinsing of the skin is important, not merely applying a fresh diaper of whatever kind.
