Kissinger Will Stay

Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger has withdrawn his threat to resign now that the Senate Foreign Relations Committee has cleared him of accusations that he initiated wiretaps of aides and newsmen in 1969.

At a June news conference in Salzburg, Austria, on the first leg of President Nixon's Mideast trip. Kissinger threatened to resign unless cleared by the committee of charges he initiated the taps in order to plug leaks of national security documents.

Kissinger had testified his only role had been to provide names of individuals who had access to the documents.

The secretary is grateful with the committee's ... Given the content of the report, the secretary no longer sees any reason to resign," State Department spokesman Robert Anderson said late Tuesday. The report, issued Tuesday after a thorough

study of the charges, said: The committee reaffirms its position of last year that his role in the wiretapping did not constitute grounds to bar his confirmation as Secretary of State.

A federal grant for \$17,450 to cover 75 percent of the Step 1 cost on Pampa's proposed \$1.1 - million sewage plant improvement has been approved by the federal Environmental Protection Agency.

City Manager Mack Wofford said today he had received notice of the grant" approval and word that a check for the amount would be mailed to the city within

the next 30 days. Total cost of Step 1 was approximately \$25,000. This would make the city's share of the cost around \$8,000.

Step 1 of the sewage plant improvement involved the prliminary engineering study of the project completed by Merriman and Barber, local engineering consultants.

The Lubbock engineering firm of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper was engaged last week by the Pampa City Commission to prepare plans and specifications for Steps 2 and 3 completion of

the sewage plant. Improvement of the plant was ordered by the Texas Water Quality Board and the EPA when both agencies decided it did not meet state and federal environmental standards.


The Pampa congressman's reaction to the White House statement follows:

Deadlines Set For Unleaded Gasoline Use

Gasoline service stations in Gray County have until Sept. 1 or Oct. 1 to start selling unleaded gas. depending upon the gallonage sold per year since 1971.

County Judge Don Cain has received a letter from the Federal Energy Administration (FEA) in Dallas requesting that county commissioners conduct a telephone survey to determine which stations in the county must have the

unleaded gas available. Gray County has been designated "rural," which means that stations which sold 200.000 gallons per year will be required to have unleaded by Sept. 1, 1974. and those in the 150,000 gallon category by Oc. 1.

Currently, the FEA says. there is no list of service stations that will be required to have unleaded gas: hence, the request that county commissioners provide such a list.

Stations in urban areas that have sold as much as 200,000 gallons per year must also have unleaded gas by no later than Sept. 1. The requirements are

intended to protect the 1975 model automobiles due on the market this fall.

Jacobsen, 54, of Austin, Tex., pleaded guilty to one count of making a bribe Chief U.S. District Court Judge George L. Hart Jr. then released him to the custody of his attorney.

Jacobsen faces a maximum penality of two years in prison and a \$10,000

In exchange for the guilty plea on the bribery charge. Deputy Special Prosecutor Henry Ruth dropped other charges against Jacobsen. including an indictment filed in U.S. District Court in San Agelo, Tex.

In a letter to Jacobsen's law yer May 21, Ruth spelled out terms for accepting the single guilty plea and dropping the other charges in return for Jacobsen's testimony against Connally.

Connally, a long-time Texas associate of Jacobsen, will be arraigned Friday. He is charged with a total of five counts of accepting bribes. conspiracy and lying to the grand jury. If convicted. Connally would face a maximum penalty of 19 years imprisonment and a \$50,000

Jacobsen pleaded guilty to giving Connally what Hart called "an illegal gratuity" of \$10,000 in cash betweer. May 14, 1971, and Sept. 27, in Methodist Church of 1971

Briscoe Doubts His Influence

On Constitution AUSTIN (UPI) - Gov. Dolph Briscoe said Tuesday he felt it would have been immoral for him to try to convince legislators to pass a proposed constitution and that he doubted his influence would have made any difference anyway.

"I think the delegates voted their convictions, Briscoe said. "I think that is the way it should be.

Briscoe also denied a charge by convention president Price Daniel Jr. that he refused in the final hours of the convention to indicate if he favored the proposed document.

'No one asked how I stood," the governor said. "If they wanted to know how I stood all they had to do was walk in here and ask how I stood. I was available either by phone or in person.

Briscoe said he talked with Sen. A. M. Aikin Jr. D-Paris, the convention vice president, and Lt. Gov. William P. Hobby moments before the constitution failed to pass by three votes. But he would not say what was talked about during the conversation

They called me and I talked with them." he said. What was said in that conversation to me was a private conversation.

Briscoe said at the beginning of the convention he pledged he would not take an active role in a convention in which he was not a voting delegate.

"To use strongarm tactics on the part of this office in the final days of the convention to try to change people's minds. I think it would have been not only improper but it would have been immoral also. Briscoe said

My stand has been consistent all along. From the beginning of the convention I stated that it would not involve the office of the governor in the day to day decisions to be made by the convention.

Briscoe said he didn't think the \$4 million spent on the convention was wasted even though a proposed charter wasn't approved.

"I think that the basis that was started here was not a complete waste of the taxpayers' money, I hope that it will work toward better state government in the years ahead.



Key Capital In Fighting SAIGON (UPI) - Viet

Cong and North Vietnamese troops seized a key district capital near Da Nang today in the first major Communist victory of a three-week-old drive against the outskirts of the

strategic port city. Field reports said the Communists seized Thuong Duc, a town 25 miles southwest of Da Nang, in. hand-to-hand fighting with crack government ranger defending the war-torn district capital.

The Saigon command reported losing radio contact with the town's defenders soon after Communists backed by tanks and artillery broke through Thuong Duc's barbed wire defense perimeter at midmorning.

We think because of the size of the attacking force. the rangers may have moved away from the town and that is why we cannot contact them." a command

spokesman said. Field reports said the Communists broke through the final, concertina wire defenses and swarmed into the government lines. apparently overwhelming all resistance in less than an

South Vietnam has warned the Communists the fall of a major town in the Da Nang fighting would destroy the Jan. 28, 1973, cease-fire agreement.

The reports said the town's ranger defenders former mercenaries for American forces in South Vietnam - abandoned the one-time U.S. Green Beret outpost guarding the district capital The 14,000 residents of

For the infant, the most common spot in a car is in its mother's arms or on her lap. Usually a secure place for a child, in a collision, a child sitting on an adult's lap could be crushed against

the dashboard. Even if the adult is wearing a combination lap and shoulder belt, the child can be wrenched from the arms by collision forces. Never use a seat belt to restrain both an adult and a child seated on a lap since the weight of the adult would press down on the child's

been criticized for not requiring stricter rules for the many child seating systems on the market. It has proposed new standards, but they are not scheduled to take effect until September of 1975 and may even be delayed

The proposed revision of Standard No. 213 would apply to all devices used to transport children in motor vehicles. In addition to car seats, the standard would cover car beds, infant carriers and child harnesses which are not included in the current standard.

All child restraint systems would be subject to dynamic (in-motion) crash tests instead of the presently prescribed static tests. The restraint systems would have to protect a child from injury from a frontal impact at 30 miles per hour or a side or rear impact at 20 m.p.h.

If the original safety standard that went into effect in April of 1971 removed most of the grossly unsafe child car seats, the new standard could take off some of those that meet the current standard.

In a request to the NHTSA. GM asked for a change in the new law because it claimed that neither of its safety devices could meet the new standard. GM said both would have to be completely redesigned without any evidence they'll be

In the 34-page comment, GM said there was no way the present infant carrier could meet the proposed safety standard which says a child's head cannot move more than 18 inches from the vehicle's seat back. In the infant carrier, the child faces rearward and its head already is a greater distance from the seat back in normal riding conditions.

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





RUSHER up, if it will save the cover Several of weeks ago. when the Impeachment Bandwagon had all but ground to a halt, the House Judiciary Committee hastened to give it a fresh shove by releasing, in advance and totally out of context, certain portions of the 8000 pages of documents and testimony it had gathered which were believed to be particularly

damaging to Mr. Nixon. Of these snippets, by far the most explosive was the Committee transcript of a conversation Mr. Nixon had had in the Oval Office with John Mitchell and John Dean on March 22, 1973. In the course of this conversation, and in connection with the forthcoming testimony of his aides before the Senate Watergate Committee, Mr. Nixon was quoted as saying:

"I don't give a (deleted) what happens, I want you all to stonewall it, let them plead the Fifth Amendment cover up or anything else, if it'll save it - save the plan. That's the whole point.

Now any way you slice it, that's a remarkable statement. Mr. Nixon's position was unmistakably clear: He was ready to sanction any kind or amount of cover - up, "if it'll save it - save the plan. That's the whole point.

Mr. Nixon's critics have been understandably eager to conclude that the quoted words simply wrap up their case. The man was avowedly ready to sanction a "cover - up or anything." Impeach him and remove him: Q.E.D.

And yet there is surely more to the whole business than that. Certainly Mr. Nixon was frank enough about his purpose Stonewalling, pleading the Fifth, covering up, anything is to be permitted "if it'll save it - save the plan. That's the whole point.

What "plan" is he talking about? Why on earth has practically nobody bothered to ask that question?

As far as Mr. Nixon's critics are concerned, they have obviously glided over those dozen words because they represent a disagreeable complication in an otherwise open - and shut case. Mr. Nixon flatly called for a cover - up; what does it matter what "plan" he was protecting? Maybe he meant the whole evil conspiracy

But logically that just won't do. Even if Mr. Nixon had been up to his ears in the original conspiracy to break into Democratic headquarters, the burglars had been caught in the act in June 1972, and that entire conspiracy was in ruins. He could scarcely be trying to "save" that plan in March 1973.

Well, then perhaps the plan he wanted so badly to save was a plan (of which he was, hypothetically, part) to cover up the original conspiracy. But if "the plan" was simply to cover up, then it would hardly make sense for Mr. Nixon to list a "cover · up" as one of the techniques he was prepared to authorize to 'save the plan." In effect. he would be saying "cover

"if it'll save it - save the plan. That's the whole point.

What was that plan? I suggest that thoughtful citizens refrain from jumping to conclusions about Mr. Nixon's villainy until we know, or can better surmise, the anser to that question. What do you think the plan was?

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

INSIDE REPORT Simon Target Of Inside Gov't Guerrilla Warfare

By ROWLAND EVANS And ROBERT NOVAK WASHINGTON - At a time of potential economic disaster when business men fear the Nixon administration can no longer govern, the official most commanding their respect - William Simon. Secretary of the Treasury is the target of guerrilla

warfare inside the

government. Simon returned last week from a two - week overseas mission livid that the White House was seemingly oblivious to such warfare. He has made clear his bitter disappointment that President Nixon's top assistants did not immediately repudiate distorted leaks of his budget - cutting efforts. That failure can only tacitly encourage. guerrilla fighters in the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) and in the White House in quest of Simon's scalp.

Rough treatment for the best of his cabinet members has been habitual during Mr. Nixon's presidency. But what was merely vicious in past years can be disastrous in today's crisis atmosphere where confused guerrilla rumblings in Washington further panic Wall Street and Main Street

Animosity toward the dynamic and highly visible Simon which has grown steadily among faceless Nixon staffers is the underpinning to the power struggle between Simon and OMB director Roy Ash.

That struggle has centered on Ash's opposition to Simon's insistence on daring and politically dangerous budget cuts to fight inflation. Simon has won support from people who count: Dr. Arthur Burns, chairman of the Federal Reserve Board: Rep. Wilbur D. Mills. chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee: New York - based business economists and the business community generally. When not preoccupied by his own survival. President Nixon was thought to side with

In response to the President's request, Simon on July 6 - five days before his overseas mission wrote a memorandum to Kenneth Rush pointing out possible budget cuts in Congress would change laws that now freeze so - called uncontrollable spending. Although Simon listed reductions totalling \$25.6 billion. the memo clearly precluded all this being pressed in any one year, much less this year.

While Simon was flying to Saudi Arabia, a version of his program was leaked. In published form, he was painted as a barefoot bond salesman from Wall Street pushing a morally corrupt and politically destructive \$20 billion immediate budget reduction. Mr. Nixon, further more, was suggested as tilting against the Simon plan. The White House greeted the published report with deafening

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flam boyant adventurism. The White House was surprised at Simon's outrage when he returned home last week, personally confronting presidential aides Alexander Haig and Kenneth Clawson for their failure to knock down the anti - Simon leak. That anger is shared by Dr. Burns and Chairman Mills. Burns would like to see the Quadriad, the government's top economic policymaking body, summoned immediately so that Simon could confront Ash on the lead.

The guerrilla fighting obscures what Simon actually proposed in his memo to Rush; if uncontrollable spending (Social Security, health care, housing, etc.) is untouchable and defense is not to be reduced significantly, the rest of the budget would have to be cut an unthinkable 40 percent for only a few billion dollars in overall reduction. "As long as uncontrollables are viewed as inviolable, budget cuts will become progressively less possible," Simon warned.

Simon has not proposed ermanent cuts in Social Security payments but a six month postponement of increases (saving \$4.5 billion). Nor is the memorandum all inclusive. Besides what is listed there. Simon also talks of cuts in space spending, construction projects, food stamps and the highway program. In addition to all this, he is intent on economies in the Pentagon of \$1 billion to \$1.5

'All of the above recommendations are illustrative. Simon concludes his memo. They are, therefore, a guide for what might be done if the President meant business But with Mr. Nixon signing the costly livestock credit bill against the advice of Simon (as well as Ash and Rush), the President seems more interested in appeasing his jurors in the Senate than making dramatic moves against inflation.

Indeed. White House

failure to defend Simon was almost surely caused by the preoccupation of Haig Clawson and the President himself with impeachment. Nevertheless. Simon is known to feel in much the same position as Peter Peterson, the highly regarded Secretary of Commerce, before the palace guard forced Peterson out at the end of Mr. Nixon's first term. In those happier days. Peterson's passing went virtually unnoticed by businessmen. In 1974 the departure of Bill Simon would be viewed by them as a catastrophe.

Rain Gutter Care No Problem

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I had a company inspect my roof last week. The inspector said that the roof was in good condition but that the rain gutters needed attention. He did not go into detail and I did not ask. What can happen to gutters. since they only collect rain water? - C.M.D.

ANSWER - You may be surprised at what gutters can collect besides rain. There may be a few copies of the morning newspaper that landed on the roof as a result of the carrier's bad pitching arm, an inch or so of dirt that collects on the roof and is washed into the gutters by rain, and leaves, if there are any trees near the house.

Leaves decay and form an acid that corrodes the metal, and that wet mud in the gutters does no good either

Caring for gutters on a one - story house presents no problem if you have the use of a ladder. Longer ladders can be dangerous if you are not accustomed to handling

The principal detail in caring for gutters is to get them clean and keep them that way. Use a small brush to sweep out the leaves and dirt, but be sure not to allow this debris to get into the downspout, as it may produce a stoppage. When the gutter is reasonably clean, use the garden hose to flush out any remaining

Should there be trees close to your home so that the gutters accumulate a quantity of leaves, you should consider installing leaf guards over the gutter.

A leaf guard is nothing more than a strip of wire screen. You can buy these in rolls or in strips that have narrow pieces of galvanized steel attached to one edge for hooking over the outer

edge of the gutter. The opposite edge is pushed up beneath the bottom of shingles. Any leaves that collect on the screen will be blown to the ground by wind.

Aluminum and copper gutters are reasonably immune to corrosion that could do serious damage. Galvanized steel and wood gutters are not, and both require special attention. Galvanized gutters will rust through, especially if leaves are allowed to remain in

If you should find any rusted area, these should be rubbed with sandpaper to remove all rust. Fibered roofing cement is thenspread over the area in a thin coat. A piece of 30 pound roofing felt is pressed into the soft cement, and more cement is added on top and extended an inch or so

on each side. The life of wood gutters can be extended by painting the interior with asphaltum paint when the wood is thoroughly dry. Small decayed areas that have not penetrated through the wood should be soaked with pentachlorophenol to stop decay and then protected as explained for galvanized

gutters. Aluminum gutters usually have the sections connected by means of slip - joint fittings. These connections often leak. A repair is very simple. A non - hardening vinyl or butyl caulking is pressed into the fitting, both inside and outside the gutters. Your finger tip is





UPI Business Writer WASHINGTON (UPI) -President Nixon's Watergate problems seem to have killed for now the possibility that a brokerage official would be appointed to the Securities and Exchange Commission for the first time in 14 years.

The President had brokerage industry executives under consideration several times this year but decided instead to make two noncontroversial appointments from within the SEC.

The most serious candidate was Mahlon Frankhauser, general counsel of Hayden Stone Inc. But when the Senate Banking Committee prepared to use Frankhauser's appointment to investigate SEC allegations of fraud against Hayden Stone, the administration backed off

his nomination. The administration finally selected Irving M. Pollack. director of the SEC Enforcement Division and a longtime SEC staff lawyer. But as late as two weeks before the Pollack appointment was announced, the White House said Frankhauser was the top candidate.

Although Frankhauser's reputation was considered beyond reproach by the Senate Banking Committee, the SEC and the White House, the likelihood of a confirmation battle in the midst of legal challenges over Watergate in the federal courts and Congress was too much for the administration to handle

Brokers who favored Nixon with financial and vocal support by a wide margin over Sen. George S. McGovern in the 1972 election had reason to believe Nixon would return to the policy of the

administrations. Each named at least one broker to the commission that was created by act of Congress in 1934 to regulate the securities industry after the stock market crash of 1929 precipitated the Great Depression

Among the first 32 commissioners, there were eight brokers or investment bankers. There has been none among the last 21. Nixon

John F. Kennedy broke the pattern, although his father Joseph P. Kennedy was an investment banker for Hayden Stone in 1934 when he became the first SEC chairman. Johnson continued Kennedy's pattern of naming non-brokers to the SEC.

Nixon, who has made more appointments than any president except Roosevelt, in the past 14 months has named four lawyers and GOP economist John R. Evans. The first three nominations went to Evans, Ray Garrett Jr., a Republican lawyer, and A Sommer Jr., a Democratic lawyer.

Then, under prodding from brokers. Nixon began considering industry nominees His nominee closest to brokerage houses was James J. Needham, a Republican accountant at the time of appointment who resigned from the SEC to become chairman of the

New York Stock Exchange. But Watergate distractions eventually led to the nomination of Pollack, a Democratic lawyer, and the final selection was made when Commissioner Philip A. Loomis Jr., a Republican and former SEC general counsel, was nominated more than a month after his

ANSWER - It all depends upon the type of paint that was applied to the floor. Make this test: Dissolve 3 tablespoons of lye in a cup of cold water. It will boil over, so be careful. Apply this to the paint in a dozen scattered areas of the floor.

After a half hour, examine these areas. If none of them show signs of changing color, blistering or softening of paint, you are reasonably safe in applying the tile.

Residential Scene Of Houston Mass Murders Settling Down After Year

August brings the dog days when stifling heat swells up from parched coastal plains and mingles with the humid Gulf breezes.

TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH mination Of Muscle Spasticity

Dear Dr. Thosteson: 1 have followed your articles and fingers. The movement, about strokes but I would like to know how to stricken in right arm and leg nearly a year ago. My right hand won't seem to respond. I pick up about 100 a doorknob 100 times. Have

you any ideas? - M.R. Spasticity is an increased resistance of muscles to being stretched. After a stroke you may or may not have any true spasticity; you may simply have a situation in which the muscles are not really spastic but simply do not respond to your wish to make them move.

If it is true spasticity, there are muscle relaxants that can help. Your doctor can prescribe them. But do not neglect the things you can do yourself to help things along - and they will help whether it is true spasticity or otherwise.

Passive and active exercise, massage, heat all help. By "passive exercise" I mean moving your arm and leg with the assistance of someone. Or, of course

you can use your left hand to move your right arm, hand even with help. is useful.

By all means keep up the eliminate spasticity. I was routine of picking up marbles and turning doorknobs. The fact that you can do it is evidence that some potential remains and marbles every day and turn can be improved. You may not regain full strength but persistence, even after a year of trying, should bring new gains.

You may possibly have reference in your letter to a new medication to relieve spasticity which was reported a few months ago. I understand that it can have unpleasant side - effects, so I am reluctant to advise it. Your doctor may decide othersie.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My. husband suffers from a prostate infection, with a resulting enlargement somewhat impeding the flow of urine. A surgical procedure through the urethra has been suggested to him, but he refuses this, feeling that he will be rendered impotent.

Is this true? Would this be

Why won't men ask medical questions of their doctors or directional questions of service station operators before it's 12 months or 12 miles too late? Mrs. F.A.

Removal of the prostate would not necessarily make your husband impotent. The prostate merely manufactures a fluid that helps transport the male sperm

The procedure you refer to is called a transurethral resection (TUR). It is commonly done. The entire gland is not removed but only so much tissue as is now encroaching on his urinary stream is removed. Sexual potency following this kind of prostate surgery is usually equivalent to what it was before the operation.

Your last quesion intrigues me, and I don't think I've ever heard it stated so appropriately.

The reluctance of men to discuss such things openly is one reason that the vast majority of questions I get about male potency and fertility are from wives.

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
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


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
