Arabs Defy Ford's Oil Policy Threats per cent of world petroleum political moderate, said

United Press International The Arab press reacted angrily today to attacks on Arab oil price policies by President Ford and Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger, and Arab League sources in Cairo called the statements "a serious move" reflecting American intentions toward the Arab

One Beirut newspaper said the statements were tantamount to a declaration of war." The Iraqi News Agency, in a dispatch from Cairo, quoted members of the 18-nation Arab group as saying:

President Ford's statements represent a serious move reflecting American intentions toward the Arab region. Arab use of their oil is, and always has been, a natural right which they can use to serve their own interests and causes. Nobody can influence them as far as this right is concerned.

The sources said Arab foreign ministers presently in New York to attend the U.N. General Assembly session would meet Wednesday to study the Ford and Kissinger statements.

Ford and Kissinger, in speeches Monday in Detroit and New York, said the continued high oil prices risked a world depression and the breakdown of world order and safety that could lead to war.

In Vienna, Abderraham Khene, secretary general of the Organization of Countries, scoffed at Ford's threats and said. "we are the last people to blame for what is happening in the

Ford Planning Intensified **Program Against Crimes**

WASHINGTON (UPI) -President Ford said today that as part of an intensified fight against rising violent crimes and the habitual criminal he was establishing a program to work with states to keep track of professional criminals.

In a prepared address before the 81st annual convention of the International Association of Police Chiefs. Ford said all Americans can agree on the Petroleum Exporting same conclusion about crime

As part of the campaign against crime. Ford said he had directed the Justice Department to undertake, in cooperation with state and local governments, a Career Criminal Impact Program that will target and keep track of professional criminals.

the convention followed Monday's speech by Attorney General William B. Saxbe who also stressed that local law enforcement officers must concentrate on speedy trials for the habitual criminal. Ford had another busy day scheduled including an afternoon meeting with British Foreign Minister

James Callaghan. In a speech that touched on many aspects of the fight against crime. Ford also talked about:

-Putting a high priority on combatting violent crimes and street crimes in the inner city. "There is where crime does the most damage to our whole urban structure. There is where crime most hurts the poor who already suffer enough.

- Putting the habitual criminal behind bars. "We must take the criminal out of circulation. We must make crime hazardous and costly. We must insure that swift and prolonged imprisonment will inevitably follow each offense. Only then will we deter others from pursuing careers of crime.

-Congress making crime fighting one of its "top items." He admitted there are no easy answers and said that he expects to spell out his proposals later to both the nation and Congress.

Ford ended his speech by asking the convention to stand in silent tribute to District of Columbia officer Gail Cobb, the first policewoman in the United States killed in the line of

Ford's appearance at the convention came as rumors circulated that he was about to name Donald Rumsfeld to head the presidential staff.

Nixon Enters Hospital For Leg Treatment

LONG BEACH, Calif. (UPI) - Richard Nixon. who reluctantly gave into his doctor's urgings to enter a hospital, began undergoing tests for phlebitis today. Ron Ziegler described the former president as depressed but mentally sharp.

Nixon, walking unaided and with no serious limp. entered long Beach Memorial Hospital Monday. arriving in a white Cadillac at a laundry entrance

He was accompanied by Ziegler, his long time spokesman and now chief aide, his wife Pat, and daughter Julie Eisenhower. They were surrounded by Secret Service agents, who roughed up a network television cameraman.

You have to recognize that this has been a very difficult time for the former President." Ziegler told reporters. "The events of the past months have been a period of strain and stress."

Ziegler was asked about Nixon's statement to his former White House physician. Dr. Walter Tkach, two weeks ago that he would not be hospitalized because "If I go into the hospital. I'll never come out

'Nixon made that statement while not in good spirits and in a low state of mind," Ziegler said. "But that does not mean that his mind is not acute."

Rebel gunners fired a salvo of Chinese-made rockets into Phnom Penh today. wounding eight persons in the first shelling of the Cambodian capital in more than a month

Police said four 107mm rockets crashed into the southern section of the city at dawn, injuring two infants and six other civilians

The shelling came a week after a government intelligence report said the insurgents were planning a reign of terror in Phnom Penh to influence next month's expected U.N. debate on Cambodia.

BELFAST (UPI) - Muni- three-year sentence on tions experts dismantled a second suspected Irish Republican Army bomb factory discovered today near the border of Northern Ireland and the Irish Republic, security forces

The factory was located in an abandoned house near Dundalk. 50 miles south of Belfast. Police said there were eight mortars. 60 pounds of explosives, and a variety of detonating

A police source said security forces were working on the assumption that the outlawed IRA had used the building to build bombs which were then carried across the border into County Armagh, scene of considerable violence in recent months

Another large cache of explosives also believed to be an IRA factory, was found in the area last week. In Dublin, veteran IRA leader Joe Cahill was treated in a local hospital for what security sources

said was a heart attack. Cahill, 54, was rushed to the hospital Monday under heavy guard from Portlaoise Prison, south of Dublin He is serving a

NICOSIA (UPI) - Greek Ledra Palace Hotel that sits and Turkish Cypriots on the "Green Line" arranged their second round of prisoner of war exchanges today after a night of demonstrations by Greek Cypriots protesting the plight of Greeks stranded behind Turkish lines in the north.

Some 4.000 demonstrators marched through Nicosia Monday and delivered a petition to President Glafkos Clerides demanding that food and medicine be sent immediately to 9.000 Greek Cypriots in the northern third of Cyprus.



He said American helicopters are plucking survivors from rooftops and taking them to higher ground. "Now we're going to help distribute food and water, medicine and clothing," he said.

The government put the death toll at between 7,000 and 8,000, but the Honduran ambassador in Mexico City said. "Ten thousand deaths would be a conservative estimate.

...it tells you how I've talked about food co-ops several times in this column in the past and-with the price of edibles continuing to soar the way they are-I expect to talk about them again in the future.

There are almost as many ways to set up and run a food coop as there are groups engaged in the activity. Stripped down to essentials, however, such an organization is nothing but a buying club. Ten or 100 or 1,000 families agree to pool their weekly orders for produce, flour, sugar and other staples. One or two co-op representatives then make a trip to a wholesale market, a food jobber's warehouse or even the farms where fruit and vegetables are grown...and purchase the desired items in bulk. Finally, each participating family's portion is weighed out and all expenses are proportionately shared.

Members of successful co-ops claim that they save 10 to more than 40% on weekly food bills... depending on their area, the size of their group and the items purchased. That's worth going after, but remember: A food co-op works only as well as the folks who belong to it. Don't join one unless you're ready to do your share of the volunteer labor which makes those dollar sav-

"And I would think the other members of my crew would take a dim view of it if I tried," he said.

Pomeroy also said he never suspected he would be investigated because of his protests against nuclear power plants.

Based on what has happened to me, you'd probably have to say that the people in Texas who are involved in protests of one sort or another would have to wonder if they are being investigated. Pomeroy said.

Col. Wilson E. Speir. director of the DPS, said his officers had never been authorized to conduct political investigations. He did say the DPS has on request investigated persons being considered for appointment by the

governor to state jobs. "I have no knowledge of a governor ever asking me to do any investigations for political purposes." Speir said. "Of course, we have no way of evaluating that, but as far as we know they were

all on potential appointees." Mauzy said his committee would look into other instances in which the DPS may have violated the rights of private citizens and said the senators probably will recommend corrective

Greece Ends Ban For Communists

ATHENS (UPI) - The Greek Communist party emerged today from more than a quarter of century of illegality with both praise and criticism of the government for permitting political parties to operate openly.

While expressing pleasure at the decision, it criticized the government for asking that all parties submit a statement with legal authorities of their attachment to the principles of democracy and their opposition to its violent overthrow.

This puts limits to the function of the parties," said the newspaper Nea Ellada. which is acting temporarily as the Communist party organ.

The party also announced that as of Sept. 25, it will resume publishing Rizispastis (Radical), the newspaper of its central committee.

Rizospastis was banned in 1947, when the party became illegal, but its publication continued clandestinely both here and abroad at the Greek Communists party headquarters.

The Communists. outlawed since Greece's 1947 civil war, hailed the move as "a victory of the working class and of all the enlightened people of the country.

Anastasia Mama served as miserable. a foreign exchange student here last year. She returned to her home in Cyprus shortly before the trouble between Turkey and Greece erupted on the island. Turned out of her home, she has now become a refugee with members of her family. Following are excerpts of a letter written to the Earl

Sept. 4. 1974 Now I'm writing you, the time is 8:30 at night, and I'm out in a field.

GOING TO GREECE

The Turks forced us into the villages around the one we had been staying in. So now it is completely empty and the whole situation and the present conditions of our

It's been a week we have been staying in the fields. There have been a lot of times we ran off away from

the village to save our lives. But now we even have lost everything we had left. Now we don't even stay in a house at all. My grandparents, my uncle's family and mine are all staying together out here. having no place else to go to.

unfair, 200,000 refugees, the best part of our land, the one which used to be the most

by the Turks, who keep on destroying and committing

all different crimes. Now we have no school building, 40 percent of them have been destroyed and those which are left are filled with refugees. School won't start until who knows when or it probably won't this year.

What will the people do, I wonder, now that they don't have any homes, no jobs, no clothes, no food, no money now when the winter is getting closer and closer day by day. Or how can bey help crying and thinking about the numerous people who have been killed or missing or about the girls and women who have been raped and killed.

My brother is holding our radio now and is listening to a song which says. "Come down Jesus, come down I pray, you won't believe all the things you'll see today. Come down, Jesus, and tell me. do you think this is right, come down alone." And I feel the same way.

You're asking about the letter I sent you. I wrote that one after the first fighting and I was at home Right now I'm sitting here alone but not for any longer at all because I'm very cold and scared. I'll continue in the morning

Well, now I need to tell you that this coming Monday on the 9th I'm departing to go to Greece on a ship as a refugee. I just don't know what I'll do after that. I might try to get into some kind of school if they give me a scholarship. I'm almost pretty sure that they won't accept me in any college because I don't have

Another evil thing about it is that it suggests that business management is not interested enough in the health and welfare of the workers: therefore, a government agency must come to the rescue. It is another move to impair the smooth relations of management and worker so vi.al for productivity.

The thoughtful reader can easily see that management will provide for the safety of its workers, if for no other reason, simply because it is profitable to do so. A worker is a partner with managment. When he is productive. he produces his own wage plus a portion of the cost of running the business. When he ceases to produce because of injury he is not producving his wage nor anything toward maintaining the business.

This is not to say that mistakes are not made from time to time in the vast private business and industrial community. Some companies may not be as alert to possible hazards as others. But when a tragic circumstance develops becuase of these mistakes. the penalty is shared only by the worker and

management involved. But OSHA puts a burden not only upon all business and industry but upon all the people who buy the goods and services produced. OSHA is simply an added cost of doing business.

Nixon Illness To Bar Him From Testifying

By ROBERT S. ALLEN WASHINGTON - Those

subpoenas served on former President Nixon are inoperative. He will not testify at the

Oct. 1 trial of the six Watergate coverup defendants. Their subpoenas will be disregarded on two

grounds (1) Physical inability to respond due to Mr. Nixon's severe phlebitis condition. His doctors will formally certify that to federal Judge John Sirica. They will declare Mr. Nixon physically and emotionally incapable of standing the strain of coming to

packed trial. (2) The contention that the broad pardon granted the former chief executive 'immunized' him from being subjected to grilling on matters relating to

Washington and appearing

as a witness at the tension -

Watergate and its ramifications. Of the two factors, the strongest is unquestionably

Mr. Nixon's serious illness. That he is suffering from blood clots in his left leg is incontrovertible. That's been known for at least a year. Somewhat less positive is information regarding his mental state. Members of his immediate family have described him 'depressed' and 'nervously exhausted."

To what extent President Ford's sweeping pardon will be invoked to justify Mr. Nixon's failure to testify is unclear

Authoritative souces indicate his attorneys have explored this point at length and believe there are ample legal grounds to sustain it. Reportedly they are spelled out in a detailed memorandum prepared by "leading constitutional authoriv

Undoubtedly President Nixon's from the witness chair will be particularly disappointing to his two closest White House assistants - H.R. Haldeman and John Ehrlichman. Of the six coverup defendants, they have counted most on Mr. Nixon's testimony to clear

Having tested the heady exhilaration of being at the top. Gen. Alexander Haig wanted very much to stay there - but the Pentagon emphatically was against it.

Promptly and firmly it rebuffed his bid to succeed the late Gen. Creighton Abrams as Army chief of staff. President Ford could have overruled this opposition but wisely didn't. It would have precipitated

another angry clash with Congress - at a time when the President is under fire over his pardoning operations. As Army chief of staff.

Haig would have to deal directly with some of the most powerful members of the House and Senate, and, as one of them cryptically remarked. "He may have been a big shot in the White House, but he has very little. if any constituency on Capitol Hill.

Basis of Haig's overture to replace Abrams was his brief tenure as the latter's vice chief. But the Pentagon brusquely retorted Haig had not been Abrams's choice but President Nixon's, who had made him a four - star general on the strong recommendation of Secretary of State Kissinger

As the latter's right - hand assistant. Haig zoomed from colonel to full general in four years, although he had held no important command and had no combat service

Pentagon's choice for Army chief of staff is the acting incumbent - Gen. Frederick Weyland. longtime close friend of Abrams, who brought him to the Pentagon from Vietnam where they had served together. Unlike Haig, the little - known Weyland has extensive command and combat experience. His elevation will be popular throughout the Army.

Haid has several multi figure offers to write a book about his work with Kissinger and the eventful role Haig played as President Nixon's chief of staff. Haig had as key hand in Nixon's resignation, and is among the very few who knows the whole, and still largely untold, story.

Most American families are paying for their own air conditioning, and it would just be unconscionable to spend public money for this purpose at this time. Further. I call attention to the report of the General Accounting Office that air conditioning is not common in Hawaii, and is often to be found only as a luxury

\$80,000-\$100,000. While Symington sat mulling that over Roth clinched the matter by pointing out that all of Hawaii's electric power comes from imported oil.

'The GAO warns." Roth declared. "that air conditioning military family housing in Hawaii would be a luxury that Hawaii's energy resources cannot afford at this time.

That wrapped it up Symington stopped objecting and the Senate, by unanimous voice vote. approved Roth's amendment saving taxpayers \$100 million . without any grandstanding. hoopla and headlines.







BOSTON (UPI) - White parents in the Charlestown and West Roxbury sections of Boston plan to send their children to church instead of school today in a "say of mourning" to protest court ordered school busing for racial balnace.

A school boycott that has spread to many neighborhoods entered its ninth day. There were a few outbursts of violence Monday.

The Charleston and West Roxbury neighborhoods have been virtually unaffected by U.S. District Court Judge W. Arthur Garrity's June 21 order mandating busing as a remedy for integrating Boston's public school system. But parents have called for the demonstration as a gesture of sympathy with resident of

other parts of the city. Court-ordered desegration and busing. which began Sept. 12, has resulted in several sporadic incidents of school bus stonings and a boycott by

AUSTIN - Gov. Dolph Briscoe today announced his approval of a criminal justice grant of \$21,143 to the Amarillo - based Panhandle Regional Planning Commission of the area's law enforcement radio communications system.

The supplemental funding will purchase 15 additional mobile radios to be installed in newly - acquired police vehicles. Other radio equipment will be purchased for Hansford. Lipscomb and Randall counties and the cities of Friona and Sunray.

Money comes from the Criminal Justice Division of the Owernor's Office. CJD administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Crime Control Act of 1973.

The local grant was among 41, for a total of \$1.946.713. which the governor approved.



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

Several Harvesters stood out in Friday night's victory. which marked the third straight time the Pampa defense did not allow a point. DAVE CHAREST of Hereford, who ran back a kickoff 100 yards in Pampa's 35 - 8 win in the opener, is the only person to score on the Harvesters this

Halfback RICK LEVERICH had his best game thus far. rushing for 107 yards on 11 carries, all in the first half. He didn't carry the ball once in the second half. "It was to get the other backs carrying the ball to get more experience." Welborn explained. "I don't really care about statistics."

Quarterback CHUCK QUARLES had another impressive game, even though his favorite target, 6 - 6 HOWIE LEWIS, was contained throughout the game. Quarles completed three of seven passes for 76 years and two touchdowns. The 5 - 6, 130 - pound senior has now completed 13 passes in 24 attempts for 268 yards and four touchdowns. He has yet to be intercepted.

Defensively, tackle DANE RASMUSSEN and noseguard RON WILLETT were again unyielding. Defensive backs DAVE EDWARDS and JOHNNY AGAN each intercepted two passes and were in on several stops.

The RANGERS of Coach DON BECK did several unusual things en route to their first loss of the season. Twice Perryton punted on third down, the running backs played right off the line (Denver City offense) throughout the game, two quarterbacks (RUSS REAGAN and RICHARD BATES) alternated each series, almost everyone on the roster played and a catch - up brand of football was played.

The latter was perhaps the most unusual. For much of the second half the Rangers did not even go into a huddle - they lined up as soon as the officials laid the ball down. sometimes to be moved.

The hurry - up offense is pretty effective for a while. said Welborn. "It got us rattled for a while. The Harvesters, since they have the week off, will not be

hitting too much this week. "We'll spend more time on the mental aspect and try to stay in shape. We'll work on learning situations and timing. This (the week off) comes at an opportune time. It'll help us get over a few bruises and injuries," said Welborn.

Some critics and or skeptics say the Harvesters play a weak non - conference schedule and that's why the team is unbeaten. Welborn sees it differently. "I don't think it's a weak schedule. I don't think you can say we're playing

"Monterey is going to be a real strong test, and look how many times Dumas used to beat four - A clubs. And Perryton beat Borger this year.

"Overall, we're getting better. Our running and passing are improving each game. And our opposition has been a little tougher each game. Perryton is potentially the strongest so far and they had good size.'

Pampa's next opponent. Canyon, is even stronger than Perryton which was evident in a 17 - 14 win over Caprock last week. And then comes the strongest of all five non conference opponents - Lubbock Monterey, which Pampa plays for the first time since 1969 when the teams were in the same district.

Pampa takes on the Plainsmen Oct. 11 in Lubbock so make plans now to watch the Harvesters close out their non - district schedule.

Perryton gets its chance for revenge Thursday as its junior varsity takes on the Pampa Shockers. The game will probably be played at 7 p.m. in Harvester. However, if the field is wet, it will start at 5 p.m. on Shocker Field. according to athletic director ED LEHNICK.





Herpes Simplex Creates Blisters

Dear Dr. Thosteson: 1 don't understand why I get these blisters when I have my period. They have come on my thumb now for the first time. They have been coming on my ankle in clusters.

I have had blood tests but nothing shows up. I can't understand what is lacking in my system. - J.L.

Who says anything is "lacking"? The regularity of your "blisters" suggests a form of herpes simplex. the sort of condition that brings on "cold sores" or 'fever blisters.'

Common as this is, and annoying as it is to the people who suffer repeatedly, the cause (and treatment) continue to baffle medical researchers.

The most plausible concept today is that a virus has settled in some area, or perhaps more than one, and behaves like a good neighbor until some little

impetus activates it - and the blisters or sores pop out. But believing that this is

the same thing. A series of ordinary smallpox vaccinations might help. Sometimes this works sometimes not. It's perhaps worth trying on speculation.

Daubing with rubbing alcohol may hasten the drying process after they appear. Some folks have their own pet remedies. camphor mixtures and so on, but rubbing alcohol, I think, is as successful as any and very inexpensive.

Reason you break out when you do is, apparently. that any change in body physiology seems sufficient to activate the virus.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Once you have hemorrhoids, is it ever possible to get rid of them completely, or do they always return? Is an operation the only answer? Would this be a guaranty? -Mrs. E.S.

Yes, it is possible to get rid of hemorrhoids (which are rectal varicose veins) completely, but there is no guarantee that other veins may not become varicose the cause and finding a way and turn into hemorrhoids. to prevent it or cure are not Guarding against constipation and straining at the stool is the best protection.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I would like your opinion on horsemeat, how it fits into diets, etc. Am I correct in believing that it contains less cholesterol than regular beef? - R.V.G.

Lean horsemeat and lean beef have virtually no cholesterol. The more fat in the cut, the more it contributes to your cholesterol. Horsemeat in general tends to have less fat, so that helps. As to any other aspects of diet, there isn't enough difference to amount to anything.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My husband, 25, had to take an

Army physical. The doctor said he had a heart murmur but didn't do anything about Small hemorrhoids it. My husband had several previous physicals but nothing was said about a

murmur. He never had rheumatic fever. Is a murmur dangerous? Why wouldn't it have been noticed before? Could it have just developed? Should he consult a physician' -

Mrs. C.S. Most likely probability is that the murmur has been noticed before, but with no indication that it was otherwise significant, so it wasn't mentioned Functional murmurs that don't indicate any harmful condition are rather common, and in such cases I suspect it is best not to mention them even.

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The Lighter Side

WASHINGTON (UPI) -A good argument can be made that the most dynamic force in the American socioeconomic system today

is buck-passing. For reasons too ridiculous to repeat here, passing the buck has acquired a rather bad name. It frequently is equated with bottlenecks. red tape and other bureacuratic hinderances.

In actuality, however, buckpassing has produced almost as much progress as tax loopholes. The best way to

appreciate how buck-passers contribute to the onward and upward march of civilization is to imagine what life would be like without them. If there were no buck-

passers, ever single problem that arises in our republic would remain on the desk of someone totally unfit to cope with it. This is not to say that

bucking the problem along to another desk brings forth a solution. But often all this lateral movement results in some sort of advancement. A classic example of

progress through buckpassing is the problem of accidental fires caused by dropping cigarettes on upholstered furniture

When that problem came before the Consumer Produce Safety Commission, it was passed along to the furniture industry. The thinking was that the

furniture industry should develop fabrics that were more fireresistant. But the furniture makers promptly bucked it along to

the tobacco industry. They

contended the best way to

prevent fires would be for

the tobacco industry to

develop self-extinguishing cigarettes. Already, as you can see.

great progress has been made. Work on fire-resistant fabrics has been going on for years. The prospect of

anything revolutionary emerging for that type of project is pretty slim. But self-extinguishing cigarettes! -ah, there we have an entirely new concept. The type of thing

that almost invariably leads to a sensational breakthrough. The fact that the National Safety Council has refused to support that approach to fire prevention is no reason to throw cold water on it. Not as long as the buck-

passing system is in operation. The next move obviously is to buck it on to the Public Health Service. Think what a boon self-extinguishing cigarettes would be to the PHS's antismoking

campaign. If a cigarette went out every time you put it down in an ashtray or on the arm of an overstuffed sofa. smokers soon would become so exapserated they would quit.



The "Playmate" can once made by the now defunct Sunshine Brewing Co. of Reading. Pa., is just what Nist needs to top off his collection of 1,950 beer cans. The light blue container bearing a woman's lips and legs is a classic.

And Iron City Brewing s 1955 "Frothingslosh"—picturing former Pittsburgh radio personality Rege Cordic in zany male and female getups - would complement Cypher's rare "Lederbrau one half gallon can, his 1955 8 oz. "Tech" and his 1950 "Tube City" conetop

Nist, 23, a computer operator, and Cyphers, 24, a fast-food restaurant manager, are respectively secreatry and president of the Old Frothingslosh Chapter of the Beer Can Collectors of America.

The BCCA, a 3,000 member group, is dedicated to preserving and collecting obsolete, unusual, historical, attractive- in fact any and all kinds ofbeer cans.
