Ejection Seats For Tractors!

AUSTIN, May 14, 1975 --- Modern jet combat aircraft have rocket ejection seats to save the pilot from almost certain death in a crash. So far, no one has proposed rocket seats for tractor drivers, but starting in 1976 all new tractors will afford the operator increased protection in a rollover.

Noting that tractor rollovers have accounted for some 125 deaths among Texas farm work-ers during the past five years, the Texas Safety Association today issued a reminder that the Occupational Safety and Health Administration has now officially adopted rollover protection standards for agricultural trac-

agriculture must be equipped be held June 12 at 8:00 p.m. with a seat belt and rollover at the showbarn. protective structures which meet government performance requirements.

In addition, the standard requires that the employer assure that all employees use the seat belt and that employers enforce prescribed operating rules whether or not a rollover protective structure is required.

Unlike earlier proposals, the final standard exempts "low-profile tractors" while used in orchards, vineyards, hop yards and low clearance buildings. Also exempted are tractors mounted with implements incompatible with the protective structure during these usages. The new standards, adopted

April 25, are included in a new Part 1928 of Title 29, Code of Federal Regulations, safety and health standards for agriculture. The Secretary of Labor designated the area of roll-over protective structures a priority subject for a standard in appointing the Standards Advisory Committee on Agriculture in June, 1972.

Exports

COLLEGE STATION--- U.S. exports of livestock and livestock products totaled \$1.57 billion in 1974, up 10 per cent from record levels a year earlier, according to Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The greatest export increases were in animal fat and furskins. Lard exports were also up 42 per cent and edible tallow exports tripled.

''However, red meat exports were down considerably from '73 levels due to a cut-back of beef exports to Canada and pork exports to Japan. Variety meat exports were also down somewhat,'' notes the Texas A&M University System specialist.

University System specialist.

Uvacek says that live cattle exports were off considerably despite a 30,000 head increase in shipments to Mexico. During 1974 Mexico also became a valuable market for U.S. sheep con't on pg 4



While overall exports increased from 1973to '74, imports of livestock and livestock products dipped significantly.

"Total imports of livestock and livestock products in 1974 were down 19 per cent from year earlier levels. Meats and meat products subject to the Meat Import Law were also down in both quantity and value.

According to Uvacek, the decline of these meat imports was due in part to the unattractive prices for which manufacturing quality meat sold during 1974.
