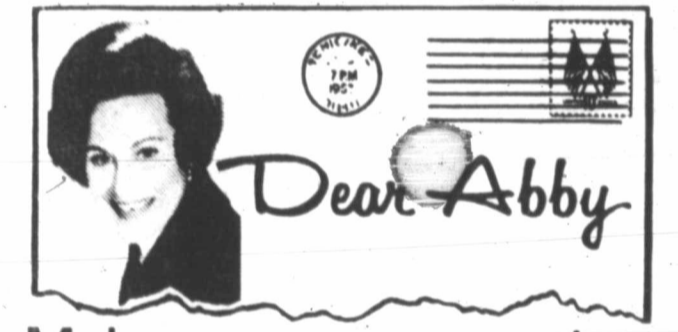

CONSERVATIVE ADVOCATE U.S.-Russ Space Flight Test One-Sided Exchange

By WM. A. RUSHER One of the most dubious achievements of President Nixon's not exactly scintillating administration was the signing, in May 1972, of an agreement with the Soviet Union for a joint U.S. - Russian space flight, scheduled for July 1975 and known as the Apollo - Soyuz Test Project.

This was to be one of the bonuses of Henry Kissinger's triumphant detente with the Soviet regime, and the anticipated benefits were correspondingly impressive.

The ASTP is now well under way. Our experts have visited the Soviet Union and learned a good deal about its space program, and vice versa.

Sharing? The plan calls for a manned U.S. Apollo space vehicle to link up in earth orbit with a manned Soviet vehicle of the Soyuz class. Unfortunately, as "Aviation Week & Space Technology" pointed out nearly a year ago, the two vehicles are so dissimilar in their degree of sophistication that it's almost like trying to hitch a Cadillac to a Model T.

Pork Lion Roast Highlights Fall Feast

Autumn's yellows and reds signal earth's final bounty of the year before winter's frosty white. The vibrant colors of foliage are echoed in fall's cornucopia of bright fruits and vegetables. Pumpkins, cranberries, red and green apples, purple grapes, pears and squash — all are stacked high in the fresh produce section of the supermarket.

It's also time to check the meat counter for seasonal buys. Right now pork loin roasts, spareribs, chops and steaks are often featured, as are favorite smoked pork cuts — hams, shoulder rolls and Canadian style bacon.

Plan to harvest autumn's specials from your food store and celebrate "November Porkfest," a festival timed to take advantage of these seasonal food buys. Pork goes well with many of fall's fruits and vegetables, offering timely and unusual menu combinations.

For example, a succulent pork loin roast, garnished with purple and green grapes and served with hot golden Squash Yeast Rolls, provides one taste provoking team. Since a pork loin roast cooks to juicy, tender perfection with little attention, you'll have more time to enjoy the beautiful outdoors.

Squash yeast rolls bring full flavor and color to the table in a most enticing

manner. Too much trouble? Not with the new convenient and quicker method this recipe provides. The rolls can be baked before the roast goes in the oven, although you will risk losing a few of these bright yellow gems to eager samplers.

PORK LOIN ROAST
4 to 6-pound pork loin roast.
Place roast, fat side up, on rack in open roasting pan. Insert roast meat thermometer so the bulb is centered in the thickest part. Make certain bulb does not rest in fat or on bone. Do not add water; do not cover. Roast in a slow oven (325 degrees F.) until the thermometer registers 170 degrees F. Allow 30 to 35 minutes per pound for a center loin roast; 35 to 40 minutes per pound for a half loin; 40 to 45 minutes per pound for a smaller blade or sirloin roast. (Total time — 2 to 3 hours.)

Note: Have the meat retailer loosen the chine (back) bone by sawing across the rib bones. When roasting is finished, the back bone can be removed easily by running the carving knife along the edge of the roast before the meat is placed on the platter to be carved.

SQUASH YEAST ROLLS
5 1/2 to 6 cups flour
One — third cup dry milk
Not reconstituted
2 packages 1 1/2 ounce each dry yeast
1/2 teaspoon mace

1 package (12 ounces) frozen cooked squash
1 cup water
1/2 cup sugar
3 tablespoons lard
2 teaspoons salt
Melted lard

Stir together 2 cups flour, dry milk, yeast and mace. Combine squash, water, sugar, 3 tablespoons lard and salt in saucepan and heat slowly only until warm (120 degrees to 130 degrees F.) stirring to blend. Add liquid ingredients to flour-yeast mixture and beat until smooth, about 1 minute on medium speed of electric mixer or 300 strokes by hand, beat 2 minutes at high speed. Stir in additional flour (3 1/2 to 4 cups) to make a moderately soft dough. Run out onto lightly floured surface and knead until smooth and satiny, about 5 to 10 minutes. Shape into ball and place in lightly greased bowl, turning to grease all sides. Cover and let rise in warm place (80 degrees to 85 degrees F.) until doubled, about 1 1/2 hours. Punch down. Let rise 10 minutes. Divide dough into fourths and shape each portion into 7 rolls; place in greased large roasting pan. Brush with melted lard. Cover and let rest in a warm place until doubled, about 30 minutes. Bake in a moderate oven (350 F.) for 25 to 35 minutes, or until done. Remove from pan in 5 to 10 minutes. Yield: 28 rolls.

Enriched Apricot Oatmeal Bread For Autumn Picnic

APRICOT OATMEAL BREAD
1 LOAF
1 cup bran buds
1/2 cup oatmeal
2 eggs
1 and one-third cups milk
1/2 cup oil
1 cup chopped dried apricots

1/2 cup chopped nuts
2 cups enriched flour
1/4 cup sugar
1 tablespoon baking powder
2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
1 teaspoon salt
Combine bran buds and oatmeal in medium bowl. Beat together eggs, milk and oil, add to cereal mixture. Stir in apricots and nuts. Stir together flour, sugar, baking powder, cinnamon and salt. Add cereal mixture all at once to flour mixture, stirring only until flour is moistened. Pour into greased 9x5-inch loaf pan. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven, 55 minutes

to 1 hour, or until done. Remove from pan and cool completely before slicing. Spoon flour into dry measuring cup; level Do not scoop.
NOTE: If self-rising flour is used, omit baking powder and salt.

Honey Makes A Good Sugar Alternative

COLLEGE STATION
In these days of high sugar prices, many people are turning to honey — one of the oldest known sweets, one authority reported this week.

It is easily digested because it consists chiefly of simple sugar — dextrose and levulose, which the body readily absorbs. Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, said:

Honey is unique because it is the only unmanufactured sweet available in commercial quantities, she pointed out.

The main commercial brands of honey come mostly from alfalfa and clover blends. Blending makes a product with uniform color and flavor, the specialist explained.

She noted that there are several forms of honey made

— Liquid, or extracted honey, is that removed from the comb.

— Comb honey is honey just as it is stored by the bees.

— Chunk honey is a combination of comb honey and liquid honey. It consists of pieces of comb with extracted honey poured over them.

— Creamed, or granulated, honey is extracted honey that has been formed into minute crystals, giving a creamy texture. It makes an

excellent spread, according to Mrs. Clyatt.

Honey butter is a mixture of honey and butter. Honey will keep indefinitely stored tightly covered in a dry place at room temperature. If it becomes granulated, place the container in warm water to reliquefy.

"Heat extra-thick honey in warm water for easier pouring. A good way to measure honey is to lightly grease the cup or spoon so the honey will pour out more readily," the specialist said.

IN HIS CAMPAIGN

Briscoe Doesn't Lack Financing

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — Reports from governor candidates and almost every hopeful for lieutenant governor, attorney general, land commissioner, railroad commissioner, comptroller, treasurer and agriculture commissioner show their combined spending was matched by expenditures by Gov. Dolph Briscoe alone.

David Dean, Briscoe's accountant-attorney, Wednesday said total spending on the Briscoe campaign through Oct. 26 will total \$1.2 million when reports for his 44 separate committees are filed. Dean said total contributions raised were \$1.3 million.

Briscoe himself has bankrolled \$645,000 of the total out of his own pocket — almost half the sum of all campaign expenditures reported by statewide candidates to the secretary of state's office by 5 p.m. Wednesday.

Texas' campaign finance reporting law requires candidates to file their final pre-election financial statements Oct. 29 or have it postmarked by then.

Reports by Briscoe's opponents and all but a few minor party candidates for major offices indicated the total spent in all those races came to \$1.2 million.

Republican governor candidate Jim Granberry reported total expenditures of \$536,545 and contributions of \$521,462.

American party candidate Sam McDonnell said he spent \$21,334 and raised \$21,842.

Reports received Wednesday in other races indicated:

— Republican Gaylord

Marshall of Dallas has raised \$10,564 and spent \$21,760 in his bid to upset incumbent Lt. Gov. William P. Hobby. Hobby's report Tuesday indicated he raised \$117,598 and spent \$101,419.

— GOP treasurer nominee Robert G. Holt has raised \$37,032, and spent \$32,123 in challenging longtime officeholder Jesse James. Holt's report was hand delivered a day late. James' report Tuesday listed contributions of \$86,407 and expenditures of \$85,007.

— Republican Joe P. Cain borrowed \$50,000, spent \$217.33 out of his own pocket and raised \$150 in donations in the past month in his race against Railroad

Commission Chairman Jim C. Langdon. Cain's campaign bankroll and outlays of \$6,876 compare to \$54,314 Langdon has raised and \$28,628 Langdon has spent in his year-long re-election bid.

— Dale Steffes, the Republican challenging Mack Wallace in the other Railroad Commission race, reported expenditures of \$5,414 and contributions of \$5,189 — including a \$1,160 loan from himself and his wife. Wallace's contributions totaled \$69,764 and expenditures \$59,105.

— Zack Fisher, GOP agriculture commissioner nominee, told reporters he mailed his report from his home in Memphis, Tex.,

Good Witches Plan Wedding

DENVER (UPI) — At the stroke of midnight on Halloween a witch and a warlock will slip off their long, flowing robes, anoint each other with oil, wine and a kiss and marry for life, and death.

When the robes go, there won't be a stitch of clothing in the place. And the couple said the spirits of the dead will join them in the celebration.

"It's a nude wedding. But then we conduct all our rituals in the nude," said James Best, 39, who has practiced witchcraft for eight years. His bride is a 21-year-old witch known only as Lady Astarta.

"This is the big holiday for us," Best said of Halloween. "I guess you might say it's our Christmas."

Best said the wedding would be an intimate affair

— just himself, his bride-to-be, a high priest, a high priestess and 36 fellow witches.

After the wedding, the witches will have "hallow-mass" ceremonies to celebrate Halloween.

Best said he and other members of his group are "good" witches.

"They all live by the cardinal rule that 'none shall use the art in any way to do ill to any,'" he said.

"We say that for every evil thing you do, you get it back tenfold," he said.

"Actually, you know, there are good and bad witches, just like there are good and bad Christians," he said. "We try to be strictly positive, working to better man."

Best said the wedding would be a far cry from his first marriage, which ended in divorce. Ays first wife

also was a witch, but she left the fold when they parted.

"It was a conventional type wedding in a chapel," he said of his first marriage.

"I gave the fellow 15 bucks and that was it. This wedding will have a lot more meaning and will join us after death as well as in life."

Best admits the wedding won't be legally recognized, but he and his Lady Astarta will marry again later for the sake of her parents. He said his bride's father is a retired Army colonel who would prefer a wedding with "dress whites and swords."

Best said some people describe male witches as warlocks, but he doesn't like the word.

"Warlock has a bad connotation," he said. "Witch sounds much better."

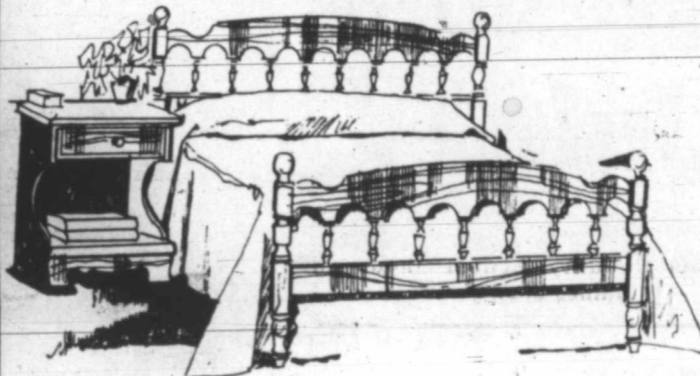

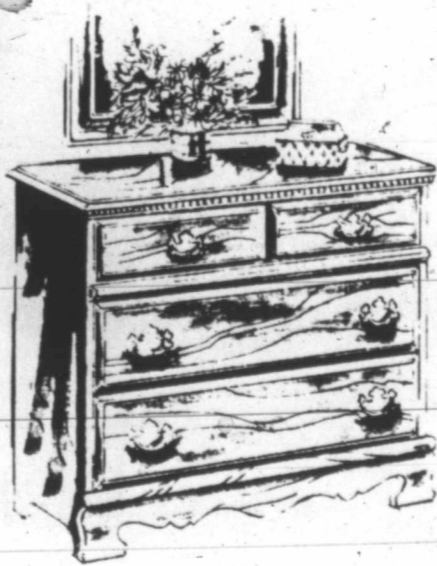

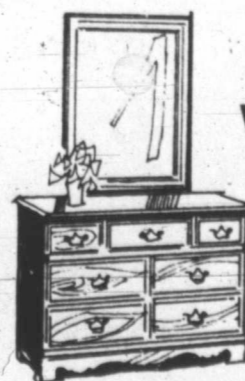

NEW YORK (UPI) — The Chinese hope Americans will help solve the nation's oil problem by again turning to silk.

Made by the silkworm from mulberry leaves, silk is a renewable source of fiber like cotton. Nylon and the polyester fabrics, which have replaced silk in the United States in the past 35 years are derived from petroleum.

priced so many ordinary folk could wear it on occasion. Men wore silk socks, pajamas, shirts and neckties. Silk sheets, pillowcases and bedspreads were much in demand.

Silk came from China and Japan. Its harvesting and manufacture were too labor intensive for Western economies. Even in Japan, there was constant complaint that silk mill labor was slave labor.

The Sino-Japanese war of the 1930s wrecked China's silk industry and World War II destroyed Japan's silk exports to the West, which once were huge.

"Today China is rebuilding her silk industry and has achieved some technological breakthroughs," Abrams said. "The industry still is labor intensive but less so than in the past." Abrams said the most remarkable breakthrough is that garments made from Chinese woven silks now are washable. In the past woven silk fabrics had to be dry cleaned; only the knitted hosiery and lingerie were washable. When Abrams washed a blouse made of China silk for New York garment people recently, they were astonished.

Abrams said he is confident Americans will welcome back Chinese silk. "It will cost more than nylon or polyester fabrics but it will have advantages in feel and luster," he said. "It won't have to be mixed with cotton to make a cool garment as the synthetic fabrics must be, and it is capable of a great diversity of beautiful weaves and textures."

Silk was used for making parachutes in World War I although nylon is used today. Silk is as strong as nylon or stronger for many purposes and is long lasting. For generations it was used for making the strongest sewing threads.

In addition to helping to conserve oil by replacing synthetic fibers to some extent, Abrams said silk probably is mainland China's best potential product for big scale export to the United States.

"The Chinese are rather conservative about foreign trade," Abrams explained. "Only recently have they been willing to import anything on credit. They are not buying on credit in the United States yet. So, if we want to sell to them, we must buy from them. Silks and certain Chinese food products are what Americans will want or need most from China in return for our products."

Baptists Face Conflict With Deviant Group

AMARILLO, Tex. (UPI) — "Charismatic" Baptists churches practicing faith healing, speaking in tongues, prophecy and other "gifts" may be asked to leave the denomination this week at a meeting of the Baptist General Convention.

The controversy over the variation of traditional Baptist practice erupted last week in Dallas when the Dallas Baptist Association passed a resolution urging the charismatic ministries to remove themselves.

In part, the resolution read: "We suggest that churches holding such views reconsider those practices and emphases. If they cannot work in harmony with our doctrinal views that are upheld by the majority of Southern Baptist churches, we strongly urge that they voluntarily withdraw from our convention and seek fellowship with other churches of more common practice."

A spokesman said the convention could not force compliance with standard Baptist teachings nor could they force withdrawal from the convention. He said, however, that the convention would withdraw fellowship with the deviant churches.

Dr. Billy Weber of Dallas' Northway Baptist Church said he would direct the drive.

In the opening day of the convention, Dr. Ralph Smith, president of the organization, called on Baptist to evangelize 100,000 persons this year.

Outlook 'Bleak' For Poltry Industry

LITTLE ROCK (UPI) — The Arkansas Poultry Federation says the outlook is bleak for the poultry industry and if the industry continues in its present direction "it cannot survive."

The industry places the blame for high feed prices, which generates the whole problem, on the grain sales to the Soviet Union.

Lex Killebrew of North Little Rock, executive vice president of the APF, said the problem, which applies most severely to broilers, is that the high cost of feed and resulting price of operation has forced the industry "integrators," those who supply baby chicks to growers, to cut back the number of chicks they produce for fattening.

Killebrew said producers had been selling broilers for less than they cost to produce and by cutting back production hoped to alter the market situation.

Meanwhile, the contract growers, who fatten the day-old chicks for about

eight weeks and receive payment according to the chicks' weight, in numerous cases are not getting enough chicks to meet their own operating costs. Killebrew estimated that 10 to 14 per cent of the broiler growers in Arkansas were without chicks now.

"The growers want to know why the government is sending grain to Russia to feed their livestock when we don't have enough to feed our own," Killebrew said. He said the problem with the Russian grain deals, beginning with the wheat sale in 1972, was that they meant depletion of United States surplus. Killebrew predicts higher grain prices.

According to federation figures, broiler chick placement has been 9 to 20 per cent lower every week since Aug. 17 than the same weeks last year.

That the Soviet Union has stated its grain seeds are strictly for livestock has particularly nettled the poultry industry. The growers have devised a slogan on a poster framed

by a flag-waving American chicken and a hammer-and-sickle embossed rooster, saying: "The American Chicken or the Russian Red Rooster, Which One Will Survive?"

"As I see it, there are three alternatives," Killebrew said. "One, we can go broke...or as a last resort, we could seek government subsidizing of the poultry industry...but personally I am violently opposed to that."

He said the most likely solution would be continued production cuts, possibly as much as 50 per cent. "Then we could see if normal demand would take care of the production."

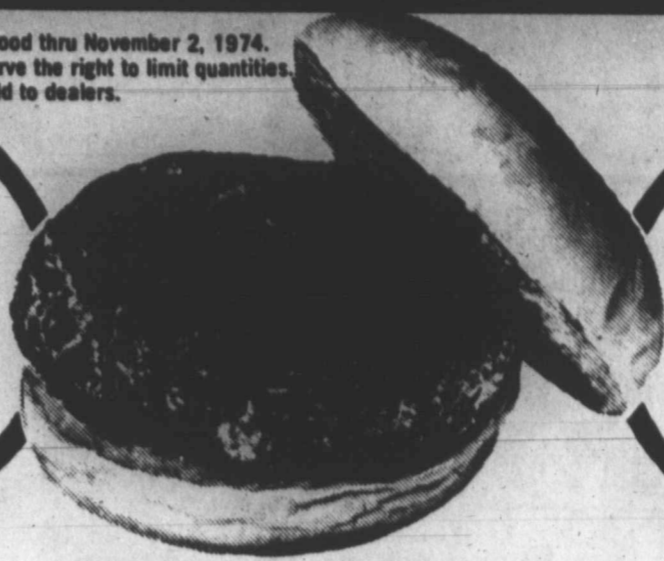

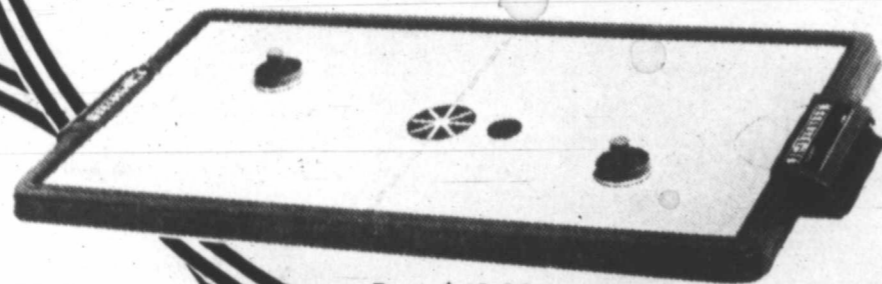

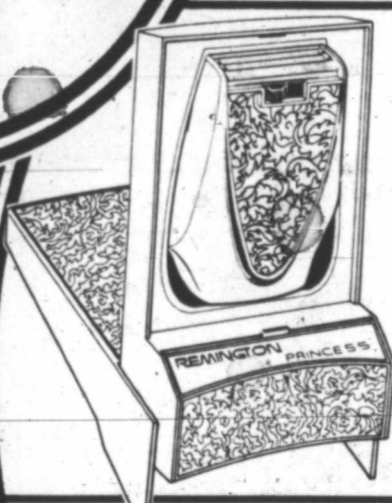
