- The black-led nations of Africa attacked the United States, Britain and France today for an unprecedented Security Council triple veto that killed a move to expel South Africa from the United Nations.

The black African bloc. failing in a 12-day campaign to oust the white supremacist state, accused South Africa's "powerful supporters" of choosing "to talk in the United Nations but do nothing about what is happening there."





Price Suggests Sending Animal Food Overseas Congressman Bob Price of Pampa suggested

Wednesday after a White House meeting of livestock industry producers in Washington, that substantial amounts of animal protein food including beef, poultry and dairy products, be included in the nation's overseas relief programs.

The House Agriculture Committee member said such actions would directly aid people in foreign countries who are starving from drought and other conditions, and would also 'help to consume the mountain of beef and other animal protein foods which are helping to keep producer prices low while failing to have an impact toward lower retail prices for

consumers." Price made the suggestions after a group of 24 leaders of producer groups met directly with President Ford to give first hand reports on the economic conditions faced by the industry and to suggest steps they feel the government can take to alleviate the situation.

Price had met with the President himself Oct. 10 and had sought the meeting which was held today. Included in the meeting were five Texans.

Every American doesn't see it. And even those who majority - will more than integrity and truth from their daily newspapers.



UNION PIPEFITTERS

Struggle On \$500 A Week

By VICTOR RIESEL

WASHINGTON - It is not unfair to say that some of the country's skilled construction trades unionists have this nation by the jugular and are applying pressure not always gently. This is tough talk but not as tough as the talk or demands being made by pipefitters without whom no oil refinery, no power plant, no new energy facilities can be built.

Further, it is easier to get into Fort Knox than to get into a plumbers' local or its apprenticeship program in many parts of this land. Yet in those areas, the desperately needed power and petrochemical industries are parched for skilled pipefitters (and welders) who sell themselves high indeed. while a great many of their brother construction workers are unemployed. Fact is that the average construction trades joblessness is 12 percent.

Yet, while President Ford talks of wage - price restraint, pipefitters are demanding as much as \$180 in increases per man per week - and striking even the building of vital power facilities right smack in the midst of the national energy crunch if they don't get it on the line. In areas where the supply of skilled plumbers is scarce, the wage hike demands are for \$1.50 - an hour increases each year of a three - year contract. Take it - or else

I've just returned from Louisiana - Baton Rouge. to be exact. A fabulous petrochemical industrial concentration exists there. down the Mississippi River and to points southwest. The stories of local labor pressure in a vast area extending over west to Lake Charles would make a bald man's hair stand on end.

Earlier this week there was a plumbers stike over in Lake Charles. The pipefitters, claiming they wanted to catch up with the cost of living, demanded a \$4.50 - an - hour increase over a three - year contract. This menas that at the end of the pact's first two years the pay jumps a full \$4:50 or \$180 a week per man in cash and fringes over the

current weekly \$344.80. This would also bring the new total package to \$13.12 an hour per man per week or \$524.80 a week. That's before overtime. And the Lake Chaires weather is so good there's no difficulty inworking the year round. So

no "seasonality" layoffs. Further, there's about a billion dollars worth of construction work waiting in Lake Charles. One "job" affected is a much needed power plant. But the plumbers hit the picket lines for the cost of living catch - up raise. I believe this is nonsense. The men would have strick for the heavy increase even if the cost of living suddenly dived. Manpower is scarce. Many who can be called in can't get in the union. As for the cost of living, who said one couldn't live on the current \$345 per week wage - fringe package plus reasonable increases which would bring, say, another \$35 or \$40 a week?

What's the union's

apprentices have they taken. into their membership pipeline in scarce skilled manpower areas such as California. Louisiana, etc?

Lest you think Lake Charles, there near the Texas border, is a special case, look northward. In southern New Jersey the wage - fringe rates in the 1974 three - year contract jumped 90 cents an hour the first year and will go up another \$1 an hour the second and rise another \$1.10 the third. That's a total

If the Lake Charles pipefitters get \$4.50 an hour increase, you can wager your WIN button the rest of the trades will try to follow

Thus, where the craft has the country by the throat and sets high wage patterns, it actually sets them for the nation. And does anyone believe the other crafts and the Teamsters rank and file won't try for the jackpot? Of course they will.

Yet there just isn't any national machinery for swift action. It could be that soon double - digit inflation may not start with the figure "1. It could go into the 20s. Why no? By GARRY WILLS When President Ford was Vice - President Ford, Mr. Nixon's suggested that his appointee was running around the country giving too many speeches. Mr. Ford seemed to be doing little preparation for the job he eventually moved up to. Perhaps that was understandable at the time. By staying out of Washington, he kept some distance between himself and Watergate. Also, the

Republican party around

the country was sadly demoralized and could use the attention. But now Mr. Ford is President. His first press secretary tells us that the President has not had time to do much thinking in office yet he is still running around the country when he is not running around the streets of Washington. The night before his major economic address he was off campaigning for the Republicans. And the man without time to be president found time to go back to Michigan and raise \$20,000

for the party's fall elections. His motto seems to be: when in doubt about what to do, campaign. Even when there is no campaign going on, he tries to find one. This may be the result of his experience in the House. Each. camera of our national legislature has its own ethos. The Senate thinks in terms of long . standing deals - and gave us Lyndon Johnson. House members think always of the next election, which is never more than two years

Congressmen are always campaigning. Well established ones like Gerald Ford can run for office by a constant servicing of constituents, rather than by campaigning in the more normal sense. But then they have to go around and campaign for their pals. It is a hard habit to break, and Mr. Ford does not even seem to be trying.

But he better. It's bad enough to have him waste presidential time on such matters. That is not what the taxpayers give him his salary for. Eisenhower — who always took action massively, if at all - nationalized ten thousand Arkansas Guardsmen and sent to Little Rock a thousand paratroopers from the 82nd Airborne Division. It was an important precedent, and a notable victory for the law. CONSERVATIVE ADVOCATE U.S.-Russ Space Flight Test One-Sided Exchange

By WM. A. RUSHER One of the most dubious achievements of President Nixon's not exactly scintillating administration was the signing, in May 1972, of an agreement with the Soviet Union for a joint U.S. - Russian space flight, scheduled for July 1975 and known as the Apollo - Soyuz Test Project.

This was to be one of the

bonuses of Henry Kissinger's triumphant detente with the Soviet regime, and the anticipated benefits were correspondingly impressive. First, there would be a substantial sharing of technological know - how between the two countries. As a major subdivision of this category. there would be important progress in developing space rescue techniques. Finally, of course, the biggest spin - off of all would be the increase in mutual understanding.

The ASTP is now well under way. Our experts have visited the Soviet Union and learned a good deal about its space program, and vice versa. And, as lift - off time approaches, it is becoming increasingly clear that Uncle Sam has been had again. We have been giving the Russians the finest fruits of our \$26 billion space program, and are getting next to nothing in return not because the Russians are concealing their expertise, but because they simply don't have any.

In an article in the October 25 issue of 'National Review." Michael S. Kelly paints a clear and thoroughly depressing picture of this one - sided "exchange. Sharing? The plan calls

for a manned U.S. Apollo space vehicle to link up in earth orbit with a manned Soviet vehicle of the Soyuz class. Unfortunately, as 'Aviation Week & Space Technology" pointed out nearly a year ago, the two vehicles are so dissimilar in their degree of sophistication that it's almost like trying to hitch a Cadillac to a Model T. The Soyuz has no inertial guidance system, no onboard computer, no onboard means of cooling system and no reserve oxygen.

It's life - support system is primitive; its attitude control system is laughable. On reentry, the Russians don't even try to pinpoint a landing target; they simply aim for the Soviet Union. American experts estimate

the Russians are about 11 years behind us in over - all space technology - or were. until we started "exchanging" information with them.

Safety ? Vladimir Komarov, the first man who ever flew in a Soyuz, was killed when his spacecraft's parachute failed to open properly on reentry. Three other cosmonauts perished when a hatch blew open in space and the cabin atmosphere was lost. The latest Soyuz mission ended prematurely for reasons the Russians have failed to disclose, but apparently without loss of life. This is the buggy the Soviet Union is contributing to the search for greater safety in space.

If an Apollo were disabled in earth orbit, the Soyuz booster doesn't even have the technical capacity to get a vehicle up there and catch it; and if that were accomplished successfully by using second - stage rockets, the Soyuz, thanks to its primitive attitude . control system, wouldn't be able to dock with the Apollo unless the latter were still capable of maneuvering.

Understanding? There's plenty of that going on, all right - the Russians are understanding more every day about American Space Technology. Moreover, what they are learning about inertial guidance alone is going to increase enormously the accuracy, and thus the deadiness, of their huge ICBM's, which are already in deep concrete silos in the Siberian earth. armed with atomic warheads and aimed at all major American cities.

How crazy can we get? The ASTP should be called off right now, before more American know - how is recklessly handed over to Soviet scientists, and certainly before the lives of American astronauts are risked on a worthless space stunt with a bunch of comparative hillbillies whose supreme ambition is to get smart enough to







Jury Visits Kent State For Trial

CLEVELAND (UPI) -After visiting the campus, the jury in the Kent State University trial of eight Ohio National Guards men returns to federal court today and begins hearing the first prosecution witnesses.

Government lawyer Robert Murphy has said he will call about 50 witnesses in the trial against the guardsmen who are charged with violating the civil rights of four Kent students who were killed during an antiwar demonstration in May: 1970.

CHARLESTON, W. Va. (UPI) - A dynamite explosion rocked the Kanawha County, Board of Education Building Wednesday night.

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Israeli Gunboats Strike Lebanon

United Press International Israeli gunboats bombarded Palestinian targets in southern Lebanon today, and Lt. Gen. Mordechai Gur, the Israeli chief of staff, said Israel is prepared for war should the Arab summit conference in Rabat lead to an immediate.

new Middle East conflict. The gunboats kept up Israel's battle against the Arab guerrillas despite the Arab summit conference's recognition of the Palestine Liberation Organization as the only voice of the Palestinians.

Israeli Police Minister Shlome Hillel told civil guard commanders there had been 258 guerrilla attempts in Israel so far this year and that an acceleration of the attacks was expected.

Gur told his troops the armed forces were prepared for the possibility of war resulting from the Rabat summit.

Israeli leaders have said Syria is preparing for war. possibly by spring. The Jerusalem Post said increased numbers of Syrian army vehicles moved in the disengagement zone Wednesday and the Syrians had moved observation tents closer to Israeli lines.

The talk of war and increased guerrilla activity came as French Foreign Minister Jean Sauvagnargues met with Prime' Minister Yitzhak Rabin and Foreign Minister Yigal Allon on the first day of a three-day official visit.

Sauvagnargues denied a report in the newspaper Ma ariv which said Sauvagnargues was trying to mediate between PLO leader Yasser Arafat and Israel. The French minister met Arafat in Beirut last week

The Moscow weekly New Times altacked Secretary of State Henry A Kissinger's personal style of Middle East diplomacy and said the only answer to the Arab-Israeli problem is a resumption of the Geneva



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

Reports of malfunctions and health hazards with aerosol sprays have caused the industry to turn to pump style bottles for hair spray. Mrs. Janice Carberry. family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System, noted.

She said that for years pump bottles were used for dispensing hair conditioners and setting lotions, but now spray, she said.

'Hair sprays will have to be reformulated before they can be put into non - aerosol packages. Only \$0 to 70 percent of the spray is active ingredients - the rest is propellants. Ingredients in the pump style can be totally active."

The cost of pump style sprays may be comparable to aerosols, but they will be more effective in holding the hair. That's because each pumping action will release more liquid and pure hair.

practical signal possessed by the defensive side is the 'high - low" signal. This signal, to urge continuation of the suit being led, is initiated by the initial play of an unnescessarily high card, followed by the play of a low card on the next lead of the suit. But many situations arise in which the mechanical employment of this signal can result in a most unhappy ending for the user. Such was the case in today's deal.

From East's position, when West opened the king of clubs at trick one. East should not have played the eight - spot. Instead, he should have dropped the discouraging deuce. -What did. East have to gain by ruffing a third club lead? Not a thing since he had a natural trump trick that could never be taken away from him

Certainly East shoud have been most desirous of getting West to lead a diamond at trick two; and he could have gotten this message across to West by playing the deuce of clubs on the opening lead. West. looking at the dummy. would then have led a diamond — and once he did. East yould have made this diamond king, and declarer would have suffered a one -

Made by the silkworm from mulberry leaves, silk is a renewable source of fiber like cotton. "Nylon and the polyester fabrics, which have replaced silk in the United States in the past 35 years are derived from petroleum." points out Charles Abrams, chairman of ChinaTrade Corp.

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Abrams has just received a consignment of 60 bolts of fine Chinese silks. He believes it is the first shipment of silks to come directly to the United States and has achieved some from China in around forty

The silks will be widely displayed in textile circles. Abrams' company, in association with Bertram will choose a designer to make up some garments for both women and men to exploit the best qualities of the fabrics.

Before nylon, American women by choice wore silk stockings and lingerie and silk dresses and blouses. Silk was a luxury product but reasonably enough

Baptists Face Conflict With **Deviant Group**

AMARILLO, Tex. (UPI) - "Charismatic" Baptists churches practicing faith healing, speaking in tongues, prophecy and other "gifts" may be asked to leave the denomination this week at a meeting of the Baptist General Convention.

The controversy over the variation of traditional Baptist practice erupted last week in Dallas when the Dallas Baptist Association passed a resolution urging the charismatic ministries to remove themselves.

In part, the resolution read: "We suggest that churches holding such views reconsider those practices and emphases. If they cannot work in harmony with our doctrinal views that are upheld by the majority of Southern Baptist churches, we strongly urge that they voluntarily withdraw from our convention and seek fellowship with other churches of more common practice.

A spokesman said the convention could not force compliance with standard Baptist teachings nor could they force withdrawal from the convention. He said, however, that the convention would withdraw fellowship with the deviant churches.

Dr. Billy Weber of Dallas' Northway Baptist Church said he would direct the drive.

In the opening day of the convention. Dr. Ralph Smith, president of the organization, called on Baptist to evangelize 100,000 persons this year.

Silk came from China and Japan. Its harvesting and manufacture were too labor intensive for Western economies. Even in Japan, there was constant complaint that silk mill labor was slave labor.

The Sino-Japanese war of the 1930s wrecked China's silk industry and World War II destroyed Japan's silk exports to the West, which once were huge.

Today China is rebuilding her silk industry technological breakthroughs." Abrams said. "The industry still is labor intensive but less so than in the past." Abrams said the most remarkable Turks, a textile exporter, breakthrough is that garments made from Chinese woven silks now are washable. In the past woven silk fabrics had to be dry cleaned; only the knitted hosiery and lingerie were washable. When Abrams washed a blouse made of China silk for New York garment people recently. they were astonished.

Abrams said he is confident Americans will welcome back Chinese silk. "It will cost more than nylon or polyester fabrics but it will have advantages in feel and luster," he said. "It won't have to be mixed with cotton to make a cool garment as the synthetic fabrics must be, and it is capable of a great diversity of beautiful weaves and

Silk was used for making parachutes in World War I although nylon is used today. Silk is as strong as nylon or stronger for many purposes and is long lasting. For generations it was used for making the strongest sewing threads.

In addition to helping to conserve oil by replacing synthetic fibers to some extent. Abrams said silk probably is mainland China's best potential product for big scale export to the United States.

The Chinese are rather conservative about foreign trade." Abrams explained. Only recently have they been willing to import anything on credit. They are not buying on credit in the United States yet. So, if we want to sell to them, we must buy from them. Silks and certain Chinese food products are what Americans will want or need most from China in return for our products."

Outlook Bleak' For Poltry Industry

The Arkansas Poultry Federation says the outlook is bleak for the poultry industry and if the industry continues in its present direction "it cannot survive.

The industry places the blame for high feed prices. which generates the whole problem, on the grain sales to the Soviet Union.

Lex Killebrew of North Little Rock, executive vice president of the APF, said the problem, which applies most severely to broilers, is that the high cost of feed and resulting price of operation had forced the industry 'integrators," those who supply baby chicks to growers, to cut back the number of chicks they produce for fattening. Killebrew said producers

had been sellig broilers for less than they cost to produce and by cutting back production hoped to alter the market situation.

payment according to the chicks' weight, in numerous cases are not getting enough chicks to meet their own operating costs. Killebrew estimated that 10 to 14 per cent of the broiler growers in Arkansas were without

chicks now. "The growers want to know why the government is

There's a revolution firemen to privide a happening in emergency medical care in Texas.

Until a very few years ago, the only ambulance service in any Texas city was operated by a private company - in many cases. a funeral home. That's still true in the vast majority of Texas communities In many instances ambulance services had neither the training nor the equipment to provide complete

emergency care in the field. In recent years, more and more local governments have assumed full responsibility for providing emergency medical services

The City of Dallas provides an illustrative example. That city assumed responsibility for emergency ambulance service in 1972, but, of course, it didn't happen overnight. Months of planning by a committee preceded the first day of the

new operation. The committee included representatives of the County Medical Society, the Dallas Fire Department, the Dallas City Health Department, and the Southwestern Medical Center of the University of

The elaborate planning process included a computer simulation of the projected 25,000 ambulance calls that would be received the first year, to determine the optimum location for the ambulance stations. Even though the first year actually saw nearly 40,000 calls, instead of 25,000 the computer analysis was so accurate that the average ambulance response time was less than five minutes.

The most important step in providing the new ambulance service was to provide trained ambulance crews. It had already been decided that the Dallas Fire Department would operate the ambulances, and 105 new firemen were hired to permit more experienced men to be trained for temergency ambulance

The training was provided by another cooperative effort, with the Dallas City Health Department providing overall coordination, the Southwestern Medical Center providing most of the faculty, and the Texas State Health Department contributing its advice and counsel based on past experience.

Anyone who had been a fireman for more than a year was eligible for the first level of training as an Emergency Medical Technician, or EMT. There were more vulunteers than there were openings in the first class. So far. 120 Dallas firemen have received EMT training, and eventually every fire company in the city will have at least one

The second stage was to upgrade the EMT's to full fledged paramedics. The first paramedic class was held in 1973, and again there were more volunteers than there were places in the class. In less than two years, Dallas has trained enough
