Osborne and His Commissioners Take Oaths of Office Today

MAYOR LAUDED AS HE RETIRES FROM OFFICE

T. D. Hobart Pledges His Continued Support

SWEARS IN HIS SUCCESSOR

Murfee and Boyd Are Commissioners With Mayor Osborne

It's Mayor Osborne now. D. W. Osborne took the oath as Mayor of Pampa and J. E. Murfee and Lynn Boyd as Commissioner No. 1 and Commissioner No. 2, respectively, today and assumed their duties.

Mr. Osborne and Mr. Boyd were commissioners in the administration of Mayor T. D. Hobart, and Mr. Murfee for two terms with Mayor F. P. Reid. The oaths were administered by retiring Mayor T. D. Hobart, who served more than four months following adoption of the new charter and city-manager government.

After giving the oaths, Mr. Hobart in a few well chosen words thanked the men who had assisted him as Mayor and asserted that in retiring he was leaving affairs of the city in capable hands. "It was indeed a pleasure to work with you men, and at all times I am at your service—to assist you in any way that I can," he concluded.

City Manager Gwin stated that when he accepted the city manager position of Pampa, he weighed his decision; one was the Mayor and the other that he liked the town. He assured the new commission of his support for and faith in Pampa.

Among these present at the inauguration ceremonies was F. P. Reid who faithfully served the city as mayor for seven years.

GRETNA, La., April 9.—(P)—A notice posted on the door of the Union Trust and Savings bank here today announced the institution had closed because of a "shortage" having developed in the accounts of Joseph W. Stinson, president, and Godfrey Owens, assistant cashier.

A bank examiner said an investigation of the bank's affairs resulting in its being closed, was prompted by a letter addressed to him from Owens in which the assistant cashier confessed to taking \$10,000 for "his personal use." The defalcations, Mr. Brock reported, extended over two and one-half years.
