

# **Renewals of Registered Brands**

Every ten years Texas livestock producers are required by law to renew their brands and earmarks if they intend to continue using them. This is in accordance with Article 144.044 of the Agriculture Code. There is a six-month period (August 30, 2001 through February 28, 2002) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animals which are currently being

used. All brands that have not been renewed will become "void" on March 1, 2002 and available for the general public.

The recording fee will be \$11.00 per brand per location.

The Clerks Office will begin the process of renewals of brands on Thursday, August 30, 2001 and will continue through February 28, 2002.

## For whom the school bell tolls

Before the first bell rings, both parents and children need to gear up for the start of the school year.

"Sometimes those first days of school can be a big adjustment for a child," said Dr. Lou Ann Mock, an professor assistant of psychiatry and behavioral sciences at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

The following techniques will help prepare a child for the first day of school:

- ✓ Get up early on the first day, so no one will feel rushed.
- ✓ Make sure to eat a good breakfast.
- Get everything ready for school the night before.
- Let the children pick out their own clothes for the first day.

Make sure children get plenty of sleep. Missed sleep causes most of the day's experiences to be stored inefficiently in the brain, making it harder to remember lectures, and interactions with teachers. In addition, it is important for children to begin settling into a good homework routine the first day of school.



# Borden Co. ISD Student Dress Code for 2001-2002

Borden County School's dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, prevent disruption, and minimize safety hazards. Students and parents may determine a student's personal dress and grooming 3) standards, provided that they comply with the following:

Borden County students shall be dressed and groomed in a manner that is clean and neat and that will not be a health and safety hazard to others. themselves or Clothing and grooming that in the principals' judgement may reasonably be expected to cause disruption of or interference with normal school operation is prohibited.

The Borden County School prohibits pictures, emblems, or writing on clothing that:

- 1) Is lewd, offensive vulgar, or contains obscene language
- 2) Advertises or depicts tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, drugs, or any other substance prohibited by the school,
- 3) Refers to satanic, cult or prison wear or gang activities.

The following guidelines will be used to determine appropriate dress:

- 1) Dresses, skirts, split skirts and shorts should not be shorter than two inches above the knee. A student will loose the privilege of wearing shorts for the school year upon a third offense. Parents will be notified when the second offense occurs. Shorts must be tailored (hemmed with no frayed edges). No spandex biker shorts or wind shorts are allowed (loose legged, athletic running shorts) and shorts shall not be too tight.
- Wearing of oversized or 2) baggy pants and/or jeans is prohibited at school or any school sponsored activity on or off campus. No "saggin, baggin, or draggin". Pants must be an appropriate length and not drag the floor. Boys pants will be worn at the waist and properly fit the waistline.

No excessively wide legged pants will be allowed. No trench coats, dusters, jail attire or paramilitary/ camouflage will be allowed. No chains will be allowed on school property or at school sponsored functions Shirts and blouses must be buttoned appropriately with midriff and back covered at all times. (Tops must be long enough that skin does not show when arms are lifted). Clothing shall be designed, constructed and worn in a manner that is not suggestive or indecent, and that shall promote proper decorum. The opening on any type of shirt shall not exceed the equivalent of the first button below the collar of a dress shirt. Tank tops and "see-through chiffon blouses" will not be allowed unless they are worn with a crew neck type T-shirt underneath it or a shirt worn over them during all school and activities. hours Tailored shirt shirttails must be tucked in unless you have a crew **T-shirt** underneath the shirt. (All tailored shirts will be buttoned and tucked in at the pants or skirt when representing Borden County in

extracurricular any activities). 4) Footwear shall be a part of regular attire. House shoes are not acceptable footwear. No metal cleats or plates on the soles of shoes shall be worn in the building. 5) Hair shall be clean and well groomed at all times while attending school, and school sponsored activities. It will be styled in a manner that will keep it out of the student's eyes and not obstruct one's vision. No unnatural or bizarre hair colors or haircuts will be permitted. Eyebrows must not be notched or shaved in an unnatural manner. Male students' hair may be worn no longer than the top of the collar. In addition; may prohibit players and school administration or

participants from certain hairstyles and color variations in the hair. Students are to be clean-shaven at all Mustaches and times. beards are not allowed. Sideburns shall not be worn ear lobe and not wider than one inch at the base. Boys will not wear piercing

jewelry. Girls may not wear exposed piercing jewelry other than earrings. NO tongue piercing will be allowed by boys or girls.

- Sunglasses may not be worn in the building during school hours or events inside the building unless prescribed by a doctor.
- All types of headwear are prohibited, (Hats, caps, bandannas, or hoods) inside the building by boys or girls unless approved by the school administration. The school administration, coach, or sponsor may determine that headwear is inappropriate at certain times and/or places.
- Any clothing or grooming not listed above that is determined by the school administration to prose a disruption, interference, or safety concern to the normal school operation or Borden County School Community will be prohibited and addressed as appropriate.

A student who violates the dress code shall be given an opportunity to correct the problem at school. If not corrected, the student shall be assigned to in school suspension either for the remainder of the day or until a parent or designee brings an acceptable change of clothing to the school. Repeat offenses may result in more serious disciplinary action. 





## Caldwell has more than a Czech Museum

I love the delicious fruit of kolache and schnitzel and and meat-filled pastries of Czech people. They make Picturesque horse farms and every day a party.

I traveled to Snook to report on an outstanding high school basketball team. I went to Somerville to report on the most unique mascot in Texas, the Yegua. And I interviewed some interesting characters in Caldwell, the county seat of Burleson county.

Being from dry west Texas, it's always fascinating to visit a county with three-fourth of its boundaries marked by water: the Brazos and Yegua rivers.

It's great to be in the land

klobasa. Of rolling hills. beautiful wildflowers.

Caldwell is located right in the middle of 85 percent of the population of Texas. That's one reason why 40 thousand people attend the city's Kolache Festival, the major Czech festival in Texas. Two state highways, 21 and 36, bring people to town from all over.

There's deep appreciation of nature in Burleson county. Lake Somerville offers recreation and the country side Is home to deer, fox and waterfowl. Post oak and live oak trees decorate the landscape.

Burleson county is a living history of ethnic migration. Of Tonkawas and Caddoes, Mexicans and Anglos, Germans, Czechs and Italians. All blended together to make Texans.

Caldwell is located on the El Camino Real, the great thoroughfare of early Texas. The highway for traders, smugglers, adventurers, settlers and armies.

Fort Tenoxtitlan was established to discourage Anglo settlement in the area. But when . pioneers encountered the fort, they considered it just another inconvenience, a minor distraction. They used their resourcefulness to make

friends with the soldiers. Finally the fort was abandoned and the frontier became civilized.

That vision and courage and determination exemplified in previous generations carries through to the residents who live there now. Caldwell was born out of the great Czech migration. Families from the oppression in Europe landed in the port of Galveston.

Filled with hope and sensing their new freedom, farmers and tradesmen began looking for fertile farm land. They followed the rivers and streams inland, looking for that special place.

In the Brazos valley they found a combination of reddish brown soil and dark prairie loam. They planted, seeds and produced abundant crops.
