REPORTED FAVORABLY

Out of a Senate committee is an amendment to the general postal bill which would restore second class postage to the scale of 1920. Whether the newspapers, over-burdened by postage increases during the last decade, will be given any relief at this session of Congress remains to be seen, but it is to be hoped that the proximity of elections in which newspapers will be influential will have a favorable bearing on the final vote.

Discrimination in rates has been vigorously pointed out by the press, but revision is difficult to obtain. Also, participation of the government in printing is deplorable as it now exists. We refer to the printing of envelopes in direct competition with every shop in the country. It is true that the government can let under contract a printing schedule which the small town printers cannot touch, but the same principle would apply to making and selling clothing, canned goods, novelties, or anything else.

A community which takes advantage of every opportunity to save a few dollars by patronizing under-bidding individuals in other communities is on an unbound basis. Business men who follow these tactics and fail to trade at home save in one instance but lose in a larger one by limiting their neighbors. Profits are mutual and generally uniform in character. Business men who urge their customers to trade at home and then break the rule themselves for the same reason their patrons do are inconsistent.

We refer specifically to the type of merchant who urges everyone to buy his merchandise, then himself sends to a mail order concern or metropolitan center for his printing. It is true that the huge printing establishments which utilize machine-fed mass production can under-bid local printing establishments which pay out tens of thousands of dollars annually in salaries. An investment in local printing is an investment in personell which buys food, clothing, and amusement. An order to an out-of-town concern may save a few dollars but it means curtailment of local shops and bringing of fewer families to Pampa. The same principle applies to "canned" printed matter for distribution instead of the use of local advertising. Get this fact: the subscription price of a local newspaper will not pay for the paper and ink in a year, not to mention salaries, taxes, rent, postage, and other expenses involved. We cannot too strongly call this to the attention of those citizens who demand all manner of service from a newspaper and yet whose businesses have contributed little or nothing to help support that paper.

No publication lives on subscription money. Before you criticize a newspaper, examine its advertising volume and see how many men it must pay off every Saturday before one cent of profit can be spent for more reporters, better equipment, and more pages. Now that Deneen appears to rule supreme in Illinois it might be poor judgment for a delegate to do otherwise—and the elected delegates have now in common with Deneen, who braved the pineapples, than with Daves.

HOLLAND'S ATHLETES TO HAVE A FINGER IN THE OLYMPIC PIE



Foreign athletes are going to get a warm reception from Holland's home-bred in the Olympics at Amsterdam this summer. With their country as host, athletic interest is booming among the Dutch.

In captain de Boer of the track and field team, the country has a likely point winner in the broad jump while Miss M. Baron, holder of two world swimming records, has a chance for first place in the women's swimming events.

Holland has been making rapid progress in track athletics of late under the tutelage of the Swedish-American coach Veigsmann. Besides the broad-jump captain the team has some promising athletes in Van den Berghie, Broos and Paulin, relay racers, and C. C. Peters, hop-and-jump specialist.

As for the women swimmers, the best are Misses Baron, Braun, den Turk and Wiering while a number of younger women are giving them plenty of competition. Miss Baron, the ace of the team, is best at the breast stroke in which she holds the 200-meter and 400-meter world records.

In both of these sports—track and women's swimming—the Dutch expect chief opposition from the United States. Battling is a real Dutch national sport and in their own waters the Hollanders can be relied upon to put up an excellent fight.

The selection of Amsterdam has set all sports to booming and the good youngsters hereabouts are determined that not all the titles at stake here shall be carried away.

MIAMI, Okla., April 19.—(P)—A 94-mile trek across the corners of three states to Joplin, Mo., constituted today's program for the 77 runners and walkers in the cross-country marathon.

Start of the tri-state lap found Andrew Payne of Claremore, Okla., leading Peter Gavuzzi of Southampton, Eng., by less than 15 minutes in elapsed time for the 1,721.6 miles from Los Angeles. The Britisher crept up on Payne yesterday by leading the pack in the 51-mile jaunt from Chelsea in 6:48:23.

Payne and Ed Gardner, Seattle negro tied for fifth in 8:31:30.

This gave the Oklahoman an elapsed time of 287:42:22. Gavuzzi's total was 287:55:38.
