Low Income **Could Cause Poor Health**

WASHINGTON (UPI) -A government report says the way to better health for Americans over the next five years may be through better housing and safer working conditions.

The report envisions spending about \$25 billion from now until 1980 to curb tooth decay, begin projects to cope with mental health hazards, and build better hospital facilities for those who are financially distressed.

Poor health is, in considerable part at least. the result of the low incomes of individuals rather than its cause." said the report from the Department of Health. Education and Welfare.

Those with low incomes, it added, have less access to m3dical and mental health care.

The Forward Plan for Health is basically a strategy for spending about \$5 billion dollars each year through 1980.

But it also says the country may not be ready for national health insurance and that too much attention has been given to heart disease and cancer research.



WASHINGTON (UPI) -Five of Richard M. Nixon's closest aides will be judged one day this week on charges they participated in the Watergate cover-up.

They will find out if the nine women and three men who listened to 59 days of U.S. District Court testimony - including the actual White House tapes -reach a verdict on the charges of conspiracy to obstruct justice. The first defense lawyer



Funeral Closes County Offices



Cool The Language

Treasury Secretary William W. Simon is doing neither this country, nor the Arabs, nor the Israelis any favor when he refers to the Arab oil cartel as "a smal band of blackmailers

The policies of oil producing Arab nations must be judged. in part. through Arab eyes - if it is to be judged fairly.

As Americans, we would like to obtain cheap oil. As Arabs, they would like to get the best price they could. If the situation were reversed that is, if the Arab nations were the buyers and America was the seller, it is reasonable to expect that we would go after the best price, too. It is unjust to blame another person for doing what you would do if vou got the chance.

Furthermore, we see no reason the Arabs shouldn't get the best price they can arrange for their oil. We use the term "best" instead of "highest" for the reason that highest price does not always yield the highest profit, all things considered. But whether it does or doesn't, the asking price for Arab oil is their business. not our business.

When you look at the difference etween the amount of energy in a barrel of oil and in (say) fourteen dollar bills, obviously the petroleum has more doesn't really have any intrinsic worth than the paper. To be sure, debt

paper (that is, Federal Reserve banknotes) have a certain utility in the world market. But the fact that the Arabs have all that type o utility they require, and more besides, does not

make them blackmailers. What would be beneficial at this time is not name calling in Washington, D.C., but rather individuals who are as loyal to this country as the Arabs are to their

country Not all Arabs are of the same religion. Many who rside in America profess the Christian faith Traditionally, except when oppressed by exterior forces. Arabs are notoriously independent in thought and action. For the treasury secretary to call them "blackmailers" does not increase that

independence, but serves to unite them in a common effort. Tha coerced unity doen't help the price of crude oil and doesn't do the Israelis any good either.

International insults accomplish no peaceful purpose. The term "blackmail" is inflamatory. a war word. We assume the youth of America are no more willing to die on the dry sands of Palestine than

INSIDE WASHINGTON Fulbright Gets Job Offer

By ROBERT S. ALLEN WASHINGTON, Dec. 23-Sen. J. William Fulbright is considering another administration job offer.

Inside word is Secretary Henry Kissinger, warm friend of the lame - duck Arkansan, is trying to persuade him to take charge of winning congressional approval of the sharply controversial Vladivostok nuclear arms limitation agreement.

Presumably, that would include making him a member of the staff of the White House or State Department.

When the SALT I pact was before Congress. Fulbright. as chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee. spearheaded the ratification drive. It was a protracted and difficult struggle, with a number of torrid exchanges

between him and Sen. Henry Jackson D. - Wash., leading opponent. While the accord was fina

ly approved. Jackson was able to include precautionary language which the Russians have never accepted on the ground it is "unilateral" and they are not bound by it. Privately. Fulbright is

understood to agree with them. He vigorously fought Jackson's stipulation. At the time of the

Vldivostok meeting between President Ford and Communist party boss Brezhnev, Fulbright was recuperating from what was described as "corrective surgery" in a military holspital in Washington. As a member of Congress, he is entitled to this treatment at

nominal cost. While Fulbright has saidnothing publicly about the Vladivostok agreement. he is authoritatively reported to heartily favor it. Whether he will make that known in the remaining day of this Congress is uncertain. Kissinger hopes he will do that, and has privately briefed Fulbright







the STAIRWAY An Asset That's Architectural

A STAIRWAY can be an asset or a major drawback in a room. For example, I have a friend who bought a house for just one reason: She loved the staircase and could imagine her 4year-old daughter in years to come tossing her bridal bouquet from it. But there are other stairways without drama that are best sequestered between two walls, out of sight.

Decorative Asset

The staircase in this setting is a decorative asset. Its ascending wall is a gallery for paintings, while its landing houses a library. The stair overhang creates a natural entrance to the dining room and emphasizes the living room's two-story height.

How To Boost Child's Esteem By MARION WELLS

"Lack of self-esteem produces more symptoms of psychiatric disorders than any other factor yet identified,' according to James Dobson, Ph.D., director of behavior research, division of child development, Children's Hospital of Los Angeles.

Dobson says the seeds of low self-esteem can be sown very early in childhood. In a recent interview, he suggested some positive steps parents can take to help their youngsters start out on a more self-confident foot.

Q. How can we interact with children to build up their selfworth?

A. The fundamental skill required of anyone who handles children is learning to get behind the eyes of a child - to feel what he feels and know what he's experiencing. In general, children are particularly sensitive about their physical attractiveness and their basic ability or intelligence. Anything which makes them feel ugly or dumb or embarrasses them in front of others tends to weaken selfesteem.

Remember, too, that children build defenses around weaknesses, not strengths, It's wise to support your child at home in his attempts to defend himself against outside threats.

Q. How do parents' unconscious attitudes affect their youngsters' self-esteem?

A. Children need to feel both loved and respected. You can love them enough to die for them and yet not view them with respect. For example, when your child starts to speak in front of company, do you often jump in and try to explain what he's saying, or

laugh nervously, or send him to do with their self-worth. When they're constantly comaway? When you're getting him ready to go some place, pared to those who do it better does he soon realize you consider it a difficult task to make him look attractive? Children are amazingly per-

ceptive at "reading" the emotional messages behind our words and actions. Most kids are ordinary, just

like us. They have oversized needs to be loved and accepted just as they are, even if their ears stick out or they're too fat or thin or have trouble learning in school. When parents are disappointed, children soon know. If parents learn to recognize their own attitudes, this in itself is a big step in dealing with them.

Q. Do you have any hints for disciplining children so as not to weaken their self-worth?

A. I think the key to healthy parent-child relationships is found in a balance between love and control, shaping the will without attacking the spirit or self-worth. Recently I wrote a book on self-esteem in children, "Hide and Seek" (Fleming H. Revell Co., 1974, \$4.95). In it I quote a statement by child psychologist Dr. Joseph Bobbitt: "There have been studies showing that the child who has the lowest self-esteem is the one who isn't permitted to say anything at the dinner table. The one with the next lowest image of himself is the child who is allowed to dominate conversation. Highest on the list is the youngster whose parents tell him, 'Yes, you can speak up - when it's your turn

FOCUS ON HISTORY The many talents of Paul Revere

He was a stout fellow by all standards of today, or 200 years ago, Paul might be described as an occupational duo-pentathlon contender of those days. He was a goldsmith and silversmith, copper engraver, lieutenant of artillery, dentist, grand juror, leader in the Boston Tea Party, powder mill builder and surely a clever hand with the ladies, as well as having other skills, including horsemanship. It was for this last that Henry Wadsworth Longfellow recorded his fame: "Listen my children and you shall hear of the midnight ride of Paul Revere." Longfellow referred to the ride of April 18-19, 1775.

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In Boston, Mass., the British under command of Gen. Thomas Gage were getting restless with inaction. It was about time, they thought, to punish the unruly Colonists by some kind of an attack, somewhere or other, starting by either land or sea.

Samuel Adams and John Hancock were in Lexington, close to Concord, where the **Provincial Congress was** meeting, and where what little arms and ammunition the Continentals had were stored. Everyone knew that Gen. Gage would make a big grab for Lexington and Concord, but not when or by what route. Paul Revere's patriotic boys in Boston were watching the British and Tories by day and night. When Gen. Gage made up his mind, someone let the secret leak out.

The prearranged signal was flashed from the steeple of the Old North Church. Two Tlantern lights told that the British




