# Syria Puts Armed Forces On Alert

## Low Income Could Cause Poor Health

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A government report says the way to better health for Americans over the next five years may be through better housing and safer working conditions. The report envisions spending about \$25 billion from now until 1980 to curb tooth decay, begin projects to cope with mental health hazards, and build better hospital facilities for those who are financially distressed. "Poor health is, in considerable part at least, the result of the low incomes of individuals rather than its cause," said the report from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Those with low incomes, it added, have less access to medical and mental health care. The Forward Plan for Health is basically a strategy for spending about \$5 billion dollars each year through 1980. But it also says the country may not be ready for national health insurance and that too much attention has been given to heart disease and cancer research. Among its priorities: —An \$8 million national fluoridation program to curb tooth decay. —New mental health projects to cope with "such social stresses" as the influence of violence on television, racism, crime and delinquency, poverty and suicide. —A multimillion dollar drive to reduce by 10 percent cancer contracted on the job and because of the job. —A redirection of federal construction funds toward health facilities treating patients who do not require expensive beds and on modernizing big city hospitals. But giving everyone access to poor or highly variable health care through a national health insurance scheme "would be a hollow victory," it said. HEW has developed a plan, announced by former President Nixon, to require employers to offer health insurance to workers. President Ford said he supported the idea but that "Congress will have to join with me in cutting federal expenditures before we can afford this program."

## MEETS WITH AIDES

# Ford Studying Reports Of Illegal CIA Actions

WASHINGTON (UPI) — CIA Director William E. Colby, warned bluntly by President Ford that he would not tolerate spying by the agency on Americans, met with top aides today to discuss press allegations of illegal domestic activities. A CIA spokesman said Colby had no plans to meet with news media to counter reports in The New York Times Sunday that the agency had conducted a "massive illegal domestic intelligence operation" on U.S. citizens as far back as the 1950s. The Central Intelligence Agency charter authorizes the agency, whose secret headquarters is secluded in the countryside at nearby Langley, Va., to engage only in foreign intelligence activities. "The director is meeting with his staff this morning, as he does every day," the spokesman said. "All I can tell you is that they will be studying the various allegations in the press and we will let you know if anything develops." He said it would "not be now worth while" to seek out Colby on the issue. President Ford, spending a skiing Christmas vacation in Colorado, said he would not tolerate any more domestic spying by the CIA. He said Sunday that he illegally spied on Americans, but no longer. He called the CIA director from Air Force 1 to be sure it had stopped. The New York Times reported Sunday that beginning in the 1950s the CIA conducted a "massive illegal domestic intelligence operation." It increased to spying on antiwar and other dissident groups during the Nixon administration, including keeping files on 10,000 American citizens, the Times said. "It's mainly correct and we regret it," a former CIA agent said of the story, adding, "It has stopped." An agency spokesman said the CIA would have no public comment until it studied the Times report.

The agency's 1947 charter bans the CIA from operating in the United States and gives responsibility for internal security to the FBI. Ford read the Times report hurriedly as he flew toward a skiing vacation in Vail, Colo. The President got CIA Director William E. Colby on the phone and, he said, was assured "nothing comparable to what was stated in the article was going on over there, and I told him that under no circumstances would I tolerate any such activities in this administration. "I was assured it did not exist. Asked whether he knew about the surveillance before he saw the Times,

Ford replied, "I had some partial information." He sidestepped questions as to whether the Nixon administration had been responsible. Colby has acknowledged that the CIA should not have participated in Watergate — it gave disguises and equipment to burglar E. Howard Hunt. "They weren't earthshaking, but they were wrong," he said. "We shouldn't have done them, and we have told our employes that we won't do them again."

The story said the actions were more extensive, especially during the directorship of Richard Helms, now ambassador to Iran. Palestinian commandos hurled a grenade Sunday at a bus carrying 17 members of a Jacksonville, Fla., church group on a tour of sacred sites around Jerusalem, wounding a teen-age American girl and an Arab bystander. The Beirut newspaper An Nahar reported today that Iran will provide Egypt with several kinds of defensive weapons including a modern radar network and will train Egyptian pilots to fly American-made Phantom F5 warplanes.

## Ford Takes Vacation At Skiing Area

VAIL, Colo. (UPI) — Shortly after he arrived for a Christmas holiday with his family, President Ford dressed in a bright orange ski jacket and headed for the slopes. His first run was the Simba trail, considered one of the most difficult. About 100 skiers and 50 reporters and cameramen followed him. The President had said he wanted to be regarded as one more skier, but there was no lift line and he said he was surprised. It had been arranged by the Secret Service for his protection. He was also with his instructor, Dennis C. Hoeger, and that allowed him to go to the front of the line. A cheer went up from the crowd as Ford easily swung into a lift chair. Despite the pleas of Secret Service agents, he was followed down the slope by many skiers. He shook a number of hands. Hoeger said Ford took a spill near the top of the mountain. Ford describes himself as in the intermediate class, but one Vail pro described him as "a good recreational skier and getting better all the time. The skiers around said this was some of the best weather Vail has had in years. New snow had fallen and the temperature on the mountain was about zero, with a breathtaking 20 mile per hour wind sweeping the 8,000-foot peaks. Although this is Ford's first vacation since becoming President, he had some work to do — the 150 bills passed by Congress when it adjourned and the proposals on the economy and energy which he must give to the new Congress in January. Ford told reporters that he planned to work about three hours each morning, then head for the slopes in the afternoon. The Fords leased a seven-bedroom house at Vail owned by Texas oil man Richard C. The newspaper quoted diplomatic sources as saying the military aid to Egypt, the first to be given by Iran to an Arab country at war with Israel, will also include specific kinds of electronic equipment which the Egyptian army needs. And in London, diplomatic reports said the Soviet Union was prepared to rearm Egypt to a wartime footing in return, for restoration of firm links between Cairo and Moscow. The diplomats said Communist party General Secretary Leonid I. Brezhnev was prepared to make the offer when he meets Egyptian President Anwar Sadat in Cairo next month. Reports of a Syrian alert were published in the Beirut newspaper NNL Liwa which said the Syrian "precautionary" measures came when Syria received information "that Israel may launch a big aggression on Syrian territories during the holidays. Iran will provide Egypt with defense military equipment, including a modern radar network to be added to the air defense umbrella which provides protection to cities and strategic positions in Egypt," the newspaper said. The newspaper quoted unconfirmed reports as saying "a number of Egyptian pilots will be trained in Iran to fly American-made Phantom F5 warplanes of which quantities are available in Iran and Saudi Arabia."

The newspaper said the Shah of Iran's visit to Egypt next month "will lead to more cooperation between the two countries, especially in the economic field."

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# Jetliner Crash Kills 74 In Venezuelan Accident

CARACAS (UPI) — Authorities blamed a mechanical failure today for the fiery crash of a domestic jetliner in eastern Venezuela. All 74 persons aboard died when the plane burst into flames and smashed into a hill. Unofficial reports said another passenger and three unlisted children were on the flight and that the death toll could be as high as 78. The airline was expected to issue a clarifying statement later today. The Aerolineas Venezolanas DC9 exploded Sunday five minutes after taking off from Maturin Airport, 360 miles east of Caracas, and then crashed into Vulture Hill 15 miles away. An airline spokesman said all 68 passengers and six crew members died in the crash, but it would take until later today for rescue workers to hack through the rough tropical terrain and reach all the bodies. He said most of the victims were believed to be Venezuelan but a sketchy passenger list indicated four foreign names — Paul Rice, William Richard and two persons called Vanhlerber-

ger. There were no addresses on the list. Communications Ministry officials said the accident appeared to have been caused by "structural defects" in the jetliner. An airline spokesman said the pilot, Capt. Diogenes Torella, was apparently trying to return to Maturin Airport after running into "mechanical difficulties." The first rescue workers to reach the scene reported widespread wreckage and badly burned bodies. "The bodies are spread all over the place, which will make the rescue and identification task more difficult," a spokesman said.

Merchants say shopping this year, some managers said they probably were running about even with last year, or perhaps up a little but could show a further increase in the remaining time before Christmas. The general consensus seemed to be that Pampa's economy is in perhaps a more stabilized condition than most Texas cities of similar size and that the Texas Panhandle is far better off than many sections of the country.

Another said business for the entire year of 1974 had shown a gain to date of about 15 to 20 percent. One merchant said higher prices may have accounted for increased revenue although sales in some instances were fewer than last year. This was born out by the last sales tax report by the City of Pampa which showed a comfortable gain over one year ago. With an extra day for

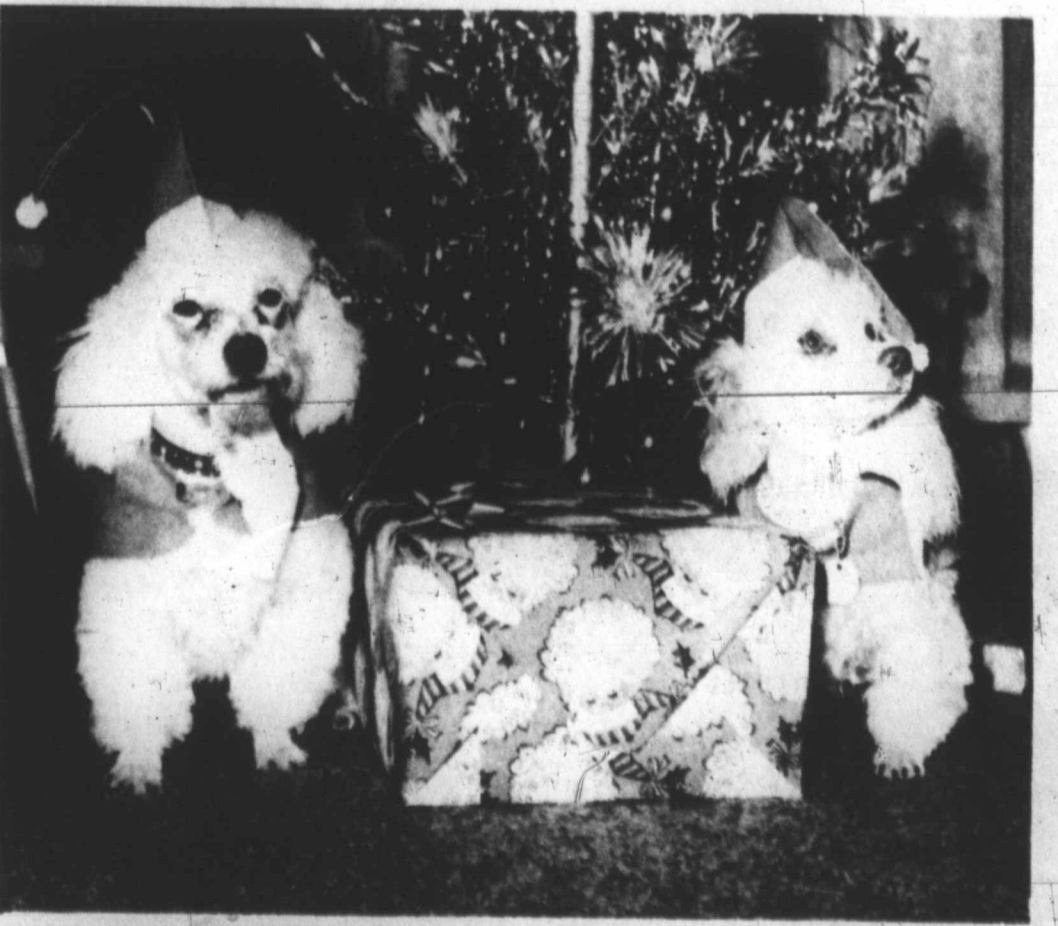
## Nixon's Aides' Judgement Nears

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Five of Richard M. Nixon's closest aides will be judged one day this week on charges they participated in the Watergate cover-up. They will find out if the nine women and three men who listened to 59 days of U.S. District Court testimony — including the actual White House tapes — reach a verdict on the charges of conspiracy to obstruct justice. The first defense lawyer to make a final argument, Frank Strickler, must complete his summation today for former White House Chief of staff H.R. Haldeman. He will be followed by an estimated 10 hours of summation from lawyers for former Attorney General John N. Mitchell, former White House aide John D. Ehrlichman, former Assistant Attorney General Robert C. Mardian and former re-election attorney Kenneth W. Parkinson. Chief prosecutor James F. Nease probably will make his closing argument Tuesday morning. Judge John J. Sirica hoped to recess the trial for Christmas Eve and Christmas. If the pattern of Thanksgiving is followed, the jury and its five alternates, sequestered since Oct. 11, will get Christmas Day visits from their families — in the presence of U.S. marshals. Sirica says he will deliver his charge to the jury Thursday morning and deliberations will begin that afternoon. One unindicted

co-conspirator — Richard M. Nixon — was not there. A near-fatal illness kept him in California, and the jurors had as his testimony only the tapes he must never have expected anyone would hear. One of the government's arguments is that the Watergate crimes were "even more serious when carried out by people in high office sworn to uphold the law." But another Haldeman lawyer, John J. Wilson, argued that the tapes were like family discussions around a dinner table. "Mr. Nixon didn't get the \$1 million," he said, referring to the taped remarks that finding hush money for Watergate burglar E. Howard Hunt would be no problem. "Mr. Nixon didn't have anything to do with the \$75,000 in cash delivered to Mr. Hunt that night."

## Drugs Stolen From Clinic

Investigation into a drug theft from a local physicians office is underway by investigators in the Pampa Police Department. Police reports said today Kelley Clinic, 516 W. Kentucky, had been entered sometime during the night Saturday. Offices in the clinic had been ransacked and an undetermined amount of drugs stolen. Inventory of the stolen narcotics was incomplete this forenoon, but police said Dr. Frank Kelley reported "numerous drugs" had been removed from the office.

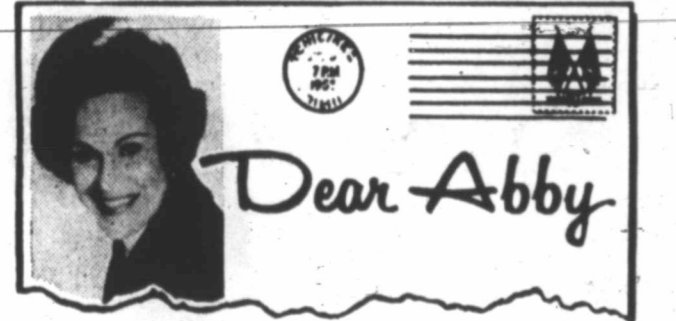

# How To Boost Child's Esteem

"Lack of self-esteem produces more symptoms of psychiatric disorders than any other factor yet identified," according to James Dobson, Ph.D., director of behavior research, division of child development, Children's Hospital of Los Angeles.

Dobson says the seeds of low self-esteem can be sown very early in childhood. In a recent interview, he suggested some positive steps parents can take to help their youngsters start out on a more self-confident foot.

Q. How can we interact with children to build up their self-worth?

A. The fundamental skill required of anyone who handles children is learning to get behind the eyes of a child — to feel what he feels and know what he's experiencing. In general, children are particularly sensitive about their physical attractiveness and their basic ability or intelligence. Anything which makes them feel ugly or dumb or embarrasses them in front of others tends to weaken self-esteem.

Remember, too, that children build defenses around weaknesses, not strengths. It's wise to support your child at home in his attempts to defend himself against outside threats.

Q. How do parents' unconscious attitudes affect their youngsters' self-esteem?

A. Children need to feel both loved and respected. You can love them enough to die for them and yet not view them with respect. For example, when your child starts to speak in front of company, do you often jump in and try to explain what he's saying, or

laugh nervously, or send him away? When you're getting him ready to go some place, does he soon realize you consider it a difficult task to make him look attractive? Children are amazingly perceptive at "reading" the emotional messages behind our words and actions.

Most kids are ordinary, just like us. They have oversized needs to be loved and accepted just as they are, even if their ears stick out or they're too fat or thin or have trouble learning in school. When parents are disappointed, children soon know. If parents learn to recognize their own attitudes, this in itself is a big step in dealing with them.

Q. Do you have any hints for disciplining children so as not to weaken their self-worth?

A. I think the key to healthy parent-child relationships is found in a balance between love and control, shaping the will without attacking the spirit or self-worth. Recently I wrote a book on self-esteem in children, "Hide and Seek" (Fleming H. Revell Co., 1974, \$4.95). In it I quote a statement by child psychologist Dr. Joseph Bobbitt: "There have been studies showing that the child who has the lowest self-esteem is the one who isn't permitted to say anything at the dinner table. The one with the next lowest image of himself is the child who is allowed to dominate conversation. Highest on the list is the youngster whose parents tell him, 'Yes, you can speak up — when it's your turn.'"

Q. Are there dangers in comparing children to each other?

A. Children may miss everything else, but they remember every event having

to do with their self-worth. When they're constantly compared to those who do it better or faster or who are prettier or smarter, they know they're losing.

You can make something respectful out of each child's

position in the family. Maybe the younger one has fewer responsibilities but the older one has more privileges. Making each child feel loved and important can help counteract feelings of displacement when a new baby comes.

## A 'MOTHERLY' FATHER

### He Took Custody Of The Children

MEN should make better "mothers" than women, says Michael McFadden. He believes men are more relaxed and freer to innovate in this role "because we weren't brought up with preconceived notions on how to run a household and raise children."

At 35, McFadden, by virtue of being a graduate of the school of experience, considers himself an expert on this subject. He has been a "motherly" father for three years, since his wife and he divorced and "willingly and wantonly" he eased his way into retaining custody of their three children.

He Missed the Children "For six months after the divorce, I lived the 'good' bachelor life," he recalled, "but I missed the children. It wasn't working out for my ex-wife either. Nancy was bored with being the perfect wife and perfect mother—that's one reason why our marriage broke

up. She wanted to be free to develop as a person—but she couldn't be free because she still had the children."

McFadden suggested taking the youngsters—Kate, now 10, Mary, 8, and Tom, 5—for a summer. With their mother's consent, he's had them ever since. The experiment that's become his way of life mainly has been successful, says McFadden. He writes about it with warmth and humor in "Bachelor Fatherhood: How to Raise and Enjoy Your Children as a Single Parent" (published by Walker & Co.)

A Painful Hurdle

The first hurdle was getting over the divorce—"that was painful." But the couple had enjoyed eight happy years together, and made the adjustment "without being hateful or spiteful."

"We wanted to protect the children as much as possible," says the author, who has

dedicated his book to them, and to his ex-wife.

McFadden believes the easy way is the best way, and that's how he runs his household. For example, he has simplified bed-making by eliminating spreads and buying quilts.

"If I'd thought of sleeping bags," he said with a grin, "I could have eliminated sheets, too."

His home in Laguna Beach, Calif., is free, loosely structured and flexible. An expert on nutrition ("I won't buy junk foods and candied cereals"), he's a novice at cooking—even after three years home at the range.

Burgers Are Best

"But I don't know one kid in the world who'd rather have paella than hamburgers," he said by way of apology.

McFadden has restructured his job and works from home, editing two airline magazines and working on a new book, his third.

"Because I'm home all day," he confessed, "supermarketing is a high point, a social experience."

Amazed at his bachelor father status, people are forever asking now he copes with chores such as laundry.

"The answer," said McFadden, "is that I stick it in a machine, add soap and push a button. When the machine stops running, I stick the wash in another machine and dry it."

Raising Them by the Book  
How does a bachelor father

cope with the problems of raising young children? McFadden consults an expert: "Dr. Haim Ginott's book, 'Between Parent and Child' has been my bible," he said. "It's taught me to attack the problem, not the child."

Another source of help has been his mother: "She offers grandmotherly advice and keeps me au courant with the newest detergents and latest gadgets." A once-a-week cleaning woman helps with housekeeping.

Not Again

McFadden resists thought of remarriage: "Certainly not to give my children a mother," he said. "They have a mother. Nancy lives nearby. Our agreement is that she can be with the children whenever she likes and sometimes when I like—she moved in last summer when I took a two-week vacation."

Ms. McFadden, happily involved with her own ceramic business, finds that now that the children are no longer a major part of her life in terms of the time she spends with them, the quality of her relationship with them is better. The children agree.

"Bachelor fatherhood" says author McFadden, "gives you the advantages of a family and the freedom of being single at the same time. It's not only fun but often quite funny." And that's the way his book, which is filled with practical how-to suggestions for the single parent, makes it sound.

## Former Bell Employee Says Political Donations Routine

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UPI) — Executives of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. have been forced to make monthly payments to political candidates as part of a secret political fund controlled by the utility, a former executive said in an interview in Sunday's edition of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

"I was told that included in my salary was \$1,000 of company money," James H. Ashley told the newspaper.

"This company money was designed to net me \$600 roughly after taxes and was to be disbursed by me at the rate of \$50-a month for whatever political contributions the company chose to make."

Ashley, former general staff manager of the St. Louis area for Bell, told the paper he was one of 40 St. Louis-based Bell executives

who were required to make the monthly contributions when he worked here in 1970.

"Ashley said that a total of about 140 top Southwestern Bell executives in the six-state area served by the company were contributing about \$80,000 a year under the plan, which he said was in effect as recently as last summer," the newspaper said in a copyrighted story.

Ashley, 45, is a co-plaintiff in a \$29 million libel suit filed against Southwestern Bell after his dismissal in late October. He was interviewed in San Antonio, Tex., where the suit was filed.

Zane E. Barnes, president and chief executive officer of Southwestern Bell, was quoted in the article as denying the charges.

"As a matter of policy, we do not make any corporate illegal political contributions," Barnes said, "and we do not coerce any employees to make political contributions. Making contributions to the political process is emphatically not a condition of employment."

Ashley said the political payments in Missouri were to candidates for public office in state elections. He said they were given under the guise of personal contributions, but actually were company funds in that the executives involved had been given salary increases to cover their contributions.

"We were all aware of the fact that these were illegal political contributions," Ashley said. "We frankly worried quite frequently for fear word would get out on this. We were warned not to say anything about it."

## Kissinger Gives Israel More Support

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger says the United States will not ask Israel to negotiate with the Palestine Liberation Organization until the Arab guerrillas recognize Israel's right to exist.

"It is impossible for the United States to recommend negotiations with the PLO until the PLO accepts the existence of Israel as a

legitimate state," Kissinger said. "As long as the PLO envisage, in one form or another, the destruction of Israel, we don't see much hope for negotiations with the PLO."

He said the United States and Europe would not negotiate over the survival of Israel.

He made the comments in an interview with Newsweek magazine.

Kissinger also said he thought it would be impossible to reach a binding legal agreement with the Russians over the immigration of Soviet Jews, that the U.S. does not plan military intervention in the Middle East to lower oil prices and predicted there would be "some evolution" in relations with Cuba next year.

Amber fell into the uncapped well as she trailed her parents, Air Force Sgt. Harry Peoples, 21, and Joyce Peoples, 20, around a "pick-it-yourself" tomato field.

"I didn't hear her, that's why I turned around," Peoples said. "I turned around, then I heard her like she was in a hole or tangled up in the tomato vines."

An 11-year-old boy tried to wiggle down into the narrow hole to reach the crying toddler, but had to be pulled out after his shoulders got stuck.

Police, firemen and volunteers finally managed to dig a larger hole adjacent to the well and chisel their way to the girl.
