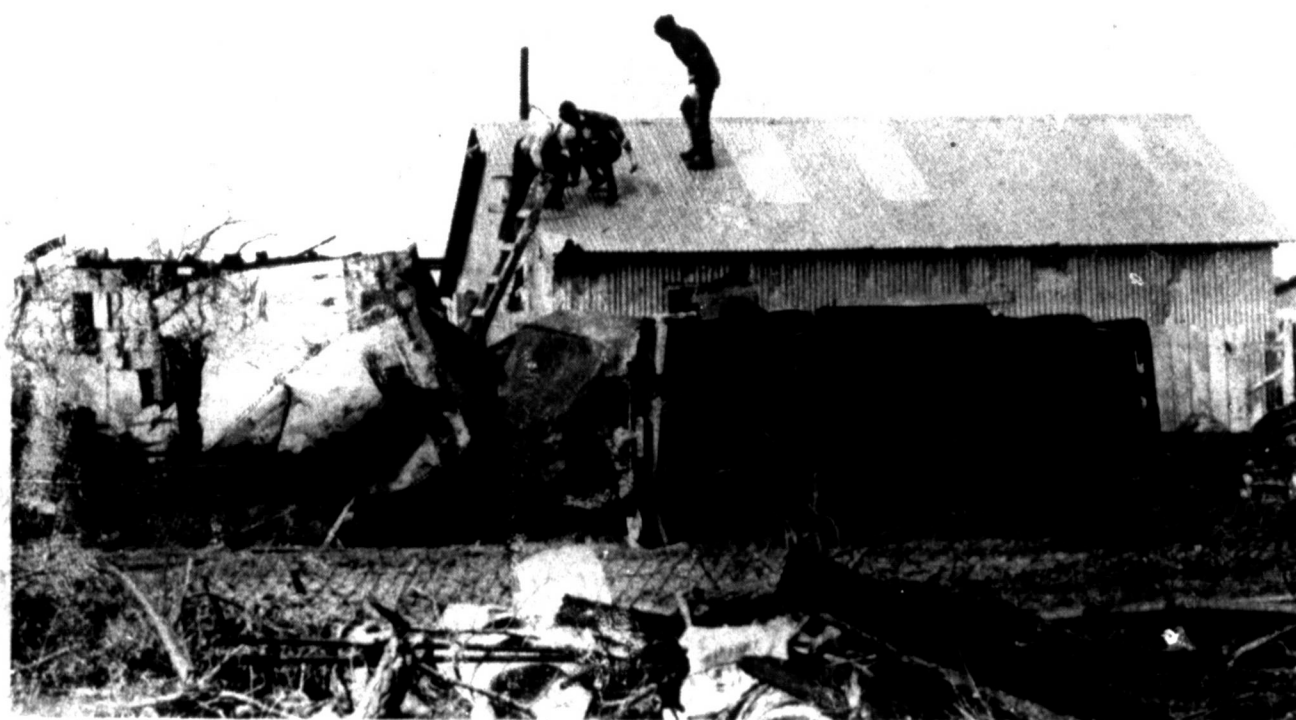
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## Bouncing Back Begins; Helpers Invade Lefors

Lefors — Business - suited, government - salaried officials sat at a table in the gymnasium here Thursday afternoon trying to explain the government assistance that Lefors could apply for and offering their personal assistance in keeping paperwork at a minimum.

Their audience was a weary worried mayor — covered with hard - work dirt from his hard hat to his boots. While the officials offered future assistance, food, beds, blankets, clothes, milk, water — everything imaginable that disaster victims could immediately be coming through the school doors in the arms of unpaid volunteers — friends.

It is going to take a lot to rebuild Lefors. A lot of work. A lot of time. A lot of money. Rough estimates made Thursday by John Archer, mayor, and Jack Schieuter, civil defense liaison officer, set damages at \$3 million to homes and \$60,000 to businesses. Other rough estimates set damage to the Post Office at \$10,000; City Hall, \$30,000; City Barn, \$20,000; city - owned vehicles, \$3,000; streets and roads, \$10,000.

A survey revealed 148 homes with damage and a guess by officials is that 60 per cent of them were not insured. At 4:50 p.m. Thursday the mayor of Lefors sent a telegram to Dolph Briscoe, governor of Texas, requesting that he seek a presidential major disaster declaration for Lefors.

If President Ford grants the declaration there will be financial assistance to the city for the public - owned property and assistance for private property owners including low - interest loans from the Small Business Administration and the Federal Housing Administration. Lee McMurtry from U.S. Rep. Jack Hightower's office was in Lefors Thursday and said that the way has been paved in Washington for the request.

"They know it's coming," he said, "and have everything possible to speed up the procedures. The city is being kept secure by the Texas Department of Public Service. Maj. C.W. Bell, DPS regional commander from Lubbock and Capt. J.W. Blackwell, district highway patrol commander from Amarillo, are supervising DPS activities. Highway Patrolmen remained at their posts at entrances to the town last night and a spokesman said, "we will be here as long as it is necessary to provide security for the homes, property

and personal possessions of these people." The patrolmen allowed people to enter the city if they were bringing supplies, or had other genuine needs to get in. Once in Lefors, people are required to go by the high school cafeteria to acquire a pass which will permit them into the damaged portion of town. Hundreds of people were pouring into Lefors all day with all forms of aid and cleanup help for the victims.

"We would have no estimate of the number of people involved," one DPS official said. "We've had people from a 75 mile radius pouring in all day," said Bobbie Robinson of Pampa's KGRO Radio station. Ms. Robinson had been in Lefors since shortly after the storm hit doing what she could to help out. In the afternoon two more injured people were discovered and taken to Highland General Hospital in Pampa where they were treated and released.

"They were in a daze," Ms. Robinson said of many of the tornado victims. "We went out with a bullhorn in the morning telling people to come register but we couldn't get through to a lot of them. We finally had to get out and walk and talk to them individually. Many church groups are providing emergency help in the town in addition to the Red Cross and Salvation Army. In addition, there are countless individuals and companies providing assistance. People like David Brockbank of Jim's Steak

House in Pampa who cooked up a stew with 40 pounds of meat in it and sent it to Lefors in two large canisters in time for supper. Companies like Triangle Well Service of Pampa who donated the use of a 100 - barrel water truck for as long as it is needed.

City Utilities Restored  
Gas, electric and telephone service gradually was being restored today to homes and businesses left standing in Lefors after Thursday's early morning tornado. Marvin Cooper, line superintendent for Southwestern Public Service Co., said SPS crews from Amarillo, Hereford, Dumas and Canyon were working today with employees from the Pampa division to install electric power as rapidly as possible. Cooper estimated electric service had been restored in half of the homes still standing. Although Pioneer Natural Gas Co. does not serve Lefors, Raymond York, district superintendent for Pioneer in Pampa, said a crew of 15 Pioneer workmen has been busy in Lefors since the night of the storm.

Five Men Saw Steel Plate, Escape Tyler County Jail  
TYLER, Tex. (UPI) — Five men, one of them charged in four East Texas shotgun murders, broke out of the Smith County Jail this morning. Police arrested one of the inmates shortly after the 4 a.m. escape. Police identified the escapees as Edward Elton Corley, 30, a construction worker charged in the shotgun killings of three women and a child, Tony Leroy Petty, 39, charged with bank robbery, Thomas Milton Wilson, 35, held on a murder warrant from Georgia, and Thomas Walter Shaw, 38, held on a warrant from the Texas Department of Corrections for the murder of a policeman. The captured escapee was unidentified. A convenience store operator spotted a man standing in front of his store, and police arrested him on suspicion of narcotics possession. The jailer recognized the inmate and discovered the other men were missing. The men escaped from the sixth floor of the Smith County Courthouse by sawing through a one-fourth inch thick steel plate above a lavatory police said. The inmates used a homemade rope to drop to the second floor roof of the building, broke into the county auditor's office where they ate a box of candy, and escaped. ## Fears State Control on Appraisals

Fear of state control over local property appraisals under a bill introduced in the Texas Legislature was expressed today by Aubrey L. Jones, Pampa city tax assessor-collector. Similar concern also was expressed in an analysis of the bill by the Texas Association of Counties received today by Gray County Judge Don Cain. The bill now being considered by both the House and Senate of the state legislature relates to the establishment, administration and enforcement of a system of single, countywide appraisals of property for all tax purposes. In a statement issued today, City Tax Collector Jones said House Bill 1463 as introduced should command the immediate

attention of the tax - paying public of all political subdivisions of the state. If all values are based on the fair market value, as proposed by Article 7176a, equalization should be effected. We may need standards and guidelines that should be followed. However, the primary objection to the Bill is found in the provisions of Article 7176b. This article provides for the property appraisal division to be created in the office of the state comptroller. It also provides for a State Director, serving at the pleasure of the State Comptroller, to audit and direct county appraisal work at the state level. The article under state administration specifies in detail the duties and authority of the

State Director pertaining to standards for reports, equipment, maps, state appraisal manual, various reports etc. The bill also specifies the standards for appraisals, but does not leave the execution to the political divisions of the state. It also provides for state execution and control. After studying a copy of the House Bill, Jones asked the question "Do you want state control over local property values?" The analysis by the Texas Association of Counties expressed additional concern over a provision for a Board of Adjustment, that would be composed almost 100 per cent of city and school people with very little control by the county if the board is selected on the basis of tax values or percentage of population. The association's analysis also points out: "If the local government constitutional article is passed and adopted by the people, the County Tax Assessor and the Commissioners Court could lose control down the line where at this time the Commissioners Court has to sit as the Board of Equalization. The bill, now under consideration by both houses of the state legislature, had 60 co-sponsors when introduced in the House. The Gray County Commissioners Court and Pampa City Commission have as yet taken no action on the proposed legislation.

## 94 Dogs Entered Some Of Country's Best in Dog Trials

Four Britanny spaniels, a few of the country's best champions, will display their skills in the Top of Texas annual spring dog trials, which will be held on Saturday and Sunday at the Pampa fairgrounds, 16 miles north of Pampa. The trials will begin at 8 a.m. Saturday with the Open All Age and Open Puppy divisions, which will involve the oldest and youngest dogs respectively. Saturday afternoon the Amateur division will close the trials. The Amateur division will conclude at 8 p.m. Sunday, along with the Open Dog and Open Derby divisions. In both amateur divisions, Britanys will run a pass and be judged in a single course for 20 minutes and then hunt birds.

The Open Derby is for dogs between 15 months and 2 years old. No dog 15 months old or more can be entered in Saturday's Open Puppy division. The gun dog divisions will involve Britanys of any age, but only amateur handlers can enter dogs in the amateur class. Prestige is what the Open All Age division is about. Britanys, usually between six and eight years old, with field - trial experience and often with championship points make up the division. The trials' only professional handlers will have dogs entered in the Open All Age class. The pros are Lyle Johnson of Hereford, Kan., Lloyd Budd of Hereford, Kan., and Frank Roach of Pampa, three of the most renowned handlers and most consistent winners in the country. Roach, working a Brittany named Loyd's Ruff, won the stake a year ago. The dog is now owned by Ken Rogers of Hereford and is again entered. He is considered a favorite. Roach has other solid contenders entered, including Gideon of Richmond, who has done more for the handler than any other Brittany. Tip Top's Jean, an up - and - coming gal owned by Pampa's Jim Leverich and Jerry Rye, San Angelo product. Gideon, a field champion for over two years, is a sentimental favorite of Roach's. "Gid's liable to beat anybody in the world if he gets any kind of break at all." The Brittany is owned by Charles Nester of Dallas, a pilot with Braniff. Johnson's hopes lie mostly in a female — Holly Dolly Miss Kaer — who has also been classed as a champion by acquiring at least

FEDERAL ROLE

Racial progress continuing

The U.S. Civil Rights Commission is urging that the federal government continue to use the full force of both the law and the federal purse to achieve greater racial and ethnic integration in American schools. Meanwhile, Congress is being asked to renew the Voting Rights Act of 1965 which forms the basis for federal intervention in state and local election procedures to encourage more participation by minorities.

This is a good time to take stock of the progress that has been made in treating racial problems in our society, and to project the best course to follow to achieve goals that still elude us.

The Civil Rights Commission concedes that the South has responded admirably in wiping out the school segregation which had been enforced for many years by local laws. The focus now is more on segregation which arises from the racial patterns of communities and neighborhoods — patterns determined by individual choice and economics than any deliberate policy of segregation.

The resistance to busing and re-districting plans, often as vocal from Negroes as from whites, has exhibited how much more difficult it is to overcome this kind of racial imbalance in public schools. Sociologists are not of a single mind on whether this kind of forced mixing of pupils is really enhancing educational opportunities or encouraging racial tolerance.

The door to the political process in our country is now so wide open

to minorities that it is hard to justify an extension of the 1965 Voting Rights Act. Procedures have been established which hardly need the heavy hand of the federal government to see that they are continued. The spectacular increase in the number of Negroes elected to public office, especially in the South, refutes any argument that politics is dominated by the white majority.

In employment, a federal law passed in 1968 has established firmly the principle that job opportunities must be open without consideration of the race, ethnic background or sex of applicants who can otherwise meet the qualifications. The government's attempt to go beyond this with Affirmative Action programs — which the Civil Rights Commission is encouraging — has put many employers in the awkward position of practicing "reverse discrimination" in hiring and promoting members of minority groups. Along with school busing plans, such policies can set back the spirit of tolerance rather than nourish it.

The American people can be proud of their collective achievements of the last 20 years in breaking down old patterns of segregation and discrimination. Many prejudices have received the burial they deserve. We have formed a foundation on which to achieve more. We must avoid the danger that too much pushing from Washington could interfere with progress that now has a momentum of its own.

Change comes slowly

Reformers in the House of Representatives, cheered by the addition of 75 freshmen Democrats, have been flexing their muscles in the House Democratic Caucus.

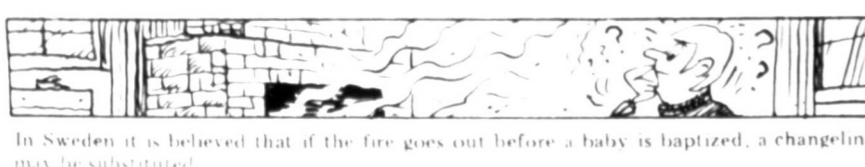
Aggressive action last month assured more power for junior Democrats at the expense of the committee structure and the much-maligned seniority system.

Abolishment of the Internal Security Committee, an anachronistic center of controversy for many years, was pledged in a more recent caucus vote and carried out by the full House. But like the replacement of some aging committee chairmen, the resolution on the committee can scarcely be considered revolutionary. The docility of the top Democratic lead-

ership reflected widespread disenchantment — not necessarily capitulation.

Now, faced with the problems of the economy and the energy crisis, Speaker Carl Albert and House Majority Leader Thomas (Tip) O'Neill Jr. will be more concerned with a strong party response to national ills. The newcomers, too, will concentrate on building a good record to carry into reelection campaigns two years hence.

The pressures from the impatient, ambitious malcontents below indicate that the new Congress will be more vigorous — more imaginative. The seasoned legislators will be on their toes.

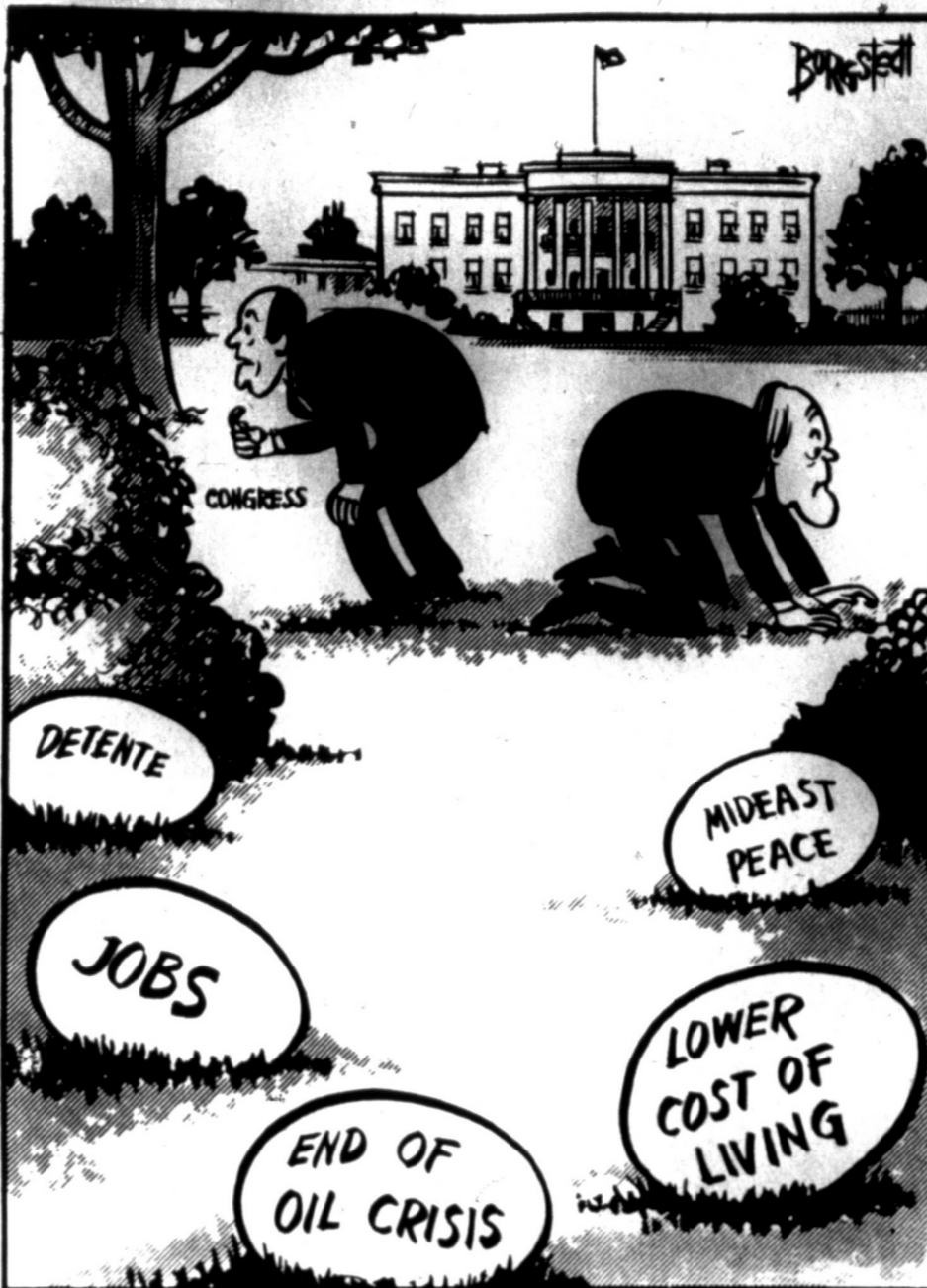

OUR SOVEREIGN RIGHTS  
Resolution To Hold Onto Canal

The resolution Sen Strom Thurmond introduced in the Senate recently, upholding the sovereign rights of the United States over the Panama Canal Zone is an important statement of America's national authority and interest in a strategic region. Thirty-six senators joined in sponsoring this resolution, indicating the feeling in the Senate against relinquishing the Canal Zone to the revolutionary government in power in Panama.

For many months as Sen Thurmond noted, U.S. diplomatic representatives have conducted negotiations with Panama under a cloak of unwarranted secrecy. The senator rightly asserted that the "statement of principles" adopted by Secretary of State Kissinger and the Panamanian foreign minister Feb. 7, 1974 constitute a clear and present danger to the hemispheric security and the successful operation of the canal by the United States.

Secretary Kissinger would do well to take careful note of this resolution. His career as a diplomatic superstar seems to be drawing to an end. His passion for secrecy has not resulted in

tangible benefits for the United States.

Writing in the March issue of THE ALTERNATIVE magazine, Prof. Robert H. Ferrell of Indiana University observes that "Kissinger did not show considerable accomplishments before holding office, nor has he demonstrated very special qualities while in office. At the moment his legacy would seem to amount to a good deal less than greatness and could easily be interpreted as deplorable."

A State Dept. sacrifice of America's national interest in the Panama Canal Zone could be the last straw insofar as Dr. Kissinger's fate is concerned.

The sponsors of the Panama Canal resolution join in pointing out that the American interest is profound. For example, the resolution notes that "approximately 70 per cent of canal traffic either originates or terminates in United States ports, making the continued operation of the canal by the United States vital to its economy."

One of the contentions of the Panamanians is that the United States takes unfair economic advantage of the country in its operation. Has made a total investment in the canal of over \$6.8 billion and that "compensation and correlated benefits have constituted a major portion of the economy of Panama giving it the highest per capita income in all of Central America."

Time and again one hears from advocates of appeasement of Panama that Americans can't expect the Panamanians to accept U.S. control over a strip of land in their country. But the point well made by the sponsors of the Senate resolution is that the U.S. has ownership of the zone "in perpetuity" under a valid treaty.

The 1903 Panama Canal treaty is as valid as the 1867 Treaty of Cession by which the U.S. acquired Alaska from Russia. No one is suggesting that the Alaska treaty is invalid simply because it was signed more than a century ago.

Sen Thurmond deserves the thanks of the public for introducing the Panama resolution. The public also owes a debt of thanks to the co-sponsors of this important national interest resolution.

The co-sponsors are Sens. Allen of Alabama, Bartlett of Oklahoma, Beall of Maryland, Buckley of New York, Byrd of Virginia, Byrd of West Virginia, Curtis of Nebraska, Dole of Kansas, Domenici of New Mexico, Eastland of Mississippi, Fannin of Arizona, Fong of Hawaii, Ford of Kentucky, Garn of Utah, Goldwater of Arizona, Hansen of Wyoming, Hartke of Indiana, Helms of North Carolina, Hollings of South Carolina, Hruska of Nebraska, Johnston of Louisiana, Laxalt of Nevada, Long of Louisiana, McClellan of Arkansas, McClure of Idaho, McIntyre of New Hampshire, Montoya of New Mexico, Morgan of North Carolina, Nunn of Georgia, Randolph of West Virginia, of Virginia, Stone of Florida, Symington of Missouri, Talmadge of Georgia, Tower of Texas and Young of North Dakota.

It is important and instructive to call the roll from time to time. Americans should know the names of their representatives who firmly oppose a surrender of U.S. national sovereignty over part of our country's territory.

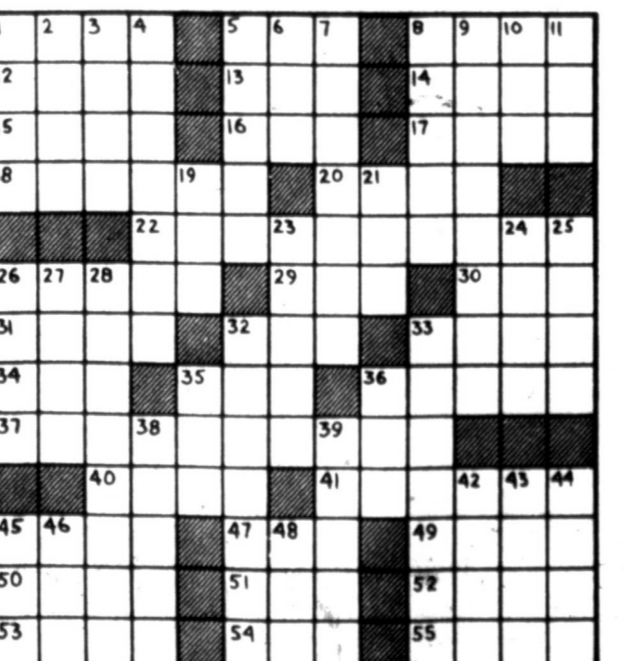

BATTIN' AROUND  
Instability Of Economy  
Triggers Turmoil Period

Thoughts while cleaning off the desk: — A White House study says, according to Associated Press, that "The World's natural resources will not be exhausted in the near future but raw material shortages and economic instability are leading to potential mistrust and conflict among nations. . . . The report said that after two decades of relative economic stability a period of turmoil and uncertainty has developed. . . ."

It might be well to remember that there has always been a plentiful supply of resources, but scarce supplies of goods which are made from them. So why, after a period of relative stability, should we enter a period of mistrust and conflict? Certainly not because of any change in the overall resource supply — But instead, because of the worldwide grasp for power by governments over the people they rule, the resources those people own, and over other nations.

—An environmental writer reports that conservationists have discovered a serious flaw in California's Wild and Scenic River Act. A master plan to guide and control development on the rivers under the act will not be completed before 1978 or 1979.

Meanwhile, lumbering, grazing, and unspecified heavy industrial uses are not prohibited by any law. . . . Not so long ago, I tried to be charitable toward those who would prohibit such worthwhile activities on privately owned lands.

They don't understand that such prohibitions will deprive a person from using his property, and deprive the public from the materials he would produce from it. . . . I thought.

But since closely observing the California scene for several months, I can no longer be tolerant of their apparent ignorance — for I have concluded that those who would prohibit such beneficial uses of property know full well what they are doing. They know that they are confiscating property.

—The boys and girls down at the statehouse decided to work on Monday, Washington's birthday. They get paid \$15 expense money for every day they are in session, provided they don't recess more than four days in a row. Since they recessed the Friday before, they decided to work on Washington's birthday so they could collect \$140 each that they would otherwise "lose."

The following week, the same bunch was criticizing one of its members who appeared on the house floor without coat and tie — seems they are concerned about their public image.

Some commentators were critical of them wasting time arguing how their fellow members should dress. I say, let them go at it — as long as they are arguing about coats and ties, they aren't hurting anybody.

—The National Park Service, it is said, is looking for support for subsistence hunting by natives in proposed national parks in Alaska. Since the current thinking seems to be that national parks are to be kept in their "natural" state, and trends are to prohibit modern conveniences such as automobiles and snowmobiles; then it seems logical that any hunting that may be allowed should be restricted only to bows and arrows, spears, stones, and whatever other primitive weapons the natives of Alaska used before firearms became available to them.

—The California Coastal Zone Conservation Commission has declined to permit the owners of a 54-year old house to tear it down, because it adds a pleasant diversity to the landscape. Well, at least, government is beginning to recognize the attractiveness of diversity — but how attractive will government-imposed diversity be?

—A January front-page headline shouts, "Air of Crisis Looms Over New Congress." Of course, without a crisis, Congress could not justify its existence, so if there is no crisis, it must create one.

What would cause a girl who never wanted for anything, and was raised in a good Christian home to go into a store and steal? Where could she have gotten her criminal tendencies? She is going for counseling today as she refuses to talk to me about it. I pray she can be helped. I want her to grow into a beautiful young woman — inside as well as out.

Have you any words of comfort for me?

DEAR MOTHER: Don't despair. Your daughter won't talk to you about it because she is too ashamed. She knows how deeply she has disappointed you. Young shoplifters do not necessarily have "criminal tendencies." They sometimes steal for the "thrill" of getting away with something, or to impress their peers with their "courage." Professional counselors are trained to help children understand their anti-social behavior, and many young shoplifters have matured into respectable, law-abiding citizens.

DEAR ABBY: Our grandson had to marry his high school sweetheart. They had a beautiful, hurry-up church wedding. We gave them a \$25 check for a wedding present. Six months later they had a baby boy. Everything went along fine for about a year. Then they got a divorce.

A year later, our grandson married a divorced woman who had two small children. That was also a large church wedding. Everything was pale pink. We gave them a \$25 check for a wedding gift. That lasted only seven months.

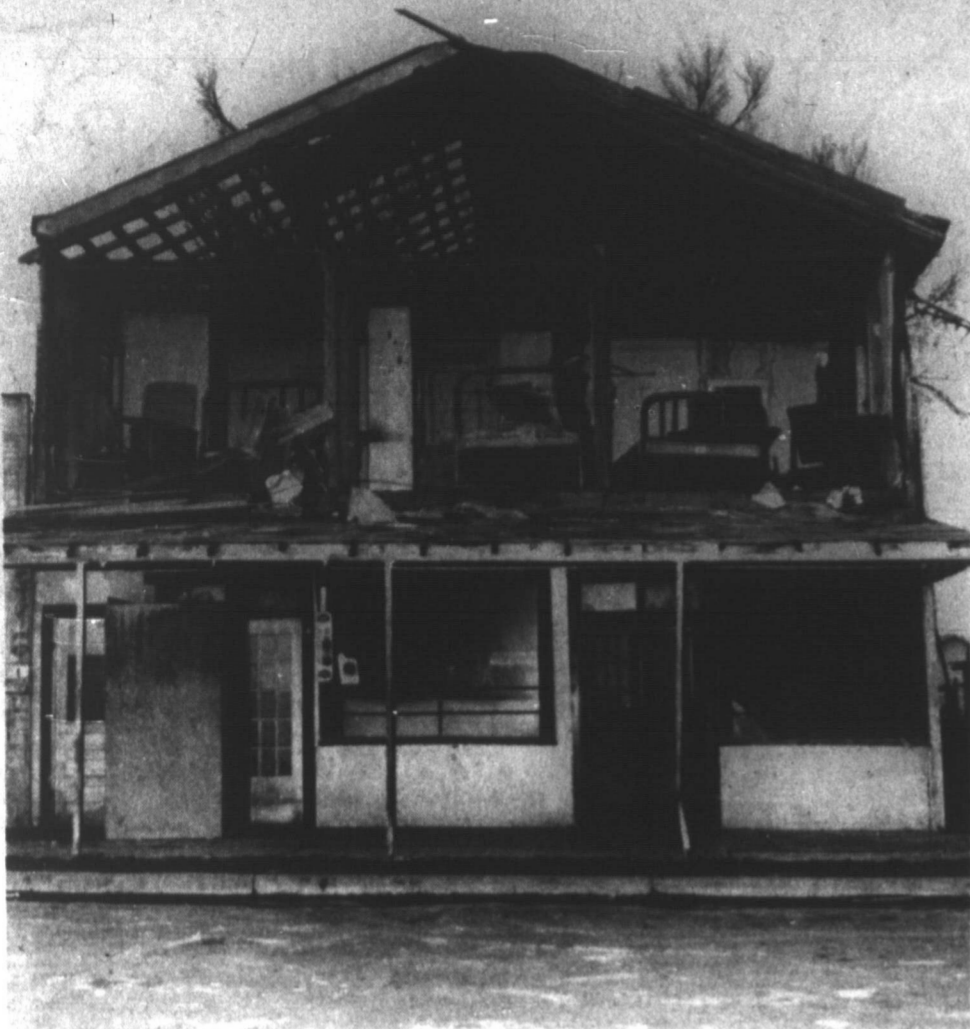
After being single for two years, this same grandson is going to get married again, this time to a young widow who has a small child. We are hoping for the best.

## Lefors Storm Adds to List Of Bad Panhandle Tornadoes

The tornado that hit Lefors early Thursday morning adds another sad chapter to a growing book of Pampa area tornadoes.

On April 30, 1973 a funnel dipped out of a stormy sky that already was dispensing damaging baseball-size hailstones. After touching down in open country west of White Deer, it hit the south portion of the city cutting a swath of destruction and injuring three persons.

On April 19, 1970 a tornado hit the southeast section of Pampa in pre-dawn hours on a Saturday. Utility poles were uprooted, homes were unroofed, business buildings were damaged, trailer houses overturned, the county annex, county barn, state highway department building all destroyed.

But Pampa was lucky. Even with the 15 or so people injured and the \$2 million damage that night, Pampa was lucky.

## Ships Okayed To Carry Grain

HOUSTON (UPI) — Five grain inspectors have been indicted by a federal grand jury on charges of accepting bribes totalling more than \$5,000 to certify ships were acceptable to carry grain.

The indictment, returned Tuesday, alleges the five certified the ships were clean and free of insects without making the required inspection of cargo areas.

UPI incorrectly reported the five were charged with accepting bribes in return for putting acceptable grades on the grain.

The bribes, allegedly in amounts of \$50 to \$500 each time, were made from 1970 to 1974, the indictment said.

The five indicted were Bill Marcey, Billy James Westbrook, Arthur James Taute, Jerry Robert Parker and Billy Ray Davenport.

The same clouds that gave birth to Pampa's damaging tornado spawned too many others to count and spread them across 200 miles of Texas Panhandle. Twenty-two people were killed, hundreds injured and damage was more than \$5 million.

One of the hardest hit of the 11 towns struck was Clarendon where 12 persons were killed in a

## Rio Airways Want Flights Waco-- Houston

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — Rio Airways officials say they're willing to take a chance of providing flights between Waco and Houston despite records showing the route might not be profitable.

Waco would have to supply 9,000 passengers a year to produce a break-even figure of \$245,650 in revenue, said F.E. Howe, general manager of Rio Airways.

But Howe said Thursday Texas International Airlines only carried 1,000 passengers from Waco to Houston last year on flights through Dallas. TIA has been grounded by a strike since December.

TIA flights from Waco to Houston made a stopover at Dallas-Fort Worth.

Rio wants to fly a direct route between Waco and Houston.

## Gov Extends 55 mph Limit

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — Texans will have to drive 55 miles an hour or more slowly for an indefinite period of time.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe signed legislation Thursday extending the 55 mph limit until it is decided the nation no longer needs to conserve the energy expended by traveling at higher rates of speed.

SAIGON (UPI) — Communist forces captured a strategic city on the outskirts of Da Nang today and overran an entire province northeast of Saigon.

The capture of Hoi An, the capital of the province that includes Da Nang, and another provincial capital, Bao Loc, 96 miles northeast of Saigon, gave the Communists control of more than half of South Vietnam and 12 of its 44 provinces.

Bao Loc is the capital of Lam Dong province, which the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese troops now control.

Military sources said the Communists captured Hoi An, a city of 50,000 just 15 miles south of Da Nang, leaving South Vietnam's second largest city wide open to an attack from the south.

The sources said the Communists also seized the provincial capital of Bao Loc, 6 miles northeast of Saigon, bringing all of Lam Dong province under Viet Cong and North Vietnamese control.

The fall of Lam Dong left the Communists in control of 12 of South Vietnam's 44 provinces and more than half the country's territory.

The drive against Da Nang's southern approaches came as the city's 1.5 million residents staged near-riots in desperate attempts to get out.

U.S. officials in Saigon said most Americans have been withdrawn from Da Nang, although Consul General Al Francis and "about four or five others" were still in the city.

Most residents of Hoi An had fled to Da Nang before the Communist attack, joining about 1 million refugees added to the port's normal half-million population.

Military sources said the Communists captured Bao Loc in two hours of fighting after an

intense artillery barrage. Lam Dong, which has a population of 76,693, is at the southern edge of the embattled Central Highlands.

In Da Nang, soldiers without money for food clashed with national police in a series of gunbattles. The soldiers had arrived penniless after retreating from northern provinces abandoned by the government.

A huge swarm of panicky refugees mobbed the runway of Danang's airport today, forcing the United States and South Vietnam to halt air flights to sanctuaries in the south.

Officials said up to 100,000 persons broke through a cordon of troops and raced across the airport in search of flights from Da Nang, the government's last stronghold in northern South Vietnam.

Airport sources said South Vietnamese infantry troops tried without success to control the crowds, finally calling in army tanks when the situation got out of hand.

World Airways, a charter American airline flying the refugees out of Da Nang, called off its Boeing 727 flights until

the government restores order. Air Vietnam canceled all flights from Da Nang, 370 miles north of Saigon, halting the air exodus out of the refugee-swollen city of 1 million.

A World Airways jetliner, capable of holding about 200 refugees on each flight, flew four times Thursday from Da Nang to sanctuaries along the coast of the South China Sea.

Thousands of other persons swarmed over Da Nang's docks today in an attempt to get aboard evacuation ships, including a U.S. civilian vessel and a Philippine naval landing craft.

In Saigon, Gen. Frederick Weyand, the U.S. Army chief of staff, conferred with President Nguyen Van Thieu at the start of a fact-finding visit for President Ford.

Weyand, the last U.S. combat commander in South Vietnam, arrived in Saigon Thursday for up to four days of talks with U.S. and South Vietnamese officials.

U.S. officials said Ford asked the general, the highest-ranking American military man to visit South Vietnam more than two years, to look into the

rapidly deteriorating battlefield situation. Viet Cong and North Vietnamese troops have won a series of major victories during a three-week-old nationwide offensive, emerging with control of 11 of South Vietnam's 44 provinces.

Ky, speaking at a news conference Thursday, threw his support behind an opposition coalition demanding Thieu's resignation. "A new govern-

ment that can be trusted by the people and the soldiers should be formed," he said.

## US Adoption Agency Feeds Viet Orphans

BOULDER, Colo. (UPI) — An international adoption agency is beginning a massive airlift of food to orphans fleeing the North Vietnamese military offensive in Southeast Asia.

"There are 3,000 to 5,000 children right in the city of Saigon who do not have any place to go," Sally Bergner, a spokesman for Friends for All Children, said Thursday. "They are just street children who don't know where their next meal is coming from."

Doris Besikof, another official of the agency, said the airlift will help forestall a food shortage resulting from the communist takeover of the food-producing northern provinces.

"It looks like there may be a food shortage very soon in Vietnam," she said. "The vegetables are grown in the northern provinces and now that they have fallen the children

can't get vegetables. We will use everything we can get."

She said the food will be flown to South Vietnam aboard a commercial airliner. An airline company donated space for 2 1/2 tons of food, she said, but asked its name not be made public.

Mrs. Besikof said the agency was specifically requesting donations of baby food with a soybean base, powdered milk, Jello, tuna fish, oatmeal and Tang, an orange-flavored breakfast drink.

Cash donations will be used to purchase suitable foods for 600 orphans housed in the agency's five homes in Saigon, she said.

Earlier this week, five South Vietnamese children were flown to Denver in an attempt by another adoption agency, Friends of the Children of Vietnam, to accelerate evacuation of orphans from the war-torn nation.

## Prosecutor Exposes Bullet-riddled Blouse

HOUSTON (UPI) — Prosecutor Jerry Sandel, standing between the chemist on the witness stand and the jury of nine men and three women, unfolded the soiled red blouse and exposed the gaping hole left by the powerful gun blast.

After parading a long line of witnesses who testified about the events surrounding a gunbattle ending an 11-day siege at the Texas state prison Aug. 3, 1974, Sandel saved Department of Public Safety toxicologist Leslie Smith for the last. Then the Huntsville Tex.,

prosecutor rested the state's case. Delivering his expert opinion with studied ease Smith told the murder trial of Ignacio Cuevas Thursday two women hostages inside a make-shift shield were shot at point-blank range.

Smith said an examination of the women's clothing indicated bullets from the two .357 magnum revolvers carried by narcotics kingpin Fred Gomez Carrasco and Rudolfo Dominguez were responsible for the deaths of Julia Standley and Elizabeth Beseda.

## Briscoe Outlaws Hit, Run Boat Accidents

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — Happenings in the capitol Thursday.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe announced a free inoculation program against childhood diseases for Cameron, Willacy and Hidalgo Counties in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

There are an estimated 20,000 children under the age of 10 in the three counties who aren't protected against polio, measles, diphtheria, rubella and whooping cough. The inoculation drive, called "All 5 in '75," begins on April 8 and runs through April 20.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White announced cotton farmers have until midnight Monday to plant their crops.

White estimated 95 per cent of the Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr and Willacy area had been planted already. Due to good weather, farmers planted early this season, White said.

The Senate approved and sent to Gov. Dolph Briscoe a bill outlawing hit and run boat accidents. The bill also makes it a crime to ignore a person injured in a boating accident.

The Water Safety Act is necessary, Sen. Betty Andujar.

## Spring Storm Batters Texas; 10-foot Drifts Strands North

A spring storm battered Texas with heavy thunderstorms, hail and high winds for the second day today. A tornado touched down in Cooke County injuring one person.

The Cooke County sheriff's office said the tornado destroyed a trailer in Valley View. The injured man, who was not identified, was taken to a Gainesville hospital.

Sheriff's dispatcher Jerry Devault said the storm blew down power lines in an area about two miles south of Valley View and there were some reports of vehicles being overturned in the area.

The National Weather Service issued a tornado watch for a large portion of North Texas.

Thunderstorms rumbled across almost every section of the state and some light snow was reported in the Panhandle.

Marble sized hail was reported at Clyde near Abilene and golf ball size hail fell in the Sherman-Denison areas.

There were also reports of winds of 60 miles per hour in the Sherman-Denison area.

Civil Defense officials reported winds of 75 to 80 miles per hour Thursday night in Kemper about 60 miles southwest of Waco.

The NWS said the violent weather was being caused by a strong cold front moving southward across Oklahoma and moist, unstable air spreading northward across Texas.

Flash flood watches were issued for the entire area of Texas north of a line from Abilene to Shreveport, La.

The NWS said heavy thunder-

storms with rainfall rates of more than two inches in three hours could be expected the flash flood watch area.

At least two deaths were blamed on the blizzard, which began its assault Thursday and became the third major snowstorm this week in the upper Midwest.

"It's one hell of a mess," a police dispatcher at snowswept Gering, Neb., said. "Nobody's going anywhere."

National Guardsmen and rescue crews took to snowmobiles and four-wheel-drive vehicles in efforts to rescue hundreds of persons stranded in their cars in Nebraska's western panhandle.

One man died of a heart attack while two snowplows which were leading a rescue team to his snowbound farm home near Baynard, Neb. got stuck in the snow. A truck driver was killed in a two-truck collision on a snow-slicked highway near Baldwin, Wis.

All South Dakota state roads were closed, as were all roads leading out of Cheyenne, Wyo. State offices closed in the Dakotas and Wyoming.

Minnesota state police warned against travel in most of the state. Most bus runs were stopped and many Minnesota airports shut down.

Marshall, Minn.—a city of about 10,800—was isolated, with power knocked out and all business closed.

Agriculture officials in Nebraska and Wyoming feared heavy livestock losses.

Nebraska Gov. J. J. Exon issued a disaster declaration as a foot of snow and 60-mile-an-hour winds buried portions of his state under 10-foot snowdrifts.

Blizzard warnings were up in the Dakotas, Wyoming, Kansas and Minnesota and weather and travel warnings were up for 18 states from California to Michigan.

Nearly three feet of snow clogged South Dakota's Black Hills. The storm brought the two-day snowfall total to 56 inches at Wolf Creek pass high in the southern Colorado Rockies.

Operators of western Nebraska truck stops reported "wall to wall" people and communities along drift-clogged highways were packed with blizzard refugees.

Gordon, Neb. Police Chief Bob Case collapsed from exhaustion after trudging less than a mile through the raging snowstorm.

He and two other persons attempting to reach the Terry Johnson home where Johnson's wife, Dianne, was three days overdue with her pregnancy. The would-be rescuers were stranded when two snowplows attempting to lead the rescue party got stuck. The rescue

party found refuge at another farm home, where Case collapsed.

The Johnsons, still stranded, were awaiting the birth of their child today.

"I don't know the first thing about delivering a baby, but if it comes, I'll learn quick," Johnson said.

Tornadoes, raging winds and violent thunderstorms swept the area south of the blizzard zone.

One twister raked Lefors, Tex., Thursday, killing a child and injuring some 50 persons. Some 160 homes and businesses were demolished.

Another tornado swooped down on Omaha, Neb., destroying two homes, damaging 19 others and injuring four persons, none seriously.

A grisly combination of freezing rain, sleet, light snow and hail plagued portions of Iowa and Illinois, causing at least one death and delaying flights at O'Hare International Airport in Chicago.

Ice-glazed roads were blamed for an auto death near Ridgefarm, Ill. Authorities said the driver skidded on the icy pavement, then crashed into a bridge.

## Court Severs Parental Rights Of Walkers

After a two-day hearing, parental rights Thursday were severed from Carolyn Walker, 20, Danny Walker, 22. Their 3-year-old son Emory will, under the order from District Judge Grainger Melhany, be placed for adoption.

Both parents live in Pampa.

## Despite Controversy Ft. Hood May Expand

FT. HOOD, Tex. (UPI)—The commanding general of Ft. Hood says the Army will ask Congress to appropriate funds to purchase the entire 60,000 acres west of the post for a major expansion of the nation's 10th largest military reservation.

Lt. Gen. Robert M. Shoemaker told a small group of affected landowners Thursday the Army has changed its plans from the original request to Congress for \$10 million to purchase about one-third of the acreage. Shoemaker did not estimate how much the entire 60,000 acre acquisition would cost.

Shoemaker said he has sympathy for the landowners who will be displaced by the expansion but his professional duty is to assure his troops the best training "so they can survive and win on the battlefield."

Col. Robert H. Nevins, director of operations, plans and training at Ft. Hood, presented the landowners a slide show of the expansion area. He told them the area is some of the best training land in the country, offering varied terrain—some similar to the Vietnam jungles and some like the terrain in Western Europe.

## Kidnappers Ex Change French Ambassador

PARIS (UPI)—Airplanes carrying the kidnaped French ambassador to Somalia and two prisoners to be exchanged for his release flew today to Aden after South Yemen agreed to organize the switch, government officials said.

A Somali DC3 carrying ambassador Jean Guery, 57, three kidnapers and a Somali diplomat left for Aden from Cairo at the same time, the officials said.

A French military plane with the two released prisoners and \$100,000 in gold left for Aden from Cairo at the same time, the officials said.

French officials said they hoped the exchange would go through now that South Yemen, after changing its position several times, bowed to the kidnapers' requests and France's pleas to let the swap take place in Aden.

Guery's wife, Francoise, said in a telephone call from Mogadishu, Somalia, earlier that her 57-year-old husband and spent an "uncomfortable night" on their plane at a remote airfield near Bosaso.

All aboard were reported in "good, if tired condition."

## Economy: Brightest Reports Since Last Summer's Slide

The nation's long and steep economic slide is easing, and government and private industry indicators point to better days ahead.

In the brightest economic reports since early last summer—

—The government's composite index of nine leading business indicators rose 1 per cent in February. It was the first rise in the economic barometer in seven months.

—Oil imports in February dropped to their lowest level since the 1973 Arab oil embargo. This gave the United States a trade surplus last month of \$971 million, the first since a nominal surplus last November and the biggest on record.

—Retail sales, although still

low, improved last week, rising 3.5 per cent over the prior week and 7 per cent over a year ago. The year-to-year gain was an improvement over the 6 per cent average since Jan. 1.

—U.S. automakers planned for increased production in anticipation of a surge in demand later in the spring and early in the summer. Thousands of idled workers were recalled, and one automaker, Ford, has workers in two plants on overtime.

—The stock market gained ground following reports indicating the recession is easing. The Dow Jones industrial average, which soared 18 points Wednesday, rose 4.07 points to 770.26 Thursday.

—The nation's money supply declined \$1.8 billion to \$286.3 billion this week, but the

growth rate was 1.7 per cent higher than in the past 13 weeks. The growth rate had been decreasing. But many economists say a faster growth needs to be promoted by the Federal Reserve to stimulate economic recovery.

What these developments, along with previous indicators of an easing of price increases, indicate is the nation's economy is beginning to show signs of recovery after more than a year of severe recession and high inflation.

This does not mean the recession has ended. It does indicate the worst may be over. Most economists, including those in the Ford administration, expect industrial production to be sluggish—and unemployment high through most of the year.

Michael Evans, director of Chase Econometrics, said that if President Ford approves the tax rebate soon the "second half of the year will feature a robust upturn of the economy, with growth rates in excess of 5 per cent."

## Court Rules Against FPC

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—The U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals has ruled the Federal Power Commission cannot demand price information on natural gas that never leaves the state of origin until the court can act on an FPC order requiring such information.

Thursday's court ruling temporarily prevents the FPC from monitoring intrastate natural gas sales and price levels.

The court delayed implementation of a Jan. 9 FPC order requiring price information on intrastate natural gas sales, pending arguments before the court.

The FPC only regulates interstate gas, and the Superior Oil Co. and other gas producers challenged its order compelling them to supply details of intrastate sales.

The commission approved the order by a 3-2 vote. Under the order, all independent producers selling at least one billion cubic feet of natural gas a year were required to file periodic reports on a monthly or quarterly basis. The commission said it needed the information to help set prices for interstate gas.

Current information on sales which are not regulated by this commission (intrastate sales) are not reported by any government agency, federal or state, on a comprehensive basis," the order said.

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# Soldier Mourns Wasted Lives

Forrest Lindley wore the U.S. Army green beret for two years, fighting to keep the Central Highlands of South Vietnam free. The jungle earth was his bed. Rice, chicken and an occasional pig were his food. And his friends were the Montagnard hill tribesmen.

His homes were jungle camps around places named Ban Me Thuot, Bu Prang and Tieu Atair. Death, fear, thirst, hunger and fatigue were as much the enemy as the Viet Cong. Lindley, 27, of Washington, D.C., fought for what has fallen five years later to the Communists. He is bitter.

"It makes no sense. They said Americans had to fight and die. Thousands and thousands of people died fighting for that land, and now they just ha! heartedly shrug it off and say it's not important," said Lindley, who now heads the Vietnam Veterans Center, a capital outfit that helps veterans whose minds and bodies are still ravaged by war.

About a million refugees fled six South Vietnam provinces today in a search for safety. Two northern provinces near the border of North Vietnam were the latest to fall. What Americans fought and died for was falling.

And the men who battled half a world away in the tropical rain forests, rice paddies and hills so remote they bore only numbers reacted to the fall with anger.

"The war was stupid and my personal sacrifice was all for nothing," said Jim Anderson, 29, of Pittsburgh.

Wis. "It's not worth it, what happened to me." While on security guard north of Saigon in 1968, Anderson was ripped by an antitank rocket. He lost his right arm, one leg was maimed and he lost part of his hearing.

"I am stuck being a disabled veteran and have no job," he said. "It was a waste of a lot of good lives. Everything we did over there failed."

The women of American fighting men share the bitterness. Barbara Mullen, 40-year-old mother of two boys from Centerville, Mass., is a MIA wife. Her husband, Lt. Col. William Mullen was shot down in 1966 and never heard from again.

"It wasn't worth it," said the tall brunette. "I hope this has taught us something — no more Vietnams! We cannot dictate by force what is happening internally in another country. If we don't learn something from this then it really has been in vain. But maybe if we learn something — even a tiny, tiny bit — some of the sacrifices we've made were worth it."

"But look at all the waste..."

Some of America's fighting best are crippled but proud. Jimmie C. Edwards, 26, is a Texas state legislator from Conroe, and a former Marine. One month after he arrived in Vietnam in 1969, both his legs were blown off by a mortar shell near Ben Hoa.

"I lost a lot of good friends over there and now I walk on two artificial legs. It would be very easy for me to feel sorry for myself, but I had a duty to do for myself and my country," Edwards said. "If they called me back today, I'd

go, because due to the fact I was wounded I left a job unfinished. I never had time to think about the politics of the war because we were just trying to do our job and stay alive. That was the universal idea of men that fought in that war — to do their job and come home."

Former Navy Lt. David G. Rehman, 34, of Garden Grove, Calif., spent six years as a POW in Hanoi. He was one of the best known POWs because his photograph, showing him bandaged and burned and paraded through the streets of Hanoi, was used on posters, pamphlets and matchbook covers by various groups seeking release of U.S. POWs.

"Apparently what we did was in vain," Rehman said of the Communist takeovers in South Vietnam. "I thought the war was totally mismanaged but the cause was noble enough. I have no regrets. That's the way I will always remember it — it was a noble cause."

Air Force Col. Quincy Collins of Marietta, Ga., was a POW in North Vietnam for more than seven years. He ran for Congress in 1974 and lost.

"I have become convinced of one thing — that we did not go over there intending to win," Collins said. "I'm not sure that I believe in the domino theory but I know this: greed is real and the Communists are greedy. They won't stop with South Vietnam and

Cambodia. They want more and more and more."

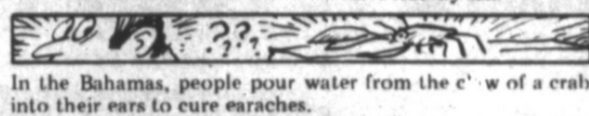

"I'm constantly reminded America is a 'jerlahou,' which means paper tiger in Chinese," Williams said. "We have a big bark and little or no bite when it comes to facing reality. We will be a nation of copouts as far as our Asian allies are concerned if we permit any of the nations we support to fall into the hands of the Communists."

"Apparently we've quickly forgotten the thousands of U.S. personnel killed, wounded or still missing in Southeast Asia in our efforts to secure something we now find was not secured."

Frederick W. Burns of Merrick, N.Y., lost his only son in Vietnam. A Marine doctor told him his son died of malnutrition in a doctor's arms on the second day of 1969.

"We lost over 50,000 men, not to speak of those who survived and are maimed for life, and for what?" Burns said. "In the light of what has happened over there in the last few days; the obvious answer is for nothing. We never should have gone into the damn thing in the first place unless we had gone in there to win. If we had thrown everything in there, the war would have been over in four or five weeks and I would not have lost my son."

HOUSTON (UPI) — The City Council has rejected a proposal to provide unmarried female employees with maternity insurance which would cost the city an extra \$5,700 annually.

Councilman Frank Mann opposed the insurance because of the additional cost and because he said it would encourage

immoral behavior.

The present plan covers only female employees who insure their husbands as dependents at an additional cost. Poppy Northcutt, women's advocate for the mayor's office, said the plan discriminates against all female employees, married or not.

# House Cites Spanish Lobby, Gas Prices

**HIGHER GAS PRICES** — To firmly impress on his colleagues the inevitability of higher gas prices, Dallas Republican Rep. Jim Collins cited gasoline rates now being charged in 35 cities around the world. He told the

House, in remarks on the floor, that the United States has among the cheapest gas prices of any nation in the world, but that situation is bound to change.

Among the prices he quoted on a regular gallon of gas including tax, were the following: Delhi (India) — \$2.00; Sofia (Bulgaria) — \$2.13; Genoa (Italy) — \$1.62;

Tokyo — \$1.55; Mexico City — \$1.63; New York — \$1.50; Moscow — \$1.47.

**HISTORICAL PARK** — Five of the 18th Century Spanish missions in San Antonio are being considered by the National Park Service as a National Historical Park.

Legislative hearings on the proposal might begin by next fall, says Rep. Abraham Kazen, D-Laredo, whose district includes portions of San Antonio.

The proposed park would include the missions of San Juan, Espada, San Jose, Concepcion and San Miguel. The most famous of them all, the Alamo, is already owned by the State and is operated as a historical shrine.

**LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM** — A lobbying organization for Spanish-speaking Americans has disclosed its 1975 legislative goal program, including support for stiffer enforcement of laws against illegal aliens.

The National Congress of Hispanic American Citizens also disclosed that it will work to establish a bilingual court system and to extend the 1965 Voting Rights Act to cover Texas

and other southwestern states.

Support was indicated for a bill sponsored by Rep. Peter Rodino, D-N.J., which would make it unlawful to knowingly hire illegal aliens.

Rep. Barbara Jordan, D-Houston, has submitted legislation extending the Voting Rights Act into all of Texas and four counties in California, in addition to scattered areas in a dozen other states.

A bilingual court system bill has been introduced by Sen. John Tunney, D-Calif., with simultaneous Spanish-English translations of proceedings for non-English speaking defendants.

## Want Their Tired, Poor To Shape Up

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI) — Members of a Senate committee complained Wednesday the legislative pages are in poor condition and tire too easily and decided to retain some form of mandatory physical education in Oklahoma schools.

The House bill would have abolished mandatory physical education but the committee decided to require physical education 75 minutes a week.

Under present law, students in the first through ninth grades are required to attend physical education classes 150 minutes a week.

Sen. Norman Lamb, R-Enid, who wanted to keep the present law, said children have become

so soft it becomes a crisis if they have to walk to school.

"One of the tragedies you see are the young people who come down here as pages and get exhausted just walking around the capitol," he said.

Sen. Jim Hamilton, D-Poteau, said parents don't make children work any more. He said physical education is needed to replace waning parental influence.

"About all we do is make sure the TV isn't on the blink so they can stretch out on the floor and watch it," he said.

"Physical education is needed for the health of our younger generation."

## ERA Loses Chance In '75

COLUMBIA, S.C. (UPI) — The South Carolina House has tabled the Equal Rights Amendment, effectively killing it in that state. The action virtually ends any chance the ERA will become part of the U.S. Constitution this year.

Thirty-four states have ratified the amendment. The ERA requires the approval of two thirds of the states, or 38, before 1979 to become part of the Constitution.

Only three states — Missouri, Florida and North Carolina — are actively considering it this year.

But supporters of the amendment, which would prohibit laws and legal practices which discriminate by sex, haven't entirely given up hope for this year. Mary Brooks, ERA expert for the League of Women Voters, conceded only that ERA is "unlikely" to be ratified in 1975.

Today's deal is a real tough one to play correctly. When the hand actually arose our South declarer incurred a one trick set. In the post-mortem analysis it was revealed that the contract could have been fulfilled if declarer had made an "abnormal" play at trick one.

Neither side vulnerable. South deals.

North's two-club response was the initiation of the Stayman Convention. The rest of the bidding was natural.

On West's opening lead of a low spade, East put up the king, which South captured with his ace. He then led the jack of clubs. East's king winning. East returned his remaining spade, and South's jack fell to West's queen. West played back the spade nine. That trick being won by the board's ten-spot.

The queen of clubs was laid down next. West winning the trick with his ace. West then proceeded to cash two spade tricks. Thus declarer lost three spades and two clubs. To incur a one-trick set.

In the analysis that followed it was pointed out that the contract could have been fulfilled if declarer should have declined to have captured East's king of spades at trick one. Instead he should have played the spade jack. In making this play, superficially he would be throwing away a spade trick since if he took the king with the ace, he would always be certain of winning a second spade trick with either his jack or dummy's ten.

Had East's king of spades been permitted to win the first trick

East would have returned his remaining spade. South taking it with his ace. A club would then be led, with East's king winning. Since East would have no spade to play back, a heart or a diamond return would be won by South.

Another club lead would then be made, driving out West's ace. Since dummy would still retain the doubleton 10-6 of spades, West could do no more than to cash his queen of spades. With dummy's club suit now established, the contract would be assured.

By playing the hand as recommended, declarer's only loser would have been two spade tricks and two clubs. But it is quite difficult to censure declarer for his actual play of winning the first spade trick with his ace.

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
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# Does Devil Sow Seeds in Religion?

The recent flurry of interest in the occult, satanism and demonology just might have been the work of the devil.

Just might have been, that is, if one believes that a major aim of the devil is to sow seeds of confusion among the faithful. During the height of the occult fad—perhaps symbolized most dramatically by the long lines for and widespread discussion of the movie "The Exorcist"—there was a lot of confusion among the faithful.

In response to requests from church members, the Council on Theology and Culture of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. has attempted to clear up some of the confusion.

They asked the Rev. Shirley Guthrie of the Columbia Theological seminary in Decatur, Ga., to prepare a paper on "The Problem of a Personal Devil and Demons."

Approved by the council, the paper will now go to the denomination's general assembly in June as information for distribution.

Guthrie's paper begins with the Biblical view that acknowledges "the reality of powers of evil" but also points out that neither the Bible nor the confessional literature of the Reformed tradition, of which Presbyterianism is a part, "gives us a developed satanology or demonology."

The heart of the paper deals with the question of whether the devil and demons should be thought of as literal, personal realities or be viewed in more symbolic terms.

Any interpretation of evil in terms of personal powers, the paper says, must be measured by four Biblical-theological criteria:

—"Acceptance of the reality of a personal devil and demons must never be used to excuse or justify human sinfulness."

— Emphasis on demonic possession of individuals must not be exclusive of the New Testament's emphasis on "principalities and powers" at work in social and political bodies and processes.

—Interest in the devil "must not become so central and intense" that demonic powers are "consciously or unconsciously assumed to be equal" to God.

—"Any reality as persons attributed to the devil and demons must be distinguished from the reality of God and from the existence of human beings as persons."

The symbolic interpretation, Guthrie says, may be legitimate "so long as it is not in fact an attempt to explain away the reality of evil but a serious attempt to understand it at a deeper level."

"Modern history has taught us," the paper says, "...that whether or not evil is itself personal, it can be horribly personalized in political, military, scientific and religious leaders and groups of people who support them and are influenced by them."

Perhaps most importantly, the paper suggests that the Biblical view of devils is "not primarily to attack individuals for their own sake but to hinder the work of Jesus."

In the New Testament view, the paper says, "Satan and demonic powers are at work everywhere, but their work is especially concentrated where God in Christ through the Church is at work."

Beyond that, however, every person should uphold and participate in the Church because it tells the truth about man's life, death and destiny; the truth which alone will set him free to live as a child of God.

## Colson Commitment Deeper After Prison

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Charles Colson says his commitment to Christ has deepened since his conversion and the seven months he spent in prison for his Watergate sins.

He says he has no specific plans for the future other than to spend as much time as he can "with the fellowship" and work for prison reform. He has no desire to return to any part of his old life.

Once a \$200,000-a-year corporate lawyer and one of Richard Nixon's closest advisers, Colson was interviewed Monday in the basement of his Tudor home in suburban McLean, Va. An autographed picture of Nixon hung beside his desk.

He wore a heavy knit white sweater and a pair of sneakers. For two hours he talked, sipping coffee—formerly it would have been Scotch on the rocks—and puffing on a pipe or a cigarette. At one point, he sardonically referred to himself as "the ex-White House hatchet man."

He said he feels he was burned in his one and only other interview since leaving prison in January when he quoted Nixon as having said Secretary of State Henry Kissinger was unstable. Now he

refuses to speak publicly about Nixon or Watergate. It obviously is on his mind.

"I don't... know of any bombshell that hasn't exploded," Colson said when asked if the full truth of Watergate is known.

He pulled out several bulging files that were the basis of a book on Nixon that would be "as straight as I know how to make it—the good and the bad." He has shelved it. "I'll finish it someday," he said. "It's not the right time for it now."

Colson says he has told all he knows to the Watergate special prosecutor and the Rockefeller CIA commission. He is linked at reports he has withheld information.

Few if any aides were as close to Nixon as Colson. His book could disclose intimate details about the former president during the firing of Special Prosecutor Archibald Cox, the resignation of Vice President Spiro Agnew, the selection of Gerald Ford and Nixon's resignation.

Colson meets regularly with the politically heterogeneous prayer group that has nurtured him since his 1973 conversion—former Sen. Harold Hughes of Iowa, a liberal Democrat; Rep. Al Quie of Minnesota, a moderate Republican; former Rep. Graham Purcell of Texas, a Southern Democrat, and Douglas Coe, a staff member of the prayer breakfast movement. He hopes to work part-time with Hughes and Coe in the work of the movement.

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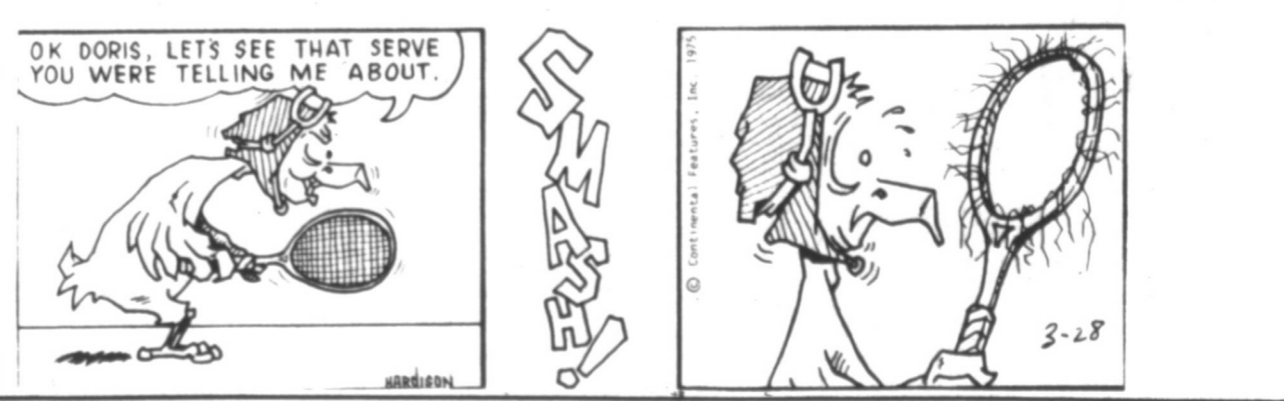
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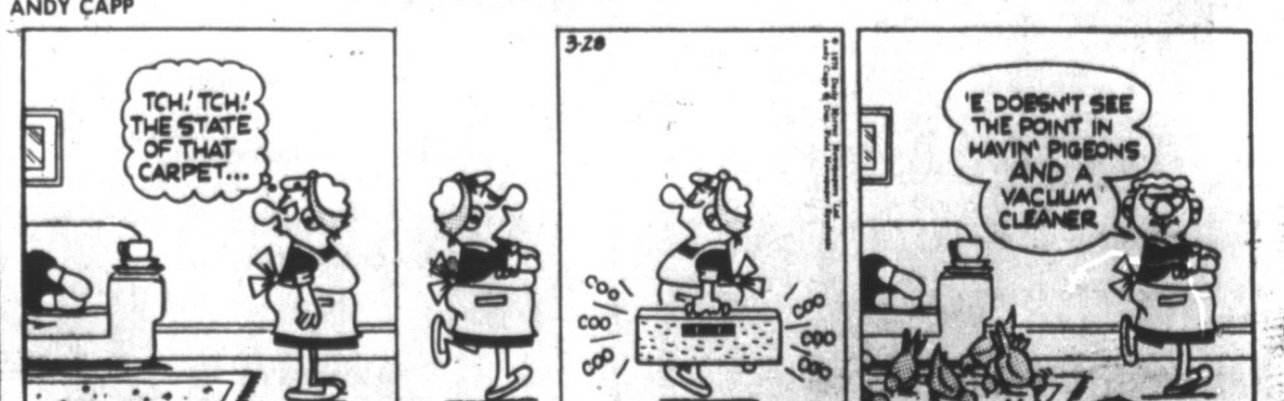
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# UCLA Picked As NCAA Drama Begins

SAN DIEGO (UPI) — UCLA, with a bruise resting on the sidelines, will wear the familiar favorite's mantle when the NCAA basketball championship semifinals unfold Saturday with the Bruins going against Louisville, and Kentucky, the team that knocked off the No. 1-rated Hoosiers, pitted against unheralded Syracuse.

America Dave Meyers, are used to, having won an incredible nine national championships in the past 11 seasons. Kentucky, 25-4, will face Syracuse, 23-7, at 12:10 p.m. PDT in the first semifinal game followed by a meeting of UCLA, 26-3, and Louisville, 27-2, at 2:10 p.m. Both games will be on national television (NBC). The finals are scheduled at

6:10 p.m. Monday at the San Diego Sports Arena. "We spent a lot of emotion in the Indiana game," said Joe Hall, the man who succeeded the legendary Adolph Rupp as

Kentucky's head coach three years ago. "By Saturday, I hope our players can get down to earth." In the final regular season ratings, Indiana was ranked first, UCLA second, Louisville third, and Kentucky fourth. Syracuse's Orangemen were not even among the top 20. Beaten by Indiana by a devastating 24 points in December, Kentucky sent Bobby

Knight's Indiana team — heavily favored to go all the way in the 37th NCAA — home by scoring a 92-90 win in the Midwest Regional finals at Dayton, Ohio. The UCLA-Louisville confrontation rates as the No. 1 attraction Saturday and matches the 64-year-old Wooden, the teacher, versus the pupil, the Cardinals' Denny Crum. In the NCAA semifinals at

Los Angeles in 1972, Wooden's Bruins beat Crum's Cardinals, 96-77. "If I had my druthers," said Wooden, now in his 27th season at UCLA, "I'd rather not play against a former player or assistant or very close friend. You're closer to your own children. To me, Denny will always be one of my boys."

Added Crum, "Yes, I'd rather be playing somebody else, too. But we don't have any choice in that. Just like three years ago, I can't let my feelings interfere with my team's approach to the game. We have to get ready for UCLA just like we get ready for anybody else."

Making its 22nd appearance in NCAA postseason basketball play — compared to UCLA's 18th — Kentucky will be looking for its fifth championship, but first since 1958. All four titles came under Rupp, now an executive with the Kentucky Colonels of the American Basketball Association.

"It was a rebound. I happened to be on the left side and shot into an almost open net. It came in the second period, but the game ended in a 3-3 tie with Toronto. I wrote 15 letters home. That's why I remember it."

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**Hendrix Rediscovered**

**Warehouse Yields Album**

Nearly a year ago, word of a new "discovery" of quality-recorded Jimi Hendrix material swept the music industry. The hundreds of multitrack tapes had been stored for years in a New Jersey warehouse. They had been virtually forgotten, except by Alan Douglas, the man who had been working with Hendrix as producer just before rock's premier guitar virtuoso died in 1970.

Warner Bros. Records, Douglas began working with the warehouse tapes last June. The first results of those labors are included in a new Hendrix album, "Crash Landing" (Reprise MS-2204). This album is the first of at least three — and possibly as many as five — quality new Hendrix releases that will be appearing over the next couple of years. The emphasis here is on "quality" — because all but an isolated handful of tracks from the four previous posthumous Hendrix LPs have been inferior junk.

exception of the original "Are You Experienced?" album, this may be the best Hendrix set ever released. Douglas has done a flawless production job, laying down new rhythm tracks behind Hendrix' guitar and voice. The playing time on this album is short — less than 30 minutes — but it is 1774 seconds of pure delight for any Hendrix fan.

Although she plays a fractious maid in the series, Hermione knew a day when she had a houseful of servants herself. She was once married to the second son of Lord Glenconner.

Her husband, the Honorable David Tennant, died in 1967. They had been divorced years earlier. He remarried, divorced again, and was courting Hermione once more when overtaken by a heart attack. They were parents of a daughter, now Lady Rumbald, who lives in Dorset, England. Their son, David, lives in Spain. Hermione is a four-time grandmother who visits the youngsters when time allows. Her sister, Angela, who lives in London, plays the cook in the British television series "Upstairs, Downstairs." Hermione lives in the Hollywood Hills but spends almost as

much time in London. She bought her 25-year-old California house last July. It has two bedrooms, a swimming pool and a lush garden. The decor is a mixture of contemporary and antique furniture. She is particularly fond of an old desk, brought over from England, which reposes in her bedroom. Most of the time Hermione shares her home with Lady Ashton-Smith (Joan), a friend of a quarter century. In London she lives in Joan's spacious apartment. A young male college student takes care of household tasks and a chauffeur drives the actress to and from work each day. Joan and Hermione do the shopping and cooking themselves, including preparations for large, frequent and boisterous parties of the Auntie Mame variety. "We are famous for our parties," Hermione says. Joan generally fixes breakfast and dinner which consists primarily of vegetables and salads. "I think great chunks of meat are barbaric," says Hermione. "But I do like fish and lobster." When Hermione prepares the fare is often

## Nader Accuses Mailmen Of Spying On His Mail

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Ralph Nader Thursday insisted despite official denials that the Postal Service has placed a "mail cover" on his Public Citizen Litigation Group in violation of confidential lawyer-client relationships.

Postal Service regulations prohibit postal surveillance being applied to a person and his lawyer. Nader said in this case the mail cover, in effect, has been placed on the lawyer himself.

Postal Service regulations describe a mail cover as the process by which a record is made of any data appearing on the outside of any class of mail, including the checking of the contents of any second, third or fourth class mail.

Normally, they are requested by law enforcement agencies

The regulations limit them to protecting national security, locating a fugitive or obtaining evidence for criminal prosecutions.

Nader's group is involved in law suits against a wide range of government agencies and a mail cover could give government lawyers unfair advantages. Nader said in a news conference.

The Postal Service, which had told Nader in earlier correspondence that it had no record of an authorization for a mail cover on his group, repeated that denial in a public statement issued after Nader's news conference.

The Postal Service stated at that time (in a letter to Nader March 4) and states again that it has no record of maintaining any mail covers on mail addressed to those groups or individuals named in the (Nader) request for information, the Postal Service said.

This time the Postal Service added. There is also no reason to believe any unauthorized mail covers have been conducted.

Nader said that while he had no proof, there have been a series of misdeliveries of batches of mail since last September that he believes can only be explained by the existence of a mail cover.

Nader said he has appealed

under the Freedom of Information Act for a more extensive Postal Service check. He said if the response is not satisfactory he will bring suit under the act to get a full disclosure and also will sue for damages on grounds that his constitutional rights have been violated.

### Rockets Halt US Lifeline To Cambodia

PHNOM PENH (UPI) — Rebel forces fired a barrage of artillery and rocket rounds at Phnom Penh's airport today, halting the lifeline U.S. airlift to the besieged Cambodian capital.

Military sources said the insurgents fired at least 28 shells at Pochentong Airport this morning, killing two persons and wounding two.

U.S. officials suspended the civilian-piloted airlift because of the intense insurgent fire after the first cargo planes of the day managed to land with supplies of food, fuel and ammunition at dawn.

American officials said the security situation at the airport was being carefully studied to determine whether the airlift could be resumed.

U.S. airlift planes flew a total of 37 flights into Pochentong Thursday, bringing rice from South Vietnam and fuel and ammunition from Thailand.

## Bill To Require Gas Price Sign

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — If Texans realized how much they are paying for gasoline, they might not drive so much, says Rep. Ronald Coleman, D-El Paso.

So Coleman is pushing legislation forcing gasoline stations to let customers know in advance how much each gallon of fuel is costing. The House tentatively approved the bill Thursday, and will vote on it again Tuesday after returning from a long Easter weekend recess.

Coleman's bill requires gasoline stations to post their prices for each grade of gasoline on signs big enough to allow motorists to read them from the road.

"A lot of people don't even pay any attention, they just hand the guy a card and don't look at the bill until the end of the month," Coleman said. "This may even conserve energy. Heck, if people see how much their gasoline is costing per gallon, it'll maybe bring to their mind they ought not be driving so much."

Coleman said California has a

similar law which even specifies the size and color of the signs.

"I like to know the prices before I pull in," Coleman said. "If it spurs competition maybe we'll get lower prices."

In Senate action Thursday, supporters of Gov. Dolph Briscoe's plan to combine the Mass Transportation Commission with the state Highway

Department won a 20-9 vote to bring the bill up for debate.

"It'll be statutory rape of the cities and mass transportation will be the illegitimate offspring," said Sen. Jack Ogg, D-Houston, who supports an independent mass transportation agency.

"The present department is totally highway oriented. We don't feel mass transportation

will ever be given a fair shake and get its fair share of the money (under Briscoe's proposal)," Ogg said.

Senators adjourned for the weekend without voting on the issue because opponents threatened prolonged debate.

It will be at the top of the list of bills to be considered when senators return to work Monday afternoon.

## Alert Policeman Catches FBI Wanted Woman Saxe

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Susan Edith Saxe is a one-time college honors student who was on the FBI's "10 Most Wanted" list for a record five years. Her days as a fugitive ended because of policeman Joseph Reid's memory for faces.

Miss Saxe dropped out of sight after she, Katherine Power and three men allegedly held up a Boston bank and shot a policeman to death in 1970. Thursday night, Reid saw her walking along a city street and recognized her from a new FBI photograph and description.

He pulled over and asked for identification. When she tried to run away, he said, he arrested her and took her to jail.

Miss Saxe, 26, was using the name "Ailene A. Helman," but

police said they identified her by fingerprints. "We did not know she was in this area," an FBI spokesman said. "Fortunately, the officer was very alert."

Miss Saxe, of Albany, N.Y., and Miss Power, of Denver, Colo., were on the FBI's "Most Wanted" list longer than any other women. Miss Power is still at large.

They are accused of helping three men hold up the State Street Bank & Trust Co. in Boston Sept. 23, 1970, and shooting to death a policeman during the holdup. The three men were caught, but the girls escaped.

Miss Saxe, described as once a shy and quiet girl, first attended Syracuse University and then transferred to Bran-

deis University in Waltham, Mass. There she... became friends with Miss Power. They were described as good students who both won awards for scholastics and community service.

Then, authorities say, the two met three men. It was the height of the anti-Vietnam protest movement during the American invasion of Cambodia in 1970. The FBI says the five formed an urban guerilla unit.

They say the girls were involved in a number of crimes with the men, including the robbery of a government armory and the theft of armament.

The two women also are charged with bank robbery in Philadelphia.

## Prison Inmate Nominated For Heroism

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — A prison employe and an inmate have been nominated for national heroism awards for their attempts to free hostages during a Huntsville escape attempt last summer.

The Texas Council on Crime and Delinquency said Thursday Lt. Willard Stewart and inmate David Robles were nominated by state director John Albach for the Carl M. Loeb Jr. 1974 Citizen Valor Award.

Fred Gomez Carrasco and two other inmates held 12 hostages for 11 days in the Huntsville prison and tried to escape in a shootout with law officers. Carrasco, one other inmate and two women hostages were killed during the attempt.
