Whitharral Takes 50-14 Win

Coyotes fight to the end against State's number One team

Coach Bobby Avery doesn't shy away from tough scheduling.

He even puts his old alma mater, consistently ranked as one of the state's top six-man football teams, on his calendar each year.

The results on paper—this time a 50-14 loss—may seem overwhelming, but that's why news stories are written to give the rest of the story.

Consider these facts from last Friday's game: the Coyotes passed for 135 yards against the state's number one defense; they rushed for only 46 yards, but that was without T.J. Sharp (averaging 10 yard a carry this year) who went out on the third play of the game with an injury to his arm; they trailed only 30-8 at half-time, thanks to a great defensive stand led by Dan Griffin's sack right before half-time; the Coyotes held Whitharral four times on fourth-down conversion attempts; they Whitharral collared four times behind the line of scrimmage with aggressive rush.

Now, none of those facts adds up to a victory, but it does indicate that the Coyotes can play ball with the best team in the state.

Had it not been for another fact—that the Coyotes suffered three fumble losses and one game interception—the could have been much closer than the score indicates.

Sharp, though not involved in the fumble, injured his arm while trying to dive back for the

ball. (reports from weekend visits to the doctor reveal that he has a severe sprain in the arm but may be able to play this Friday against Loraine.)

After the turnover, the Coyotes are without their silent workhorse and find themselves trying to hold off Whitharral in the Coyotes' end of the field—all of this with only seconds off the clock.

At this point, many Coyote fans and probably Panther fans were thinking this night would then proceed easily for the number one team. Those fans were mistaken as the Coyotes bowed up and held the Panthers, forcing two incomplete passes—thanks in part to some relentless pass rushing by Raul Rodriguez.

The Coyotes met adversity on this first test and came out on top as they held Whitharral on 4th down on the Coyotes' 18-yard line.

Fumbles on the ensuing Coyote drive prevented any momentum for BHS, and Jacob Zant's second punt of the quarter was returned by the Panthers for a touchdown.

The first period would end with the Coyotes attempting to mount a drive as Zant to Rodriguez 35-yard pass play put BHS in Panther territory for the first time.

A sack and interception stopped this drive as Whitharral led at the end of the first ten minutes of play, 16-0.

The Coyote defense, however, was not going to concede anything as they held Whitharral on its first possession of the second quarter.

Cody Nowlain broke up a pass, and Dale Grant made a crushing tackle on a pass play to hold off the Panthers.

The next possession for the Coyotes was aided by an interference call against the Panthers.

Nowlain then made a leaping catch of Grant's pass in the endzone to finally get the Coyotes on the board at 7:07. Kyle Pinkerton's PAT kick was good to cut the Panthers' lead in half, 16-8.

Despite great defensive plays by Pinkerton and Talin Pepper (sacked a Panther runner for a 2-yard loss) on Whitharral's next drive, the Panthers were able to score twice in the second quarter to make it a 30-8 lead.

They hoped to cushion that margin right before intermission as the Coyotes fumbled once again, giving the Panthers one more opportunity.

When Griffin and the rest of the Coyote pack entered, BHS fought off the Panthers' attempts to punch it into the endzone as time ran out in the half.

Still, Whitharral showed why they are ranked number one as they came out strong in the second half, scoring quickly on two pass plays to take a 38-8 lead.

Rodriguez returned the kickoff 34 yards and fumbled, but Pinkerton pounced on it to keep possession for the Coyotes.

Grant would find Nowlain again, this time for a 20-yard gain and set up what would be the Coyotes' final score.

With 5:54 remaining in the third quarter, Zant would hit Pinkerton on a one-yard strike to give BHS its last six points of the evening. The PAT attempt was blocked.

Though the Coyote offense was essentially through for the evening, the defense continued to stay focused as they would hold Whitharral twice more on downs.

Pinkerton and Rodriguez both led the way with hurries and sacks in the final half, but the Panthers scored twice more, once in the air and once on the ground.

The win for the Panthers was only the second time this year that they have played the full game. All others have been called on account of the 45-point six-man margin rule.

The Coyotes fall to 2-3 with the loss, but begin a clean slate with district play this week.

BHS travels to Loraine for a 7:30 p.m. kickoff in their district opener.



The Immigrant Comes Home

Civic Theater came in the mail some weeks ago. It was advertising an upcoming play called The Immigrant about Haskell Harelik, a Russian Jewish immigrant who arrived in Galveston in 1909 and became a successful merchant in central Texas. He lived in Hamilton.

The flyer triggered something inside me, but I couldn't quite figure out just what, so I laid the advertising piece aside. Every time I sat at my desk, I saw it. Then one day the spark of recognition struck me. I had interviewed Haskell Harelik back in 1975.

I had also heard about the play, of course. It was written in the mid 80's by Haskell's grandson, Mark and in 1989 was the most produced play written by an American author. Mark Harelik is an actor with an impressive amount of television appearances on shows like Wings, Seinfeld and Diagnosis Murder. His movie credits include Star Trek Jurassic Park III.

I called the theater and made reservations. I had a choice of buying a ticket just for the play or I could buy a higher priced ticket that included a dinner. I chose the latter. The dinner was to be at a café called the Hen House.

We arrived in Hamilton a half-hour before the dinner started. We went by the theater and then drive around the corner to the Hen House Café. It's in an old Quonset hut and from the outside looks like something from the war years. Susan asked sadly, "is that where we're going to eat?" I said, "Yet."

We toured around the

A flyer from the Hamilton pretty little town of Hamilton (population 3,000), then went to get our tickets. We walked into the Hen House and had a very pleasant surprise. It looked like the Dallas Country Club, complete with silver, linen and crystal. We sat on a porch overlooking a creek with pecan cottonwood trees. The café was full of well-dressed theater patrons.

The meal was prepared by Dorothy Harelik, mark's mother. Her husband, Milton (Haskell's son) helped. Both Dorothy and Milton recognized me and made us feel right at home.

The meal included borscht, matzo balls, roast beef with new potatoes, a hot brandied fruit compote, green beans almandine, braided bread with honey butter (challah) and Strawberry-filled blintzes. Amazing.

The play was in the Texan

Theater, a newly restored structure that is a point of pride for Hamilton residents.

David and Del Thatcher, husband and wife, played the parts of Haskell and Leah Harelik. No small task, since about ten- percent of the play is in Yiddish or Hebrew and both parts require strong accents throughout the play. David and Del were superb. The other cast members were Mike Lovell and Debbie Roberts, who gave outstanding performances as a Baptist banking couple who took in Haskell when he first arrived in Hamilton.

The play tells how Haskell went from selling bananas for a penny each to becoming an entrepreneur and civic leader in Hamilton.

The play premiered in Denver in 1985 and has been performed in New York, Los Angeles and major cities all across the United States. This was the first time it was in Hamilton.

Packing a Safe School Lunch

The school lunch that children take to school maybe the reason they come home stomach cramps, diarrhea, or even vomiting. Their illness might actually be caused by a "food bug" instead of a "flu bug."

Sometimes we forget that packing a lunch that will be stored at room temperature and eaten many hours later requires special precautions. Harmful bacteria that cause foodborne illness grow best room temperature. Temperatures between 40 and 140 F, also known as the "danger zone," can cause these harmful bacteria to multiply and cause illness.

Bacteria that cause foodborne illness need moisture, the right temperature, a food source like protein, and time. Any moist protein food is especially susceptible. Foods that are handled a lot during preparation pose an extra risk because bacteria from hands can spread to them. These foods include protein salads such as ham, chicken, or egg.

To avoid spreading harmful bacteria to food, maintain a clean area when preparing sack lunches. Make sure utensils, hands, work areas, and food containers are clean. Remember to wash the lunch box or thermos after each use. If using a paper bag, use a bag made for food. Do not use grocery bags because they may be contaminated from insects or food leakage.

Keep could lunch foods cold. Store lunches in a refrigerator. If one is not available, insulated lunch boxes keep foods colder than paper bags. A freezing gel, ice, or frozen drink placed in an insulated lunch box will keep food chilled. Advise children to place their lunch in a cool place out of direct

sunlight.

Keep hot lunch foods hot. Use a thermos for hot foods such as chili, soups and stews. Use a clean thermos with a tight lit. Rinse the thermos with boiling water and pour steaming hot food into the thermos. The food should still be hot at lunch time.

If you choose to pack lunchmeat sandwiches, make sure to keep them cold. When purchasing lunchmeat, pay close attention to "use-by" dates. These products can harbor bacteria that can grow slowly, even at refrigerator temperatures.

Plan a menu of properly prepared and healthy foods. Foods that look or smell sour may be contaminated with bacteria that cause foodborne illness. Don't pack leftovers that have been in the refrigerator for an extended time and don't re-pack perishable lunch items that have not been eaten. Throw them away.

Foods that don't need to be kept hot or cold are a safe choice when there is no cold storage to keep foods chilled. These foods include peanut butter; dried products such as beef jerky; non-perishable cheese and cheese spreads; canned products that can be opened and eaten immediately such as meat, poultry, and seafood; fresh fruits and vegetables; and breads, cereals, and nuts. Ready-toeat foods in individual servings such as puddings or canned fruits make a nice addition to sack lunches.


