

Clean-up To Launch May 5

Pampa's annual clean-up, paint up, fix up campaign will be launched Monday, May 5, and run through May 30.

The Chamber of Commerce Fire Prevention and Safety Committee in a Friday meeting designated May as Clean Up Month and scheduled the following dates for trash pickups in the city's four wards:

Ward 1 - May 5-9; Ward 2 - May 12-16; Ward 3 - May 19-23 and Ward 4 - May 26-30.

R.B. Cooke, city public works director, said his department would be working full force during the month.

Cooke requested home owners to begin now cleaning up their

premises and place trash in the alleys in advance of the pick up week in each of the city's four wards.

Homer Thomas, committee chairman, said the theme of this year's clean up campaign will be "Pitch In," a national program started by the American Brewers Association.

N.D. Morrison of the Budweiser Distributing Co. Borger, met with the group and announced his company will furnish all outdoor advertising and handout publicity materials for the local campaign.

Special committees were named to handle various details of the month-long program.

R.B. Cooke, Floyd Sackett, Lee Fraser, Kirk Duncan, Cal Barbaree, Ab Conway and Homer Thomas were assigned to general publicity.

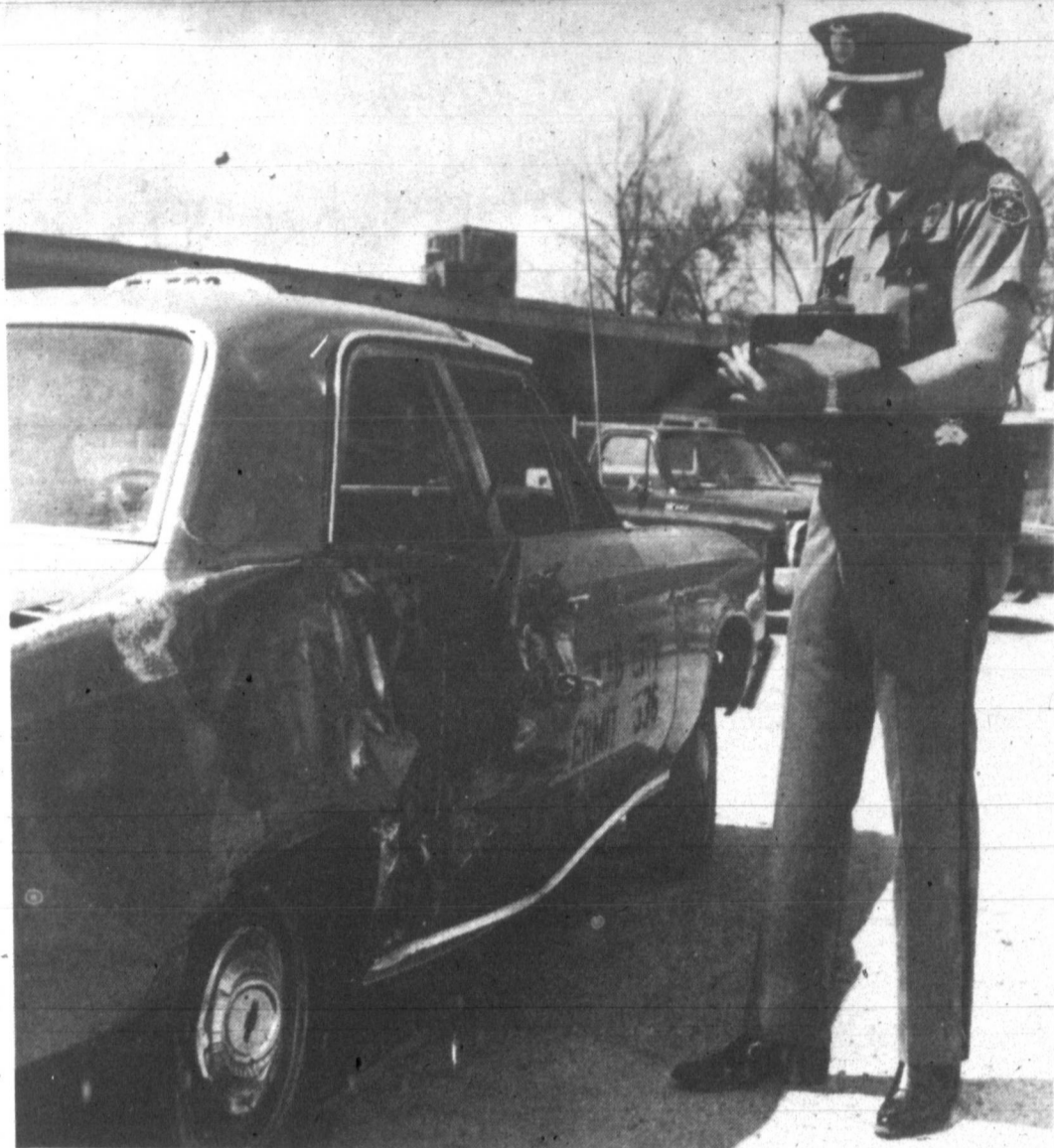
Service club announcements and handout material will be

Commissioners Slate Flood Insurance Talk

City commissioners will be asked at their regular meeting Tuesday to approve a resolution authorizing an application for Pampa's participation in the National Flood Insurance Program.

Pampa was cited as one of more than 300 Texas communities that had not joined in the program to make residents eligible for federal flood insurance at subsidized rates.

City Manager Mack Wofford said while it was doubted there was real danger of damaging flood waters in what the government had designated as flood-prone areas in the city, there possibly were other advantages that would accrue from participation in the program.

Junior High Students Compete in Spanish Exam

Twenty-five Spanish students from Pampa Junior High School recently competed in the National Spanish Examinations at West Texas State University in Canyon.

The examinations, given annually by the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese, were administered to high school and junior high Spanish students from Tulia, Amarillo, Canyon, Spearman, Bovina, Friona and Spearman.

Separate examinations were given for levels I, II, III, and IV. There also were three classifications of students. Those with experience only in classroom or school are in the regular classification. Students with a Spanish surname who are not native speakers and those with limited experience abroad are classified special.

The native classification included natives of Spanish-speaking countries or those who are fluent in the language.

Testing areas included reading comprehension and

usage.

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Judge Okays Pretrial News

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) - A district judge has refused to stop the news media from reporting on a pretrial hearing on evidence implicating Robert Elmer Kleasen in the murders of two Mormon missionaries.

Defense attorneys asked District Judge Tom Blackwell Friday to forbid reporters from publishing testimony or even names of witnesses who appear at the hearing next Friday.

Defense attorney Pat Ganne complained reporters have been

irresponsible in their coverage of the case.

"It's bad taste for a reporter to comment on a certain piece of evidence as 'dripping with blood.' That's not true," Ganne said. "They're trying to sell newspapers; they're trying to sell air time."

But Blackwell countered, "If you insist on having a pretrial hearing on the evidence with witnesses that you've subpoenaed, it's going to be a public

hearing. If the news media wants to publish it they certainly can."

The judge agreed to prohibit picture taking or tape recording in or adjacent to the courtroom, but refused to bar reporters from handling or viewing physical evidence in the case.

Blackwell ordered a hearing for 10 a.m. next Friday on a motion to suppress evidence Kleasen contends was seized illegally at his trailer home last fall.

**Bicentennial
Celebration
Begins**

CONCORD, Mass. (UPI) — Paul Revere never did finish that ride in the first bloodshed in the American Revolution involved a sleepy-eyed patriot who mistook a British soldier for another colonist.

America officially began bicentennial celebrations Saturday with the re-enactment of the famed "Shot Heard 'Round the World" at Lexington Green on April 19, 1975.

But events leading to and following the first battle of the Revolutionary War weave an

interesting historical tale, spiced with gossip and scandal. Manuscripts, letters and diaries unfold the tale which began March 20, 1775. Gen. Thomas Gage, military governor of the Province of Massachusetts Bay, learned the colonists were storing weapons and military supplies in Concord, and immediately began plans for a night raid of the town, 18 miles northwest of Boston.

Concord could be approached by land and water (through marshy areas which since have been landfilled, now Boston's

Back Bay section) or by land only (riding through what is now Charlestown, Cambridge, Somerville, Arlington and Lexington).

On April 16, Paul Revere rode from Boston to Lexington to warn the Provincial Congress, the legislative body representing the Massachusetts patriots, John Hancock and Samuel Adams about the British preparations. Plans for rebellion began.

That night, Revere stopped off in Charlestown on his way back to Boston to make

arrangements with a Col. Conant "that if the British went out by water, we would show two lanterns in the North Church Steeple; and if by land, one as a signal."

In Boston at 10:30 p.m. on April 18, Revere and William Dawes were alerted—the night of confrontation had arrived and the British were moving by sea.

Dawes began a longer land route while Revere ordered two lanterns hung in the steeple. Revere hurried over to the north end of town where two

friends rowed him across the river.

A British detachment of 700 men assembled in Boston Common under the command of Lt. Col. Francis Smith of the 10th Regiment and Maj. John Pitcairn, of the Marines. Gage's written order to Smith was to lead the soldiers to Concord "where you will seize and destroy all Artillery, Ammunition, Provisions, Tents, Small Arms and all Military Stores whatever."

By 11 p.m., Revere arrived on the Charlestown side of the

river on his famed ride to Concord.

About a half-hour later, he was joined by Dawes and the two rode to Concord as 130 Minutemen began to assemble on Lexington Green. But about 1 a.m., April 19, two British officers ambushed the group.

This time Dawes and Dr. Samuel Prescott, who had joined the group, successfully evaded the soldiers but Revere was captured and held at the nearby pasture with three Lexington scouts.

By 2 a.m. British soldiers had

crossed the marshes and were on the road to Lexington. Their hoofbeats awoke Josiah Nelson, a Lincoln Minuteman, who had been appointed to keep watch and carry the alarm to Bedford.

"Leaving his bed hurriedly, Nelson ran out into the road and called out, 'Have you heard anything about when the Regulars (British) are coming out?'"

One of the officers grabbed his sword and replied in anger, "We will let you know when they are coming!"



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


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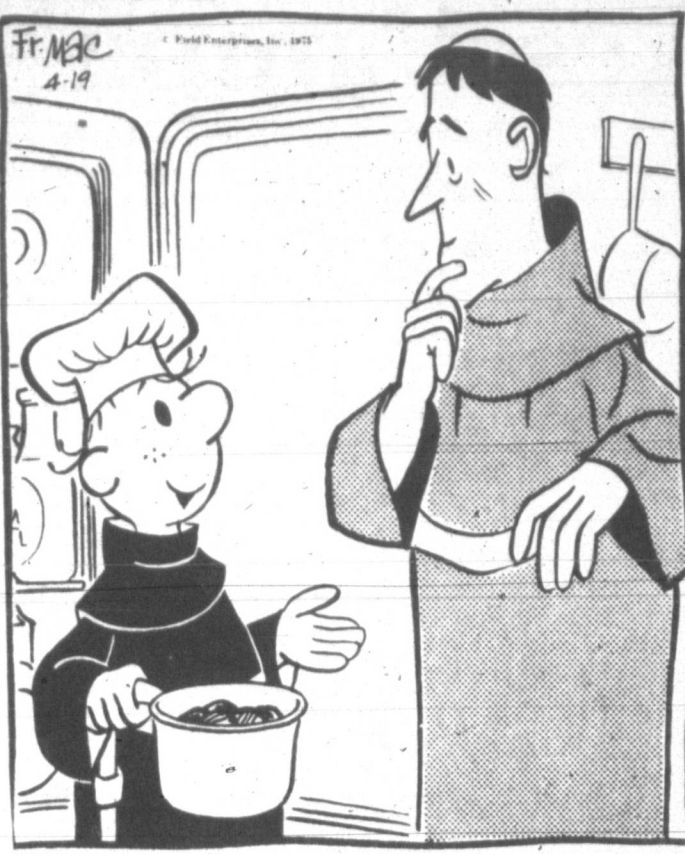
