Should I care if Nitrates are in my Ground Water?

What are nitrates? Nitrates are salts or esters of nitric acid. Decaying organic matter, sewage, and fertilizers produce nitrates in the soil which can leak into ground water.

How do nitrates affect my drinking water? High nitrate levels in drinking water can cause Blue Baby Disease (Methemoglobinemia) humans and animals. Methemoglobinemia affects young children, pregnant women, and people in poor heath.

Some studies indicate that long-term exposure to high nitrate levels can cause cancer.

Nitrates also encourage the growth of algae and other organisms, which may produce undesirable tastes and odors in your water.

What is health standard for nitrates in my drinking water? In humans, the level of nitrate that is safe to consume is not known, but health standards set a maximum limit of 10 milligrams per liter (mg/L) nitrates as nitrogen.

Do Nitrates affect my irrigation water? Irrigation water should be tested for nitrates just as household water wells.

The nitrate content of the irrigation water should be credited for crop growth in the nutrient management plan.

To determine the amount of nitrogen in your irrigation water, a test for nitrates should be conducted. The result from this test is expressed in mg/L nitratenitrogen. Multiply the mg/L or parts per million (ppm) by 2.7 to determine the amount of nitrogen applied per acre in a 12-inch application of water. To find out the number of pounds of nitrogen applied for each inch of irrigation water, multiply mg/L (or ppm) of nitrate-nitrogen

If you choose to participate in the Borden County Rural Water well Screening, your water sample will be tested for nitrates. Screening date will be November 14th.

Zone 5 includes all of Borden County south of U.S. Highway 180. Other members of the Board are Jimmy McMillan, chairman, representing Zone 1, Ted Crenwelge, vice chairman, representing Zone 3, Myron Calley of Zone 2 and Max Jones, Secretary, of Zone 4.

The purpose of the Upper Colorado SWCD is to promote sound soil and water conservation program son agricultural lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers, ranchers, and local community entities on conservation matters.

The district's board directors coordinates the conservation efforts various local, state federal agencies and other organizations. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator, or other potential users of the SWCD's programs.

Grant's season ends with broken arm

Bulldogs unleash ground attack on Coyotes; BHS now even at 1-1 in District play

The one break the Coyotes got in Friday's district game against undefeated Ira was not the one they wanted.

At 7:04 in the 2nd quarter of Friday's district match-up, Senior Dale Grant went six yards around right end to get a much-needed first down for BHS.

But the play ended in a broken arm for Grant and seemed to be an omen for things to come the remainder of the evening.

Ira, undefeated on the season at 7-0, stacked up 210 yards rushing to ground out a 46-0 victory over the Coyotes.

But for key missed opportunities in the first half, BHS might well have been tied with Ira after two quarters.

Ira fumbled away its first possession, giving the Coyotes initial momentum.

Unable to capitalize though, BHS punted and then neglected to take advantage of two Ira penalties, which backed the Bulldogs to 4th and 11 deep in Coyote territory.

Ira converted the 4th down and scored on an 11-yard pass with 4:44 remaining in the first quarter.

Senior Jacob Zant would connect on the following drive on two long passes, one to Raul Rodriguez for 27 yards and the other to T.J. Sharp for 23 yards.

A holding penalty and two dropped passes stopped the drive as Ira held the Coyotes off.

At the end of the first quarter, BHS responded with a good defensive effort as Zant broke up a pass with a solid hit on the Ira receiver.

Ira's drive continued into the second quarter, and twice the Coyotes had the Bulldogs at 4th down.

Ira's Nathan Smith, a sure pick for post-season honors, rushed both times to pick up the first down yardage and keep the Bulldog drive going.

With 8:05 on the clock in the second quarter, Ira's other top running back, Josh Gutierrez, went 11 yards for the score.

The next series for BHS was the season-ending one for Grant, and the Coyotes ended up punting on this drive.

Ira got the ball on its own 23-yard line, but two consecutive penalties backed the Bulldogs to their own 13-yard line.

This time the Coyote defense would respond as Zant intercepted a 4th and long pass from Ira's Eric Dickerhoff, giving the Coyotes the ball with 3:23 before intermission.

This drive would take BHS to the Ira 6-yard line where the Coyotes faced 4th and 6, but Ira thwarted the attempt and took over.

Junior Raul Rodriguez sacked the Ira quarterback before half-time as Ira led 16-0.

The visitors kicked off to begin second half of play as Zant returned the ball to the Coyote 28-yard line

Offsetting penalties along with a fumble that resulted in a loss of 11 yards forced the Coyotes to punt, though, giving Ira yet another break.

The ensuing Bulldog drive was indicative of the Coyotes' frustration on defense.

back as a result of holding calls, but BHS could not capitalize on the mistakes.

Ira scored at 4:21 in the third quarter and even had a second chance at the PAT kick, which they converted after the offside penalty on the Coyotes.

As the third quarter drew to a close, BHS was unable to get a drive going and was forced to punt. Two plays later Ira was on the Borden County three-yard line as time ran out in the third period.

Fourth quarter action began with Smith going into the endzone for another Bulldog touchdown, this time a one-yard plunge.

Smith would score 13 seconds later after intercepting Zant's pass and dashing 34 yards for Ira's next six points.

The Coyotes' final drive of the evening was short-lived as Zant found Dan Griffin on a pass play followed by Griffin's run up the middle. Ira did hold, though, and took over on the Coyotes' 37-yard line.

Jake Barnes took a 15yard pass from Dickerhoff to end the game.

BHS travels to Hermleigh for a 7:30 district game Friday.

They will be going for district win number two before entertaining Westbrook at home November 2.

Carter and Tarleton combined for five completions in nine attempts for 77 yards in the game.

Carter's spiral to John Wilson, a 21-yard reception, was good for six points to open the game's scoring in the first period. The PAT kick failed, but BHS jumped out to an early 6-0 lead at 6:03.

Ira responded with a touchdown pass of its own, a 24-yarder, to even the score at 6-6 after the Coyotes blocked the PAT attempt.

Legitimate nelps are available free for charge from the government privately funded organizations. Any source which charges a fee is seeking money hemselves and not the student. The Pell Grant, Work-Study, and other federally funded monies are available through the FAFSA 3) Required credit card or Free Application for Federal Student Air) which must be pased on income tax reports of the preceding year and cannot be submitted before anuary 1.

- 2) Money-back guarantees. No reputable sponsor can guarantee that you will win an award.
- bank account verification. Scammers will ask for this information and then drain your bank account or run up charges on your credit card.
- Award offers for which no application has been made. All offers should be connected to applica-
- 5) Claims concerning success rates and unclaimed monies. Scholarships are highly competitive, but most awards are dispersed.

most financial While advisors want to help, some do take advantage of unsuspecting students. Students

should ask for contact information, and check with the high school counselor concerning an advisor's history and qualifications. A consultant should never be used who encourages a parent or student to do something unethical such as lying about income or assets. 
