





In compliance with Senate Bill 1074, the Borden County Sheriff's Office has established a policy on racial profiling. Starting January 1, 2002, information will be collected on all traffic and pedestrian stops. This will be done with video/audio equipment or with written

We realize that confusion, different perceptions, or possibly the timelines of information could result in information that may produce different accounts of the same incident. These disagreements between citizens and officers need to be addressed. We trust that the vast majority of contacts between citizens and officers are conducted in a positive, professional manner. The relationship between the community and our officers is based on confidence and trust. We cannot be effective without both the community and our officers working together to achieve this goal.






