Close, But Not Quite Enough

Borden Elementary and Jr. High Place 2nd Overall at Zone U.I.L. Meet

After a long run of district academic championships, the Borden County Elementary and Junior High U.I.L. Academic Teams were forced to relinquish their thrones reluctantly last week in the District 9-A, West Zone U.I.L. Academic Meet.

The teams did not go down without a fight, however, as both levels competed well enough to place 2nd to Grady's Elementary and Junior High.

Students competed in 61 contests over the two-day meet held at the Grady I.S.D. on November 13th and 15th.

Points, ranging from fifteen (first place) to four (sixth place), were awarded to schools for the top six finishers in each contest. These points were then added together to determine the overall champion for each level.

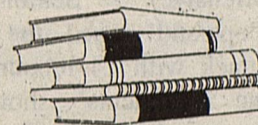

Lady Coyotes Win One, Lose Two in First Week

A great performance in the rebounding category enabled Borden County's Lady Coyotes to pull away from New Home in a season-opening win, 36-31.

BHS grabbed 48 rebounds (28 defensive, 20 offensive). Senior Rika Copeland paced the board attack with 14 rebounds off the opponents' shots and four on her end.

The Lady Coyotes jumped out to a 10-2 lead, forcing New Home to call a time out with 4:50 remaining in the first quarter.

The time out worked to the Lady Leopards' advantage as they help BHS to only two more points in the quarter, closing the gap to 12-10 by the end of the first eight minutes of play.

Juniors Kyla Culp, Bobbie Kempf, and Carolina Arellanos scored for the Lady Coyotes in the second period, giving BHS a little breathing room by half-time, 21-14.

With two consecutive baskets by Rika and Bobbie to begin third quarter play, the Lady Coyotes seemed to have things under control, 25-14.

Slaton Pulls Away From Lady Coyotes in Second Half

Trailing only 19-12 at halftime to perennial power Slaton, the Lady Coyotes were greeted by a full-court press after the intermission and eventually dropped a 46-24 decision in their second game of the season.

Klondike took a 42-20 victory over the Missy Coyotes. BJH defeated Sands just as decisively, 30-10.

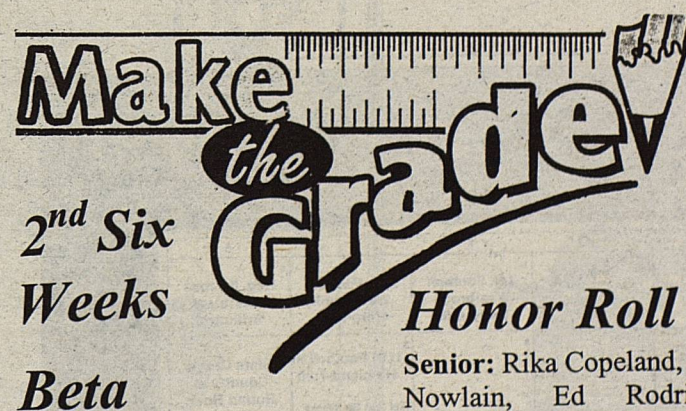

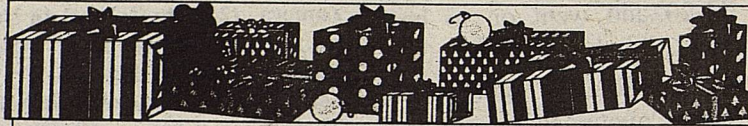

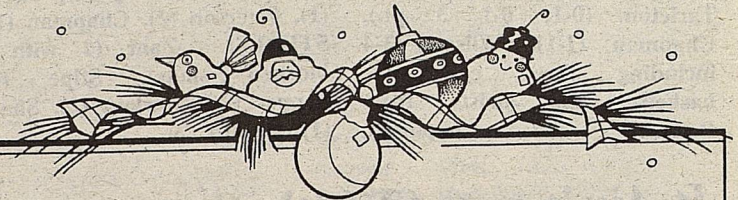

Our Visionary Founding Fathers

The early American Indians believed that you should judge every action on what effect it will have in seven generations. The people who wrote our constitution took that a step further. They must have eaten some powerful brain food back in 1776.

They created a democracy, a system of government operated by elected representatives of the entire country. And it still works.

Lately we have been seeing a way of life quite different from ours. Where religion is only a part of our lives, for some people in foreign lands, it is their whole life. It doesn't look too appealing. They are living the same way they did two thousand years ago. They think living in ignorance and poverty is some sort of spiritual obligation. They consider things like commerce and industry as sinful, only for infidels (a fifteenth century term denoting a person of a religion other than one's own)>

They live under a theocracy, a Greek work from theos, meaning God, and kratos, meaning power. It is a form of government by a priestly order that claims to be divinely directed. They think god destroyed the twin towers.

The old European political theory that kings ruled by divine right went out in the late sixteen hundreds. In theocracies like Afghanistan and Iran and Iraq, the government might be a council of clerics or a charismatic leader who claims a special call from God and gains office by force of arms.

Ancient civilizations lived

in theocracies for some of the early history. The United States keeps church and state separate. It is a sound principle. Just take a look at the countries where religion is everything and you can see the absolute worst living conditions: straw huts for houses, no pavement, a life span of forty years, hunger, illness, women used solely for procreation and ten year old kids with bazookas wanting to kill people. We have witnessed meanness and criminal activity unparalleled

in our experience. We are dealing with a country whose main export is an illegal substance.

In the last twenty-five years, numerous Muslim groups have attempted to establish Islamic theocracies. The Islamic community, founded by prophet Muhammad in 622, originally covered the land now occupied by Iraq, Syria and Egypt. There are pressures from fundamentalist Muslims to move toward theocratic forms of government in other countries.

Islamic ideals are used to win liberation from foreign domination or from some ruling elite, to encourage economic renewal and to revitalize Islamic culture. Ayatollah Khomeini smuggled religious sermons into Iran to turn Iranians against the shah. Saddam Husayn tried unsuccessfully

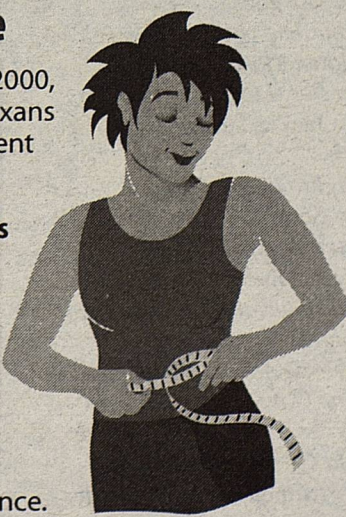
