

Tornadoes Hit Oklahoma

STILLWATER, Okla. (U1) — Standing in a downpour church Cathy Conley watched the tornadoes raging in and out of the storm clouds and plunging to earth to ravage a mile-long section for 45 minutes Friday.

"White clouds swirled out of all directions like smoke," she said. "The clouds moved so fast every time you looked it was different."

She said the tornadoes lingered in the area for about 15 minutes and "hovered and sucked things up as they went."

The series of twisters damaged half of the major buildings on the campus of Oklahoma State University, smashed downtown store windows and destroyed part of a trailer park.

Five persons were injured but there were no deaths, authorities said. Four of the injured were treated and released. One woman who suffered a broken leg when her camper overturned on the OSU campus was hospitalized.

Mayor Bill Thomas estimated damage would be in the

millions of dollars and said he would ask state officials to request Stillwater be declared a federal disaster area.

Officials said the southeastern part of town was hardest hit and also was probably the least adequately insured because it was a low income area.

Officials said looters were a problem in the downtown area. About 50-60 National Guardsmen and police officers from surrounding towns were called in to patrol the stores. Several looters were arrested.

The twisters first struck near the OSU campus. Jim Stone, an OSU employe, and his family ran for their lives from their home near

campus to take shelter in a classroom building.

"What we saw was a lot of debris actually," he said. "There seemed to be more than one. We would see the others hanging down. One was white and one was dark."

Half the major buildings at OSU received some damage, President Robert Kamm said.

After striking the campus the twisters cut a path of damage six to seven blocks wide to the downtown section and then struck a trailer park.

About 20 trailers at Green Acres trailer park in the southeastern part of the city were destroyed. The residents had found shelter and none were injured. Two persons were

missing from the park, but officials believed they had not been home during the storm.

Kamm said at least 30 of the 60 main buildings on campus were damaged.

Old Central, the oldest OSU building, was hard-hit, an OSU spokesman said. He said the top of one wall of the structure, built in the 1890's, was torn off. The Oklahoma Historical Society has been restoring the building.

Kamm toured the campus after the storm hit and said the immediate projects would be security and prevention of water damage. He praised the OSU police for security actions.

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Ticket Fixing: American and Illegal?

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — To many Philadelphians, ticket fixing was just another aspect of the political system. It was a way of life for hundreds of committeemen — at least until Walter Phillips Jr. came along. Now he's trying to prosecute ticket fixers — and the screams of outrage have begun.

Phillips, state special prosecutor, was assigned by Gov. Milton Shapp to ferret out municipal corruption. He went after contractors doing business with the city, and then he went after some politicians. But when Phillips went after traffic court, thousands of motorists and hundreds of politicians screamed. Even state officials were surprised.

Phillips charged there was "wholesale ticket fixing" in the city to the tune of \$1 million a year. He said he planned to prosecute not only judges but motorists who paid to have traffic tickets fixed.

"If we have to track them down, they won't be given lenient treatment," Phillips said. "If you pay a public official to influence the way the public official discharges his duties, it's bribery. And that's punishable with up to seven years in prison."

Wofford Attends Confab

City Manager Mack Wofford left Friday for Waco to attend the annual conference of the Texas City Management Association.

Accompanied by his wife and two children, Wofford said he will vacation in South Texas for the rest of the week.

R.B. Cooke, public works director, will serve as acting city manager while Wofford is out of town.

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Economy Leaves Auctioneer Alone

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — "Teelive-fifty, teelive-fifty, do I hear teelive-fifty?" That familiar chant from Samuel T. Freeman & Co. Auctioneers on Chestnut St., one of the city's busiest

downtown thoroughfares, rings out once a week. Often the price barked by the auctioneers jumps into the thousands. And that hasn't been affected by the ups and downs of the economy. "Our business hasn't really

been affected by the recession," said John Freeman, head of the firm. "We sold a chest-on-chest for \$92,000 about a month or six weeks ago. And we sold a necklace for \$20,000 from the Wanamaker family." Freeman said you just can't gauge the economy by the auction business because it almost always does well. And Freeman's business has been doing well for 170 years he said.

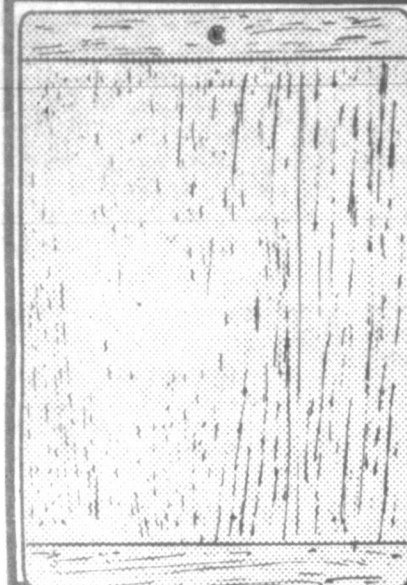
"The auction as a medium of sale does not reflect changes in the economy," Freeman said. "All during the depression we operated very successfully. While prices were low, we had vast amounts of things to sell. When prices go up, we have less to sell, but what is sold goes for higher prices." Reason for the relative stability of the auction business: The items auctioned are either rare objects, or low-

priced household items. "We do far better on collectables—things that are hard to find," Freeman said. "New items have lower recovery. Oddthings in antique shops bring very, very good prices. If we notice anything during the recession, it is that junk items—pots and pans—maintain a very high comparative level and so do the fine items. But the in-between things did slough

off. They were the things that suffered." Freeman said most of the objects his firm handles come from estates which are being liquidated. He said he deals mostly with dealers from Philadelphia and New York, but many homeowners come into his auditorium to pick up furniture, paintings or antiques for their homes. Freeman suggests that those who walk into auctions arm

themselves with patience and a knowledge of the items they plan to buy. "I believe this is the only place in the city to buy furniture—if you are a good buyer," Freeman said. "You can get anything from everyday contemporary furniture to antique treasures." "They should examine the items carefully," Freeman said, "and most of all—prepare

to spend a certain amount and go no higher." Knowing how to buy at an auction is almost as much an art as barking the prices, he said, adding, "Some people even bid against themselves." "You really have to know what you're doing if you want to save money or get the items you want," Freeman said.

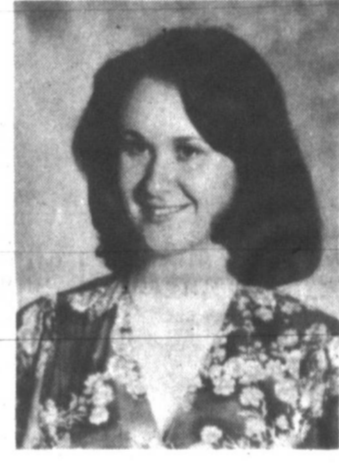

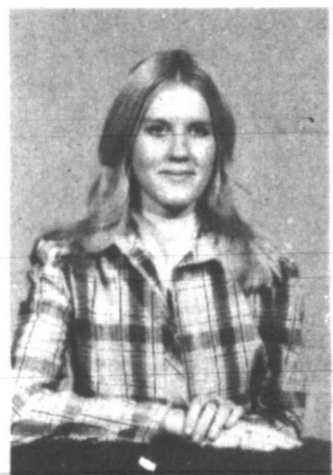

Ethnic Fare Improves Diet

JACKSON HEIGHTS, N.Y. (UPI) — An intermediate school in this New York City suburb has used ethnic foods to improve its students' nutritional attitudes from 17 per cent among eighth and ninth graders up to 107 per cent among younger children.

Tests following the pilot project showed students had increased their consumption of well-balanced breakfasts and selection of higher-protein foods.

Leonard Fagen, health education and services supervisor in the district, said the three-week pilot program reached 1,500 students and into every classroom.

Social studies dealt with the food habits of different nations.

Math students calculated calories and carbohydrates for such ethnic dishes as Icelandic pancakes; German spekulatius, or spice cookies; Yugoslavian pita, a bread popular throughout the Near East; and several versions of arroz con pollo, a chicken and rice casserole of Spanish origin.

Fine arts and industrial art classes made nutrition education posters to display in the school and in neighboring store windows.

Special events on the final day of the project included a sandwich-making contest, a poster contest and a food and nutrition expo, featuring more than 75 neighborhood ethnic dishes prepared by students and parents.

Fagen estimated that 70 different nationalities and ethnic groups live in the area. He hopes to make the same type of program a regular part of the curricula throughout School District 30, which includes six intermediate and junior highs.

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Phil George Double Victor In Pampa AAU Meet

Phil George, a Pampa High Junior high jumper 6-4 and broad jumper 19-9 to win individual titles in the senior division of the West Texas AAU Track Meet Saturday in Harvester Stadium.

George's performances were the highlight of the meet, which attracted 135 athletes from Groom, Canadian, Amarillo and host Pampa. Entrants completed in five divisions — Bantam (9 and under), midjet (10-11), junior (12-13), intermediate (14-15) and senior (16-17).

George's high jump mark makes him a good choice to win an individual title when Pampa High competes in district track next spring. He beat Amarillo's Paul Herman (6-5) by 11 inches.

In the broad jump, George's 19-9 was three feet, two inches better than Herman's 16-7.

Dub Taylor was another senior double winner for Pampa, capturing titles in the discus (114-4) and shot put (39-11). Paul Baker of Pampa was second and third, respectively, in the shot and discus.

Pampa's Barry Lemmons won the 440 in 52.2 seconds, edging runner-up Dan Campbell of Amarillo, who ran 56.4.

Lemmons will be a senior at Pampa High. Sherry Kimbell of Pampa won the 220 in 27.4 seconds and the long jump in 15-6. Vicki Bieganski of Amarillo was second in the 220 (31.3), while Beth Risley was runner-up in the long jump with a 14-10 leap.

Miss Risley showed her versatility by winning the high jump and placing second in both the shot and discus. She cleared 4-4 in the high jump. Ribbons were awarded to the top three places in each event.

Pampa tracksters will compete in the West Texas AAU Junior Olympics June 28 at Borger. The meet is the first steppingstone to the National Junior Olympics. First place in any event of the intermediate and senior divisions will qualify for the Region IX meet July 12 at Hattisburg, Miss.

Thorpe In Track Hall

CHARLESTON, W. Va. (UPI) — The late Jim Thorpe, generally acclaimed as the greatest athlete in the world, was inducted into the National Track and Field Hall of Fame Saturday with two other stars from the past.

Thorpe's son, Richard, received a plaque for his father in an outdoor ceremony at the West Virginia Capitol and said, "I accept it on behalf of all the young Indians in America today."

—John B. Flannagan, an Irish hammer-thrower who won three gold medals in the early 1900s.

—Ralph Metcalf, a top sprinter who ran in the shadow of Jesse Owens and Eddie Tolan but won a gold medal on a relay team in 1936.

—Horace Ashenfelter III, who in 1952 at Helsinki became the only American to win the steeplechase in the Olympics.

—Alice Coachman Davis, high-jump medal winner of the late 1940s.

—Edward P. Hurt, honored for his coaching at Morgan State.

The Hall of Fame now has 39 members. Thorpe's daughter, Grace, an aide in the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Washington, D.C., also attended the ceremonies and appealed for restoration of the gold medals Olympic officials took from Thorpe in a dispute over his amateur status.

Noting that Thorpe also was a great baseball and football player, his daughter said:

"His favorite sport was track because he told me he could do it alone. He was humiliated and stripped of those honors and his name was removed from the record books. King Gustav of Sweden told him, 'You are the greatest athlete in the world.' Indian youth of America need to know that a Sac-Fox Indian won Olympic gold medals. Justice for Jim Thorpe is long overdue."

Inductees contributed medals, track shoes and other mementoes from their careers to the hall, which is operating from an old riverside house until a permanent shrine is built. Construction is expected to start later this year.

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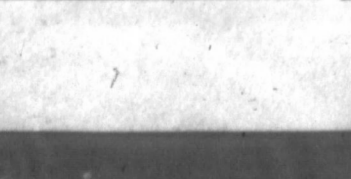

Football Season Opens Saturday With Coaches All-America Game

LUBBOCK, Tex. (UPI) — The 1975 football season premieres Saturday night with the 15th annual Coaches All-America game, each year a wideopen contest with the best college players in the nation. The combination of the best of the East and the West is expected to draw a near-capacity crowd of 45,000 into Texas Tech's Jones Stadium and a national television audience watching via ABC for the 9 p.m. EDT kickoff. Baylor coach Grant Teaff, who took his Bears to a surprise Southwest Conference title for the first time in half a century, will coach the West and Texas Tech's Steve Sloan, who moved into the SWC this year after reviving the Vanderbilt football program, will coach the East. Teaff will have his own quarterback, Neal Jeffrey, and Nebraska quarterback David Humm. Jeffrey is headed for San Diego and Humm for Oakland. Sloan will counter with the quarterbacking of Tampa's Fred Solomon and Central Michigan's Mike Franckowiak. Solomon was drafted by Denver. The West backfield will also include fullbacks Don Hardean of Texas A&I and Stan Winfrey of Arkansas State, and tailbacks Willard Harrell of the University of the Pacific, Phillip Kent of Baylor and Emmett Edwards of Kansas. The East, trying to overcome an 8-6 series advantage held by the West, boasts a backfield including fullbacks Stan Fritts of North Carolina State and Harold Henson of Ohio State and tailbacks Darius McCarthy of South Carolina State, Marshall Mills of West Virginia and Woody Thompson of Miami of Florida. Other West receivers include Southern Methodist's Oscar Roan and Oregon's Russ Francis, while the East has Georgia Tech's Jimmy Robinson and Southern Mississippi's John Sawyer. The West will be out to win its third straight game, something neither team has been able to do since the first game in 1961 in Buffalo. The West won 20-6 in 1973 and took a 36-6 decision last year. The game was moved to Atlanta in 1966 and shifted to Lubbock in 1970. Players arrived Friday and began workouts Saturday.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI) — Just how much financial fat can be trimmed from intercollegiate athletics will be determined soon. About 40 economic amendments will be voted on when the NCAA convenes for its special convention Aug. 14-15 in Chicago. Much has been made of the financial pinch afflicting college athletics and, in two months, something is going to be done about it. Just how much of the economic bullet college presidents are willing to bite remains to be seen. The NCAA currently has legislation written for 27 amendments which will be brought to a vote at the special convention. Ted Tow, NCAA Council secretary, estimates there are another 20 amendments still to be written. Some of those, of course, will never go to a vote. "The idea, however," said Tow, "is to get a large number of proposals before the members and let them vote on them as they see fit." There are some major proposals among the legislation, proposals that could drastically change the nature of collegiate football and basketball as they are now conducted. Among the most interesting proposals for major (Division I) schools: —Limiting football scholarships to 27 a year and 90 total. —Limiting basketball scholarships to five a year and 15 total. —Limiting football coaching staffs to one head coach, seven assistant coaches and two part-time assistants; limiting basketball staffs to one head coach, one assistant and one part-time assistant. —Deleting supplies and \$15 a month for incidentals from athletic scholarships. —Abolishing scouting in all sports except basketball. In addition, there are a number of proposals that should save money in the area of recruiting. Legislation has been written to limit a school to two personal contacts which a prospective athlete, on expense-paid visit for the prospect to the campus and allowing the prospect to visit only four NCAA schools at their expense. In addition, there is a 19-part amendment which would set up a national letter-of-intent for all sports and abolish all conference letters. There are also a number of lesser items, which could trim expenses. Included in this list is prohibiting travel uniforms and abolishing the practice of quartering a team in a hotel before a home football game. Also, limits on travel squads in all sports have been set (48 in football, 10 in basketball) as well as the number of athletes who will be allowed to suit up for home games (25 per cent over the number for the travel squad.) That means that a home team can only suit up 60 players for a football game, in contrast to some schools that like to line the sidelines with 100 or more athletes. Of course not all of the legislation will be adopted at the special convention. But it's reasonably certain that a large portion will be, at least in some amended form.

From The Channel

As you read the article today I would like for you to bear in mind that we all tend to forget from time to time that new bowlers are not always aware of all the etiquette rules we try to observe. Telling them in a nice way so they will know the next time is the way to go about it rather than sit there and complain we have all been new bowlers at one time. Here are the basic etiquette rules and a little bit of explanation of them.

1. Be on time and prepare to take your turn on the lane, but remember that the bowler to your right has the right of way. We want to add that we mean the person to your immediate right not two or three lanes down. If you wait that long you hold up the game. Also don't take time to pose and shuffle around, but do get the line on the pins and go.
 2. Stay on your own approach at all times and return to the back of the approach after each delivery. Better yet step off of the approach after making each delivery. Some tend to stand at the mouth of the ball return waiting and this is a distraction to the one addressing the pins. It really distracts the person that uses the full approach.
 3. Don't try to race the bowler on the next lane to the foul line.
- This means to wait until they go ahead and bowl and this way you both will deliver a good ball because rushing only serves to throw your timing off. On this one look to the right and the left before you start.
4. Don't harass your opponent, but praise them for their achievement. Good bowling requires concentration. When a player is ready to bowl, give them the courtesy of making their shot without any interference, as you will want the same courtesy when it is your turn to bowl. Save the "kidding" for the bench or locker room.
 5. Play the game to win but be a good loser. This is one of the most important. We can't win all of the time so if we come out on the short end of the count congratulate your opponents.
- Etiquette and sportsmanship are winning partners in any sport. In the game of ten-pins, a code of etiquette has been established and has been accepted by bowlers everywhere. Few of its rules are official, but respect for unwritten laws gives consideration at all times to the rights of the other bowler. This is all for this week; we will include league scores in next week's article.

Library Boasts of Bountiful Books

The shelves at Lovett Memorial Library, 111 N. Houston, contain everything from recent best sellers to telephone directories representing major cities all over the country.

Since Ms. Barbara Cockrell came to the library about nine years ago, she has noticed an increasing demand for adult books, both in quantity and quality.

"We check out twice as many adult books as children's books," she said. "And I have noticed much use of research materials. I think it's because of the emphasis on continuing education."

There are about 52,000 books in the library collection and there also are many 33 rpm record albums. The record collection includes some popular music, classical, operas, plays, foreign language and other educational discs.

"We checked out 1801 records last year," Ms. Cockrell said. Total circulation of books for the 1973-74 library year was 88,540.

Librarians also checked out many of the art reproductions in the library's collection and maps, posters and mini-masters (small reproductions of great paintings).

"About the only thing we don't check out are the basic reference books and periodicals," the head librarian said.

She said that there are approximately 9,000 card-carrying library users served by Lovett and estimated that about two-thirds of that number are adults (over 16 years of age) and one-third are school children.

A recent addition to the library services includes information of interest to area businessmen.

"Last year," Ms. Cockrell said, "we initiated and began building a business collection, including investment information."

The collection includes many of the major materials associated with stock market investments — Moody's, Standard and Poor's, Baron's and others. There are also many periodicals in the business collection.

Ms. Cockrell said that the collection is not yet widely used, "but it takes a while for the word to get around," she explained.

Another feature of the library, one that is popular, Ms. Cockrell said, is the collection of 300 to 400 large print books.

The large print books are appreciated especially by readers with tired or weakening eyes, Ms. Cockrell said. The collection includes "a little of everything," but consists mostly of popular fiction. The books are specially ordered from England.

Lovett is a part of the Texas Panhandle Library System and the Texas State Library Network.

"We have qualified as an area library, or a size II library," Ms. Cockrell said.

In the state network, all size II libraries are provided with a hotline telephone to help in finding any requested materials not included in the local collection.

For example, if a Pampa library user needs information not obtainable at Lovett, a librarian would call the nearest Major Resource Center public library — Amarillo — and request the materials. If that library cannot fill the need, the request automatically will be referred to the Texas State Library through a teletype system.

The Texas State Library will make every attempt to locate the requested material in its own collection or through teletype contact with the other major resource center public libraries.

When operating with a full staff, the library employs seven persons, including two professional librarians, Ms. Cockrell said.

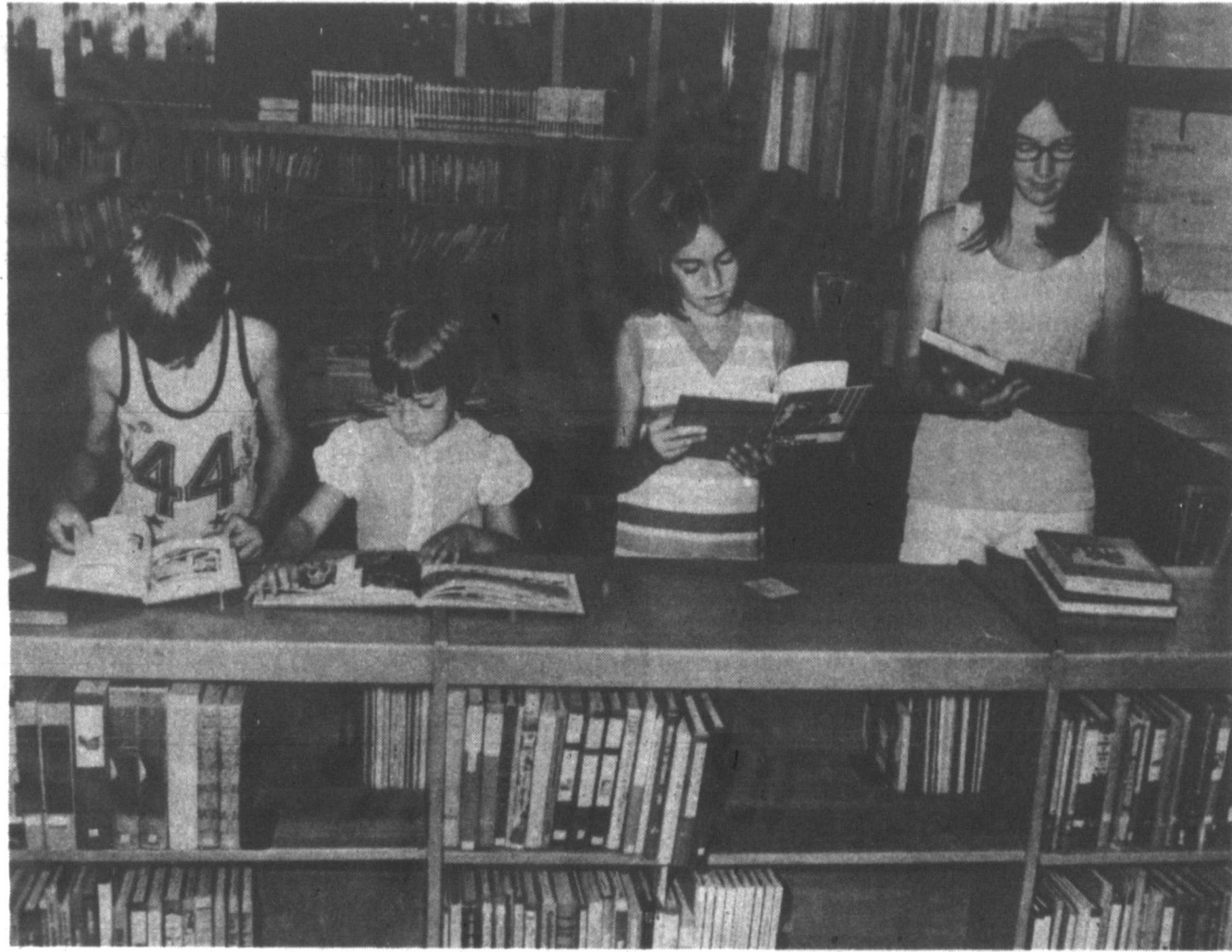
Aiding in management of the library is a local board of nine members including Kay Fancher, president, Mrs. Aubrey Steele, Mrs. Rex Rose, Mrs. Frank Kelley, Mrs. Joe Franklin, Mrs. E.L. Green Jr., Don R. Lane, Ben H. Guill and Boyd Taylor.

"Together we are directly responsible to the city commission and city officials," Ms. Cockrell said.

Rules at the library recently have been revised to allow borrowers to keep three weeks instead of two.

To qualify for a Lovett Memorial Library card, one must be a resident of the county and fill out a simple application. There is no charge and cards are good for three years. If lost, a minimal charge is made for a replacement card.

Due to a reciprocal borrowing program initiated about a year ago, Lovett card holders may use their cards at many other area participating libraries.

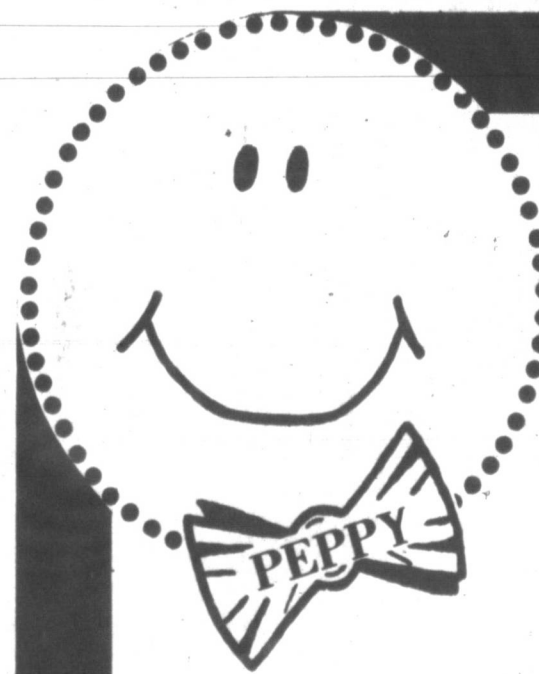
Children who wish to have their bicycles engraved under
