Former Teammates now wearing same numbers, different colors

Playing college basketball had always been their dream, but the two never dreamed they would one day match-up *against* each other.

Borden High School graduate Julie Mayes (Class of 2000) and Borden High School ex-student Valerie Wootan have done that twice already this season.

And their record? One win for Julie's team, the Wayland Baptist Flying Queens, and one win for Val, the West Texas State University Lady Buffs.

The two played together in 1998-1999 and 1999-2000, both members of a Lady Coyote team that advanced to the State Final Four in Austin in '99 and returned to regionals in 2000.

Julie was recruited and signed with Texas A & M Kingsville her senior year, but a coaching change during the summer made her re-evaluate that decision.

She decided to stay closer to home and was fortunate to find a spot at Wayland.

Val grew up going to Lady Buff camps in Canyon as a young girl and always knew that's where she wanted to go.

She signed with them in the fall of her senior year and is making an immediate impact, starting as a freshman.

WTAMU, a Division II NCAA school, and Wayland, a member of the NAIA, often play each other in non-conference games due to their proximity with each other. Canyon is only 65 miles north of Plainview, where Wayland is located.

In their first outing against each other (a controlled scrimmage in Canyon on November 12,

Wayland came out on top, 80-74.

Julie hit five of six free throws for five points, stole the ball twice, and had five rebounds along with one assist.

In that game, Valerie scored 12 points, blocked two shots and had six rebounds.

Colder temperatures means propane appliance safety reminders for Texans

Texas Railroad Commission Chairman Michael L. Williams, Commissioner Charles R. Matthews, and Commissioner Tony Garza today reminded Texans of winter propane safety producers now that colder temperatures have arrived.

"Most of the state received the season's first blast of winter weather recently," said Chairman Williams. "And while the drastic drop in the temperature came as a surprise to some, it means now is the perfect time to make sure every member of your family is up to speed on propane safety."

"An estimated one-half million Texas homes use efficient propane as their primary energy source,"

Commissioner Matthews said. "Knowing what to do if you smell propane and think you may have a leak will insure reliability and safety for your and your family this winter."

"Knowing in advance what to do if you smell a propane leak is critical to ensuring your safety," Garza added. "Texans should familiarize themselves with basic safety guidelines and have their propane equipment regularly inspected by a trained service technician."

If you think you smell propane in your home, camper, RV or the area around any gas equipment, or if a gas alarm signals the

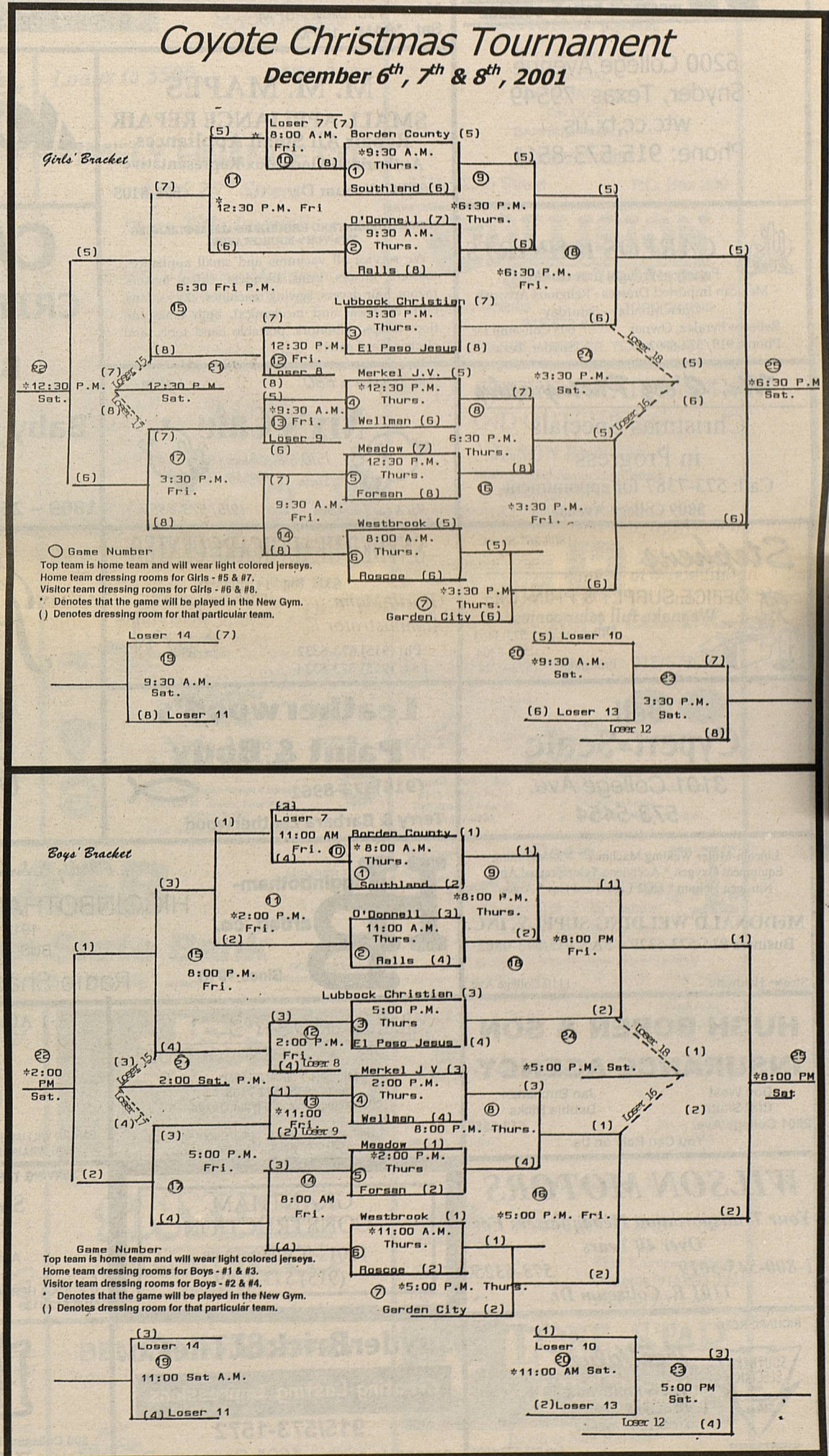

The Santa Bank Robber

The season of peace and goodwill is reflected best in the small towns. When you drive through them and see the lighted courthouses and Christmas displays you get a little tingle in your body and a lump in your throat.

A familiar bearded man in a red and white suit strolled down the street among the holiday shoppers in Cisco on December 23, 1927. He barely spoke to the smiling people he met. Santa entered the First National Bank and immediately became the center of attention.

Suddenly the works rang out across the lobby: "STICK 'EM UP!" Three men with drawn pistols were stationed in strategic positions. Their names were Louis Davis, who covered the door; Robert Hill, who held a gun on the cashier; and Henry Helms, who guarded the teller.

The bank officers were lined up against the wall while the man in the Santa suit searched them for weapons. While Santa told the teller to open the safe, a woman customer and her daughter ran out the side door of the bank and went to city hall just a half block away and announced: "They're robbing the First National Bank!"

While policemen converged on the bank, Santa reached into his suit, pulled out a tow sack and began

filling it with cash and securities from the vault. A curious passerby noticing the bank's front door was closed, pressed his face against the plate glass in front. At that time, Santa emerged from the vault, drew his pistol and fired, drilling a hole in the window just above the man's head.

Almost immediately a shot answered from outside the bank. Hill, one of the bandits, fired a shot into the bank's ceiling, hoping to keep officers from rushing in. From outside, a shower of bullets pelted the bank. Aroused citizens rushed to the scene, some bringing firearms.

To get to their car, the robbers had to go through an alley which was alive with gunfire. They forced some of the bank employees and customers to enter the alley first. Two of them were shot. Santa grabbed two small girls and used them as shields. They made it to the car and sped away. Carloads of civilians and lawmen gave pursuit.

Down the road, the robbers stopped the car and forced the occupants out. They transferred the bag of money and securities to the second

car, but the driver had cleverly taken the keys. So the bandits returned to their car without the loot and took off again. One of the robbers, Louis Davis, was badly wounded and left behind. He later died of his wounds. The bag contained \$12,000 and \$150,000 in securities.

The robbers' car stopped on a little used road and they ran away, leaving the two girls in the car. Area lawmen joined in the search and the bandits were apprehended. Two were sentenced to die in the electric chair. Henry Helms did. The other one, Marshall Ratliff, the man who played Santa Claus was hung by irate Cisco citizens. The third bandit, Robert Hill, was released from prison on good behavior and lived a quiet life by another name in a West Texas town.

Study Shows That Parents May Need to Reduce Content and Weight of Child's School Backpack

With Christmas Holidays about to begin, it might be a good time to check the contents of your child's school backpack say physicians at the Scott & White Departments of Family & Community Medicine and Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation.

A study recently conducted among more than 1,000 schoolchildren was conducted by Scott & White. The study findings indicate that students whose parents check the contents of their backpacks were more likely to carry less weight with fewer textbooks.

"We are beginning to see many kinds with complaints of low back pain in our clinics and we cannot rule out backpacks as the culprit," said Dr. Lane.

It is believed there is a real need for a targeted prevention program on school backpack safety in our area such as using the backpack safety SKILLS acronym. IT is clear that the majority of parents do not know the weight of the backpack loads carried by their schoolchildren. Additionally, many parents have no clue about the backpack contents.

Backpacks carried by schoolchildren may be associated with several potential health consequences including back strain, altered gait (walk), bad posture, and eventual low back pain.

Heavy backpacks including all other bags carried properly or improperly on the backs or shoulders of schoolchildren, can put pressure on their joints and ligaments to initiate the back strain process.

The research study consisted of a survey of 1,105 elementary, junior high and middle schoolchildren at five schools in Central Texas. The height and weight of each student and the weight of his or her backpack was determined. Students who

carried a backpack weighing over ten percent or more of body weight were surveyed for the contents of their bags and whether a parent had ever weighed their backpack or checked its contents. Grade, gender and ethnic background were also obtained from each student.

Study findings are as follows:

- ◆ Average backpack weight was 8.0 pounds (range, 0.5 lbs. to 29.8 lbs.)
- ◆ Average backpack weight represented 9% of body weight (range, 1% to 37%)
- ◆ Average backpack weights were higher in middle/junior high schools.
- ◆ Backpacks carried by girls and non-Hispanic white students were heavier on average than those carried by boys and students of other racial/ethnic backgrounds.
- ◆ A small portion of the students (3%) had a backpack with rollers.
- ◆ Backpack contents averaged 1.2 textbooks, 1.6 folders and 1.4 binders.
- ◆ Overall, 55% of parents had at some point checked the contents of their child's backpack. However, only 7.5% of parents had ever weighed their child's backpack.

The conclusion drawn by the researchers indicates that, backpack loads represent a significant percentage of elementary, middle/junior high student's body weights. Study also showed that many students are beginning to use backpacks with rollers. In addition, students whose parents check the contents of their backpacks were found to carry less weight with fewer textbooks.

Recommendations were devised by the Scott & White researchers based on the



study findings, and include the following guidelines:

- ◆ Select the right size backpack with wide, padded straps, and enough back padding.
- ◆ Know the weight limit of the backpack to carry, preferably less than 10 to 15 percent of the child's body weight.
- ◆ Inspect what is to be packed to make sure everything is needed and packed properly
- ◆ Lift backpack correctly with bent knees and facing backpack when picking it up
- ◆ Learn to adjust backpack straps so it rests properly on the back, not below the waist
- ◆ Search for updates on backpack safety from Internet sites and your family doctor.

presence of propane, the Texas Railroad Commission suggests that you immediately:

- Extinguish all smoking materials and any other open flames or sources of ignition.
- Vacate the building, vehicle or area. Move everyone away without using any electric switches, appliances, thermostats, or telephones.
- Close the supply valve on the propane tank or cylinder. Turn the valve to the right as far as it will go.
- Call your propane supplier and/or your local fire department from a cellular telephone or a neighbor's phone.
- Even if you do not continue to smell propane, do not open or turn on the propane supply valve. Do not re-enter the building, camper or RV or area. Let a qualified propane service technician and/or emergency personnel check for escaped propane.
- Have a properly trained propane service technician repair any leaks detected. The service or

emergency technician should determine that the leak situation has been fully resolved. The propane service technician should check all of your gas appliances and re-light any appliance pilots.

- Return to the building, camper, RV or area only when the service or emergency technician indicates it is safe to do so.

To help consumers properly use propane-fueled appliances, the Railroad Commission of Texas offers a free safety brochure entitled "Home Safe Home." Copies are available in both English and Spanish and can be obtained by contacting the Railroad Commission's alternative Fuels research and Education Division toll-free at 1-800-64-CLEAR [1-800-642-5327].
