BHS Basketball Wrap Up Regular Schedules Before Holidays; Begin Preparation for District Play

With district play just around the corner, Borden High School's varsity teams will have one final tune-up as they begin play in the Sundown Tournament two days after Christmas.

The girls will face Seagraves at 10 a.m. Thursday, December 27, while the boys match up with Plains at

In non-district action Friday, the Lady Coyotes used a big lead established in the first quarter to hold Crosbyton in check, 47-30.

Senior Rika Copeland went to the line four times in the first quarter and hit 4-of-8 free throws and junior Bobbie Kempf grabbed 5 rebounds to set the tone for the Lady Coyotes the rest of the evening.

The 13-2 lead after eight minutes would help BHS as Crosbyton worked their way back, scoring 13 in the second quarter to close the half-time margin to 24-11.

Junior Kyla Culp had back-to-back points in the second quarter when she hit a pull-up jumper with 3:12 remaining and followed that with a steal and lay-up to put the Lady Coyotes up 20-8.

Bobbie and sister Dalene teamed up for another spark as Dalene stole the ball at the 1:50 mark and dished off to sister Bobbie who went in for a lay-up to make it 22-10.

The Lady Coyotes recorded three blocks on the evening, one each by Rika, Bobbie, and Dalene.

As a team, the Lady Coyotes pulled down 39 rebounds, had 16 steals, and 9 assists to help pave the way to victory.

Bobbie had a double-

double on the evening as she scored 10 points and had a career-high 13 rebounds.

In Monday night's game with Forsan, the Lady Coyotes opened up an 11-2 first-quarter lead, fought off a slow second quarter which saw Forsan outscore BHS, and then held the opponent scoreless in the third quarter to earn their 12th win on the season.

Coach Richey's scrappy team took the lead into intermission, 18-16, against Forsan, thanks to some good rebounding.

Crosbyton shooters got hot, however, in the second half, especially from the 3-point range as they staged a comeback and took the lead after three quarters, 32-23.

Ironically, the very strength that the Coyotes had relied on early in the game failed them in this period as Crosbyton hit the offensive boards, giving themselves many second and third chance opportunities to score.

Meanwhile, the Coyotes went cold, going 0-7 from the field. The only third-quarter points came off Talin Pepper's three and two free throws.

Crosbyton hit four three-pointers in the final period and took advantage of some foul trouble to take the 58-39 win.

Against Forsan Monday night, BHS never got untracked as Forsan scored 23 in the first quarter and benefitted from 25 Coyote turnovers to win 59-33.

Freshman Ben Griffin's 3-of-4 from the 3-point line was the offensive highlight. Senior Jacob Zant led rebounders with 6 boards.

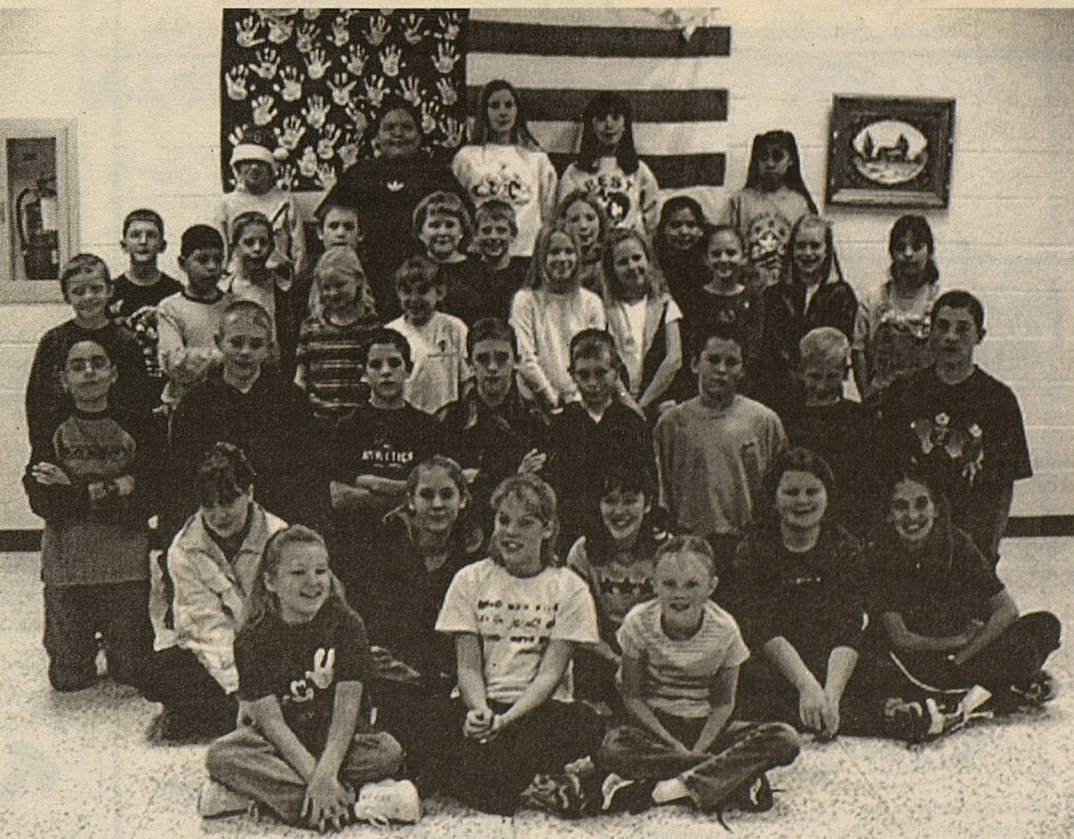



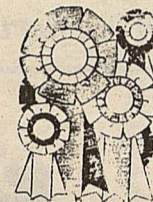

MINUTES APPROVED

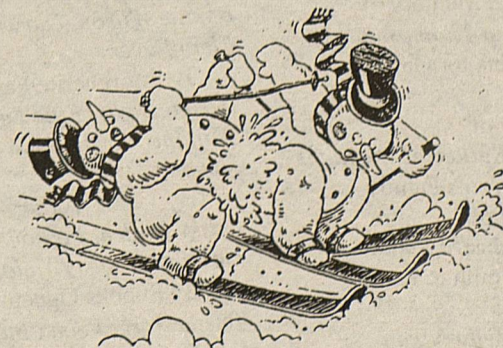

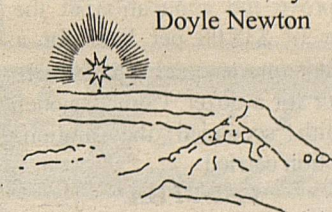
