Ambulances

To Be Given

Back To County

Meeting in regular session on Monday, members of the Bailey County Commissioners Court heard a letter received from Frank Ellis of Ellis Funeral Home. According to the letter read to commissioners, the ambulances, currently being operated by the funeral home, will be turned over to the commissioners early in July.

For the past several years, the commissioners have purchased the ambulances, provided a subsidy to the funeral home each month, and the funeral home employees have operated the ambulances for the area.

Commissioners are currently working on a solution for future operations of the ambulances.

Also meeting with commissioners was Sheriff Bob Henderson, who asked that he be budgeted for a full time jailer in the new budget. At this time, the sheriff has a part time jailer in addition to the three regular jailers, and in the next year will have an additional full time jailer. This will bring his staff to two deputies, a secretary, and four jailers.

Also during the meeting, Rudolph Moraw, Commissioner from Precinct Four, was named to the board of South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) and an easement was granted to Five Area Telephone Cooperative, Inc.

for the organization. He said a total of 12 days are included in the project this year, with several days being added, increasing it from nine holidays.

Members of the Kiwanis Club have not changed the cost from that of a year ago, and it will still cost only \$27 for the Kiwanis members to display the flag in front of your business on the special holidays.

The price breakdown, according to Griffin, is only \$2.25 per holiday, and the funds are used to help with the Junior Livestock Show, Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, baseball and other youth orientated activities in this community.

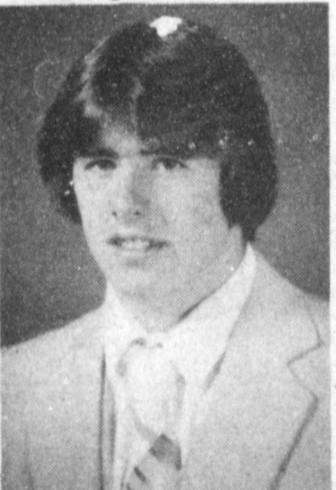
"During the year," said Griffin, "we will put our Great American Flag out and pick it up for the following holidays:

President's Day, plus three other days during Patriotic Week; Memorial Day; Flag Day; Independence Day; Mule Day; Labor Day; Columbus Day; Election Day; and Veterans Day."

"The Kiwanis do all the work starting around 6:30 a.m.," explained the project chairman, "we end the holiday by picking up the flags about 6 p.m."

Extra-Curricular Activities Limited

According to a report given at the meeting of the Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees on Monday night, the local administration supports the decision to limit extra-curricular activities for school students.

Superintendent H. John Fuller reported that the

Teacher's Incentive Is Boosted

"Muleshoe's school administration and Board of Trustees is promoting professional growth for all local teachers," said the superintendent, H. John Fuller. "One way to promote growth is through additional college training. This fall, both Wayland University and Texas Tech will be offering Master's degree level courses in Muleshoe. For details, contact Elizabeth Watson. The courses are open to anyone in the Muleshoe area eligible to enroll for Master's level courses."

"Also," he added, "Muleshoe ISD will offer the following incentives to teachers taking graduate level courses: "Stipends will be paid to teachers for courses leading to endorsements in priority areas.

(A) \$50.00 will be paid to a teacher for the successful completion of a three hour course in English as a Second Language or Bilingual education.

(B) \$50.00 will be paid to a teacher for the successful completion of a three hour course in computer Education or Computer Science.

(C) \$50.00 will be paid to a teacher for the successful completion of a three hour course in Special Education.

"And, Muleshoe ISD will pay for the operating expenses (gas only) to and from the campuses listed below when four or more teachers 'car pool' together and all four teachers are enrolled in a graduate level course: Texas Tech University, Wayland Baptist University, West Texas State University or Eastern New Mexico University."

State Board had adopted guidelines limiting a student to ten absences during the school year for extra-curricular activities. He stated that the administration supported the new rules and would also be making formal recommendations to the board this summer to further strengthen Muleshoe's position making academics first. Although the superintendent said he supports the position that extra-curricular activities are a valuable and important aspect of student life, the academic program has to have first priority.

With cumulative attendance for the first five six weeks period of school, the district is ahead of predictions made last summer, and the current budget was built on an average attendance of 1,444. The end of the fifth six weeks showed the average attendance of 1,459, meaning the Muleshoe schools will not be forced to reduce the teaching staff this year. Last year, the schools reduced the regular teaching staff by six because of declining enrollment.

A report on library circulation was given, along with a review of all expenditures during the current school year. Assistant Superintendent for Business and Finance, Tom Jinks, said all funds are in good shape for this time of year, and attributed this to the good tax collections for this year.

Superintendent Fuller announced he is seeking qualified applicants in the following areas: Third Grade Bilingual Elementary Teacher; Fifth Grade Teacher, a new position; Elementary Chapter 1 Reading Teacher,

3-5 grades; Secondary English Teacher, two positions; Special Education Teacher, 3-5, two positions; Special Education Teacher, 6-8; Head Track Coach, Science teaching field and Counselor, federally funded, K-8.

Muleshoe's Official Rainfall Measured Nearly One Inch

After just eight inches of moisture during the past 15 months, the entire area in and around Bailey County was elated with general rain during the past week.

Dry, dusty farmlands, and sand dunes which had formed over the area enjoyed up to and more than three inches of rain that generally fell 'just right,' slow and penetrating the thirsty soil.

Most of the heaviest rain was concentrated in southwest Bailey County where a lot of the dryland farming area lies.

Around Goodland, rains amounted to three inches and more. Frank Stegall said he received approximately three and three-tenths inches and on the Reuel Kirby farm north of Maple, the amount of rainfall for the past week was two and a half inches.

Floyd and Loyce Davis, who live on the Arch Highway near the New Mexico line said they received two and three-fourths inches of rain that fell 'just right,' and will now allow Davis to plant his dryland cotton.

At Bula, Bennie Claunch at Claunch Gin said one and three-tenths inches of rain was measured at the gin, but that would probably be enough to let them plant cotton.

In the Lariat area, on the Robert Hunt farm, they received just about an inch of rain, but the Hunts said they are ready for sunshine

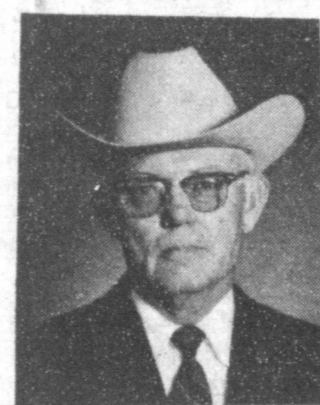
According to the tax collection report given by Tom Jinks, 103 percent of

BUSINESS OUTLOOK

By Edward Thorlund
The biggest furor in the nation's automotive industry, tied closely to the health of the national economy, was touched off recently when several U.S. auto companies announced huge bonuses for executives.

Bill Brock, the Reagan Administration's Trade Representative, reacted with a sharp indictment of excessive bonuses (some over \$1 million). He said the administration would not ask the Japanese to continue their quota system limiting car exports to the U.S. next year. (He had said that earlier but it then got little media attention.)

With car sales running over 30 percent above a year earlier, in late April, the auto industry seemed in healthy condition—and in a situation which will mean increased worker benefits this summer (to avoid a strike), and that will probably push car prices up next year.

If it does, with Japanese competition increasing, and tending to lower prices, 1985 may not be nearly as good for the U.S. companies as 1984.

Very high automobile sales are currently matched by high retail sales. Sears, the nation's biggest retailer, reported sales up over 9 percent in April.

K-Mart and Penney's, the next two largest chains, also reported good gains—Penney's even better than Sears and K-Mart gains.

The stock market takes all this sales and earnings news in stride, and languishes, not knowing whether higher interest rates are going to cool off the recovery or not.

If auto sales are down next year, that could take some of the pressure off interest rates, ironically, and lead to lower rates.

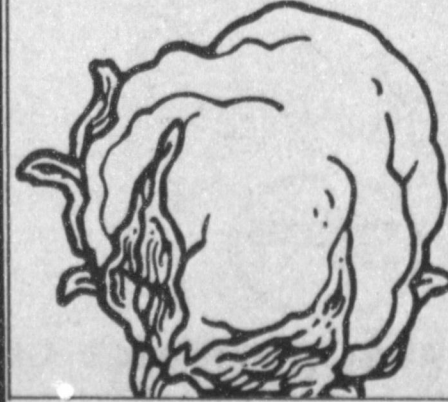

For Proper Pet Care Include Immunization

Every spring brings a renewed outbreak of rabies and a new round of pet immunizations, but what it should bring is the realization that proper pet care includes year-round protection and attention.

A good physical examination and program of disease prevention and parasite control can prevent many severe diseases that affect both dogs and cats and can be passed to humans. Chief among these diseases is rabies, says Spencer Tanksley county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Rabies is one of the oldest and most feared diseases that can be spread from animal to man, Tanksley says. It is a natural disease of dogs, cats and many wild animals such as bats, skunks, foxes and raccoons. However, all warm-blooded animals are susceptible to rabies.

The disease is transmitted from animal to animal by means of a bite introducing the virus-bearing saliva or

through contamination of wounds, cuts or breaks in the skin, Tanksley explains.

Clinical rabies in man and most animals is 100 percent fatal; there is no specific treatment once the clinical course of rabies has begun. Therefore, it's vital for anyone bitten or scratched by a domestic or wild animal suspected of being rabid to contact a medical doctor immediately, warns Tanksley.

All pets, both dogs and cats, should be properly immunized against rabies each year by a veterinarian. Records should be kept and the animal should wear a rabies tag. Rabies clinics can be organized by communities to help get pets immunized, Tanksley says.

Policing stray animals and humanely disposing of those that are unclaimed also will help fight rabies.

Stockmen should consider vaccinating horses, cattle and other valuable animals in areas where rabies is prevalent in wildlife.

Immediate and thorough first-aid treatment of all bite wounds and scratches is

perhaps the most effective rabies preventative, Tanksley stresses. The wound should be cleaned with soap and water and a physician should be contacted for further treatment.

During the week of May 6-12, veterinarians and auxiliary groups will organize state and local National Pet Week campaigns sponsored by the American Veterinary Medical Association. The week's theme, "Caring People Care for Animals," is designed to celebrate the value of pets in our society as well as promote the concept of responsible pet ownership, including regular veterinary care, says Tanksley.

Expansion - Answer For Farm Business

Expansion could be the answer to farming and ranching operations struggling to survive financially.

Many farmers and ranchers look to expansion when their current operations will not generate cash flow sufficient to provide a desired level of living, said Dr. Richard Trimble, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, at a recent conference on "Teaming Up in Agriculture" at Texas A&M University.

Operations can be expanded "extensively" and "intensively," noted Trimble. "Extensive expansion" means acquiring and using more resources, such as land, labor, capital and management, while "intensive expansion" refers to using resources better. Management is the biggest factor in intensifying an operation, said the economist.

"Farmers and ranchers often expand their operations by taking on a new partner, usually a son or daughter," Trimble said. "Before this new team or partnership is formed, operators need to realistically evaluate what is going to happen. Generally, cash flow will need to be increased because of the added drain created by the new team, whether it be one individual or a family."

"The real key in expanding an operation is to make an accurate assessment of the existing farming, or ranching business," emphasized the economist. "You've got to know where you're at so you can figure

out where you're going."

Another speaker, Dr. Wayne Hayenga, an Extension Service economist and attorney, reviewed the many legal choices in expanding a farming or ranching operation.

Choices include partnerships, limited partnerships, corporations and business trusts. All these choices have various implications on a business from the standpoint of taxes, state law, costs, liability, personal preferences, control and ownership, profit sharing and financing, Hayenga said.

Income tax planning and estate tax planning are key elements affected by the

"Time spent on planning how the operation will be run to satisfy the needs of all concerned and to reduce the tax burden now and in the future will avoid a lot of frustrations and heartaches down the road."

Hayenga advised all farmers and ranchers to seek legal counsel on major decisions affecting the structure of their operations.

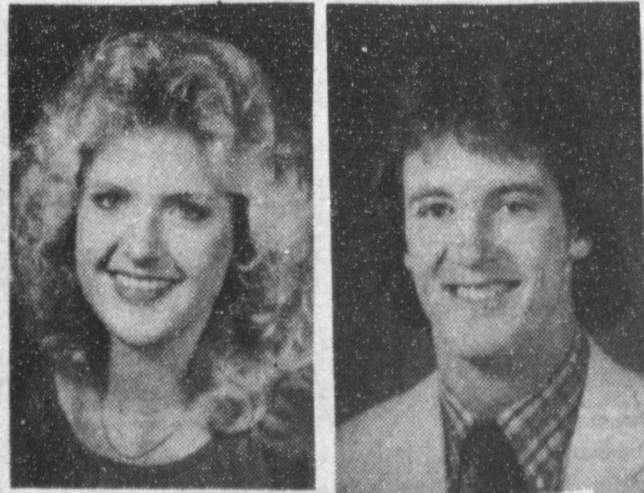

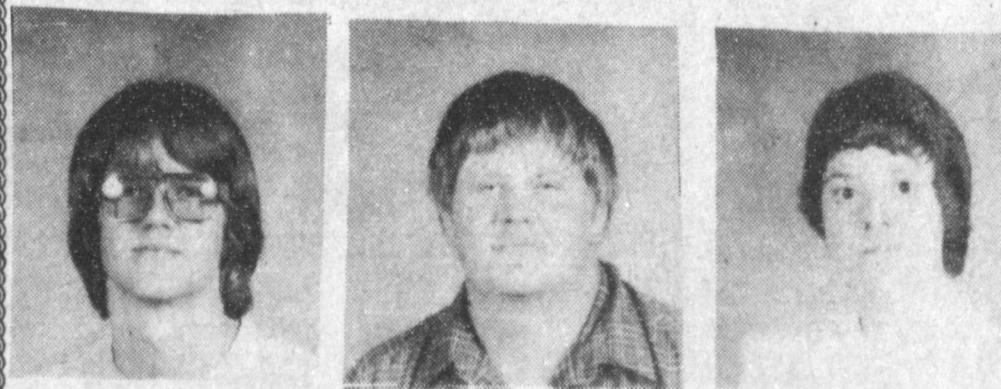
