Basque Guerrillas May Be Executed

MADRID (UPI) — Generalissimo Francisco Franco's government met in special session today to consider drastic action against Basque guerrillas who killed three policemen Sunday with a remote-controlled mine.

The three policemen were killed and two others injured when a fragmentation mine blasted their jeep. Funeral services were scheduled for the three men later today and were expected to produce more demonstrations in favor of the execution of other police-killing guerrillas.

Premier Carlos Arias Navarro and his ministers met at 10 a.m. at the premier's office. The government vowed last week at the funeral of three policemen slain in Madrid to continue its policy of executing terrorists convicted of killing policemen.

The latest death was reported in the town of Elorrio in Guipuzcoa Province where unknown gunmen shot and killed Basque tavern owner Ignacio Echave Orogongoa. The victim was the brother of Juan Jose Echave, known as a militant Basque separatist who has taken refuge in France.

Police said a group of men entered the bar, had a drink and then opened fire on Echave, 45, with automatic weapons.

Authorities said the bodies of the three slain civil guards would lie in state in the guards' headquarters in the town of Mondragon.

Guerrillas set off a remote-controlled Claymore mine in the Basque province of Guipuzcoa Sunday afternoon, blowing up a jeep carrying members of the Guardia Civil, the national police force.

A police spokesman said the blast shot the vehicle through the air end-over-end for 60 feet, killing three of the officers and seriously wounding two others.

Squads of national police set up roadblocks in Guipuzcoa's lush green mountains in an attempt to capture the guerrillas, but there were no immediate reports of success.

The attack near the Roman Catholic shrine of Aranzazu appeared to be in reprisal for the government's firing squad execution of five guerrillas nine days ago.

The blast, which sent chunks of shrapnel tearing through the jeep, appeared to be the work of Homeland and Liberty, a guerrilla group fighting for the independence of the four Basque provinces in northern Spain.

Prime Minister Luis Carrero Blanco was killed in 1973 when Basque separatists set off a similar bomb under his car in Madrid, blowing the vehicle over a five-story building.

The Spanish government has vowed to keep enforcing its tough anti-terrorist law, which imposes a mandatory death penalty for slaying policemen, despite widespread protests around the world against the executions.

In May 1975 Col. Ethan Allen and Gen. Benedict Arnold argued over who would be in charge of the attack on Fort Ticonderoga. They finally agreed to share the troops and the glory. But history gave most of the credit to Allen.

Constitution Supporters Are Deceiving

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — Former Speaker Price Daniel Jr. today said the leader of a campaign against Texas' pro-constitution is deceiving the public and covering up his own selfish interests in the Nov. 4 election.

"Peyton McKnight is hiding behind the coattails of his greedy, selfish, special interest friends and using their money to conjure up hobgoblins, ghosts, witches, and other assorted spooks," Daniel said. "He is trying to turn this crucial election into a big Halloween party rather than the thoughtful, intelligent debate of constitutional issues that it should be."

Daniel, who served as president of the 1974 Constitutional Convention, said the Tyler senator's rejection of a state-wide radio and television is "a serious indication that McKnight's campaign is based on deceit, deception and distortion and bankrolled by special interests and lobbyists who have selfish reasons for not wanting Texas to adopt a modern Constitution."

The former speaker said if McKnight's opposition is not based on personal antagonism towards Daniel he should be willing to debate.

Wood Stove Burns, Five Children Die

SAPULPA, Okla. (UPI) — Five children, between the ages of 1 and 13, were killed Sunday in a fire apparently started by clothing draped over a wood-burning stove to dry.

The fire collapsed the interior walls of the rural house where the children were sleeping unattended before firefighters arrived, officials said.

Investigators said the children apparently lit the stove, washed some clothing and spread the garments over the stove to dry, but the clothing caught fire and the flames spread.

Killed were four children of Dolores Robertson, who was away from the house at the time the fire began, and a cousin James Hill, 9. The Robertson children were identified as Donald Wayne, 13; James, 11; Emanuel, 2, and Sherry, 18 months.

David Robertson, 7, was the only survivor. He said he tried to awaken his brothers, sister and cousin but was unable to move them before he ran from the house and sought help.

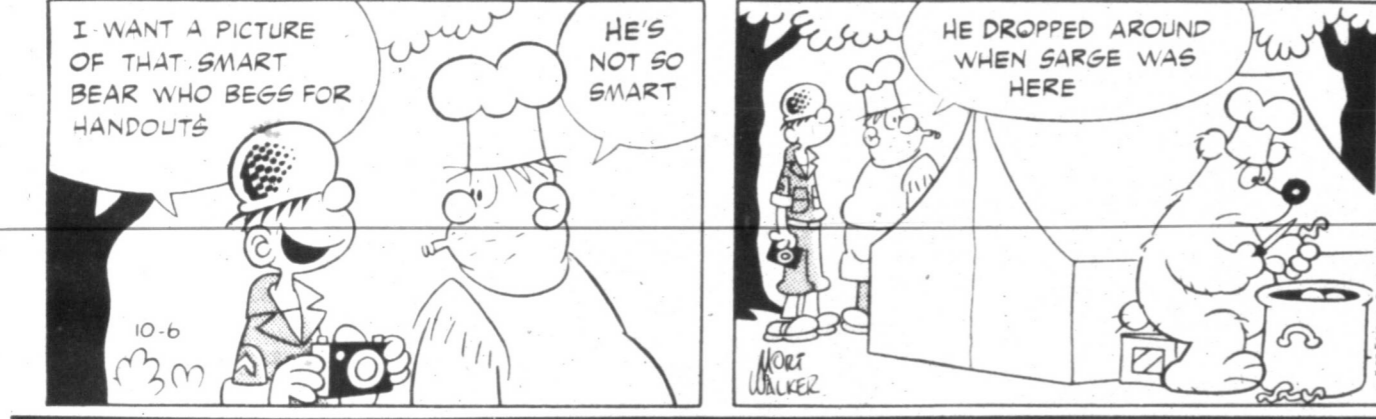
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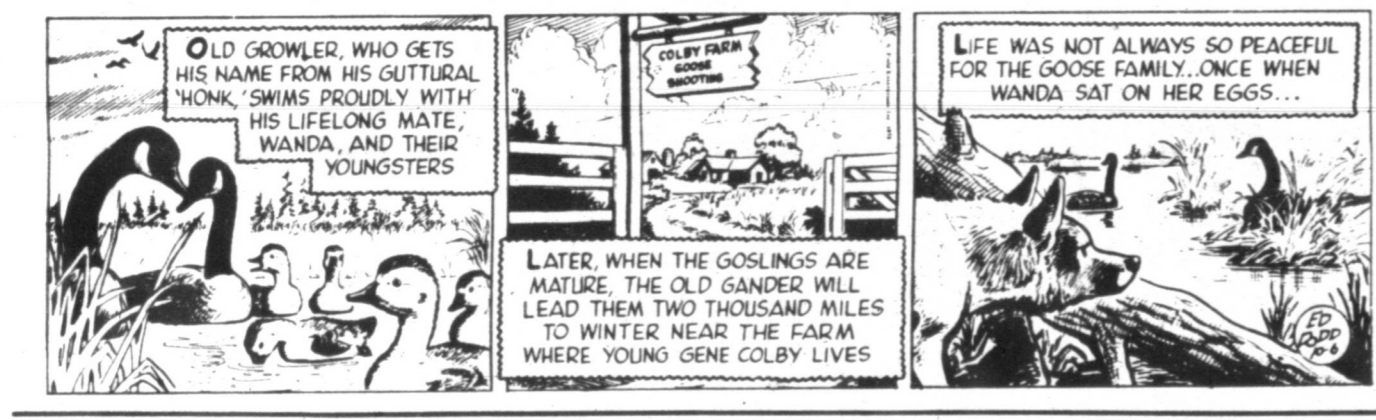

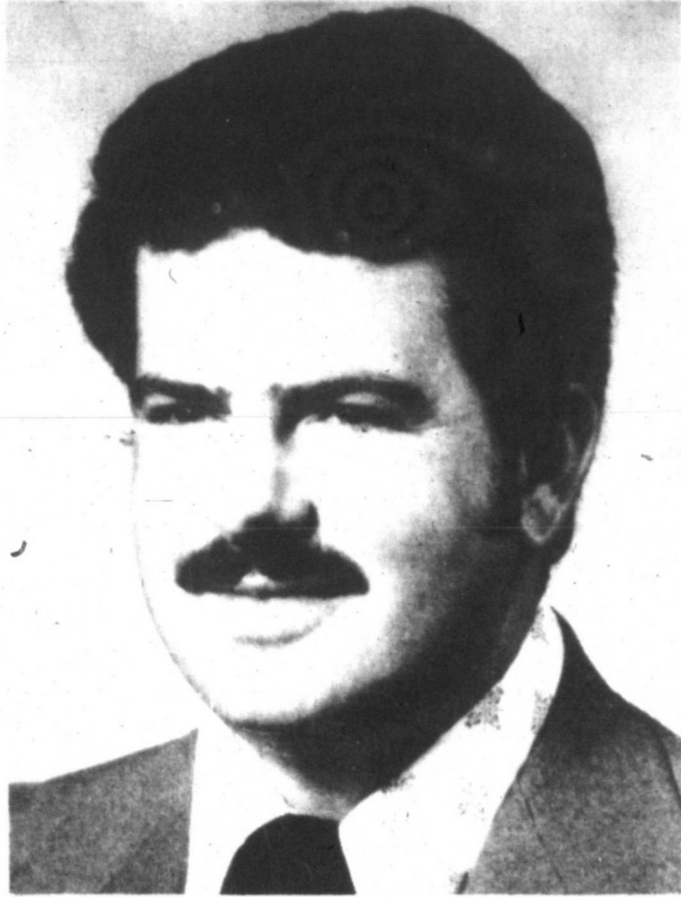

Martha Mitchell Has Blood Disease

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Martha Mitchell is being given chemotherapy treatments for a blood plasma disease her doctors say is manageable.

Mrs. Mitchell, 57, wife of former Attorney General John Mitchell, has been in Northern Virginia Doctor's Hospital where she has been undergoing tests for the past month. "She was a pretty sick girl but she is improving daily," according to her physician, Dr. Thomas O'Brian, an internist. He predicted she could leave the hospital at the end of this week "but will continue to undergo chemotherapy treatment."

A team of hematologists decided Mrs. Mitchell has a blood plasma disease. These specialists are Drs. Lee Smith, Robert Dobrzynski and Winston Ueno. A neurologist, Dr. Barbara Mella, also has been attending Mrs. Mitchell for a disease that requires treatment on a regular basis, according to the doctors. "It's a disease that is manageable," one of them said.

Weekend News Summary

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (UPI) — Chuck McCracken, who took himself off a kidney dialysis machine to await a slow but peaceful death, was buried during the weekend.

McCracken, 37, died of a heart attack Wednesday shortly after telling friends in the hospital, "The Lord's been good to me." Suffering from diabetes, blindness, paralysis and a diseased thyroid in addition to his kidney troubles, McCracken unplugged his dialysis machine two months ago so he could "die in dignity."

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States has 23 per cent more coal than thought but only

5 per cent of the 3,966 billion tons can be recovered with present technology, the U.S. Geological Survey said Sunday.

The survey said that as of Jan. 1974, the U.S. had one-fifth of the world's supply.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Agreement has been reached on continued use of American military bases in Spain.

No details were released in Saturday's announcement by the State Department, which followed a meeting between Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger and Spanish Foreign Minister Pedro Cortina Mauri. A

spokesman said supplemental documents must be completed before the new agreement takes effect.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — "Palestine Liberation Organization head Yasser Arafat says the Egypt-Israel interim agreement could increase chances for a new Mideast war because it keeps Palestinian Arabs "dispersed and living away from their homeland."

The United States is "deeply involved in helping the Zionists to usurp our land and rights," Arafat told U.S. News & World Report in an interview released Sunday.

CIA Ordered Assassinations

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The CIA tried several times to assassinate Cuban Premier Fidel Castro, Sen. Frank Church said.

Church, D-Idaho, chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee investigating the CIA, said Sunday the plots and attempts spanned at least 15 years, although he said there was no evidence any American president was aware of them.

CIA Director William Colby also appeared to acknowledge the attempts — although indirectly — in an interview Sunday on CBS' Face the Nation.

Colby was asked about assassination attempts. He said in 1973 he ordered the CIA to have nothing to do with assassinations and he added he did not think it good to carry on a public discussion about them, partly because "some of the facts of these things... are very murky as to who was part of it and who — where the approval and how detailed the approval was."

By referring to the details of the approval, Colby appeared to be conceding the event.

Church was more blunt. "Yes," he said on ABC News'

Issues and Answers program when asked "did former CIA director Richard Helms confirm in secret testimony before your committee that the CIA attempted to assassinate Fidel Castro...?"

The Idaho Democrat was asked how far back the attempts to kill Castro went.

"The attempts go back beyond the Kennedy Administration," he said.

Then he was asked about "the plans."

"When this report comes out you will find both plots and attempts, and they span many years. They span the years from the Eisenhower administration through the Kennedy

administration and into the Johnson administration," Church said.

Colby, asked about the effectiveness of American intelligence, insisted that the U.S. intelligence system would alert the government of any potential attack.

Church said his committee's investigation turned up things "clearly illegal" and said "yes, indeed," criminal prosecution might be warranted, such as in the opening of mail. But he said it was not certain if any plots or attempts against the lives of foreign leaders violated federal law — and his committee would recommend legislation to make "hem illegal."

53 Refugee Children Find Foster Folks

FT. CHAFFEE, Ark. (UPI) — Fifty-three refugee children who left Vietnam without their parents have been placed with foster parents in the United States.

Before the foster parents receive custody of the children they must agree not to seek permanent custody of the children for at least three years.

"We ask them to sign the agreement because most, if not all these kids, have parents living in Vietnam. We want to protect their rights and we want the kids to be able to return to their parents in Vietnam if they want to and the opportunity ever arises," explained Ann Henshaw, a State Department attorney and legal advisor at Chaffee.

Twenty-four of the children have been placed with foster parents in Arkansas and the rest with persons living in other states.

Two Business Schools Close

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — The State Board of Education Saturday closed two business schools in Dallas and Houston because of financial instability.

Mark Perlmutter, assistant attorney general, said Draughon's Business College of Dallas had a deficit of more than \$114,000 and Southwestern Business College of Houston owed more than \$100,000 in refunds to students.

Dallas attorney Jim McCoy said Draughon's in June was given 90 days to file an audited financial statement. Thirty days later, McCoy said, the state revoked the college's license to operate.

"It's not fair to revoke this 90-day thing," McCoy said. McCoy said state law re-

quired the state to give the school notice of the revocation order.

"This was not done," he said. "The revocation order came out of the blue."

An overdraft of \$25,000 had been paid before the revocation order he said.

"The owners of the school did an almost phenomenal job of bringing it from a bad situation to an almost good situation. Gentlemen that's just not fair."

McCoy said the board of education had not set guidelines for minimum standards of financial stability for proprietary schools.

Perlmutter said the revocation order was sent because of the school's \$114,000 financial deficit.

"It was decided that because the financial instability was so great that they couldn't wait delay for revocation," Perlmutter said.

Perlmutter said the Texas Education Commission recommended Southwestern be closed because it owed more than \$100,000 in refunds to students.

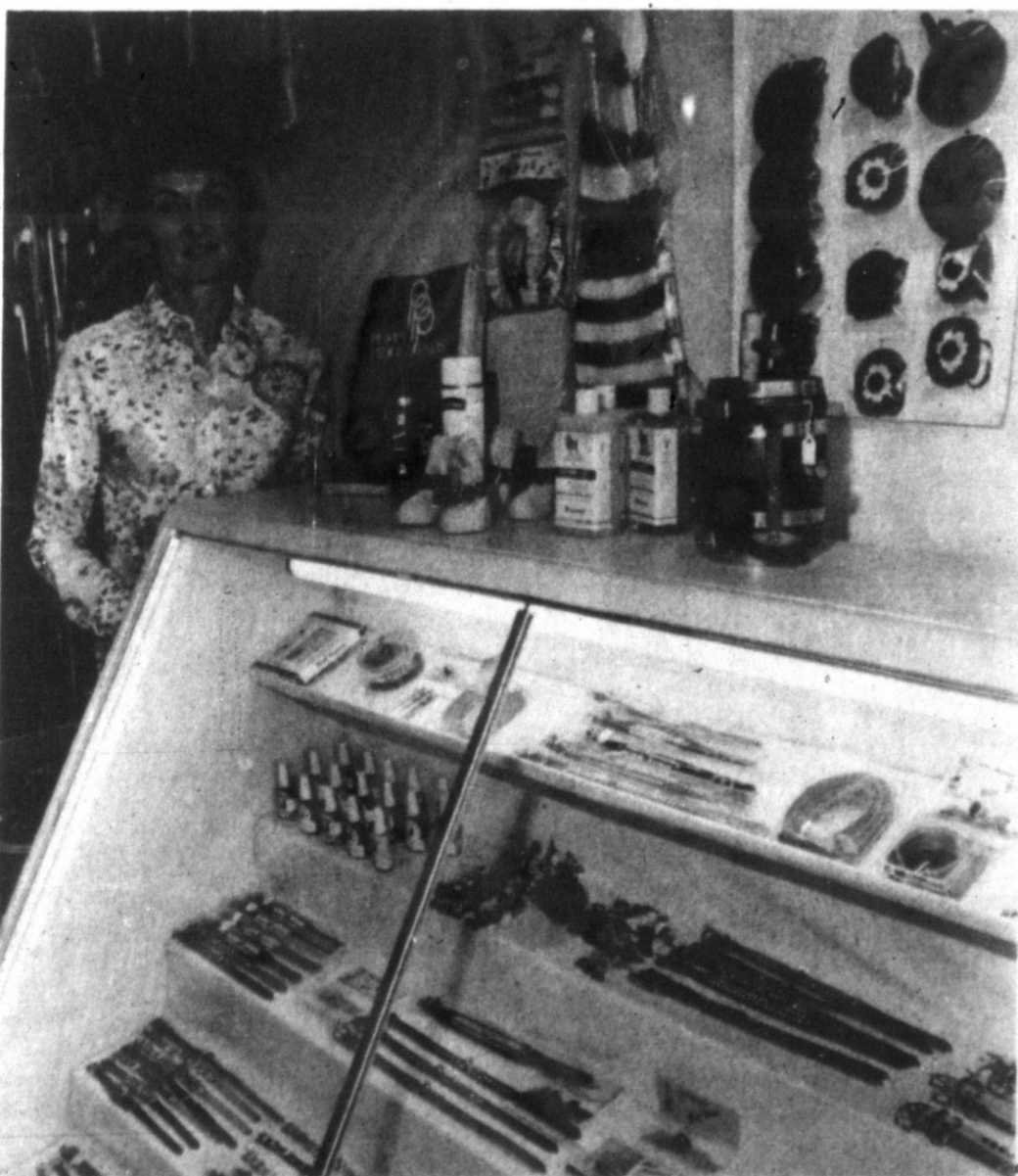
San Antonio attorney Kenneth Beanland representing Southwestern said there never was a complete audit made of the school's financial books which he said was necessary before the facility was closed.

Beanland said the school owed the refunds because the federal government has discontinued its insured loan programs of the facility.

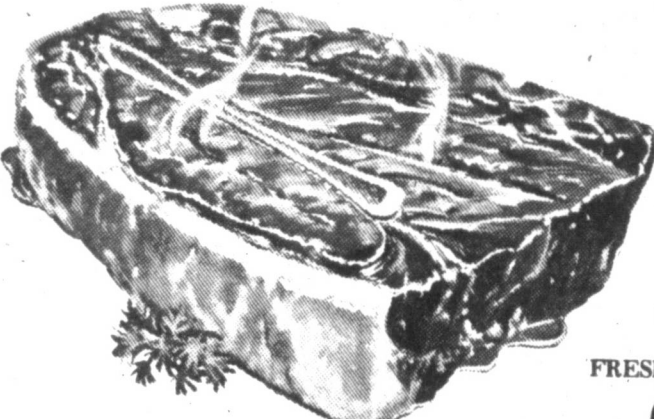
