Ford Proposes Food Stamp Sweep

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The administration today proposed sweeping changes in the food stamp program that would limit aid to official poverty level families, eliminate 1 million households from the program and save taxpavers an estimated \$1.2 billion a year

The plan, outlined before a Senate committee by Agriculture Secretary Earl L. Butz. would tie food stamp eligibility to the official poverty figure established each year by the federal government

This figure currently is \$5.060 for a family of four But the administration plan allows a "standard deduction" of \$100 a month or \$125 if the household contains a person over age 60 in figuring food stamp eligibility. The deduction would raise the annual gross income figure to \$6.250 or \$6.550

But z said use of government poverty figures would eliminate 1 million households - or 3.4 food stamp program. This represents roughly 17 per cent of

McGovern, D-S D, and Robert Dole, R-Kan, authors of an alternate food stamp reform

McGovern said the program is a surrender to some of the more extreme critics" who want not to correct the abuses that have surfaced but substantially reduce the scope of the program by making it strictly a poverty program

Dole suggested the Ford bill is another overture to conservatives who first proposed the \$5.050 figure

Butz said 3.3 million households or 57 per cent "will be at least as well off under the administration bill Of this figure, 14 million families or about one-fourth of the total recipients — who Butz called "the poorest of the poor" — will

have their benefits increased He said 46 per cent of the persons now receiving food stamps would have their million individuals — from the benefits reduced and 17 per cent would become ineligible

The official poverty level the 18.8 million individuals incomes, excluding the \$100 or currently participating in the \$125 monthly standard deduction, currently are \$4,230 for a The plan was immediately family of three. \$5.870 for a

family of six

McGovern also criticized another aspect of the administration plan which would have food stamp eligibility on the actual income for 90 days before a food stamp application is made rather than the present procedure of estimated income for the coming month

Butz said using income from the past three months as an eligibility trigger would save \$550 million a year, while charging families a uniform 30 per cent of their income after the standard deduction and limiting the program to poverty level families would save an additional \$720 million

Currently, the food stamp program costs the government \$5 2 billion a year

Aside from revealing his stamp program. Ford had a busy schedule today including the planting of a bicentennial tree on the White House grounds and presiding at the swearing in of Richard Dunham as chairman of the Federal Power Commission. He also scheduled a meeting with his economic and energy advisers

Accused of Killing Six in Nebraska

SUTHERLAND Neb (UPL) Charles Erwin Simants kept pretty much to himself - so much so that some of his neighbors in this rural community of 840 persons didn't know he existed But that is all

changed today The quiet wheat and ranching community along the South Platte River now knows Si mants as the man who was and charged with shooting to death six members of the Henery Kellie family

Simants, 29, stood in front of a judge Sunday, staring at the floor while he was formally charged with six counts of firstdegree murder. The victims. including three children, lived next door to Simants on a secluded dirt road at the north edge of town. A rifle was used in

Simants, a slight 5-foot-7 man. was ordered held without bond. A preliminary hearing was scheduled for Wednesday

Neighbors of Simants who were questioned said he didn't mix much with others as far as

'I didn't even know he existed," said Albert Meyen, who lived a block away from Simants

Simants' mother said her son admitted the killings to her and her husband, but police would not say if they had a confession. Lincoln County Sheriff Gordon Gilster questioned Simants but said his statements were not too clear

'He (Simants) had been drinking," said Gilster, "but I wouldn't say he was that drunk

Killed were Kellie and his wife, Marie, in their 60s; their son David, 33; and three of their grandchildren - Florence, 10. who lived with them, and Deanne, 8, and Daniel, 5, who were visiting their father

The bodies were found after authorities received an anony mous telephone call Simants, described by neigh

bors as a loner, spent Saturday night and early Sunday morning hiding in weeds only about 112 blocks from the Kellies home while authorities searched the town

Police looked for Simants for 11 hours before he returned to the home of his sister and brother-in-law, where he had been staying

Plundering the Prudent

Mayor Fred Hofheinz of Houston (the only unzoned major city in the U.S.) should have been the most popular delegate at the U.S. Conference of Mayors in Boston. His city. the sixth largest in the nation with a population of 1.3 million. has a remarkably low unemployment rate and a city budget covering all necessary services and still posting a \$14 million surplus

We would expect that Democratic mayors from big cities that are on the financial ropes would flock around Mayor Hofheinz to ask him how it's done. Instead, they used Houston as an example of why the federal Revenue Sharing program ought to be reformed. What agitates them is that Houston, under present formulas, is entitled to 116 million in Revenue Sharing

And why not? Citizens of Houston are sending money to Washington under the same federal tax laws as everyone else in America. If fairness is to prevail, they should get some of it back.

Not according to Mayor Richard Daley of Chicago. Mayor West Uhlman of Seattle. Mayor Coleman Roung of Detroit and many others. "If Houston doesn't need it, Houston shouldn't get it," said Mayor Uhlman, summing up what has emerged as a new drive by the mayors of cities that are in financial trouble to get relief at the expenses of cities that are managing to avoid such

Former President Nixon looked at Revenue Sharing as part of a "new federalism." The theory was that returning federal tax dollars to states and cities in the form of grants would be preferable to federal programs in local communities which were conceived and directed from Washington.

That form of "new federalism" had some appeal even though it, would have been more logical to leave the money in the local communities in the first place. However, what the Democratic mayors were proposing, until the full Conference voted them down, was a form of federalism of quite a different stripe, using the federal taxing power to redistribute wealth among the cities of America. "From each according to his abilities, to each according to his needs," as Karl Marx expressed the 'principle' so well in 1875.

That the people of Houston should be taxed to pay the garbage collectors in New York amounts to an "ism" so alien to the concept of justice that the mayors who propose it ought to be sent back to high school for a class in civics. (We take that back. That's probably where they got the idea in the first

It's no wonder that pollster Louis Harris had to report to the mayors that the number of Americans expressing confidence in their local government had sunk from 43 percent a decade ago to 14 percent today.

'Send It Back'

You've heard the expression, or something similar to it, no doubt: "Everyone has his hand out for some of that 'free'

Everyone? Well, not quite. An incident in Taos, New Mexico, as reported in U.S. News and World Report, serves

to point up two things: 1. That there is a growing awareness that tax money sent to Washington, D.C. or state capitals and returned, minus the cream skimmed off the top, is not "free." There are strings attached. ("He whose food I eat,

his song I sing. 2. That the spirit of independence for which Americans are noted the world over is still alive and kicing here in the West.

Taos, a ski resort, art colony and tourist mecca, had applied for and got a federal grant of \$200,000. The money was to be used for a renovation of the town

Upon receipt of the grant, an open meeting of citizens was held to discuss just how the money was to be spent; at which time the mayor reminded the assembly that the grand had to be spent "properly," meaning in accordance with "guidelines" laid down by Washington.

That got the gathering of Tao's citizens to thinking. And, when someone velled. "Send it back to Washington — we can handle our own affairs," the gathering arose as a body and cheered.

"Send it back," cried a single individual standing on principle. And they did!

That's the spirit that made this country great. That's the spirit we do honor to as we get ready to celebrate the Bicentennial Year.

Instead of going to Washington, or Austin, for money, plus controls, let's put the pressure on both capitals to leave our money here, where it came from in the first place. and where it will do the most

QUESTION: It's going to cost us tax pavers \$200 million to keep 200 American civilian techinicians between Arab and Israeli forces. Isn't a million dollars a year pretty high upkeep for stationing personnel around the world? By what right do the people like Kissinger and Ford commit American tax payers to such expenditures? Aren't we getting into the same position Presidents Eisenhower and Kennedy got us into in

Southeast Asia? ANSWER: We have no way of knowing anything about the cost of installing and maintaining sensitive electronic equipment and technicians in a foreign land. We would suspect that the rumored cost of \$200 million a year would not be overstated. In fact, judging from the way politicians spend tax payer money it would not be surprising if the expenditures would run far higher, in future years if not

immediatly. We know of no "right" the Ford - Kissinger administration possess to commit expenditure of U.S. tax payers' funds in order to keep two belligerants apart. We suppose the expenditures are justified under conduct foreign policy and to command the military forces. We question whether there is any constitutional authority for the U.S. government to serve as an intermediary as it has been

doing We have for years pointed out that U.S. politicians have dragged the country into attempting to police the world, with or without the approval of the people. Once it was said that the sun never set on the British empire. Now, the sun doesn't set on U.S. military forces around the world, who are supposed to be helping to keep the peace, but who actually may more likely create resentment. There is grave danger that U.S. forces in the Sinai as "peace keepers"

will lead to further involvement. As desirable as peace in the Middle East is, we do not believe there is legal justification for the U.S. intervention.

It Helped Win the Revolution

By OSCAR W. COOLEY, Ph.D. On October 18, the people of Portland, Maine, will commemorate that day in 1775, when their town (then called Falmouth) was bombarded and destroyed by British men - of -

Concord and Lexington were six months behind us, Ticonderoga had been taken in May, and Bunker Hill fought in June. Washington's army had the British bottled up in Boston, but "Washington's Navy," consisting of armed, private ships, or privateers, was busy on the high seas - so busy and deadly that the British commander, Howe, ordered retaliatory raids on ports from which the privateers sailed.

Thus, two warships entered the harbor of Falmouth, warned the inhabitants to flee and canonaded the town with incendiary shells. No one was killed, but 139 homes, 278 other buildings, and 11 ships were reduced to ashes.

The colonies had no navy, but they were a seafaring people, bold and skillful as sailors, and had many merchant ships These they armed, commissioned with letters of que, and ser British vessels.

Privateering could be a highly profitable occupation, for when a prize was taken both ship and cargo (except munitions of war which it might contain) became the property of the owner and crew of the privateer. Customarily, the crew got one -

Thus, everybody wanted to serve on a privateer! And some 70.000 did (including the poet, Philip Freneau). It was so popular, in fact, that when Esek Hopkins launched a U.S. navy he had difficulty recruiting sailors. The Marblehead men who ferried Washington's men across the Delaware to take Trenton refused to re - enlist in the army, when their terms ran

out, because they itched to go

privateering. Washington could not have blamed them, for he had encouraged privateering in order to get guns and powder. On September 2, he had comissioned the first privateer. the "Hannah," And he himself owned an interest in at least one privateer

That fall the privateers took some 35 ships, worth \$20,000. These included the "Nancy," which yielded 2,000 muskets, 840 fuses, 31 tons of musket balls, and a 13 - inch mortar. No wonder Howe was upset.

The burning of Falmouth failed to intinidate the privateersmen. By the end of the war, 1,151 privateers had been commissioned by the Continental Congress and many from individual states. They took an estimated 1.500 British ships, plus more than 12,000 British sailors.

One reason Britain lost the war was that all the arms and supplies for the redcoat army had to be carried 3,000 miles across the Atlantic, and there was a Yankee privateer behind

communications by capturing

ships carrying dispatches. The privateers did not wait for their quarry but sailed boldly into waters around the British Isles. To do this they needed overseas bases, and the French, between whom and the British no love was lost, provided these. This intensified the British -French acrimony and was an influence bringing the French into the war on the American side. At Yorktown this help proved decisive.

Notable among the privateer skippers was Abraham Whipple, whose "Providence" slipped into a convoy of British merchantmen, bound from the West Indies to England. Each night he would board and capture one of these, put a small prize crew aboard, and send it to Boston. Eight arrived. They sold for over a million dollars.

Great among the privateer owners was Nathaniel Tracy of Newburyport. He sent to sea 24 armed ships, which took 120 enemy craft, loaded with British army. His prizes brought \$4,000,000

But Tracy had his reverses. Of his 110 ships, 97 were captured or sunk by the British. An ardent patriot, he gave the impecunious American government \$167,000 in cash, plus much clothing and food. He died poor.

The Cabots of Beverly owned at least 40 privateers. Since they traded much with Spaniards, they had their prizes taken into Bilbao, where they were sold and the proceeds deposited with a Spanish firm. Thus, unlike some owners of privateers they conserved their gains to the end of the war.

College Theater Director Develops Rare Philosophy

Until today, I had just about given up on college dramatics. My California experiences with it during the Sick Sixties were such as to make the word "traumatic" grossly inadequate.

One so - called institution of higher learning out there put on a "play" in which Jesus Christ was portrayed as a practicing homosexual. Another one produced a little gem featuring a third act during which the cast came up to the footlights and pelted the audience with the dismembered bodies of animals. Still others dwelt lovingly on such thespian poison as LeRoi Jones' "The Dutchman," and if you're not familiar with this one, be glad. There was even one called "The Toilet," which I'm trying hard to forget.

So I'm glad to be able to cite an exception today which I hope will make you feel as good as it did me. As reported by drama critic Kenneth Paul Shorey in the Birmingham, Ala., "News." Samford University's theater director Harold Hunt has developed a "philosophy of drama" which I can only hope will turn out to be as contagious as the Hong Kong Flu.

Says the upbeat Mr. Hunt: would not produce anti -Christian or immoral plays. Some directors, I guess, might consider this an encroachment on their freedom, but I don't feel in the least restricted.

As the late Jack Benny used to say: "Well!!"

How can the man find anything to produce? Aren't all modern plays either naked, like "Hair," or dirty, like "Oh Calcutta"? Don't they play up perversions and pessimism and downright paranoia?

Not all of them, apparently. Here are a few of Hunt's recent stagings: 'The Trojan Women"; "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown"; 'Waiting for Godot"; "The Night Thoreau Spent in Jail," and "The Fantasticks." All clean. All interesting.

Hunt's philosophy - and that of the university which employs him - is as direct as it is refreshing: "Theatrical experiences should challenge and uplift man and help him to make this a better world. That's basically how theater got started and it's the only hope for

the future. As a matter of fact, the man is right. Ancient drama showed man in relation to the divine So did the "miracle plays" of the Middle Ages, which were the direct ancestors of modern drama. The themes were awesome - heaven, hell, the seven deadly sins, crime and punishment, damnation and salvation. Contrast them, if you will, with current Broadway and off - Broadway themes ranging from the trivial (who is going to bed with whom or, in some cases, what) to the revolting (gutter dialogue and excretory

I'm resisting the urge to oversimplify, but I'm tempted to come up with a one - phrase reason for the contrast: not enough Harold Hunts. In other words, not enough dramatics instructors and directors with a sane, balanced, decent philosophy of the theater. To get closer to the truth, perhaps another phrase is necessary: not enough Samford Universities. Because only an institution which knows where it stands and what it stands for will hire a man like Hunt - and then back him to the hilt when he decides that some of the prurience currently passing as plays simply will not measure up to said standards.

Anyhow, Samford and Hunt have shown that college theater doesn't have to be downbeat and degenerate. What they can do, others can do also. So, gentle reader, if you feel the urge to send this column to your local college president and - or theater director, be my guest. They may not be converted, but it's bound to be good for their souls.

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Life or Death-The Case of Karen Quinlan United Press International Doctors speak of it matter of factly. It's called "pulling the plug." Those in favor say it's the only human thing to do. Those who object call it murder.

The case of Karen Ann Quinlan has sparked a nationwide controversy over the legal question of "When does death occur?

Karen, 21, suffered massive brain damage and slipped into a coma last April 14. Doctors have told her adoptive parents -Mr. and Mrs. Joseph T. Quinlan of Landing Section, N.J.-the brain damage is irreversible and there is no hope for recovery

Karen is being kept alive by tube feeding and the use of a respirator. Her parents want her to die naturally, with "grace and dignity.

The Quinlans go to court in Morristown, N.J. Monday to seek a court order to halt the life-preserving devices.

What complicates the Karen Quinlan case is that she sometimes breathes independently of the respirator. And

Dr. Robert Fishman, chairman of the Neurology Department at the University of California, disagrees. "Murder is an act of commission and not an act of omission," he said.

"Withdrawal of vital supports

happens all the time in hospitals," Fishman adds. "It is an act of omission. If the diagnosis is correct, it is a: completely futile situation. There's no need to dramatize it to bits and pieces. No one will ever criticize a physician, for example, for not calling a 'code

patient. A code blue alert brings doctors in from all parts of the hospital to help revive a patient whose heart has stopped beating.

"In an age of informed consent," Fishman said, "the physician can no longer hide behind a cloak of incantations."

Another northern California physician who trained at one of New York's leading cancer hospitals said "doctors learn who to kill. If a person is in horrendous pain it's the only humane thing to do-to shorten their misery by a couple of lousy

'In the past," said the doctor, who asked not to be identified, these types of issues were handled by physicians making

Dr. McCarthy DeMere of Memphis, Tenn., chairman of the American Bar Association's committee on medicine and law. said the states with a legal definition of death at present are Kansas, Maryland, Virginia, California and Illinois.

In his opinion, the two best are those of California and Illinois because there is no eitheror and they are easy to understand by a judge and a

The ABA House of Delegates on Feb. 24 passed a statement of policy on a definition of death saying: "For all legal purposes, a human body with irreversible cessation of total brain function according to usual and customary standards of medical practice shall be considered

But in Massachusetts the state's top medical attorney, William Chayet, objects to the

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idea of legislation that would define death.

We have nothing in the state which defines death and I would be opposed to any such legislation," Chayet said. "We have enough to deal with on day to day legislation, never mind after we're dead. To push the Massachusetts legislature, or any legislature into determining when death occurs would be a tremendous error, but I can understand that everyone wants to pass the buck here.

"A Quinlan case could come up in this state" he said ? "Failure to keep it (medical assistance) going could constitute murder in Massachusetts. There has been so much pressure because of the Quinlin case, however, it could have a shot (in the legislature). The pressure is on the physician and he's the swing guy.

'Many physicians have told me privately they have not only have not continued life saving methods, but they've actually stopped them when the family was in full accord," he said. "That's terrible. But it's about the only way we can do it. The

Cigar stand operator Ed Piper of New Orleans, said: "I'd say no, they shouldn't pull the plug. Where would it stop? I think there would be somebody who would start demanding more and more. I don't think you could determine what's a crucial case and what isn't. The man who's paralyzed for life might want this too. I think it's killing.

Betty Smith, a secretary in Concord, N.H., said she feels the decision should be left up to the parents, not a doctor. But, she said, she might be reluctant to end a life because "how do you

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know what might be invented the next day that could cure them?

"I would side with the parents and pull the plug" said Mrs. Sonya Calabrese, 44, of Willingboro, N.J., a public relations counselor. "If you believe in God you have to believe he didn't mean for that girl to live through a machine. Keeping her alive through the machine would be criminal.'

But Joseph Dubanowitz, 26, of Clifton, N.J., a financial analyst for the Continental Can Co. in Manhattan, has been through it and "wouldn't pull the plug."

"I know it's a traumatic experience for the parents,' Dubanowitz said, "but as long as there is some ray of hope, they can't kill the girl. My wife had twins and one of them didn't make it. She was kept alive artificially for several months and at the time I was thinking like the Quinlans.

"I decided if there was any chance in the world, I wouldn't pull the plug," he said. "The baby died, but if I had it to do

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again I'd make the same decision. I'd never give up."

On the other hand, Richard Carmen of Wellington, Ohio. father of Randal Carmen, 17, who died Oct. 11 after 20 days in a coma caused by a head injury in a neighborhood football game, wanted Elyria Memorial Hospital to pull the plug after "brain death" occurred. The hospital refused.

"If we can make people aware, if we can get the kind of laws we need, there will be a purpose to Randy's death, Carmen said.

Omani Troops Cut Off Marxist Supply Route

An Omani government spokesman said today loyal Omani troops have cut off the main supply route for Marxist forces in Dhofar province, signalling "the beginning of the end" of the 10-year-old guerrilla war.

'Omani troops are now firmly in control of the main supply line which runs through west Dhofar," an Omani Defense Department spokesman said. Terrorist gangs further east have now been cut off from all food and ammunition.

"Although this is not the end of the war it can be regarded as the beginning of the end."

Reports from the Omani capital of Muscat earlier said Omani infantry, artillery and warplanes, backed by Iranian ground and naval forces, were sweeping along the Gulf of Aden's oil-rich coast in a drive against the guerrilla forces.

The Muscat reports said the forces backing Sultan Qaboos bin Said were battling rebels in mountainous Oman as well as across the border in South Yemen.

The reports said the leftwing guerrillas of the Popular Front for the Liberation of Oman appeared to be retreating in the face of the Omani and Iranian offensive

Oman, a Utah-sized nation of 750,000 persons on the southeast coast of the Arabian Peninsula. is one of a chain of tiny Arab oil states bordering Saudi Arabia

The Iraqi News Agency said the Front sent messages to leaders of the Arab world appealing for help against 'liberated' areas in Oman's southern Dhofar province.

Estimates on how much gas can be generated by emergency legislation for the winter are approximately 300 billion cubic feet. That would keep the shortage about the same size as last winter, but a shortage nonetheless.

designs. For each bride, Mrs. Reeves has dressed a tiny doll in an identical gown. As identical as she could make it. Of times she found it difficult to match the fabric, she said, and she could find little or no descriptions of four of the bridal gowns. For those she modeled the dresses after the fashion of the era.

Mrs. Reeve's avocation began by chance fours years ago when she decided to give a study club program on the brides.

Her doll collection includes one groom, Algernon Charles Fredrick Sators, who married U.S. Grant's daughter Nellie. Sators marched down the isle carrying a bouquet of orange blossoms topped with a flag bearing the word "love."

Miss Grant's \$5,000 gown was probably the most expensive ever worn by a White House bride, Mrs. Reeves said. Miss Grant received wedding gifts valued at \$75,000.

Only one president was married in the White House. Grover Cleveland wed his ward, Frances Folsom, when he was 49 and she was 22. The President wrote the ceremony and omitted

President's son ever to be married in the White House. His bride was Mary Kathryn Hellen, a niece of Mrs. John Quincy

Teddy Roosevelt's daughter Alice, in 1906, wed Nicholas Longworth before 1,000 guests. She had no attendants and is one of three White House brides still

The other two are Lynda Bird Johnson who married Capt. Charles S. Robb and Trucia Nixon who married Edward Cox Finch in the White House Garden.

One of the marriages ended in divorce: Eleanor Wilson. daughter of Woodrow Wilson, and Williams Gibbs McAddo who was secretary of the treasury

The White House saw two other marriages while Wilson was in office. Another daughter, Jessie, married Frank Sayer in 1913 and his niece, Alice, married the Rev. Issac Stuart McElroy Jr. in 1918 and they moved to Japan to be missionaries.

Mrs. Louise Gill Macy, the only divorsee wed in the White House, became the bride of Harry Hopkins in the President's office. She was a former editor of Harper's Bazaar and he was a land lease man living at the White House. She wore a blue crepe dress. President Franklin D. Roosevelt were Maria Monroe, daughter of James Monroe who married Samuel Governor in 1820. Her wedding gown is the only one displayed at the Smithsonian Institution.

Elizabeth Tyler wed William Davis Waller in 1842. Mary Ann Lewis, whose father was a personal adversary to Andrew Jackson, married Alphonse

Lucy Payne Washington, mother of Dolly Madison, was the first White House bride; she married Judge Thomas Todd in

Emily Platt, niece of Rutherford B. Hayes married General Russell Hastings. Six attended her wedding.

A sum of \$10,000 was spent to decorate the White House when Mary Ann Eastine married Lucina Janius Polk. Twenty spittoons were bought to accommodate the guests.

Pierre Cardin's first children's wear collection includes miniature versions of adult styles, as in a short-sleeved. ivory-colored raw muslin-look pants suit with vertical tucking and fagoting on the jacket.

Who Says Food Habits Can't Be Changed?

By DR. JEAN MAYER Professor of Nutrition, **Harvard University**

Among the many food myths. one of the hardest of dispel is the one that says, "You can't change food habits." Of course you can. Simply ask any of the giant advertising agencies that reap more than \$2 billion a year to influence the way Americans eat, and they will tell you how easy it is to change eating habits. Most of this money goes to advertise soft drinks, snack foods and sugared cereals - the least nutritious, the least necessary and the newest components in our diet.

For another example, look at the worldwide promotion of prepared baby "formulas," especially in developing areas. Tens of thousands of unsophisticated young mothers have abandoned the traditional breast feeding of babies and are substituting these products. Because the mothers don't know how to use these formulas, the Your beautiful gourmet result has been what one noted expert, Dr. Derek Jelliffe, calls

'commerciogenic malnutrition" of infants. Perhpas by inference, the myth really means, "You can't change food habits for the While it's true you can't change them by faith or wishful thinking, I am convinced that people will adopt a healthier way of eating if given the proper information and motivation, and

I can cite numerous examples. Centuries ago, when the potato was brought from the New World to Europe, the French would have none of it. But King Francis I, who reigned from 1515 to 1547, recognized its value and also had a rare understanding of his subjects. He announced that henceforth, potatoes were the food of kings

and that any peasant caught stealing the king's potatoes would be severely punished. He then planted his fields with potatoes and had them guarded - very poorly. Within a few years, the French had over 100

ways of preparing potatoes! The Irish needed so such subterfuge; they readily recognized the nutritious and prolific crop that could be grown underground as ideal for a small, poor nation constantly at war with armies trampling the farmland. More recently, the so - called

green revolution" in Asia introduced wheat into a diet in which rice had been the staple or traditional eating habits have undergone profound changes since World War II. Just a couple of generations ago, we ate mostly unprocessed or lightly processed foods and we ate at home. Now more than 50 per cent of our diet consists of industrially prepared foods.

Instead of three meals a day many of us now eat a number of light meals and snacks, altering our nutritional intake and the place where the dinner is served. Americans eat about one - third of their meals outside the home, and in many households the art of cooking has all but disappeared.

Fortunately, I can also point out examples of Americans who have changed their eating habits for the better. Thousands of overweight people each year are turning away from fad "crash diets" and adopting sensible, weight - reduction programs, often through responsible self help groups, such as Weight Watchers. Not only are they shedding unwanted pounds but also permanently altering their habits to improve their

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

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Prosecutor Calls Pardon Of Nixon Bad Timing

mer Watergate special prosecutor Henry Ruth says he thinks the timing of President Ford's pardon of Richard Nixon was atrocious.

"I never dreamed in my own mind that the pardon would come before the Watergate jury was sequestered," Ruth said

"I thought the timing of the pardon was atrocious in the sense that it was ... a month before the Watergate trial was due to start.

Ruth, who stepped down from the prosecutor's office last week, was interviewed on CBS' "Face the Nation.

As it later turned out, the pardon did not hurt the trial of five top Nixon administration officials charged with covering up the Watergate scandal, Ruth said. But the timing was "extremely unfortunate," he

Ruth, the third man to hold the position of prosecutor, said not solved "because it was inevitable that the higher you got, the less cooperation you were going to get in investigations.

Asked whether there was anything in former President Richard Nixon's testimony to a grand jury in June that would 'surprise, change or alter" public knowledge of the scan-dal, Ruth said: "I really should not hint about that, but obviously we took that testimony at the end of June, and there have not been major indictments since then."

Ruth defended his work and the practice of plea bargaining. which he said was "essential" to the investigation. "Equal justice was achieved by the work of our office as much as could have been possible.

In an interview with Cox Newspapers this weekend, Ford said he opposes making the special prosecutor's office a permanent one.

Game Official Predicts **Alligator Slaughter**

CAMERON, La. (UPI) - A federal regulation designed to protect alligators from extinction may backfire and lead to wholesale slaughter of the big reptiles, a Louisiana game official predicts.

Alan Ensminger, chief of the refuge division of the Louisiana Wildlife and Fisheries Commission, said Sunday a law prohibiting export of domestic alligator hides is expected to cut sharply into prices hunters were expecting for up to 4,000 hides taken during a legal, threeweek gator season in Southwest Louisiana

Trappers that had been protecting these animals over the years would just go right out there in the springtime and kill every alligator they see. whether it's against the law to do it or not because they can't tolerate that predator eating their fur-bearing animals," he

The legal hunt, supervised by game agents, ended at sunset Sunday. Hunters began registering their catches today and buyers will submit their offers

by sealed bid after all hides have been examined. The bids were not expected before Wednesday.

Louisiana game authorities and trappers said alligators have multiplied manyfold in the state since they were classified an endangered species, protected by federal law. The law was altered to allow the limited hunt in an area inhabited by an estimated 300,000 alligators.

The marshy area also is home for nutria, whose pelts are worth \$5 each. But a big bull alligator can devour as many as 300 of the small nutria a year and reduce the supply available to trappers. Alligator hides sold to Euro-

pean buyers netted the hunters as much as \$21 a foot and an average of \$13-\$14 a foot during a similar 1973 hunt. But the new federal law closed the overseas market and prices as low as \$6 to \$7 a foot have been rumored this

Bacon Ingredient May Be Removed

WASHINGTON (UPI) -Bacon, called by one critic "the most dangerous food in the supermarket," may be taken out of grocery stores unless manufacturers get rid of a cancer-causing ingredient, an Agriculture Department official

The danger lies in sodium nitrite - the agent found in cured meats that helps preserve them, protects against deadly botuism and provides their pinkish color, says Donald Houston, assistant deputy administrator in the USDA's Meat and Poultry Inspection Divi-

He said the decision to move against sodium nitrite comes after an 18-month study by a panel of scientific experts. Despite their value as a

preservative, nitrites also can combine with chemicals to form nitrosamines, among the most potent cancer-causing agents yet discovered. Scientists are not sure why, but while problems have been eliminated in most meat products, bacon produces more nitrosamines than other cured meats. One of the nation's favorite

breakfast foods, bacon has been called "the most dangerous food in the supermarket" by one critic, Michael F. Jacobson of the Center for Science in the Public Interest The American Meat Institute

said 1.4 billion pounds of sliced bacon was produced in plants under federal inspection in 1974. It estimated total 1974 consumption, including bacon produced in state-inspected plants. at 1.6 billion pounds.

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
