Champion lamb nets \$55,000 breaking record

The grand champion lamb named 39 fetched \$55,000 at the Junior Lamb Auction on the final weekend of the San Antonio Stock Show and Rodeo, shattering a record set two years ago.

LaShae Johnson, owner of 39, had said she'd use the money to buy a Ford Mustang and college. But after the auction, Johnson, said her proceeds would not mean the car of her dreams.

"There won't be a Mustang - that's just a child's dream,' said LaShae's proud mother, Cindy Johnson. "She's using it to go to college."

Last year at the Houston Livestock Show, she also showed the grand champion, which was auctioned for \$140,000. She got \$25,000, with the rest going to scholarships.

The auctioneer proclaimed, "We're going to make history," and more than 100 people in the stands cheered and rang cowbells. The cheering only got stronger as bids hit \$46,000, the record, and kept rising.

"You don't have to work on a farm or ranch to be touched by agriculture every day," Texas Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs. "It's easy to take for granted the abundant and safe food supply available to us every time we open our refrigerator or enjoy the plentiful supplies of clothes, furniture and plants that brighten our lives.

"All of this is due to the efforts of men and women who plant the seeds, cultivate the crops and raise the livestock," Combs said. "Agriculture also has a major impact on our state's economy."

Tips for Controlling Clutter

Decluttering is the first step to good cleaning and reducing allergens. Here are some helpful tips:

- 1. Allow enough time to get organized. Average time are three to six hours per closet or one and a half-day per room.
- 2. Sort the mail daily. Set aside 10-15 minutes daily to sort mail and take action on necessary items. Sort mail over a trash can, eliminating as much as possible. Decrease junk mail by requesting that your name be removed from mailing list.
- Toss old paperwork. Go through old piles and throw out expired coupons, warranties and service contracts, outdated schedules, invalid insurance policies, old grocery receipts, recipes and clippings you haven't used in five years or more. Remove and file special magazines and newspaper articles. Then toss newspapers older a week and magazines older than three months.
- 4. Create a filing system for everything. Eliminate piles by filing everything no matter what is its stage of completion and keep a to-do list for items that need attention.
- 5. Keep a limited supply of bags, containers and jars. Keeping a few of these

- items on hand is useful, but many people accumulate 10-20 times what they need. Limit yourself to a realistic quantity: 6-12 plastic containers and glass jars about 12 paper bags and 24 plastic bags let the rest go.
- 6. Save only important memorabilia. To get the most pleasure from what you save, keep only what's truly important. Buy each family member a "treasure chest" for memorabilia - a large plastic tub that fits under the bed or in the closet floor or garage shelf works well. They can add or delete items, allowing the container size to limit how much they keep.

Paso Lajitas is nothing like the resort city on the Texas side. "You find a dusty main street with abandoned vehicles, wandering chickens and straying burros. Two restaurants serve much the same food and exactly the same beer. You can book a room at Ramon's grocery store for a stay in small tourist rooms on the hillside above the store."

Jim's book points out that Santa Elena, Population 300, has four restaurants, rooms and a museum. "A blue sign near the Canon Restaurant advertises cuartos (rooms) with a shared bath, sheets and towels for five to ten dollars a bed."

The Buzzard's Roost in Boquillas is one interesting place he found. "It's a bed and breakfast where for ten or fifteen dollars you can listen to people playing guitars for most of the night and share in this unusual border culture."

The village of San Carlos is 18 miles south of Paso Lajitas. A two hour pickup ride over rough terrain gets you there. In San Carlos you find a rain forest with dripping mountain springs and a deluxe bed and breakfast called La Gloria.
