State Files Suit Against Packerland

The State of Texas has filed a suit against Packerland Packing Co. of Texas Inc. in connection with its operations at the Pampa plant.

The state has requested the 31st District Court here to fine Packerland from \$50 to \$1,000 per day for each violation of the Texas Clean Air Act.

An official with the Texas Air Control Board said today that a

suit filed against Packerland of Packing Co. Inc. "involves past violations and the odor

The official, who said "we shouldn't comment on it too much," explained the suit with, We had repeated violations of state regulations."

He said that the first item on a permit issued to Packerland called for an air scrubber system installation. The plant was built and was operating

without the scrubber system which constituted a violation.

The official emphasized that "the decision to file sunt wasn't based on a sudden circumstance; it was an accumulation of everything. We are supposed to enforce the state pollution regulations and we did have numerous violations. especially on running the plant without the scrubber.

FBI Seeks Hoffa Clues In 47-Acre Landfill

FBI has been searching a 47acre landfill area under the Pulaski Skyway in connection with its investigation into the disappearance of former teamster boss Jimmy Hoffa, law

enforcement sources said today. The sources said the FBI had visited the area but had not done any digging at the site, known as Moscato's Dump and considered by government investigators as a possible underworld burial ground

The FBI was issued a search warrant for the dump on Tuesday. The warrant said authorities were searching for · the body of Armand Faungno, who disappeared in 1972.

The Long Island newspaper Newsday quoted sources close to the investigation as saying the search for Faungno's body was a "smokescreen for the Hoffa hunt." Newsday said federal authorities claimed they were seeking Faungno in an apparent effort to disguise the search for Hoffa's body.

Faugno was an associate of Salvatore Briguglio, 47, the sters Local 560 in Union City. Briguglio was named by law enforcement officials in Detroit Thursday as a suspect in Hoffa's disappearance

Federal officials in Detroit have set the stage for a confrontation between an unidentified witness and three New Jersey Teamsters he said kidnaped and killed Hoffa.

The meeting was set for Saturday at an identification lineup ordered by a federal

Robert Ozer, head of the U.S. Organized Crime Strike Task Force in Detroit, said Thursday two men may hold the key to what happened to Hoffa.

One, he said, was a man who said he saw the abduction.

The other, Ozer said, was a man who named the New Jersey men as participants in Hoffa's abduction and murder.

The existence of both was disclosed Thursday when Ozer appeared in a federal court seeking an order to compel the New Jersey trio to appear for

Federal Judge James Churchill ordered the lineup after Ozer told him the three men refused to take part voluntarily.

Ozer said he would take elaborate precautions to prevent identification of the

Hoffa vanished July 30 from outside a suburban Detroit restaurant. Even his family long ago conceded he was dead.

But Ozer created a stir in federal court when he declared Hoffa was kidnaped and murdered and when he said a second witness had fingered three New Jersey Teamsters as "active participants" in Hoffa's disappearance.

Ozer said Salvatore Briguglio, 47 of Paramus N.J. business agent for Teamsters local 560 in Union City and a close associate of Anthony "Tony Pro" Provenzano, for many years the president of 560, was among the three named as the abuctors and killers of Hoffa.

The day Hoffa vanished, he told his family, he was meeting Provenzano and two other men

Floods Drive Indians From Washington Home

By United Press International The latest Pacific storm moved out of flood-stricken · Pacific Northwest coastal areas weakened today. More than 2,000 refugees, including Indi-

ans driven from their reserva-

tion, waited for floodwaters to

subside Waters were still rising in a few areas, including stretches of the Chehalis River in Washington's Grays Harbor County, but cooler weather and glimpses of the sun gave lowland dwellers hope that the

worst was over The refugees, many carried to safety by helicopters or boats, camped in churches, schools, Grange halls and motels

Betty McClelland, emergency services director of Grays Harbor County, reported 400 cattle and 200 sheep were stranded and possibly threatened. Floods in that area were expected to reach a peak Saturday.

One instance of looting was reported. Near Easton in rural eastern Washington, looters grabbed color television sets. guitars, light bulbs, tires, shoes and cans of shrimp from a creekbed where a freight train was wrecked earlier this week They looted the scene faster than salvage workers could pick up the strewn cargo.

Searchers Thursday rescued uninjured a mountain climber who endured four days of bitter cold gale winds at the 8,000foot level of Mt. Rainier in Washington. His climbing companion was still missing.

The latest round of floods drove 158 Indians from their reservation on Washington's Olympic Peninsula, boosting the number of refugees from the flooding to more than 2,000.

The gunmen later released three children held in the consulate shortly after a mediator was allowed into the dark brick building fate in the afternoon. Police said before the youngsters were released that 11 of the hostages in the consulate were school children.

Another terrorist band held dozens of hostages aboard a hijacked train at Beilen, where a 1.000-man force of troops and police appeared ready to attack to free the captives—held since Tuesday morning.

Tuesday morning. Press photographs of the Amsterdam consulate scene showed an Indonesian-looking person with long black hair wearing a sleeveless blouse and with bare arms folded across the chest. The electric cord with a plug on the end of it was clearly visible around the neck. The face was partly hidden by the white blindfold.

The threatening balcony appearance followed four telephone calls between police and the gunmen who shot their way into the consulate and occupied with hostages Thursday

Police did not say what they discussed with the gunmen, but the balcony episode appeared to be an attempt to force compliance with the gunmens' demands. After 15 minutes the figure on the balcony was hauled back behind the lace curtains.

The marines in Beilen, trained in anti-terrorist tactics, were positioned about 300 yards from the two-car, mustardcolored

They were backed by at least 150 blue-coated police sharpshooters carrying submachineguns. Jeeps, armored cars and personnel carriers lined nearby roads.



Capitalists Must Unite Or Lose Their Freedom

By ANTHONY HARRIGAN COLOGNE, GERMANY -The history of this ancient city, symbolized by its massive cathedral — the largest Gothic structure in the world - goes back to the earliest days of Western civilization.

A Roman settlement existed here before the birth of Christ, 50 A.D. The town received the name of Colonia Claudia Ara Agrippirensium after the Emperior Claudius. Agrippina, the consort of Claudius, was born in Cologne

Roman life flourished in Cologne and elsewhere in the Rhineland. The Roman remains - mosaics, sculpture, jewelry, medical instruments and household utensils — are housed in the superb Roman - German Museum on the Cathedral More than a thousand years

after its Roman origin, Cologne was a great center of medieval Christianity. Its vast gray stone cathedral is a perfect expression of the medieval outlook on this world and the spiritual world

Cologne, then, has seen the rise and fall of empires and cultures. In World War II, the old city was largely destroyed, though the cathedral was spared. Today, like other West German cities, it is booming with commerce and individual enterprise.

The future of West Germany and of its economic and political system is by no means certain, however. At mid - day, in the midst of a packed commercial center, I came on a mass of banner - carrying, chanting Communist demonstrators, many of them young people, who were demanding the release of imprisoned Red terrorists.

It is tragic that any young Germans should be beguiled by Communism. Not only is the Soviet system an economic failure - it again is experiencing a disastrous crop failure and turning to the U.S. for help to feed the Soviet people but its internal tyranny has been documented and publicized as never before by refugees from the system, notably by Solzhenitsyn.

If West Germany were to fall under Communist rule, its people would enter a political, cultural and economic ice age. Unfortunately, the prosperity of

recent years has eroded understanding of the Communist menace. Understanding has been eroded as it has been eroded in Washington where sensitive U.S. intelligence agencies are being torn apart for political publicity.

Communism or, more properly, international socialism continues to retain adherents in the West, despite the revelations about the USSR and its satellites. Why? Because international socialism has an ongoing organizational structure. The Communist and Socialist parties in the West have an easy task because the defenders of a free society and free economy are few and unorga nized

Capitalism has made possible he economic miracle in West Germany, the United States and elsewhere, but capitalism has only a weak organizational defense. The groups that defend capitalism, or free enterprise as it is known in the United States. have little or no contact. They don't grasp the need for an international capitalist or free enterprise movement to counter the efforts of the international socialist movement, which aims at throttling economic freedom and other freedoms as well.

Part of the problem in the capitalist countries is that the growth of government has sapped capitalist incentives and undermined loyalties. The Daily Telegraph in England recently cited the phenomenon, saying: "By impoverishing the middle

class, socialism makes it more

dependent on State provision for medical care, education, help of every sort, even subsistence. The socialist ruination of private industry, with widespread white - collar redundancies, tends powerfully to the same end. Moreover, by recruiting more and more middle - class or potentially middle - class people into a monstrously swelling bureaucracy, socialism removes from them their natural preference for economical government, and makes their very livelihood dependent on public

profligacy. The Capitalism may not be around by the year 2000 unless believers in freedom unite as the socialist foes of freedom have

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Rosenberg Files Reveal 'Sky Platform

ernment files on the Rosenberg pardon attorney's office, the spy case show the CIA considered Russia's success in stealing atomic secrets from its World War II allies was "an enigma a wartime phenome-

One spy suspect in 1950 told the FBI something it did not know: a "sky platform" that would hang 5,000 miles above earth was being studied in unstate New York. But it was just a theoretical study, the FBI was told.

These are among many disclosures found in roughly ' 63,000 pages of files of six government agencies on Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, executed in 1953 after being convicted on espionage conspiracy charges.

Documents have been released by the Justice Departoffice of the U.S. attorney in New York City, the Energy Research and Development

Agency, the FBI and the CIA. More are to come - from the Defense Intelligence Agency, the Office of Naval Intelligence, the Army and the Navy.

The Rosenbergs' two sons, Michael and Robert Meeropol, won a court ruling that they were entitled under the Freedom of Information Act to see files on their parents except those legally excluded on various grounds.

The CIA's 953-page offering made public Thursday contained an analysis by its foreign intelligence staff of Russia's success in learning about U.S. atomic research.

The FBI's tip on the "sky platform" came from David Greenglass, Ethel Rosenberg's brother and chief government witness against the couple.

According to FBI files, Greenglass said Julius Rosenberg had told him of a platform that "was to be suspended at a point where the earth's gravity ceased to exist."

Senate Set For Battle On Railroads

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Senate has voted to battle President Ford to determine how deeply the federal government will involve itself in preserving 'America's railroads as the last privately owned rail system in the world.

Both sides agree passage of railroad aid legislation is an absolute necessity before Congress adjourns for the year. But Ford has said he would veto the Senate bill and call a post-Christmas special session to pass a new bill if it clears Congress in its present form.

The Senate Thursday passed an \$8.6 billion aid bill 53-38 after a last-minute compromise meeting with Transportation Secretary William Coleman Jr. turned into a session of "conflict and confrontation," according to Sen. Lowell Weicker, R-Conn.

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

Monopoly Still Popular After 40 Years

The lot names, the tokens, the money, everything even the funny, little man who appears on the Community Chest and Chance cards and in the rules have become solidly entrenched as parts of American trivia, folklore and pastimes.

Boardwalk to Baltic. Reading to B&O. Luxury tax, income tax and jail, too. They are all a part, of course, of the immensely popular table game, Monopoly.

What was once merely a popular diversion for Depression families, has grown through the years to become one of the more popular and best-known table games in the world. But it was not until just recently that it became the subject of game theorists. intent on making Monopolyplaying a skill.

The game began humbly enough when Charles Darrow, an unemployed furnace town, Pa., designed the first version of the game on a sheet of linoleum in 1933.

He called the game Monopoly from the start, and modeled the board's lay-out after the street plan of Atlantic City, N. J., where his family had vacationed in better times.

Eighty million games have been produced since, netting Parker Brothers, the company that bought the game from Darrow in 1934, over \$75 million in profits. Although Darrow was never able to invent another marketable game, he died in 1967 a mil-

In 1973 the game sold 3.5 million dollars, an increase of 10 per cent over 1972 - a testament to the game's continued popularity. Even though its roots are unmistakably in the money-tight Depression days, the general principles the game is founded on are still as

Several years ago, Atlantic City officials seriously considered changing some of the roads' names to end some of the confusion that had motorists confused for years, but such an uproar of Monopolysentimentalists arose the idea was quickly scrapped. They argued changing the names of the roads would tend to take some of the realism away from the game. And besides, they said, the names like Connecticut and Tennessee avenues were too

The Russians regard the game as a perfect example of the dog-eat-dog capitalistic world. To them the game is known as "Capitalism."

If the rudiments of play of Monopoly are basically harmful to players, at least they are entertaining and as American as the proverbial

No less a high-brow publication than the New Yorker once described Monopoly

"The game (Darrow) in vented was brilliantly conceived, for it was an uncannily exact reflection of the business milieu at large. In its depth, range and subtlety. in its luck-skill ratio, in its sense of infrastructure and socio-economic parameters, in its philosophical characterizations, it reached the profundity of the financial community."

To those who probably play the game more often than any one at the New Yorker, the game is something less lofty, but just as much fun.

Maxine Brady, 33, a textbook editor and self-confessed Monopoly nut, wrote "The Monopoly Book," that was published last year. It was the first time so much of the game's playing theory was put into print.

Correspondingly, a world championship Monopoly tournament is now played

Pastor Is A Female

ACCORD, N.Y. - About 40 per cent of students in Protestant theological seminaries are women working toward ordination

The Rev. Joyce K. Stedge is the first woman to be ordained by the nation's oldest Protestant body, the Reformed Church in America, which began as the Dutch Reformed Church in New Amsterdam, now New York.

Since her ordination two years ago, Mrs. Stedge, the 49-year-old mother of six, has formed Church in this Ulster County village. The congregation, formed in a log cabin in 1701, is occupying its sixth building, this one completed in 1924.

Under her leadership, which involves working up to 15 hours a day as she makes pastoral calls, conducts counseling sessions, attends congregational meetings, prepares her sermons and runs a one-person church office, the parish has added 41 members and lost only a handful.

Mrs. Stedge regards the net gain, particularly because it includes young people, as an affirmation of her newfound role as a minister. She feels that the four women candidates for the Reformed ministry who are completing their seminary training will have as much as or more of a chance to prove their mettle in pulpit and parish.

Before her marriage, Mrs. Stedge was graduated in 1947 from the University of Iowa and took a year of graduate work in psychology. It was not until 1969 that she went back to school — to Union Theological Seminary - in New York, in a search for "theological ground to stand on, to find out where I was."

Her studies led her to the decision to enter the active ministry and she was ordained in her family church in Spring Valley, N.Y., in 1973 and immediately came to Accord, a sprawling rural community, which accepted her readily as the only pastor in

Because so much of her time has been consumed by counseling - the sick, couples with marriage problems, troubled teen-agers and the like - she has gone back to school part-time to improve her therapeutic skills.

Much less has been written or said, however, about the equally intense presecution of the so-called "Iron Curtain Christians," particularly those who refuse to compromise with Soviet authorities and maintain "unregistered" churches.

One of the most eloquent spokesman for those Christians is Georgi Vins, now languishing in a Soviet prison.

Vins' case has not yet been very publicized in the West, but a volume of his works including a long personal memoir and nine portraits of other Christian martyrs in the Soviet Union - is certain to draw attention not only to Vins' plight but to the whole range of religious persecution in the Soviet Union

Vins' book, "Testament from Prison," published by the David C. Cook Publishing Co., is translated by Jane Ellis and edited by Michael Bourdeaux, both of England's Keston College, home of the Centre for the Study of Religion and Communism.

Bourdeaux, who compares Vins' "Testament" with the prison writings of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the German Lutheran pastor executed by the Nazis, says that the technical reason Vins' is currently imprisoned - his second jail term in the past decade - is because "he was organizing children for religious educa-

Under Soviet law, as distinct from the nation's constitution which allows the free exercise of religion, the only religious activity permitted by the state is worship in a registered church.

But Bourdeaux said the business of the children was "an excuse" and the real reason for the imprisonment is that Vins "has consistently led the opposition to the controls over religion the state tries to

Bourdeaux, who is director of Keston College, has spent 20 years studying religion in Communist countries.

He estimates that there are some 50 million Christians in the Soviet Union, the overwhelming majority of them are Russian Orthodox.

"But as far as we know," he said of the religious situation in general, "the number of Christians is at least holding its own.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - With the knowledge of three presidents, the CIA carried out a 10year campaign of coup plotting and clandestine activities in Chile to influence who ran the Santiago government, a special Senate report said today.

That "extensive and continuous" effort cost an estimated \$13 million during the administrations of John F. Kennedy, Lyndon B. Johnson and Richard M. Nixon, said the staff report of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence.

A staff member who discussed the 62-page report characterized Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger, who was special adviser to Nixon, as "the central figure ... the architect ... the principal in designing overall policy in Chile" for seven years of the decade of U.S. interference between 1963 and

It charged that, starting with the administration of Kennedy,

CIA covert money "financed activities covering a broad spectrum, from simple propaganda manipulation of the press to large-scale support for Chilean political parties, from public opinion polls to direct attempts to ferment a military

Gramm Will Reveal Finances in January

WASHINGTON — Economist Phil Gramm. the 33 - year - old Texas A&M professor who hopes to unseat Sen. Lloyd Bentsen in next year's Democratic primary, refused last week to disclose the financial state of his candidacy.

"I've raised money at twice the rate I've spent it," Gramm told the Texas press here. However, he declined to specify how much he has raised or spent to date

"I'll file a (Federal Election Commission) report by Jan. 1," Gramm continued. He added that to reveal his campaign finances now would serve to 'give important information' to Bentsen.

A fiscal conservative who is running a strong anti.- Bentsen campaign. Gramm said the incumbent Houston Democrat epitomizes "the politics ofexpediency and the situation

"Lloyd Bentsen represents, in my opinion, that which is worst with the American political system." he charged.

Gramm admits that he hopes to coalesce statewide the anti -Bentsen Democratic sentiment. He particularly criticizes Bentsen for seeking the Presidency and reelection to the Senate at the same time.

Gramm discussed his candidacy after speaking to the Baltimore Chamber of Commerce. Since he is not teaching during the campaign, the economist said he is making

his living through consultant work and by talking about the country's economy to business

groups. Gramm endorses a balanced budget and accuses Bentsen of selling out to the liberals after being elected in 1970 on a fiscally - conservative platform.

While not pointing to any areas of the federal budget that could be cut to eliminate the approximate \$70 billion deficit this fiscal year, Gramm said more revenues could be raised if the government frees additional money for private investment.

"There is a capital shortage." he said, blaming the government's fiscal policies for the situation

His political phiosophy on certain issues, Gramm observed, is best reflective of the views of strong conservatives in the Senate. such as Sen. James Allen, D -

Gramm also said that - On detente, his views were similar to those of Bentsen, who has questioned the current direction of cooperation with the Russians.

 On government spending former California Gov. Ronald Reagan, a Republican candidate for president, best represents his position.

On busing, he shares the views of Alabama Gov. George Wallace, a Democratic presidential candidate. Instead of forced busing, Gramm said the money used to transport students should be diverted into better schools.

Aboard the 350-ton flagship Alfred, John Paul Jones raises the first American flag ever unfurled on an American military ship. It is the Grand Union flag, consisting of 13 red-and-white stripes with the Union Jack in the upper lefthand corner. At the time, Jones is awaiting congressional confirmation of his naval commission as a lieutenant. The young Scotsman has had a good deal of experience at sea - much of it gained in running slaves between the African coast and the West Indies. Having added "Jones" to his given name, he applied to Congress' Marine Committee for a job in the summer of this year; his commission comes through on the 7th, making him the first lieutenant in the Navy. He goes on to become the preeminent American naval hero of the war.



Soviet Involved in Angola

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) - Black African resentment, repeated warnings by Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and a growing death toll have failed to halt the Sovjet Union's military intervention in the Angolan civil war.

Kissinger has told the Kremlin that East-West detente is in jeopardy. For the first time since the Congo crisis 15 years ago, big power rivalry has been introduced to Africa.

"This Soviet involvement is resented by Africans most of all, but the United States cannot remain indifferent while an outside power embarks upon an interventionist policy the continuation of which must inevitably threaten our relationship," Kissinger said.

American military analysts say Russia's commitment is aimed at the strategic prize of its first naval base in the south Atlantic. They say the base would complement the Soviet Union's current domination of the Indian Ocean.

Portugal yielded its fivecentury colonial hold on Angola three weeks ago leaving three warring guerrilla independence groups when handing over

Russia stepped in with a big buildup of weapons for the

20,000-strong army of the Marxist Popular Movement for the Liberation of Angola, which has overwhelming tribal support from the Kimbundu people in the capital.

The recent arrival of 3,000 Cuban combat troops has tipped the military balance in favor of the Marxists, according to South African military sources.

The sources say that unless the two non-communist groups receive a speedy and largescale injection of western arms the oil-wealthy state could become a permanent area of Soviet influence.

Apart from military and naval facilities in Somalia in the far northeast, the Soviets have no solid hold in Africa.

The Popular Movement has established itself as the People's Republic of Angola, and according to president Dr. Agostinho Neto, already has the diplomatic recognition of "several score" states.

The western-supported National Front for the Liberation of Angola and the National Union for the Total Independence of Angola have set up a rival administration at Huambo

Their temporary alliance has been under strain since their joint military assault on Luanda was blunted in the south and repulsed in the north. Both receive American manufactured weapons funneled through Zaire, Angola's northern neigh-

The State Department denies it is militarily involved in the

Zaire and another neighbor, Zambia, have joined in logistic and diplomatic support of the National Front-National Union

groups command a majority of the tribally-based support of Angola's 5.9 million, 90 per cent illiterate population.

The National Union also controls the 835-mile railroad linking Zambian and Zairian copper exporting areas to the chief Angolan port of Lobito on the Atlantic.

A recent reported intervention by South Africa on the side of the National Union could alter the course of the civil war that

has taken 30,000 lives this year. "This is an arrogant attempt by Russia to establish itself in

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southern Africa by sheer force, endangering trade routes and oil routes between the Persian Gulf and most of the free world,"

South African Defense Minister Piet Botha said. African leaders have called for an emergency Organization of African Unity summit to

attempt another negotiated

foreign meddling in Angola.

Veek's Time Almost Up To Purchase White Sox

NEW YORK (UPI) - Bill Veeck has only five more days to come up with the cash for the Chicago White Sox, and what happens if he doesn't?

This is what happens: Either (1) — The White Sox go bankrupt and the American League takes them over, or (2) — The only other prospective purchaser left, Lester Smith of Seattle, buys the club and moves it to that city.

Veeck's chances of coming up with \$1.2 million by Wednesday are not impossible but they are improbable by his own attorney's admission. He has been breaking his neck, working feverishly day and night for more than two months getting the money he has now, and here the American League is asking him to "restructure his financial program" in less than a week. That's merely a polite way of telling him to go find a million bucks in cash by Wednesday or don't bother coming

I don't blame the American League owners for doing everything they can to assure themselves, as best they can any, the White Sox' new owners will be able to chew all they are biting off and not become an added financial burden upon the league. They're not discriminating against Veeck for anything he did or said in the past, but they are asking him to put up what amounts to nearly 60 per cent of the purchase price in cash, and to my knowledge they've never asked any other

buyer to put up that much before.

Their terms left Veeck "in shock". Sometimes Veeck likes to give the appearance of being more deeply injured than he actually is. He ought not to shock so easily because he should be used to things like that by now. All he has to do is go back a few years. I'm pretty sure he still remembers that personal trauma he went through trying to get the necessary vote to move the St. Louis Browns to Baltimore in 1953. You should've seen him after he ran up against a stone wall and failed to get the vote. He was in real shock then.

Meanwhile, the White Sox are no better off than they were at the end of the season, and that wasn't very good at all.

Things got so bad that John Allyn, the White Sox president, was forced to default on a substantial loan he has from one of the banks in Chicago. He wasn't able to pay even the interest on the loan

Frankly, I was rather hoping Bill Veeck would get back into baseball. Not because I ever was so enthralled by all his sideshows or felt he was the greatest promotional genius since P.T. Barnum. But apparently he loves the game, even though he rapped it during the time he was out, and whether you approve or disapprove of some of the things he did when he ran the Indians, White Sox and Browns before, you have to admit he did put a little life into the game.

sold mostly to rural customers, he said, with urban householders buying them as backups to their oil or electric

heating systems, and to cut utility bills.

"A woman called me from Hixson, Tenn., the other day," Frizzelle said. "She told me she had one of our thermostatically controlled automatic wood burners. They were heating their \$50,000 house with it and shutting off the furnace."

The stoves with thermostats, he said, can be fired up at the beginning of the winter season and kept going non-stop through the cold weather, holding their fire overnight with dampers closed.

hardwood, such as hickory, red oak, beech and hard maple. Hickory furnishes 30.6 million BTUs per air-dry cord,

equivalent to 218 gallons of No. 2 heating oil. Red oak supplies 27.3 million BTUs, equal to 195 gallons of heating oil, with beech and maple only slightly less productive in heating units, he


