## Texas Fund Hires Plan Manager for New College Savings Program for Texas Families

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander announced that the Texas Prepaid Higher Education Tuition Board has signed a contract with Atlanta-based Enterprise Capital Management, Inc. to manage investments for a new college savings program the state will offer Texas families beginning later this year.

"Other states' college investment programs are being advertised and sold in Texas, but I believe Texans want a Texas plan," comptroller Rylander said. "Starting very soon, Texans will be able to invest in their children's future and also invest in Texas."

Texas' new Section 529 college savings plan, named for a section of the Internal Revenue Service code that authorizes tax-free college savings plans, will let families invest for their children's future education in an array of mutual funds offered by the plan manager, under the direction of the Texas prepaid Higher Education Tuition Board, chaired by Comptroller Rylander. The savings can be used for tuition and also for other college expenses like room and board, books, computers and supplies.

"This new savings program will complement the Texas Tomorrow Fund prepaid

college tuition program -not replace the Texas Tomorrow Fund," Rylander said. "Parents will be able to enroll their children in both the prepaid college tuition program to lock in tuition and required fees at today's prices, and in the new Section 529 college savings program to pay other college expenses."

"I want our hard-working Texas families to have as many options as possible to save for college," Comptroller Rylander said.

"More than 132,000 families have signed up for the safety and security of the

## BACK TO SCHOOL SUPPLIES

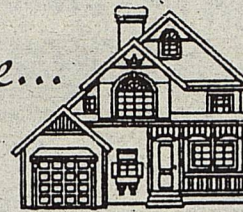

## Get a Jump on Trampoline Safety

Many children enjoy bouncing up and down on a back yard trampoline, but in many cases, a matter of seconds can turn the fun into a tragedy. According to the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), more than 80,000 people are injured on trampolines each year. Most of these injuries happen on home trampolines to children ages 5 through 14. Common injuries range in severity from broken bones, concussions and other head, neck and spinal injuries to sprains, strains, bruises, scrapes and cuts.

Children should be supervised while jumping on the trampoline. According to the AAP, most injuries occur from:

- ◆ falling off the trampoline
- ◆ landing wrong while jumping
- ◆ attempting stunts
- ◆ colliding with another person on the trampoline
- ◆ landing on the springs or frame of the trampoline

Spotting the child during trampoline use will help keep the child safe, as well as using a net around the trampoline to ensure that the children will not fall off the trampoline.

If your child or someone you know does sustain an injury, be sure to contact your physician or an ambulance immediately, depending on the severity of the injury.

## Safety Rules of Summer

With summer comes hot weather, an increase in outdoor activities and an increase of heat-related deaths and illnesses. Fact is, on average, more Texans are killed by heat each year than by tornadoes and hurricanes.

An easy rule of thumb to remember this summer, and especially when participating in outdoor activities is, "when the temperature goes up, slow down." No matter what activity is planned, remember these simple safety rules and make summer safer.

- Slow down. Heed your body's early warnings. Reduce activities and stay cool, shady or air-conditioned place as much as possible.
- Don't dry out. Drink plenty of non-alcoholic liquids. Doctors recommend a glucose replacement drink (juice or sports drink, not sodas) for those

who are outside for more than an hour or two. If this is not available, a good substitute is plain water. Remember to drink water often, even when you aren't thirsty.

- Dress for hot weather. Wear lightweight, light colored and loose-fitting clothing to help maintain normal body temperature. A wide-brim hat or cap outside is a must. Wear sunglasses if prolonged exposure to the sun's rays or glare is anticipated.
- Avoid thermal shock. Go slow for those first few hot days. Heat-stroke frequently develops swiftly with little warning. Over half of heat-stroke victims become ill less than 24 hours before being hospitalized or found dead.
- Get out of the heat. If your residence is not air-

Texas Tomorrow Fund, which guarantees to pay college tuition and required fees, no matter how much those costs increase. Other families have asked for a college savings plan that lets them earn a potentially higher rate of return and save for all of their children's college expenses," Rylander said.

Unlike the Texas Tomorrow Fund, which guarantees to cover participants' college tuition and required fees, the Section 529 college savings plan offers no guarantee that parents' investments will

earn a sufficient return to cover their children's college costs and no guarantee that parents will not lose money on their investments.

The Enterprise Group of Funds, comprised of 24 mutual funds with more than \$4 billion in assets under management, helped pioneer the concept of providing retail investors special access to leading institutional investment money managers for each investment style and sector.

conditioned, get into an air-conditioned environment for at least a few hours a day. If this isn't possible, a well ventilated shady area will do. Today's ceiling fans provide adequate air circulation in non air-conditioned homes and buildings. If driving, use your car's air-conditioner.

- Don't get too much sun. Sunburn makes the body's job of heat dissipation more difficult. Besides a hat, sunglasses, and proper clothing, a good sun screen is recommended especially

for fair skinned individuals.

- Beware of high humidity. Perspiration is the body's natural way of cooling the skin. When the humidity is low, this evaporation actually "cools" the skin. Air movement, such as a breeze, fan or air-conditioning acts to evaporate perspiration and cool your body. When the humidity is high, this evaporative cooling process is lost, and the danger of heat related illness or death is greatly increased.

## The Therapeutic Shoe Bill: Protecting from Amputation Do You Know the Facts?

Diabetic Neuropathy affects of 60% of the diabetic population. The risk of a leg amputation is 14 to 40 times greater for a person who has diabetes.

More than half of the lower amputations in the United States occur among people with diabetes -- over 56,000 a year.

The Therapeutic Shoe Bill was enacted in 1993 to provide "at risk" diabetic patients with the proper footwear and protective insoles. Medicare realized that, after many years of study, many diabetic foot complications were the result of poorly fitting or poorly designed footwear. No program, on this scale, had ever been provided to prevent a problem from occurring.

Diabetic patients who meet a certain criteria can receive one pair of shoes and three pair of insoles a calendar year. For the patient, the extra depth shoe and custom insoles help protect against shearing and callous formation that eventually lead to ulcers, reducing the over-all risk of amputation in this high-risk population.

### 2002 Property Tax Rates in Borden County

This notice concerns 2002 property tax rates for Borden County. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.
