common. Your neighbors are suddenly getting bills from places they have never been. Your relatives are denied credit or quit receiving their monthly credit card or bank Collection statements. agencies begin trying to collect debts that do not belong to you.

It's called identity theft and it is fast becoming one of the most prevalent and costly financial crimes in the country, affecting as many as 750,000 new victims each year and costing consumers, and financial merchants institutions billions dollars.

Carelessness while doing business over the Internet can mean that your Social Security numbers, credit card or PIN numbers can be "borrowed" and used to establish credit for others using your identity to run up big bills or set up phony bank accounts that can ruin your good name and credit.

But, the Internet isn't the only place to exercise caution. Some thieves steal these vital numbers from your mailbox or by lurking over your shoulder while you use your ATM.

The Independent Bankers Association of Texas (IBAT) is working with its 40,000 banker members across the state to stop this menace. But, they need your help.

It's becoming all too IBAT and its member ask that you take the following steps to protect yourself against Identity Theft:

- Never carry your Social Security number in your wallet or print it on your checks.
- Check your credit card statements carefully each month and immediately report unauthorized pur-

Children may try to hide learning problems by acting up

The class clown or play ground bully might need a trip to the doctor rather than the principal's office.

"Behavior problems are often the first sign of an underlying developmental problem," said Dr. Sherry Vinson, assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine. "You can't be quick to blame it on behavior without checking out other possible concerns."

Children often will attempt to hide a learning deficit through disruptive behavior, she said. Often, once the developmental problem is identified, it can be specifically addressed and the behavioral problem lessens or

disappears.

Some of the behaviors that are usually the first sign of a developmental problem are tantrums, aggression toward others, destructiveness, hyperactivity, food refusal and withdrawal. The child might also show sell-aggression, in attention or immaturity.

"If a child is expected to do something she cannot do, a problem behavior result," Vinson said. "For example, the child with delayed language development may act up to avoid language confrontation. Delayed children often seem as if they are not choosing to obey,"

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# 2002-2003 Dress Code for Borden County ISD

The Borden County School's dress Code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, prevent disruption, and minimize safety hazards. Students and parents may determine a student's personal dress and grooming standards, provided that they comply with the following.

Borden County's students shall be dressed and groomed in a manner that is clean and neat and that will not be a health and safety hazard to themselves or others. Clothing and grooming that in the principal's judgment may reasonably be expected to cause disruption of or interference with normal school operation is prohibited.

The Borden County School prohibits pictures, emblems, or writing on clothing that

- 1. Is lewd, offensive, vulgar, or contains obscene language
- 2. Advertises or depicts tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, drugs, or

any other substance prohibited by the school

3. Refers to satanic, cult, prison wear or gang activities.

The following guidelines will be used to determine appropriate dress:

- 1. Dresses, skirts, split skirts and shorts should not be shorter than two inches above the knee. A student will lose the privilege of wearing shorts for the school year upon a third offense. Parents will be notified when the second offense occurs. Shorts must be tailored (hemmed with no frayed edges). No spandex biker shorts or wind shorts are allowed (loose-legged, athletic running shorts) and shorts shall not be too tight.
- Wearing of oversized or baggy pants and/or jeans is prohibited at school or at any school-sponsored activity on or off campus.

NO "saggin, baggin, or draggin." Pants must be an appropriate length and not drag the floor. Boy's pants will be worn at the waist and properly fit the waistline. NO excessive wide legged pants will be allowed. NO chains will be allowed on school property or at school sponsored functions.

3. Shirts and blouses must be buttoned appropriately with midriff and back covered at all times. (Tops must be long enough that skin does not show when arms are lifted). Clothing shall be designed, constructed, and worn in a manner that is not suggestive or 4. indecent, and that shall promote proper decorum. The opening on any type of shirt shall not exceed the equivalent of the first button below the collar of

and "See through chiffon blouses" will not be allowed unless they are worn with a crew neck Tshirt underneath it or a shirt worn over them during all school hours and activities. Tailored shirt shirttails must be tucked in unless you have a crew T-shirt underneath the shirt. (All tailored shirts will be buttoned and tucked into the pants or skirt when representing Borden County in any extracurricular activities). Sleeveless blouses are permissible but must in good taste. Appropriate undergarments must be worn and must not be exposed at any time.

- Footwear shall be a part of regular attire. House shoes are not acceptable footwear. Not metal cleats or plates on the soles of shoes shall be worn in the building.
- a dress shirt. Tank tops 5. Hair shall be clean and

well groomed at all times while attending school, school functions, and school sponsored activities. It will be styled in a manner that will keep it out of the student's eyes and not obstruct one's vision. No unnatural or bizarre hair colors or haircuts will be permitted. Eyebrows must not be notched or shaved in an unnatural manner. Male students' hair may be worn no longer than the top of the collar. In addition: geometric or unusual patterns will not be allowed to be shaved or cut in the hair, and boys may not wear pony tails, rat-tails, or braids. Students are to be cleanshaven at all times. Mustaches and beards are not allowed. Sideburns shall not be worn lower than the bottom of the ear

#### Preparing your child to go **Back-to-school**

Wow! It seems as though school was just getting out for the summer, and now we are starting back again! Getting off to a good start at the beginning of the school year can be difficult. You should give your child a boost and provide motivation to do the best he or she can during the school year. However, even with "experience," each new school year is an adjustment for all family members. Changes may include things like bedtimes, friendships, activity levels, expectations (academic, social, and athletic), activities (TV, homework, school meetings, and outside functions), and diet (hurried, unhealthy meals).

Many children will attend school for the first time and the whole experience is new. For other children, there may be new interests, new doubts, new developmental changes. Changes at school can include new classrooms, teachers, and subjects. All of these and more mean that the child must redesign at least a few aspects of his or her life. This may come easier for some children than for others.

A child may adjust well one year, and struggle the next with noticeable changes in attitude, mood and social skills. Patience, understanding, encouragement attributes parents and family members should possess. In general, most children will adjust in a few weeks.

There are a variety of ways parents can make transitions easier for their children. Perhaps these can help you and your family adjust to the new school year.

· Encourage the love of

learning. Tell your child teachers about who inspired you and the interesting things you did in school. Do not support negative stereo-types of teachers or of school.

- Treat school as a normal part of your family's activities, which is easy to do in Borden County! Answer questions, discuss issues, but don't force enthusiasm or unwanted conversation.
- Visit the school and bus stop with your child. For new students, you might consider walking to school or driving the bus route to help familiarize your child with how they will get to and from school. Meeting your child's teacher or teachers is also very important. This shows that you are interested in their education and the teacher is very appreciative of your interest as well.
- Adjust bedtime and wakeup schedules. Bedtimes vary and are less consistent during the summer. Getting your child in a routine will make it easier for them to get adequate rest and be ready for the next day of school. Having them set out the clothes they plan to wear the next day is helpful. Also, be sure to keep everything (papers, homework, etc.) near the door in a satchel for easy pick-up on the way out the door.
- Allow your child to be involved in making these new schedules, homework times, play and television limits, school lunches, and various rules. They are

more apt to comply if they have a part in setting them. Also, discuss consequences of not following new rules and schedules (i.e. being tired, getting lessons finished, being grounded, etc.).

- Help your child identify people that they can call or look to if they have an emergency at school (they miss the bus, get sick, forget something at home, etc.) if they cannot reach you. This will help ease their mind and keep them from becoming panicked if an emergency does arise. It is also a good idea to leave a list in the school office, and with your child's teacher, of people to contact should you not be reachable.
- Try to get involved in your child's education and activities. Studies show kids are more that motivated to learn when they see their parents involved at school. Plan to be available to your child, especially the first few weeks of school. Keep the early weeks as free of outside activities so that you can pamper your child with home-cooked meals and special reading time with you.

# STOP—FOR SCHOOL BUS COOKIES



Your kids will smile and their eyes will light up when they get home from school and see these adorable cookies shaped like school buses! Kids will think that the bright yellow school bus cookies must taste lemony, right? And the wheels on the bus? Why, chocolate, of course! In large mixer bowl, beat sugar and butter until creamy. Add egg; beat until light and fluffy. Add lemon peel and food coloring; beat to combine. Shape dough into balls, using 1/2 teaspoon dough for each. Flatten slightly to resemble wheels; place 2 on each "bus." Bake at 350° for 10 to 12 minutes or until cookies just begin to brown. The subtleties of learning disabilities are difficult to distinguish, said Vinson, also a developmental pediatrician at Texas Children's Hospital and a former elementary and middle school teacher.

Developmental problems range form difficulty in one area, such as mathematics or reading, to attention deficit hyperactivity disorder or autism. The only way to determine the problem is through testing, she said.

Vinson said it is not unusual after testing to find that a child who has been barely passing each grade level is actual a gifted student who has a specific problem with one subject area.

"It also means that just because your child is making straight A's doesn't mean she doesn't have a learning disability," she said. "There are many types of problems that could be involved."

· When behavioral problems appear, parents should see their pediatrician and arrange for psychoeducational test-

"Determining the problem usually leads to the solution," Vinson said. "Parents often think their child is brilliant and the behavior problems

are due to boredom. That happens sometimes, but it's more likely that a learning disability is involved."


