**Forecasts Show Oil Imports Will Rise To 12 Million Barrels Daily By 1980**

HOUSTON (AP) — The new increase in authorized oil import levels probably will amount to just a drop in the bucket by the end of the decade.

The 230,000 barrels a day increase for the balance of 1972 will push the total daily level beyond 4.5 million barrels for crude oil and petroleum products.

There is widespread speculation President Nixon will authorize an even sharper increase for 1973.

Long range forecasts indicate a combination of spiraling U.S. demand and depressed domestic explorations for new reserves will push the import level to 12 million barrels a day by 1980.

Harry Bridges, president of Shell Oil Co., says this long range forecast carries special significance to both consumers and industry because of the transportation and refining facilities that will be required for handling such huge volumes of foreign oil.

Bridges says such a volume of oil imports will require 325 supertankers that would have a combined capacity comparable to that of the total world tanker fleet of 1967.

"We will need the arrival daily of six of these 11-million barrel supertankers but as of today not one of our ports can handle these ships and none is under construction," he says.

"So there seems to be no alternative in the early years but to offload this oil in smaller vessels at transhipment ports in the Bahamas and elsewhere."

Then comes the problem of refining capacity.

"Today in the United States there are 262 refineries with an average daily capacity of 49,000 barrels," Bridges says.

"To meet the 1980 demand will require the equivalent of 58 new refineries with an average capacity of 160,000 barrels daily."

Bridges says this situation underscores his concern that the United States is not preparing properly to meet future energy demands.

"Only one new refinery will come on stream this year, and none is scheduled for completion in 1973," Bridges said. "The total lead time for construction of a refinery is about six years."

Bridges said current trends indicate the cost of oil is bound to increase but that delay in preparing for future demand can mean only extra costs.

"With proper lead time, we estimate the cost of a medium sized refinery at about \$230 million," he explained. "However, if construction work has to be done on a rush basis the cost is estimated to increase by about 20 per cent, not counting higher labor costs arising out of overtime."

He said delay also means higher costs for marine terminals.

He has been a member of the All-Region and All-State Choirs.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Louisiana and Texas have 45 days to file exceptions to a report by a special master who says the Lone Star State should have half the Sabine River and millions in oil revenues that go with it.

The Supreme Court formally accepted Monday the special master's report. In addition to the 45 days for exception, the highcourt gave an additional 30 days for a reply.

### Price Lauds National Guard At Luncheon

**AMARILLO**—As guest speaker at a Battalion Headquarters luncheon of the Texas National Guard held at the Amarillo Guard Armory Sunday, Congressman Bob Price called the National Guard and Reserve forces "our best security bargain and our nation's first line of defense."

The Pampa congressman ridiculed suggestions that the National Guard was not a viable defense force, and emphasized the important and challenging assignment facing the Guard in the decade of the 1970's.

Equipment valued at more than \$1 billion has been turned over to units throughout the United States in recent years, and as the American involvement in Vietnam continues to subside, more and better equipment will be made available to all Guard units, Price said.

The congressman pointed out that the American taxpayer spends an average of \$8,000 a year to clothe, feed, and pay a member of the active force, which is six times the cost of maintaining a Guardsman or member of the Reserve forces.

"With declining draft calls and the easing of pressures of the Vietnam War, the National Guard today is no longer faced with a long list of applicants who wish to escape the draft. Therefore, I believe those entering the Guard will be doing so by free choice, resulting in a fighting force of higher caliber and morale," Price said.

The congressman also had words of praise for domestic action projects of the National Guard which have given worthwhile support to community activities throughout the nation.

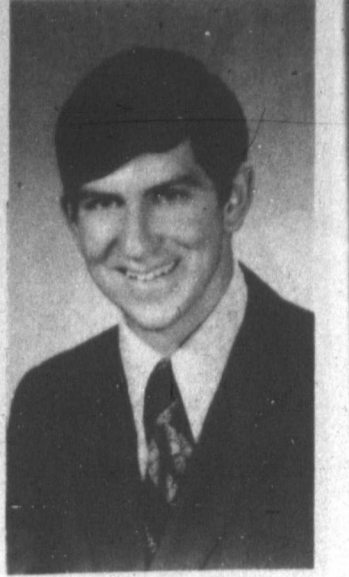
Stockdale was recently honored at the Olton High School All Sports Banquet by being named best all-around football player, best basketball player, most valuable golfer and best student athlete academic award.

**Charles Goodnight's Life Related To DAR Members**

Mrs. Twila Daugherty, chaplain, opened the meeting of the Las Pampas chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution with an invocation stressing patriotism.

She quoted the late J. Edgar Hoover as saying, "To me patriotism is one's love or devotion to one's country. Having its roots in religion, it includes respect for one's leaders, honor for our heroes, compliance with our laws, a belief in our ideals and defense in the integrity of America."

She told of how he happened to come to Palo Duro Canyon and of how John Adair of Ireland assisted him financially, becoming his partner. Their vast holdings became known as the JA Ranch and the JA brand was used on partnership cattle.

His wife, Mollie, died in 1926. Mrs. Osborne told the women, and a year later, Goodnight became ill. A young woman, named Corinne Goodnight, who was not a relative, but who had corresponded with him because they had the same name, came

to see him. She remained to care for him, and, at the age of 91, he married Corinne, who was 26.

He died Jan. 12, 1929, Mrs. Osborne reported. He was nearly 94.

"The Panhandle owes much to him and his gentle wife, Mollie," Mrs. Osborne concluded. "Together they conquered a new land. They developed the cattle industry. They fostered higher education and civic enterprises, even though he was a rough-mannered uneducated man."
