

Coyote Football Teams Take Two of Three from Ira;

Varsity Aims For Win Number Three Against Wellman

This Week **Varsity Game**

School rivalries often bring out the best and worst.

The best part about Friday night's game with the Ira Bulldogs was that it was not a district matchup.

The worst part was losing to a team that obviously plays the Borden County tilt as if it were the Super Bowl.

Ira used its speed and a surprisingly effective defense to prevent BHS from winning its third consecutive game Friday in Ira, 30-8, as the Coyotes were only able to score one time-a 38-yard run by sophomore Derek Rodriguez with 1:50 left in the third period.

Rodriguez's run came the play after senior T.J. Sharp had finally given BHS a spark with a 41-yard burst from the team's own 1-yard

Those two runs along with senior Talin Pepper's four catches for 63 yards were basically the only offensive highlights of the evening as the Bulldogs invaded the Coyote den numerous times in the game.

The Coyotes lost yardage five times in the contest as speed overcame strength.


BHS was also hampered by five turnovers: four interceptions and one fumble.

Still, considering those turnovers, the Coyotes held Ira several times to keep the game close.

When Rodriguez did score in the third period, the gap had been closed to 22-8, and it appeared that the Coyotes had put themselves back in the game.

As the fourth quarter started, the BHS defense had Ira backed up on fourth and long on more than one series, but Ira found openings and converted.

One of those occurred with 9:49 left in the game as the Bulldogs scored on a 15-yard pass play to make it a 30-8 game.

That score held up as neither team made it into the endzone for the final minutes of the fourth quarter.

Senior Raul Rodriguez and junior Andy Lozano made the highlight film with their defensive play throughout the game.

Rodriguez had a key first quarter sack at 5:09 that prevented an Ira score and could have given the Coyotes momentum were it not for a turnover on the following offensive series.

Rodriguez finished with two solo tackles, 7- assists, and two hurries.

Lozano, making his mark in his first year to start on varsity, led the Coyotes with six solo tackles.

Countering Ira's speedy offense, Lozano added 8 assisted tackles and broke up a pass play with a big tackle early in the game.

Kyle Pinkerton, another junior, continued to improve play in only his second game back since an injury.

Pinkerton recorded one sack, one hurry, four solo tackles, and six assists.

One solo tackle coming in the final period stopped an Ira runner head on.

Other defensive contributors were Adam Carter (three solos, three assists), Pepper (four assists, one solo), D. Rodriguez (four assists, three solos, one sack, one hurry), Sharp (six assists, four solos, and two sacks). Dusty Gwinn, junior, made one solo

Final stats from the offensive side of the ball are as follows: rushing-Sharp (5/55), Carter (1/1), D. Rodriguez (5/85, 1 TD);

Passing—Brionne Jackson (6-15-3 for 63 yards), Shane Tarleton (0-1-0), Sharp (0-1-1); receiving—Pepper (4-63 yards); Pinkerton (1-1).


Jackson also had three punts for a 27-yard average.






Stroope was also on the receiving end of one of Valentine's passes, good for an 8-yard gain.

The Coyote Pups return to action Thursday, hosting the Wellman Wildcats. Kickoff is set for 6 p.m.




JR. High Pups Run past the Bulldogs during Thursday night's game against Ira.



A Coyote Pups tries to get past the Ira Bulldog Pups.





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

Back-to-school Wardrobe: Keeping it in A+ Condition

The start of a new school year invariably means a new wardrobe. But, clothes that are bright and promising at the onset of the semester may soon fail to make the grade. While everyday wear and tear does take its toll, here are a few tips for helping keep the new school wardrobe in A+ condition.

Clothes that turn grey and dingy look old before their Improper laundry time. procedures, including insufficient detergent and water temperature that's too low, are common culprits. Improper sorting (clothes that are not separated by color and by heavy soiled versus light soil) can cause dirt and dyes

to transfer from one item to If soil transfer another. occurs, rewash additional detergent, the hottest water that's safe for the fabric and a bleach that's safe for the fabric. If color transfer occurs, don't dry the item. Quickly rewash with detergent and a bleach safe for the fabric, or use detergent and a dye/color remover purchased from the grocery or discount store.

As preventative measures, use the recommended amount of detergent for the load size, properly sort laundry and use the hottest water that's safe for the fabric. Also, consider using dye magnet laundry sheets or a detergent that's

formulated to preserve colors. Dye magnet laundry sheets are embedded with dye catchers that grab and hold particles of dye and other foreign materials in the wash water. Detergents that preserve colors contain ingredients that bind or react with dyes so they cannot easily be redeposited onto fabrics in the load.

Color loss or fading is irreversible. Common causes are unstable dyes, water that's too hot, improper use of bleach and applying undiluted bleach directly onto fabric. Unstable dyes most commonly occur with neon and fluorescent colors, as

Know When to Ignore Bad Behavior

Does your child keep whining, crying, talking back, or throwing temper tantrums no matte what you do or say? Then maybe you shouldn't do or say anything.

Children continue behaviors like these because they get what they want, or at least a reaction from their parents. The best way to stop

annoying behaviors is to ignore them – stop reacting and stop giving in.

To successfully ignore annoying behaviors:

Withdraw all attention.
 Don't talk to your child.
 Don't frown or show disapproval in anyway.

Be consistent. Don't

ignore a behavior one time and attend to it the next—even if you're in public. If you react once, that's enough to keep your child trying several more times.

Be prepared for the behavior to get worse. When your child doesn't get the reaction he's used to, he'll intensify his efforts. But once he realizes his behavior is

useless, the behavior will start to disappear. For most kids, this takes one to five days of consistent, total ignoring.



Mrs. Ramsey died Monday, Sept. 2, 2002 at her home.





well as bright reds, greens, blues, purples, pinks, black and peach. To remove excess dye, new items in these colors should be washed separately the first few times.

Wrinkles make a garment look unkept, which tends to make it look older. To avoid or minimize wrinkles in permanent press or synthetic fabrics, use the permanent press cycle on both washer and dryer. Remove items from the dryer as soon as it stops. Then hang or fold them.
