

R.M. Clayton inducted into West **Texas Heritage Hall of Fame**

On September 26, 2002 in Midland, Texas, Mr. R.M. Clayton was inducted into the West Texas Heritage Hall of Fame. This group honors people who have been instrumental in the history and heritage of West Texas.

Clayton is the grandfather of · Barbara Anderson, of Gail and Jere Hubbard of Midland, who are the daughters of one of Mr. Clayton's sons, Mr. Jerry Clayton.

Mr. R.M. Clayton was born in Parker Co. in 1856, married and spent his entire life in the ranching industry. He owned and operated ranches in the Sweetwater and Rotan area in the 1870's before the drought of 1886-87 plus the great blizzard of January 1888 played favor with the cattle business. This was followed by a money panic (depression as they are known today) of 1893. This was followed by another terrible, terrible blizzard in 1898, which ruined a lot of people in the cattle business.

In 1898, Mr. Clayton moved to Lubbock and homesteaded land there. While living in Lubbock, he helped charter the 1st National Bank. Mr. Clayton built a large house in Lubbock which he later sold to Mr. W. L. Ellwood, the owner of the Renderbrook Ranch in Mitchell County.

Around 1907 or 1908, Mr. Clayton formed a partnership with Mr. W.D. Johnson, a man he had known in Mary Dickerson father built Sweetwater, TX many years before. They leased 300 sections of land from Mr. C.W. Post in Garza county, known as the old Curry Comb. Ranch. Mr. Post was the founder of Post, Texas.

Around 1912, Mr. Post decided to colonize the ranch so Johnson and Clayton had to look for more country. In 1913, he and Mr. Johnson bought a ranch in Borden County. The partnership had run steers on the Post ranch but decided to change into a cow-calf operation on the new ranch.

They bought a herd of cattle from Mr. Warren who owned county around where the town of Muleshoe, Texas is now. Mr. Warren branded what was called a "muleshoe" and they bought an entire herd plus the brand.

As a matter of fact. Mr. Warren gave the town section where Muleshoe, Texas is now - hence the name of Muleshoe, Texas.

After the death of Mr. and Mrs. Clayton, the eldest son, Mr. Arthur Clayton bought his father and mothers interest in the Muleshoe Ranch from the heirs. This was in the late 30's.

In 1945, the youngest son, Jerry and his wife Mary Dickerson Clayton bought the ranch from Arthur and W.D. Johnson. Incidently, the first cotton gin in Lubbock County near Slaton. Jerry and Mary operated the ranch after 1945 until 1957 when, after Mary's untimely







District Play Begins with Win over Klondike 64-26

The win was one of those good ones—starters and other upperclassmen came in and took charge early, pounding out a 32-0 lead by the end of the first quarter.

This not only allowed Coach Avery to give his junior varsity some playing time (they had no game the previous night), but gave his starters an opportunity to avoid injury and get rested for this week's Sands game.

And, from the visitors' points of view, the Cougars were given the chance to play for four quarters when most opponents would opt to up the score and to go home quickly.

Klondike received the opening kickoff and went to the air four times, one of those passes resulting in an 18-yard gain and a first down.

The Coyote defense adjusted, with senior Talin Pepper almost picking off the very next pass.

The drive fizzled, in part to some great downfield coverage by Ben Griffin and Adam Carter and heavy rushing applied by the Rodriguez brothers, Raul and Derek.

Raul ended the Klondike drive with a sack on 4th and 15, and the Coyotes took over on Klondike's 30-yard line.

No time was wasted as T.J. Sharp rushed twice and found the endzone.

He scored after Carter pulled a great block on the right side to open up the lane from nine yards out.

Sharp's kick was good, and the Coyotes led 8-0 at the 8:23 mark.

Klondike mirrored its first drive with four consecutive passes, two of which were incomplete.

The ball went over on downs, and BHS again started business with good field position on the Cougar 30-yard line.

Senior quarterback went to Kyle Pinkerton in the air, who gained seven yards on the play.

Jackson rolled out again, found his man in the endzone, but the pass was dropped.

On third down, Jackson tried yet another pass. His 13-yard strike to Talin Pepper gave the Coyotes a first and goal on the Cougar three-yard line.

Carter's rush moved the ball a yard closer, and Sharp then finished off the drive with a two-yard dash.

With 4:19 left in the first quarter, the Coyotes were up 16-0.

Defensively, Coach Richey had to be pleased with his team's effort as the Coyotes gave the Cougars only three downs on their next drive.

Sharp's hard hit broke up a near-pass completion, and Raul's rushing forced an incompletion, which led to a punting situation.

For the third consecutive series, the Coyotes started their drive on the Cougars' 30 yard line—all in the first period.

This time it would be Derek Rodriguez who took the handoff, rushing for 24 yards on two carries to put BHS in scoring position once again.

Pinkerton took a reverse handoff for the one-yard touchdown run, and with Sharp's kick, the Coyotes found themselves in front, 24-0.

It just kept getting better for the defense as Pepper and Sharp joined efforts to force another turnover as the Cougars tried to get back in the game.

On 2nd down and 13, Pepper tipped the Klondike pass and Sharp intercepted the ball, giving BHS another chance within the 30-yard line

Klondike went to work as the first quarter ended, facing a mainly junior varsity lineup. (The JV's scheduled Thursday game had been canceled).

The Cougars were determined to continue their passing game, but on this drive they were able to pick up two first downs through the air.

A rare shovel-pass rush resulted in a 13-yard pickup to the Coyote five-yard line, and from there the Cougars threw a 5-yard strike for their first points.

Onsite kicks would continue throughout the evening as Klondike made several attempts, but freshman J. Ryan Gicklhorn did his duty and promptly fell on the pigskin following the first Cougar touchdown.


On the first play of the drive, freshman Garrett Thomas scampered 45-yards for a touchdown. On the play, Shane Tarleton aided the cause with a big block downfield on the 20-yard line.

Klondike once again had to punt following three plays (highlighted by Griffin's defensive deflection on a third-down pass play).

The Klondike punter got off a 45-yard effort, backing up the Coyotes to their own 9-yard line.

It was to be a pictureperfect possession as the Coyotes used the ground, the air, and several different players to move the ball 71 yards in eight plays for a score.

Thomas rushed for three yards on two carries, John Wilson rushed for five and caught a pass from Griffin for 12 yards, Dusty Gwinn took a handoff and moved the ball another three yards, Raul had a 13-yard carry, and freshman Andrew Lamming punched out a five-yard pickup. Derek, using a big Griffin block on the left side, moved the ball to the Cougar 4-yard line to set up the unselfish Gwinn play where

Dusty found himself unable to get into the endzone, but pitched back to Raul who ran around the open left side for the six points.

Klondike answered with a 75-yard kickoff return for six more points, and that's how the half-time scoring ended.

With less than a minute to play before half-time, BHS's drive was a Wilson rushing display of runs of 8, 3, 8, and 2 yards.

His efforts put the Coyotes in Sharp's field goal range, but the kick right before halftime was a little short and to the left.

The Coyote lead remained at 44-14.

The Coyotes were forced to punt in their opening second-half possession, but the defense once again made the play as Andy Lozano popped a Cougar, forced a fumble, and Griffin and Tyler Wallace were there to scoop up the loose ball.

Thomas picked up 35 yards on five carries in the ensuing drive, capped off with the one-yard touchdown rush.

Griffin prevented Klondike from returning the favor on their next possession when he intercepted a pass with 5:06 remaining in the third quarter.

Freshman Aaron Pigford, also playing in his first varsity game, hit Gicklhorn on a 23-yard touchdown strike to take advantage of the Klondike turnover and put the Coyotes up, 56-14.

An interception gave the Cougars the ball back. Klondike scored and prevented the game from being called, though trailing, at 56-20.

Lozano was back at it with his defensive "touch" as one of his patented jarring tackles resulted in another fumble.

Derek grabbed this one and ran it in for a 33-yard touchdown return. Gicklhorn made the PAT.

Klondike used both a passing and rushing game to get points back on the board following the turnover.

With 6:34 left in the game, the Cougars put together a 60-yard, 7 play scoring drive for their final points of the game.

The 64-26 win gives BHS a jump-start to district play, which resumes Friday in Gail against Sands.

The junior varsity will be at Ackerly Thursday for a 7:30 contest against the Mustang jv team.

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Hey Texas, you dropped something!

Drivers can now report litterers on Don't Mess with Texas Web site

Have you ever been driving down a scenic Texas highway singing along with your favorite song, when someone in the car in front of you tosses trash out the window?

If it makes you angry, it should. Texans spend \$33 million a year cleaning up discarded cigarette butts, plastic bags and fast food wrappers. Starting now, there's something you can do about it.

When you see someone trashing Texas, report litterers online. The new GOTCHA! Page has been added to the Texas Department of Transportalitter tion's (TxDOT) Website, prevention www.dontmesswithtexas.org. The GOTCHA! Page is accessible through the "Report a Litterer" link on the site's home page. Non-Web users can file their reports through a toll-free number, 888TEX-8683.

To report a littering incident, drivers must note the following information:

- License plate number (Texas plates only)
- · Make of the vehicle
- Date and time of day
- Location
- Who tossed the trash (driver, passenger or truck bed)
- Item littered.

TxDOT will mail a letter to the litterer along with a Don't Mess with Texas litterbag and facts about state litter laws. The litterer will not receive a ticket because Texas law enforcement officials, like police officers, are the only people authorized to enforce Texas litter laws. Tossing something small like a cigarette or a drink cup can results in up

to a \$500 fine.

TxDOT encourages Texans to take an active role in litter prevention, but cautions that

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
