DOHA, Qatar (AP) - The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) opened a price-fixing meeting today with only conservative Saudi Arabia, the cartel's biggest producer, opposed to an increase in the price of crude oil.

The Saudi oil minister, Sheik Ahmed Zaki Yamani, said on his arrival in Doha that his country favors postponing the increase for six more months because the world economy is still too shaky. The Saudis previously said they would agree to a "reasonable increase" of less than 10 per cent in the

benchmark crude.

The ministers of the 13 nations who supply 80 per cent of the oil imported by the world's non-Communist nations met behind bulletproof shutters in the banquet hall of a luxurious hotel beside the Persian Gulf.

Indonesian Oil Minister Mohammed Sadli, the current chairman of OPEC, opened the conference with a reminder to the ministers that their decisions would "affect the state of health of the world, not only now but for some time to

## Pampa adds Galway to Irish trip itinerary

The Pride of Pampa Band has been invited to perform and compete in yet another international band contest in Ireland during the scheduled

Jeff Doughten, director, said that John Cox from Ireland came by the band hall Tuesday to extend a personal invitation for the Pampa band to compete in a concert contest on March 12 in Galway, Ireland. It will be the first of what is expected to be an annual competition.

Cox also invited Pampa's stage band to perform for the other bands at the contest and asked if the marching band will participate in a non - competitive parade at Galway. Doughten accepted.

The director said that Cox's purpose in being in the United States is to visit all the U.S. bands going to Dublin for the St. Patrick's Day festivities and invite them to participate in the Galway contest. Doughten said that about a dozen U.S. bands will participate in Dublin.

He said he did not know how many would also compete at Galway but he did learn that the John F. Kennedy Band from Anaheim, Calif., had

That's the one we're sweating." Doughten said of the J.F.K. Band. "They won second place over there three or four years ago in Dublin. They also were invited to the Limerick City contest. They're going everywhere we are. It's going to be quite a fight.

Doughten said the California band is made up of more than 200 members.

WASHINGTON (AP) - A special commission said today that West Point's worst cheating scandal was even bigger than the Army has acknowledged.

In a 91-page report delivered to Army Secretary Martin R. Hoffmann at a Pentagon news conference, the commission headed by former astronaut Frank Borman said it was convinced that "many cadets" who collaborated or tolerated collaboration on an Electrical Engineering homework assignment last March have been neither detected nor punished:

The report recommended the readmission as soon as possible of cadets ousted in connection with the scandal.

A second report, critical of the way the academy handled Army lawyers who

A total of 151 cadets have been caught up in the scandal, including 139 who have left the academy, four who had been expelled for other reasons before their cases were decided and eight who have stayed there with appeals

"The commission is equally persuaded that scores of other violations of the honor code have gone undetected or unpunished, and that, during recent years, a substantial number of cadets have been involved in dishonesty, toleration and misconduct as

honor representatives," the report said. Expressing support for the honor code but criticizing the way it has been implemented through the honor system, the commission declared:

"It is distressingly apparent to the commission that the honor system ... had

spring of 1976. Even more disturbing is that this inadequacy was known to academy leadership as well before EE 304 (the homework assignment), but no decisive action was tak-

The commission recommended that all cadets who left the 174-year-old U.S. Military Academy be allowed to return "as soon as possible," that cadets remaining there awaiting separation be allowed to stay on and that all investigations of such cadets based upon allegations in affadavits signed by ousted cadets should cease.

Last August. Army Secretary-Martin R. Hoffmann virtually guaranteed readmission at the beginning of the next academic year to the cadets, who were among 823 members of the 1977 graduating class given the homework for Electrical Engineering 304.

The commission also recommended that:

-The mandatory single sanction of explusion for honor code violators be abolished in favor of discretionary punishment. This, however, comes after the cadet corps voted last week to keep the expulsion rule.

-The term of the superintendent be extended beyond the usual three years to keep policies from periodically changing in a way that makes cadets cynical.

-The selection of a superintendent be

## A real messed up place

By ROBERT'S, ALLEN WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 - The nation's capital is rounding out the second troubled year of home rule in a characteristically singular

manner - with three scandalously unenviable With a steadily declining population albeit zooming budget (\$1.18 billion this fiscal year with the federa government putting up \$250 million), the city is marking the advent of its third year of home

rule as follows:

(1) First major American city in which more than half the births in 1975 were illegitimate 4.988 born out of wedlock; 4,758 to married women. Also, according to the National Center for Health Statistics, 57 per cent of black children and 12.9 per cent of white children were born to single mothers. (2) First major American city

in which abortions last year exceeded the number of births - 9,819 abortions; 9,746 births. Statistics released by the D.C. Department of Human Resources show that 85 per cent of the abortions were paid for by the government through the medicaid program or at the city's free public hospital.

(3) Disclosure of widespread nepotism and cronyism in the city's largest agency - with the head of the scandal - bedraggled Department of Human Resources leading the list of chiselers and boodlers. At least six relatives of Director Joseph Yeldell, long - time henchman of Mayor Walter Washington, have been uncovered holding high salaries jobs in the agency, plus an extensive sort of interlocking directorate of nepotism with other municipal officials, including relatives of the mayor

and at least two local judges. These squalid revelations are the latest in a series that has splattered Yeldell's stormy regime - apparently of no concern to Mayor Washington. Running Wild

Nationwide, approximately 13 per cent of births last year were illegitiate — a rate that has been steadily rising since 1960.

In 1974, latest year for which national statistics are available, 47.1 per cent of children born out of wedlock were black; 6.5 per cent white. The higher proportions in Washington (57 per cent black; 12.9 per cent white) are attributed to the capital's preponderantly black population — upwards of 74 per

Teenage mothers accounted for 46 per cent of out - of wedlock children in D.C. Most of the mothers were between 17 and 19; some 200 were 15 years old; 115 under that age, with four girls 12. In most Washington high

schools, unwed mothers are so numerous that courses in child rearing and nurseries are the Dr. Wendy Baldwin, of the


National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, says, "There seems to be greater tolerance among blacks for out - of wedlock births, particularly mong low income. A white girl is more apt to say that an illegitimate baby will ruin her life. But if you don't have many opportunities, a pregnancy may well be viewed differently.

Official figures show that. since 1975, both nationally and in Washington, the birth rate for married and single women over 20 has been steadily declining Also that at every income level the premarital birth rate for blacks is more than triple that of To The Good

In one respect the record high abortion rate in Washington has been for the better

Says Jean van der Tak, of the Population Reference Bureau, If there hadn't been so many abortions, there would have been even more out - of wedlock births. If medicaid payments for abortions are cut off, the number of illegitiate births is certain to go up. There is a direct relation between



Remember Jesse's knack for recalling details? He said the train ticket from Fort Madison to New York City cost him \$39.29, leaving him 71 cents change for incidentals.

When he got on the train he went to the smoker where he made friends with a group of fellows on their way to being re-united with an old friend and employer, a fellow named Al Capone. They'd just completed a stint at Leavenworth.

The fellows noticed that Jesse's brogans were being worn without benefit of socks, so they gave him a couple of pair of the gray prison variety.

A penny-ante poker game was in progress and Jesse, the poor kid from Smalltown, Okla., still had the 71 cents in his overalls. He sat down to some cards with those Chicago gangsters.

When it was time to detrain in Chicago, Jesse stood up from the poker game with \$3 and odd cents. While waiting for the connection to New York, he spent "a little over \$2" on a substantial meal.

WASHINGTON (AP) - President-elect Carter's plan for a reorganization of the federal government is encountering op-

position from a key members of Congress and a well-known legal scholar who question its constitutionality.

Congress to give him authority to submit reorganization plans to Congress that would go into effect after 60 days unless either the House or Senate expressed disapproval.

During his campaign. Carter repeatedly pledged to cut the number of federal agencies from some 1.900 to 200. He con-

ceded that such a consolidation in the number of agencies might not result in a reduction in the number of federal em-

Many observers and Carter staffers believe the only way such a sweeping reorganization of the bureaucracy can take place is with the authority the

In effect. Carter would be authorized to reorganize the executive branch if Congress did nothing to stop him.

If Carter must submit his reorganization plans in the form of legislative proposals that would be subject to amendment by Congress and would require approval at the committee level as well as by the full House and Senate, there would be many more opportunities for opponents to tor-

Prof. Raoul Berger of the Harvard Law School said the

proposal to have reorganization plans take effect unless Congress disapproves them raises a constitutional doubt.

Emphasizing that he supported Carter in the election, Berger said, "I don't like the notion of giving such a tremendous blank check to the President.

Berger's view was echoed by Rep. Jack Brooks, D-Tex., chairman of the House Government Operations Committee.

Brooks plans to submit a bill that would require positive congressional approval for reorga-

HOUSTON (AP) - The city health director and others have questioned whether Environmental Protection Agency proposals are aimed at the right pollution target in Houston.

A 1975 study in wooded areas of nearby Montgomery County indicates that forests naturally produce chemically reactive hydrocarbons in amounts more than 30 times higher than the federal air quality goal, Dr. Richard Severs of the University of Texas School of Public Health told the hearing.

Severs said this suggests the present EPA ozone standard can never be achieved and a better strategy might be to reduce nitrogen ozixes.

Dr. Ned Meyer, an EPA standards specialist from Research Triangle Park, N.C., challenged the views and said the effect of hydrocarbon controls on ozone may not yet have had time to become evident in Houston.

Louie Welch, representing the Houston Chamber of Commerce, said the new EPA proposals are "a significant step forward from many of those of 1973 and 1975" but he said the agency's entire concept of a hydrocarbon rollback is still questionable and unsupported by adequate research data.

PLAINS, Ga. (AP) - Having filled three Cabinet posts, President-elect Carter is expected to announce Thursday his choice for at least one more post probably secretary of agricul-

Rep. Bob Bergland, D-Minn., a farm operator and political ally of Vice President-elect Walter F. Mondale, was widely seen as the likely choice to head the Agriculture Depart-

Carter spokesman Jody Powell emphasized Tuesday that Carter's next appointments will not necessarily all involve Cabinet secretaryships. Powell said simply they would be Cabinetlevel posts and said there would be at least two announce-

Another possibility was an announcement of Carter's reported decision to name Charles Schultze, budget director in the Johnson administration, as chairman of his Council of Economic Advisers.

Meanwhile, Rep. Andrew Young, D-Ga., said he has been offered the post as U.S. ambassador to the United Nations but that he hasn't made up his mind about whether to take the

Carter and several top aides cautioned newsmen again Tuesday against advance speculation about choices for top appointments.

Earlier, Jane Cahill Pfeiffer, a former IBM vice president, had asked that she not be considered for secretary of commerce, saying a Washington job would have parted her from her husband, and because she had undergone a thyroid cancer operation less than a year ago that left her without "confidence in my own sustained energy level ...

Earlier, he chose Wall Street lawyer Cyrus Vance as secretary of state and Atlanta banker Thomas Lance as director of the Office of Management and

Carter said he probably will announce, even before his inauguration, an economic program aimed at creating jobs taxes. He said he favors jobcreating programs supplemented by tax breaks.

The President-elect also disclosed that Vance has joined Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger in trying to persuade members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) from imposing steep oil price increases at a pricefixing meeting in the Middle East this week.

The President-elect ducked a question about pay raises for top federal employes, saying matter rests on outgoing President Ford's desk. On other topics, Carter said:

-He has not given sufficient study to possible duplication of offensive weapons systems to decide whether defense spending might be curbed by eliminating some of them.

-He is confident Congress will give him authority, probably by the end of February, to draw up broad government reorganization plans that would go into effect automatically uness vetoed by the Senate or

-The government faces a near record deficit of \$60 billion to \$65 billion from the 1977 budget he will inherit from President Ford, but he declined to say what size deficit he might face in his first year in

### Galveston plant accused of leak

HOUSTON (AP) - A Galves- area warehouses. ton Bay chemical plant, under investigation by federal officials in connection with a controversial pesticide it produced. has been accused of leaking another toxic chemical.

Allison R. Pierce, acting Harris County pollution control director, said county investigators found p-nitrophenol riding the rain runoff out of the Velsicol Chemical Corp. plant and

into roadside ditches Tuesday. This material is visible to the naked eye because of its distinctive yellow color." Pierce said. "It's toxic, and it's something that shouldn't be in

our waterways. Earlier Tuesday the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) said traces of the pesticide leptophos still can be found in the Galveston Bay

area but present no threat to the environment. Federal investigators have said 10 or more employes may have suffered severe nerve

damage while helping manufacture the pesticide at the Velsicol plant. Velsicol stopped producing the pesticide last January but

still has quantities of the prod-

uct stored in three Houston

"If there is a problem, it will be on the plant site," said John C. White, EPA regional administrator, "and will be the responsibility of the OSHA (the Occupational Safety and Health dministration). White, at a news conference,

released a preliminary report on soil and grass samples taken this month at the plant site and sediment. water and oyster samples taken from the Bayport channel and Galveston

The preliminary findings indicate no problem or threat. White said.

Pierce said p-nitrophenol is piped into plant evaporation ponds, where it is concentrated and eventually shipped by truck to Texas City for disposal down an injunection well.

But in Tuesday's continued heavy rains. Pierce said. the chemical was overflowing from the ponds and running beneath plant fences.

He said the toxic chemical was going into a flood control ditch that apparently emptiesinto Taylor Bayou and Taylor

Velsicol officials were not available for comment on the alleged chemical leak.

DEAR READER - The person you know is his own worst enemy and deserves to be nagged. Unfortunately nagging may not do any good. Through centuries of relations between men and women, nagging has proved to be very poor medicine. If you will forgive my exaggeration think of all the healthy husbands there would be if nagging

I presume from your remarks that the person you know has an irritated lower esophagus because aciddigestive juice leaks backward out of the stomach into the lower esophagus. This is commonly associated with a hiatal hernia (hernia of the stomach through the diaphragm).

Alcohol increases the formation of acid digestive juice and makes matters worse. Coffee and all caffeinecontaining beverages also make it worse. Cigarette smoking has not been shown to increase acid formation, but it may affect the normal contracting action of the stomach which may

DEAR DR. LAMB - I had a vasectomy three years ago. A hard nodule has formed in the scrotal sac. The nodule is

assured me that it is nothing to be concerned about. Do you foresee any complications? In the event I should desire to sire a child, could an operacould sperm be withdrawn for an artificial insemination?

DEAR READER — A small lump or nodule can be many things, including a small cyst filled with sperm cells, or the scar tissue that may have formed around a small amount of blood associated with the operation. In any case you did the right thing. Anyone who has a lump or nodule of the testicle should have an examination as soon as possible. In some cases it is malignancy and early diagnosis may save a person's life. Don't delay as some of these tumors spread very rapidly

You should consider a vasectomy as permanent at the time you have it done. Some urologists claim a 25 per cent success in restoring fertility by re-operating on the vas and rejoining it. Success is not success unless sufficient healthy sperm cells are released to enable pregnancy. Recently microscopic operations, perfected by a few surgeons, have been credited

with better results. Withdrawing sperm by a needle after a vasectomy has been performed may not be successful. Sometimes the testicle stops forming an adequate amount of viable sperm cells after the vas is tied. Sperm banks have been used to store frozen sperm before a vasectomy is performed but these are not well regulated in every instance and no one can guarantee you how long the frozen sperm

will really be usable. I don't think you need to worry about that lump since you have had your doctor examine it, but your chances of regaining fertility are not out-

### Giants name McVav

PLEASANTVILLE, N.Y. (AP) - John McVay reflected for a moment on how far he had come and where he had come from, then decided: What makes this so different is that I know there's going to be another season.'

For McVay, there are going to be at least another two seasons with the National Football League's New York Giants. That is a half-season more than the World Football League gave him - or gave itself for that matter.

The Giants said Tuesday they have signed the 45-year-old McVay to a two-year contract as head coach, eliminating the "interim" which preceded his title during the latter half of the 1976 season, when he helped turn the club around.

McVay's only previous head coaching experience in the pros started in 1974 when he guided the Memphis Southmen to the WFL's best record, 17-3.

# Mother dead, child survives bullet

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - A man whose wife shot their 4 year-old son and then killed herself said. "She loved him so much, she wanted to take him with her.

Joe Tilton, 30, said in an interview Monday that he hopes his son Jody will also adopt that outlook toward the tragic final actions of his mother. Judith Rae Tilton. the afternoon of Dec. 4.

"Jody's going to have some beautiful memories of her," said Tilton, a radio executive in the western Oklahoma community of Elk City, who is staying here hospital. Doctors say the boy should recover completely from damage to his liver, lung, diaphragm and stomach caused by a single 45 caliber pistol bullet that entered through his back

Tilton said he doesn't ever expect to understand just what went on in his wife's mind before she died.

Something somewhere snapped, and I just thank God that something happened when I could be a part of saving my son's life," he said.

He said he and his wife of 10 years had "a super family life" and there was "no question" she loved her family

perfect that she just couldn't ... there were times 1 knew that she just couldn't be the perfect person.... She strived to be the ideal wife, the ideal mother. You could ask anybody that knew her.

"I look back at it now and I see there was a period of time when she was depressed. But how many of us have times of depression?

Tilton has consulted pyschologists about his son and said, "He's taking it like a normal 4 year-old.

The child knows his mother is dead and has talked to his father about her. Tilton said. He declined to discuss what Jody had

Mrs. Tilton, 30, a former secretary, had stayed home to be a fulltime wife and mother since the birth of Jody, the couple's only child. Tilton said she spent a few hours a week as a hospital volunteer in Elk City and helped with Sunday church services for children at the Elk City Church of God.

Judy was a very religious woman - she was very diligent in her Bible reading and prayer." Tilton said.

'She never mistreated Jody," and Mrs. Tilton had no history of mental illness.

Tilton recalled the afternoon of Dec. 4, a Saturday, when he was practicing his electric organ in the living room for church

He said he heard a shot and rushed into

the bedroom. "Jody had just hit the floor," bleeding heavily. Tilton said. "I thought it was an accident," that Jody had accidentally shot himself. Tilton said. "Judy didn't move -

she just stood there." He grabbed Jody in his arms, ran to his car and drove to the Elk City Hospital, less than a mile away.

· After he arrived. Tilton told an ambulance to bring his wife to the hospital. He remembered that he had seen blood on her hand and said he was afraid she had

When authorities arrived at the

apartment they found Mrs. Tilton dead. She had shot herself in the heart. Tilton said. A neighbor reported hearing a shot just after she saw Tilton running frantically to the car with Jody.

Tilton said he kept the gun his wife used at home because "obviously I wanted my family protected.

Tilton, general manager of Radio Station KADS in Elk City, said the tragedy has

made him more religious. He said he believes it was a miracle "that God spared his (Jody's) life. I really request the prayers of all believers that I'll raise this guy right." Tilton said softly. 'But how can I follow in her (Mrs. Tilton's) footsteps?"



## Don't drink coffee, supermarket men urge

**Associated Press Writer** Soaring coffee prices have prompted officials of at least two supermarket chains to suggest that their customers switch to other beverages to try to bring costs down.

In a move reminiscent of the sugar boycott two years ago. Kenneth Knese, area manager for the nine Justrite stores in Kansas City, Mo., posted signs in his outlets reading:

"We at Justrite feel coffee costs have become ridiculous. Therefore, we are asking you to select a substitute until coffee suppliers reduce their cost to

A similar message came from Neil Golub, head of the company that runs the Price Chopper chain in the Albany, N.Y., area. Golub has been running full-page advertisements urging customers to try tea. boullion, hot chocolate or hot

"We did the same thing when the price of sugar went up .... and we think it might work again," he said.

Spokesmen at stores in other areas of the country said they did not plan to encourage any formal boycott, but expected that consumers would revolt without any urging.

"The consumer is smart enough to know," said Ted Simmons of Colonial Stores in Atlanta. "I assume that when the price 'gets high enough, they'll say the hell with it."

Sugar prices climbed to record levels in late 1974. prompting consumer groups and some stores to urge a boycott. The higher prices - more than \$3 for a five-pound sack of sugar - were blamed on increased demand. Consumption dropped and so did prices. By this fall, the average retail price for a five-pound bag of sugar was about \$1.15, according to the U.S. Department of Coffee prices, meanwhile,

started rising in the summer of 1975 after a frost in Brazil destroyed much of the crop that prices.

Recent increases have boosted prices to about \$3 a pound at the wholesale level. Retail prices still are under \$3 a pound in most areas - partly because merchants are selling cheaper, existing supplies and partly because they are using coffee as a "loss leader" to get customers into their stores.

The Albany and Kansas City stores aren't the only ones urging a boycott. U.S. Rep. Benjamin S. Rosenthal, D-N.Y., head of the subcommittee on commerce, consumer and monetary affairs, launched an inquiry into the increase in the price of coffee.

He noted that there had been several special promotions on coffee recently and said: "If there is a shortage, why are there discounts? The quickest and surest way for consumers to avoid being squeezed to the last drop is to vote with their dollars - refuse to pay the

HOUSTON (AP) - The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) wants Texas industries to install special vapor recovering devices on large gasoline and crude oil tanks to help improve the quality of air in the

The plan, which would cost industries \$39 million in Houston and \$91 million statewide. was to be discussed today in the first of three EPA hearings on air quality in the state.

Other agency proposals include suggesting the state start a feasibility study on possible measures that would reduce traffic in metropolitan areas.

> The EPA wants the six major metropolitan areas in the state to implement carpool-matching systems where residents receive assistance in finding car-

Houston already has such a plan and an EPA official said this objective is being directed mainly toward Beaumont-Port Fort Worth, San Antonio and El

To reduce traffic, the EPA wants state officials to work with cities in the development of specific plans that would offer incentives to encourage people to use buses and car

Such plans could involve exclusive traffic lanes for buses and carpools and park and ride facilities connecting commuter parking by bus both downtown

The EPA also proposes that employers of 250 persons or more encourage employes to use carpools and buses by giving them such incentives as special parking privileges or more desirable work schedules.



### Christmas sales may influence tax decision

WASHINGTON (AP) - The ingling of cash registers, not sleigh bells, will be the key to a successful Christmas season for the incoming Carter adminis-

President-elect Carter and his advisers have put Christmas retail sales at the top of the list of economic statistics that will influence their decision on whether to recommend a tax break next year.

Retail sales have been disappointing since early in the year. And when Americans stop buying, businesses stop producing and that means fewer jobs on production lines.

There are other statistics this month that will count in Carter's decision, including November industrial production figures that will be released late today.

There also will be figures on housing starts and personal income, both on Thursday, corpo-

rate profits on Monday, consumer prices on Dec. 21, and the index of leading economic indicators on Dec. 29.

At an Atlanta news conference Tuesday. Carter said he will meet with his key advisers soon after Christmas to decide on what to do about the economy. He said he probably will announce the decision before he takes office Jan. 20.

If things remain as they are now, he indicated, help will definitely be needed. He noted that with unemployment at 8.1 per cent and inflation still dogging the economy. "the economic problems are very se-

He said he prefers jobs programs as the best way to put people back to work, adding that he would supplement those with a tax break, if necessary.

Retail sales is one of the statistics that gives the quickest look at what is happening in the economy. So if consumers start buying generously at Christmas, it may mean they

will keep on spending into next year, diminishing the need for a quick tax cut.

The whole purpose of a tax break is to put money into the hands of consumers so they can buy more.

Some encouragement was found in the retail sales report for November, which was up 1.7 per cent over October.

Another economic indicator, meanwhile, showed a slight improvement in October. The Commerce Department said business inventories that month grew at their lowest pace in six.

Inventory growth can reduce production if business tries to sell excess stocks rather than manufacturing more goods.

# Ex-mayor says keep HUD out of Pampa
