## Local statistics might shock Grandma

Birth, marriage and divorce statistics for 1976 have altered very little from those of the past three years in Gray County. Yet compared to statistics of 10 years ago, there are two drastic changes.

1. For every marriage license issued in Gray County, there was one baby born. 2. Almost one out of every two Gray

County marriages were dissolved in the

3. According to statistics provided by the Gray County and District Clerks' offices. there were 350 marriage licenses applied for last year while 188 divorces were granted by District Judge Grainger

Judge McIlhaney said divorce figures are similar to those of the past few years. According to County statistics there were 354 babies born in 1976. This is a sharp

decline from the yearly average of 900 born

a decade ago, and is not much above the record low of 335 in 1974.

Grade school enrollments reflect this declining trend. Enrollment for the Pampa Independent School District 1976-77 school year is 2,263 compared to last year's enrollment of 2,332

Judge McIlhaney believes those involved in divorce proceedings in Gray County generally fall into one of three categories:

 Young couples, married five years or less who are burdened with economic

problems which cause arguments and eventually disintegrate the relationship.

- Middle - aged couples or older, with second or subsequent marriages that have failed to fulfill expectations.

 Couples where one partner is addicted to alcohol or drugs and becomes impossible to live with

Earlier rulings in the Texas Family Code required more specific grounds for divorce such as adultery or alleged cruelty. Cruelty in these cases did not always refer to the

physical aspect - proof of mental cruelty was sufficient, the judge said, but it was necessary to testify to the specific acts of

Today, "discord and conflict" is the common ground for divorce under the new Family Code and it is not required to testify to specific incidents

According to Judge McIlhaney, a significant aspect of the Family Code is the 60 - day waiting period after the divorce has been filed before the couple can appear in to reconsider and he estimates that almost half the couples change their minds and get back together.

The Pampa Family Service Center plays an important role in the alleviation of divorce according to Judge McIlhaney. A psychiatrist, a psychologist and a social worker experienced in marital counseling come to Pampa from Amarillo on a regular basis and professional counseling is available to anyone needing guidance.

## Longet trial begins today

ASPEN, Colo. (AP) — Claudine Longet was escorted into the courtroom by her ex-husband, singer Andy Williams, as jury selection began today for her felony manslaughter trial in the shooting death of her

The small, slender Miss Longet appeared calm as she walked into the Pitkin County District Court surrounded by Williams and her attorneys.

"I am really just here to lend support at the first and to be with my kids," said Williams, seated in the third row of the courtroom

Pitkin County District Court Judge George E. Lohr told about 70 potential jurors that Miss Longet is charged with unlawfully, feloniously and recklessly killing Vladimir "Spider" Sabich, 31.

But Lohr cautioned that the charge was only an accusation. "Therefore," he said, "the burden is on the people to prove the charge within a shadow of a doubt.

Among the first excused from jury duty was Anthony Mazze. an attorney who said he was "a personal friend of mr. Sabich I represent Mr. Sabich's es-

Also excused was J.D. "Joe Dog" Muller on the ground that he also is a lawyer.

ning of testimony. Miss Longet "feels pretty certain she is going to be all right," Williams said.

Before the session started. Miss Longet flipped through a folder of what appeared to be newspaper clippings.

could end in as little as two weeks, but Dist. Atty. Frank Tucker has said jury selection could lengthen the trial to a month. Tucker said many po-

Jury selection in the 70-seat courtroom was scheduled to last until the middle of next week. Potential jurors were to appear in groups of 75 today. Wednesday. Friday and next Tuesday

Pitkin County District Court Judge George E. Lohr estimated over he weekend that the trial would last two to four weeks. But Austin, sharing duties with Charles V. Weedman, said he feared heavy prior news coverage could make the trial take "longer than usual." Austin said he believed Miss Longet could get a fair

The French-born Miss Longet, who is free on a \$5,000 personal recognizance bond, staved with friends in Aspen. including singer John Denver, after the shooting. She later moved into a \$153,000 house she purchased last spring. Austin said

If convicted, she faces a maximum penalty of 10 years in prison and a \$30,000 fine

## Revenge motive for fire

venge against a young woman was the motive behind a Bronx social club fire that killed 25 people two months ago, a prosecutor said in announcing the arrest of two men on arson and

murder charges Police said Sunday that Jose Cordero, a 40-year-old unemployed salesman, and a teenage accomplice set the fire after Cordero had a lover's quarrel" with 19-year-old Diana Sanchez. They said at least one other person was being sought.

Police said Miss Sanchez was Cordero's girl friend and the fight was caused by her attending the party at the Puerto Rican Social Club in the South Bronx against his wishes.

However, the family of Miss Sanchez, who was killed in the blaze along with her sister Evelyn, 22, said Cordero was just a friend of the family and denied that any romance had existed betweeen the two.

Cordero and Lopez were arraigned before Criminal Court Judge William Holland. They are being held without bond for a hearing Wednesday. The case was to be presented to a grand jury today

The district attorney's office also requested that both defendants be "segregated from the rest of the prison population' because friends and family of those who died in the blaze might seek revenge

The 16 women and nine men who died in the Oct. 24 fire made it the worst death toll in a building here since 1958. when 27 were killed in a textile factory fire in Manhattan. In addition to those killed in the Bronx fire, 18 others, including Angel Louis Sanchez, a brother of the Sanchez sisters, were injured when they jumped to the street from the top floor of the two-story building.

According to police and the Bronx district attorney's office. Cordero left the party "enraged" and returned with friends to throw a liquid accelerant, believed to be gasoline.

Police said Cordero was married and had two sons and a previous police record. Lopez, who was arrested on his way to a National Guard meeting, was unemployed and had no prior

After police delivered news of the arrests to Provicencia Felix, the mother of the Sanchez sisters, the sobbing woman described Cordero as a frequent visitor to their apartment.

"Everyone, they are saying he is Diana's boy friend. That's not true. He was a friend. He said she was like a daughter he had told us," she said. "He was a friend of us. He was godfather to Evelyn's baby. I just can't believe he could do this."

Angel Sanchez, 18, said, "The day of the party, Cordero came here and said he would take all of us. Later Diana told me he was angry beause she was going, but she did not understand

only five thermometers in the center - three oral and two rectal - and they are all kept in the same container. She said that diabetics are not served diabetic diets and that she had sent food trays back to the

kitchen "several times" because it was cold.

One of the kitchen workers called and said "proper diets are not being carried out because we don't have the proper food to give them." She said the kitchen staff includes a kitchen helper, a dishwasher. and a cook. She said there is supposed to be another helper on

Mrs. Burrier said that there is a dietician working at the facility with diet cards in the kitchen which are checked and meals prepared accordingly.

She said that patients unhappy with a meal "can send a special order to the kitchen and they get

what they want. They can almost send their own menu to the kitchen every meal if they don't like what we have. We have two cooks and a dishwasher working all the time plus a dietary supervisor.

Asked if there was a shortage of thermometers at Leisure Lodge, she said, "Goodness,

Asked how many there were. she replied, "Gracious, I don't know, but we've got a good supply of them.

She said the inspecting officials had "an exit interview with her and "they said apparently the patients are getting good care.

Mrs. Burrier admitted that since Thursday a couple of patients have transferred to a facility across the street, but she said that "Everything's running smoother than it ever has

Some nurses have been brought in to work until the ones who quit can be replaced.

And Mrs. Burrier said a new director of nurses has been hired and will begin work on Thursday.

## Property tax No.1 with legislature

**Associated Press Writer** AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - Doing something about the Texas property tax apparently will have a No. 1 priority in the 65th

Legislature meeting Jan. 11. "It would be hard to find someone who would not admit that the property tax system is a mess," said Comptroller Bob Bullock recently. "It is inequitable. Some 3,000 taxing entities administer it in

almost as many different ways. "The public is concerned only about one tax-the property tax."

"Property tax revision is an idea whose time came long ago and whose passage is long overdue," said Atty. Gen. John Hill. The levy on the market value of a taxpayer's property, or a faction thereof. has been with Texans for at least 100 years. But inflationary trends in recent years brought on the pressure.

The Texas Research League says preliminary estimates indicate total property tax collections in 1976 will be about \$2.75 billion, an increase of almost 75 per cent in the last five years.

The Texans for Equitable Taxation (TET), an organization which says it will give the average taxpayer a non-political lobby in Austin, claims that real property such as homes, businesses and farms represent less than 30 per cent of the wealth of the state in private hands, but this same property raises 85 per cent of the ad

valorem or property tax dollar. Tax payers beef that a house may be valued at \$25,000 on the tax roll by the school district and \$15,000 by the county. They don't understand why citizens of one Texas city pay property taxes on their atomobiles while those of other cities go scot free. And they don't understand why some types of property, like "intangibles" such as stocks, bonds and bank accounts.

A legislative property tax committee of a previous legislature, which was unsuccessful in getting property tax reform, estimated that untaxed property in Texas, including intangibles, amounts to \$252 billion.

Hope for tax law revision, and reform. this session rest largely with a 200-page proposed recodification aet that is a product of the Legislative Council's Property Tax Study Committee. Legislators, aided by citizen advisory group, drew up the proposal after months of study and public hearings.

This is the Texas property taxpayers bill of rights," says Rep. Wayne Peveto, D-Orange, committee chairman. He predicts that passage of the bill might even mean lower taxes for a lot of taxpayers.

The massive bill, which was presented to the public in a series of 13 recent public hearings, has the main task of putting property value appraisal into one central office in each county--not one appraisal for the county, one for the city, another for the

school district, etc. It also would set up an appeal system where unhappy property owners could appear before a local review board to

protest property valuations. If not satisfied locally, the taxpayer could carry his appeal to a new state commission.

Local property taxes would be frozen under the proposed system and could not be increased by government officials without due notice and public hearings. Each taxpayer would have to be notified of any change in his assessment ratio.

Peveto's tax package has drawn considerable support but also opposition:

The attorney general announced support of property tax reform then his department could not be forced to take part in a central tax appraisal office but could do it voluntarily, and perhaps by contract. The League of Women Voters has made

Peveto's version, its top priority for the

property tax revision, particularly

Spokesmen for Bexar and Howard Counties, which already have central assessment system, support a single appraisal office plan.

However, Fort Worth city and county officials said large cities would have to bear too much of the cost of a single office, particularly without county involvement. Some think it would take

away local control of local property taxes. Other city officials are leary of the requirement that taxes cannot be raised

without public hearings. "It would place elected officials in a bad position of having to vote for a tax increase every year." moaned one public

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### Those Soviet 'deficits'

An item in a recent issue of the Wall Street Journal helps to put the matter of "trade deficits." especially those being experienced by the Soviet Union and other socialist economies, in clearer perspective.

The Soviet Union's trade deficit with capitalist countries," noted the Journal, "hit \$.36 billion in 1976's first nine months, widening \$410 million from midyear.

Of that \$3.36 billion Russian trade deficit with capitalist countries, \$1.97 billion was with the United States, the Journal went on to explain; meaning, when reduced to laymen terms. that the Soviet government and economy received \$1.97 billion more, in goods and services, from the United States than the United States received from the Soviet Union.

All of which raises an immediate question: If we did not get an equal amount of goods and services from the Soviet Union in exchange for ours sent to them, as the \$1.97 billin trade deficit clearly tells us, then, just what did we get in exchange?

Russian rubles? Let's not joke about such a serious matter. No private enterpriser in his right mind, dealing directly with the Soviet Union, would dream of accepting the worthless Soviet

This, incidently, also goes some way toward explaining why the Soviet Union can spend such enormous sums on military hardware: sums which, in the absence of government bestowed "gifts" from the American taxpayers, would have to be spent on feeding, clothing and housing the



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## Be not 'unduly alarmed'?

Of all dangers to humanolife and freedom, without doubt the greatest is thinking that goes something like this: "We must hurt for your own good." Or. "Even if it kills you, we are going to force you to be healthy. or educated, or happy, or even God - fearing," as the case may be. Imbued with such a crusading mania, there are literally no lengths to which power - wielding individuals

won't go. Such thinking sparked the Inquisition in Europe. compulsory schooling, the military draft. Prohibition and thousands of laws, in this country and elsewhere, based on some misguided individual's or group's ideas of what, they were sure, would be "good" for you.

The currently in the news Swine Flu Program" is an illuminating case in point. Everyone should be inoculated with the vaccine, powers - that be in Washington, D.C. decided and, forthwith, mounted a massive taxpaver - funded campagin, replete with scare tactics, calculated to insure that everyone was That is until mounting evidence began to accumulate that the program not only failed to do what it claimed but, actually, was dangerous to both health and life At which point inoculations were suspended and, probably, will be quietly discontinued in the hope that the public will

What appears to be a final blow has been dealt to a health program that was in trouble from the start — the ambitious plan to inoculate every American against swine flu the current issue of U.S. News and World Report states. "Federal officials on December 16 suspended the project for at least a month after more than 50 cases of a rare form of paralysis were reported in people who had received shots. At least six of the paralysis victims died.

permanently. That, mind you, after some 45 million men, women and children have been given the government progagandized

Moreover, it is not that the government hadn't been warned. It had! Just how well warned, and to what effect, are suggested by these excerpts from a North American Newspaper Alliance (NANA) news dispatch filed in Washington, D.C. on July 29 of this year:

Dr. Anthony Morris, director of the Slow Latent and Temporate Virus Branch of the Food and Drug Administration. and once the government's chief vaccine control officer, has been fired. Following his firing, four rooms full of test animals were

Five of the seven employes working under Morris have been detailed to other jobs. The other two do not yet know their fate. But these men have been stripped of all their research records and equipment and told to get rid of their vaccine cultures...

On July 16, government personnel officers presented Morris with his retirement papers to sign which would have guaranteed him \$17,000 a year for life. Morris declined to sign.

Informed sources say the White House ordered the firing of Morris after an article appeared in the Washington Post in which Morris was quoted as saying the effectiveness of the flu vaccine was only 20 per cent. This contradicted the public statement of HEW's Dr. Theodore Cooper of 80 per cent effectivenss..

Morris has been telling government officials for years that follow-up studies on influenza vaccine were essential especially hypersensitivity studies - according to government transcripts.

Hypersensitivity means that if a person gets a flu shot and then is later exposed to the flu, he will come down with a more severeclase then he would have gotten had he not taken the flu shot at all. This could mean that insurance companies could be faced with millions, even billions, of dollars in claims for vears to come

In one 1968 study alone, 54 per cent of those getting a flu shot came down with severe cases of influenza during the next flu epidemic, while only 25 per cent of those not taking the flu shot

Another study in a small group of industrial workers showed similar results — 55 per cent of the immunized group got the flu, while 26 per cent of the unimmunized got flu.

In June 1975, Dr. John E. Craighead, in the department of pathology and oncology at the University of Vermont, said immunization enhanced the severity of the disease sometimes weeks and even vears later.





AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) - Linda Ingram's troubles started more than two years ago with a legal squabble over her purchase of a puppy. Today, the dog is fullgrown, and Mrs. Ingram is

Court records show that in April 1974, Mrs. Ingram. 33, answered an ad and agreed to purchase a Rottweiler, a popular breed of German cattle dog. for \$200 from Sherri Lee Charles of Cincinnati. She sent a check for \$100 as

The dog arrived by air freight on May 23, as did a notice that a shipping charge of \$50.45 was due, along with the \$100 balance. Mrs. Ingram felt the shipping cost was not part of the agreement and refused to pay it.

Mrs. Charles flew to Augusta, hired an attorney and swore out a possessory warrant. Accompanied by Columbia County sheriff's deputy Alex Shumaker, she went to the Ingram residence. Mrs. Ingram and her husband, Walter, said they did not have the dog. Shumaker searched the premises: no dog.

After a court hearing the next day, Mrs. Ingram, at the suggestion of the court, wrote a check for the full balance, including the disputed shipping cost, Mrs. Charles refused it, saying she wanted the dog, not cash.

That same day, Shumaker obtained a warrant and searched the property a second time. Again, no dog. This warrant charged Mrs. Ingram had perjured herself by denying knowledge of the dog's whereabouts.

The deputy returned later with two arrest warrants: one alleging perjury, the other charging Mrs. Ingram with theft by deception.

Shumaker charged that while he was attempting to serve those warrants, Mrs. Ingram pointed a shotgun at him. He swore out a third warrant charging aggravated assault.

Four months later, a grand jury indicted her. She pleaded guilty to assault and no contest to the other charges on Oct. 16.

Superior Court Judge Edwin D. Fulcher sentenced her to five years probation on each charge, to run concurrently. As a condition, she was fined \$250 and instructed to pay \$500 to Mrs.

Fulcher ordered Mrs. Ingram to return the dog within 30 days or to submit evidence she didn't have the dog and couldn't deliver it.

The case lay dormant until April 1976, when Mrs. Ingram was arrested on a petition to revoke probation. It was based on affidavits alleging that she possessed the dog in violation of her

At a probation revocation hearing that month, a Greer, S.C., man testified that in late 1975 he had paid Mrs. Ingram \$700 for the dog.

Mrs. Ingram was confined in the Richmond County jail and has been there since. Her attorney filed a habeas corpus petition to have her freed on bail, but a state court denied the motion.

Mrs. Ingram, who becomes eligible for parole in February, has asked the Georgia Supreme Court to overrule the lower court and grant her habeas corpus petition. She also has filed a \$100,000 civil rights complaint against Mrs. Charles and Deputy Shumaker, contending that they "acted in concert ... to deprive the plaintiff of liberty and property" when they obtained the

### Jazz musician Garner dies

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Jazz pianist Erroll Louis Garner. who performed at Carnegie Hall and won international acclaim though he never learned to read music, has died of a heart attack at 53.

Garner, who died Sunday en route to Cedars Sinai Medical Center here, had been seriously ill with emphysea for several years and had been discharged from the hospital near his home just last Wednesday.

His body was to be flown to his native Pittsburgh for burial. His best-known composition was "Misty," which he recorded in 1956. With words added later by Johnny Burke, the song became a hit for singers Johnny Mathis and Sara Vaug-

Garner's late father, Ernest, played the trombone, mandolin and piano as a hobby. Three of Garner's five brothers and sisters are amateur musicians. and a fourth is a professional

Garner began appearing regularly on station KDKA in Pittsburgh at age 7 with a group called the Candy Kids. By age 11, he was substituting for pianists on Alleghenyriverboats

He began playing with local groups in 1937 and went to New York in 1944, where he took engagements at small clubs. He worked with the Slam Stewart trio, then formed a trio of his own and appeared in the Paris Jazz Festival in 1948. French

critics called him "the man with 40 fingers.'

He performed with the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra in 1957 and made return appearances with that organization four times. In 1959, he made his debut at Carnegie Hall in New

Garner's work brought him international awards. He received the French Prix du Disque for jazz recording in Paris in 1957 and the same year was chosen best pianist by the International Jazz Critics Poll of Downbeat Magazine.

He performed with the National Symphony Orchestra in Washington, D.C., during the 1974-1975 season. His latest album, "Magician," was issued in 1974-75.

## Don Yarbrough takes oath

**Associated Press Writer** AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - Don Yarbrough, who the State Bar says is not fit to be a Texas lawyer, was a member of Texas' highest court today.

The 35-year-old Houston attorney was sworn in Sunday as an associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court.

Today, at 9 a.m. he sits with the other eight members of the court at a special hearing. Tuesday he will take part in the usual weekly conference of the court considering cases appealed to them from throughout

"I covet your continued prayers as we embark on the troubled waters ahead both personally and for the state," said Yarbrough Sunday.

He took the oath in a black robe borrowed from Chief Justice Joe Greenhill. He said he appreciated the courtesy but complained there was a hole in

"You will find the work challenging and I hope you enjoy working with us." the chief justice said at the end of the 20 minute ceremony

Yarbrough refused to talk with reporters later.

The brief swearing-in ceremony before a crowd of maybe 75 persons was the climax to Yarbrough's surpise win in last June's Democratic primary and the defeat of two write-in candidates in November.

Yarbrough is a defendant in 15 civil suits including one by the State Bar seeking to take away his lawyer's license. The

### Ask Dr. Lamb

By Lawrence E. Lamb, M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I am 59, female, married and have high blood pressure around 175. I am worried about strokes or a heart attack, but my faith believes only "God" is the greatest of all physicians. I wonder if you can buy something over the counter at a drug store?

DEAR READER - If you belong to the faith I think you might, you may be interested to know the lady who founded the faith wore glasses - but I don't know where she bought

You should be concerned about your blood pressure as it does increase the chances that you could have either a stroke or heart attack or other disorders associated with diseased arteries.

I usually prefer to see a person with high blood pressure improve his or her living patterns first if that can be done. If you have any amount of fat at all under your skin, go on a sensible diet and exercise daily. At least try to walk 30 minutes to an hour a day. Walk in two sessions if you need to, in order to not be un-

comfortable The weight loss often lowers a person's blood pressure, and when it is successful it is far better for you than any medicines available for moderate elevations of blood

pressure. Also you should avoid coffee, tea and colas, as well as cigarettes.

None of these measures should conflict with your faith. I know of no Christian religion that is against a good healthy diet program, exercise and avoiding cigarettes, coffee and tea.

York, NY 10019. DEAR DR. LAMB - Do you have any information pertaining to appendicitis and how to prevent it? Also I would like to know if an operation is the only answer if a person has an appendicitis at-

DEAR READER - We have no definite information on how to prevent attacks of appendicitis. Dr. Burkitt and others who have studied the effects of cereal fiber bulk in the diet believe that appendicitis is rare in people who have sufficient cereal fiber in their diet. These investigators believe appendicitis is just one of many diseases that we suffer because of our modern bulkless diet that leads to poor colon function.

Appendicitis may be confused with several other medical conditions. These include the pain a girl may have related to ovulation, or inflammation of large lymph nodes inside the abdomen in either sex.

Once a case of appendicitis is definitely diagnosed most doctors agree that the only treatment is surgical. If the patient is severely ill for any reason, a period of patient preparation may be required. This can be required if the appendix has already ruptured. Otherwise, one of the few conditions for delaying surgery would be a very recent heart attack or similar

severe illness. In general doctors do not think trying to abort the attack with antibiotics is acceptable. The risks are too great.

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## Pitt No. 1? Probably so

AP Sports Writer Winning Coach Johnny Majors of Pitt and losing Coach Vince Dooley of Georgia were in agreement after the Sugar Bowl game that Pittsburgh deserved to be ranked the nation's top college football team.

The No. 1 rating will not be-come official, until The Associated Press' final poll Tuesday. but the top-ranked Panthers and Heisman Trophy winner Tony Dorsett were impressive in outclassing fifth-ranked Georgia 27-3 Saturday.

Majors said, "All year long I haven't waved my finger in the air and I haven't worn a No. 1 button. But after the game I told the team it was No. 1, and we all agree that we are."

"I take my hat off to Pitt." said Dooley. "Without doubt they proved themselves the best team in the nation."

Pitt's solid showing served to deflate the national title aspirations that Southern California. Michigan and Maryland might have envisioned. The Panthers finished the season with a 12-0

Pittsburgh's main challenger is expected to be Southern California, which finished the regular season as the nation's No. 3 team, but beat second-ranked Michigan 14-6 in the Rose Bowl Saturday. The Trojans wound up with an 11-1 record and Michigan 10-2.

In other Saturday bowl

champion Houston, No. 6. downed fourth-ranked Maryland 30-21 in the Cotton Bowl and Ohio State topped Colorado 27-10 at night in the Orange

Houston's victory over Maryland gave the Cougars a 10-2 record and knocked the Terrapins out of the undefeated ranks. Maryland finished at 11-

Sunday, 10th-ranked Texas A&M overwhelmed Florida 37-14 in the Sun Bowl, the West beat the East 30-14 in the Shrine Game at Stanford, Calif., and the North edged the South 21-20 in the American Bowl at Tampa, Fla.

Nebraska outlasted Texas Tech 27-24 in the Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl and Kentucky blanked North Carolina 21-0 in the Peach Bowl on Friday.

In Pitt's conquest of Georgia Dorsett compiled 202 yards on 32 carries and scored one touchdown, while quarterback Matt Cavanaugh tallied once and threw for another TD.

Over-all, the Panthers amassed 480 yards, including 288 rushing, and bottled up the Bulldogs' offense.

Southern Cal, the Pacific-8 champion, gained its victory over Big Ten co-champion Michigan although All-American running back Ricky Bell was sidelined most of the game with a concussion. Freshman Charles White proved a capable yards on 32 carries.

Bell has recovered from the head injury and will be able to play in next Saturday's Hula Bowl at Honolulu, a Southern Cal spokesman said Sunday. Dorsett also will participate in the all-star game for college

Southern Cal Coach John Robinson said, "You've got to feel good about the way Charles White played. Charles is already one of the best breakaway runners I've ever seen around.

Quarterback Vince Evans of the Trojans completed 14 of 20 passes for 181 yards and scored once. Southern Cal's two touchdowns came on long drives, with White getting the other score. Rob Lytle produced the lone Michigan TD on a one-

Franklin, a barefoot kicker, booted three towering field goals, including one that carried 62 yards, a record for major college bowl games. Woodard, a pile-driving fullback, ran for three scores and gained 124 yards rushing.


