
Herridge's family needed him to supplement the family income, and being the only son at home at the time, Herridge found work on the Trail Ranch.

# Coyotes 'Sharp'en Claws Against Grady, 48-15; **Advance t o Playoffs**

Face Sanderson Friday night in Water Valley

It's been a long three-year drought.

No football playoffs for BHS in 2000, or 2001- tough to handle anytime, but especially after the highly successful years from '96-'99 when the Coyotes advanced to bi-district ('96), won state ('97), were state runners-up ('98), and advanced to quarterfinals ('99).

But the 2002 Coyote roster staff and have something about that, and they began the trip back to playoffs the with a convincing 48-15 victory over the Grady Wildcats last Friday at Grady.

T.J. Sharp came, saw, and conquered the Wildcats with his 237-yard rushing performance.

Add to that his three touchdown runs, one touchdown pass, and six successful PAT kicks, and it's safe to say that the senior had a career night.

It couldn't have come at a better time for the Coyotes.

It was a sudden-death situation for both teams, with the winner taking the runnerup spot in District 5A. (Sands advances as the district champion).

The Coyotes actually trailed the Wildcats statistically, but the scoreboard is what counted, and BHS found the endzone more often than the hosts.

With 7:43 remaining in the first quarter, Sharp went to sophomore Adam Carter for a 10-yard touchdown pass.

Second-quarter action saw the Coyotes score three times: Sharp's 23-yard run and kick just into the start of the period, Sharp's 56-yard run and kick at the 6:40 point, and Carter's 8-yard rush with a minute remaining in the half.

Grady would not put any

points on the board until late in the third quarter, but by then it was too late.

Sharp managed another long score, this one a 60-yard run, in the third period.

Senior Raul Rodriguez's 10-yard scamper with 9:11 left in the game along with Sharp's kick gave BHS all the scoring it would need.

Though all of the scoring game on the ground, senior Brionne Jackson did throw for one completion-a 38done yard strike to Rodriguez.

Derek Rodriguez carried the ball three times for 34 yards and also returned three kickoffs for an average of 11 yards per return.

Defensively, the Coyotes turned in perhaps their best team performance of the season with three different players recording tackles (assists/solos combined) in the double figures: Sharp with 15, Raul with 14, and Andy Lozano with 16.

Rodriguez and Lozano each were credited with a sack, and Carter and Talin Pepper both recovered fumbles.

Kyle Pinkerton was in on 7 tackles, Pepper 8 (including a pass break-up), Carter 4, Ben Griffin 2, and Derek with 6. Water Valley, a six-man


The Sale will conclude on Wednesday, November 13<sup>th</sup>. Items will arrive during the second week of December for the holidays.



# **Texas Forest Service Sells** Windbreak Trees, offer Tips

a certain aesthetic quality to rural systematic planting of trees and shrubs in a windbreak becomes a management tool that effects every aspect of a farm or ranch, says Texas Forest Service official.

Now is the time for Texas landowners to order windbreak seedlings produced by the Texas Forest Service West Texas Nursery in Lubbock, before preferred stock is sold out, says, Robert Fewin, Texas Forest Service forester.

Windbreaks protect the soil, increase land value and create habitat for a variety of wildlife species. But producing a high performance windbreak required more than just planting a line of trees.

Prior to planting a wind-

A tree standing alone adds break, landowners should determine; the area or living. But the structure in need of protection; tree species and adaptable to the planting region; and the planting dimensions of the break. A planting dimension, such as proper spacing, prevents crowding and reduces tree stress, which also decreases insect and disease susceptibility thus extending the life of the windbreak. Generally, each tree row should be planted 20-feet apart with a 10- to 25- foot spacing between each tree within a row.

When designing a windbreak Fewin also recommends planting multiple rows of evergreens and deciduous trees and shrubs. The purpose of the windbreak dictates the number of rows required.

Each row within a multiple

row windbreak serves as a backup in case one row is lost to pest damage or other Cont. to pg. 7





# It was a pretty interesting funeral

It was sort of different. The funeral was held in a cemetery chapel near his gravesite on a warm October day. His Rabbi came to Big Spring from Fort Worth to conduct the service.

Jim Zack never thought about dying. He expected to live forever. He purchased a burial plot years ago, but gave little thought to using it. He didn't ever talk to anybody about his funeral. He figured someone would tend to that. He didn't want to think about it.

"Just put me in a pine box and dump me in the ground," he once jokingly told his daughter.

Rabbi said the The scripture mentions living 3 score and 5 years. But in Jim Zack's case, it was a bit more: 5 score and three. And for a person who lived for 103 years, the passing is not a sad occasion, but a reason to celebrate a long and happy life. Jim's son-in-law and grandson brief gave humorous remarks about Jim's life. A huge picture of Jim faced the crowd.

Jim Zack would have loved it. His family and friends were there and he was the center of attention. He died on a Friday and the Sunday newspaper carried a frontpage story on his life. His was the only obit on the obit page. That would have pleased him, too.

He enjoyed his age. He bought a car when he was 99 and told the credit man he wanted to pay it out in six years. When the man found out Jim was born in 1899, he put down his pencil. Jim just laughed and got out his checkbook to pay for the car.

Jim was born in Siberia, migrated to Canada, then to New York City in the late 1920's. He went around with just a nickel in his pocket for three days. He married a girl from Big Spring named Clara Brenner who was a student at NYU. They moved to Killeen when Fort Hood was being built, then went to Big Spring when Clara was about to deliver their daughter, Susan. The Zacks ended up in the ladies clothing business. Their store had a fireplace with benches in front of it and became a popular

meeting place. After they sold the store in the mid 70's. Jim started going to the country club every day to play dominoes. He was still driving there when he was 101. His summer costume of colorful plaid shorts, long black socks, and sandals was a common sight at the club and around town.




