

# Indian Canyon Cowboys are Champions tants from Ind

While attending last year's World Championship Ranch Rodeo as spectators, Wyndel Culp and Tony Scott – of Indian Canyon Ranch east of Lamesa – became unexpected participants as they "mugged a cow" in the stands.

The cow had jumped over the fence into the seating area when Culp and Scott instinctively sprang into action to prevent any of the spectators from getting hurt.

For their efforts, the folks from Indian Canyon Ranch were given free tickets to attend this year's championship rodeo. At the time, they had no way of knowing that they would not need those tickets.

"The ranch rodeo championship was a lot of fun to watch, but we thought it would be even more fun to participate," Wyndel's wife, Ann, told the *Press-Reporter*.

Ranch rodeo competition features cowboys from actual working ranches, who compete in events styled after real tasks they might handle on the ranch on any given day.

Indian Canyon Ranch teamed up with Williams Ranch in Crossroads, N.M. and formed a team to compete in the ranch rodeo

competition. Team members

Williams – competed in six
different ranch rodeos this
year.

"It was hard for everyone to get off and be able to go to the rodeos,: Mrs. Culp said. "But we went when we could."

Apparently whatever sacrifices the team members made in order to participate in the ranch rodeos paid off.

The team was named overall champion in June at the Big Bend Ranch Rodeo in Alpine. By winning that sanctioned rodeo, the team qualified to return to this year's world championship round – not as spectators, but as participants.

The 7<sup>th</sup> Annual World Championship Ranch Rodeo, sponsored by the Working Ranch Cowboys Association (WRCA), was held Nov. 14-17 in the Amarillo Civic Center. A total of 18 teams participated from across the western United States and Canada, including contestants from Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, South Dakota, Texas, Wyoming and Saskatchewan, Canada.

When all the dust had Seymour, Spade Ransettled in the arena on Colorado City and The Saturday night, the contes-

tants from Indian Canyon-Williams Ranches had claimed the title as WRCA World Champion Team Penners.

In addition to earning the team penning title, the team also split sixth place overall with four other ranch teams. The Indian Canyon-Williams ranches placed in the team branding and wild cow milking contests.

Besides team penning, team branding and wild cow milking, other ranch rodeo competitions at the world championship included team doctoring, wild horse race and ranch bronc riding.

Contestants from the Slagowski-Martin ranches in Nevada and Wyoming claimed the overall championship. Team captain Joe Slagowski, of the Slagowski Ranch in Pine Valley, Nev., also won the "top hand" award given to the cowboy who stands out the most during the event.

Another Texas team, Sandhill Cattle Company and Hayes & Son Cattle Company from Earth and Hereford, finished just one point behind the overall champions.

Also representing Texas in the competition were the Cowan/Wines ranches from Seymour, Spade Ranch from Colorado City and Thompson Ranch from Munday.

#### Turkey Basics

Since many of us save turkey and all the trimmings for a once-or-twice-a-year feast, even experienced cooks can use a refresher course on buying, thawing and cooking the traditional bird.

#### Buying and Thawing a Turkey:

When buying a turkey, allow 1 pound per adult serving if the bird weighs 12 pounds or less. For larger turkeys, count on 3/4 pound for each adult serving. If you want leftovers, buy a bird that's 2 to 4 pounds larger than the size you'll need for serving.

Although not all turkeys are labeled indicating whether the bird is a hen or tom, select a hen turkey if you want more white meat and a tom if you want more dark meat. Also check the sell by date on the label of a fresh turkey. This is the last day the turkey should be sold by the retailer. The unopened turkey should maintain its quality and be safe to use for one or two days after the sell by date.

If you buy a frozen turkey, look for packaging that is clean, undamaged and frostfree. Allow plenty of time to thaw a frozen turkey. For a whole frozen turkey, leave the

bird in its wrapping and place it on a tray in the refrigerator. Plan on at least 24 hours for every 5 pounds and don't count the day you'll roast the bird. (Once thawed, turkeys will keep one to two days in the refrigerator.)

If you run short of time and the turkey isn't completely thawed the day you plan to roast it, place the bird in a clean sink full of cold water and change the water every thirty minutes. Do not thaw turkey at room temperature or in warm water - these methods will allow harmful bacteria to grow quickly to dangerous levels. You'll know the bird is ready for roasting if the giblets can be removed easily and there are no ice crystals in the interior cavity. If the turkey is still frozen in the center, the bird will cook unevenly.

#### Preparing a Turkey for Roasting:

Once the turkey has thawed, release the legs from the leg clamp or the band of skin across the tail. Also, remove the giblets and neck from the interior cavity. Rinse the turkey inside and out, let it drain an pat dry with paper

Place the turkey, breast side up, on a rack in a shallow roasting pan. Insert the meat

### Grieving families find comfort in remembering over holidays The holidays are a cheerful time for most people, but for

others, they are a painful reminder of a lost loved one Families who are struggling with grief can find comfort in honoring that person's memory.

"Try to set aside a specific time to remember the person you lost," said Dr. John Burruss, assistant professor of psychiatry and behavioral sciences at Baylor Houston.

Feeling of grief are especially intense for people who had a family member murdered or killed in traumatic accident. They may be more reluctant to talk about their loss, for fear of ignoring the fact that your health professional. father, son, mother or child is not at your holiday gathering does more harm than good.

"Don't leave the loss unspoken. That is an injustice to the memory of the person who has been lost and it sets up the situation of the proverbial elephant in the room," Burruss said.

"Everyone knows it is there. Everyone can feel it. Their loss is a palpable presence,"

On the other hand, making grief a continual theme of the holiday also is not healthy.

"You don't want to make the holidays a constant memorial to the lost person," Burruss said. "Some types of memorial discussions are appropriate. However, they may take over the event."

- Recurring thoughts of death or suicide, wishing to die, or attempting suicide (Please seek help immediately for this symptom).

Buckling up yourself and all the passengers in your vehicle will give you two more reasons to be thankful this week: you'll be reducing the odds of serious injury in case of a crash and you'll also be protecting yourself from getting a ticket.

Texas is launching the safety belts. second phase of "Click It or Ticket" as part of a national effort to reduce deaths and injuries from traffic crashes. From November 24th to December 1<sup>st</sup>, state troopers and local law enforcement throughout Texas will be cracking down on drivers and passengers who aren't using

"We know that combining stepped up law enforcement with public education works to get people to buckle up,' said Susan Bryant, the Texas Department of Transportation's traffic safety director. "Focusing on seat belt law enforcement during Thanksgiving week not only will save lives, but it will also give Texas motorists the extra incentive they need to always use their safety belts and make sure their children are properly secured."

Texas law required drivers and front seat passengers to use safety belts. Children and teen sup to the age of 17 have to be buckled up in front or back seat. Child safety seats are required for children under four years old or less than three feet tall. Fines for violations range from \$25 to

As a result of this year's first round of click it or Ticket efforts during the Memorial Day holiday in May, statewide safety belt use increased from 76% to 81% in Texas. In the 10 major belt cities, safety use increased from 81% to 86%. Officials estimate maintaining safety belt use in Texas at this level would result in 200 fewer traffic fatalities and 5,000 fewer injuries each year.

Borden County's varisty boys basketball team made it two straight in the win column Friday, evening at Gail where the Coyotes rolled past Highland, 63-37.


"The best thing we're doing is hustling," said Borden County Coach Trey Richey. "We're making things happen."




