



Toy Safety

Each year we struggle with what kind of toys to buy our children for the holidays. You can only imagine the difficulty that Santa Claus has choosing toys for all the boys and girls across the world! There are numerous things that we consider should when selecting toys for children of all ages. The top three things to consider are:

1. SUPERVISION - Watch your child while they play. Select toys that you don't have to provide constant supervision, particularly for small ones.

2. MAINTENANCE - Check all toys regularly for damage (such as sharp edges, small parts). You may want to avoid toys that may require a lot of maintenance, particularly if you are busy and don't always have a lot of time on your hands. You may also consider how your child is with his/her toys. Some children are rougher than others.

3. SELECTION - Choose toys according to a child's age, interests, and skill level. Be sure to check the safety information on the warning labels. Children under age three can choke on small toys or toy parts.

In order to make your holiday shopping easier, below is a pocket guide to choosing age-appropriate gifts. This is wonderful for anyone that is going to be buying toys for children, regardless of whether you are a parent, grandparent, aunt, uncle or Santa himself! Good luck in your holiday shopping!

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Upper Colorado SWCD Report

It's time to be thinking about colder weather, and high West Texas winds that go along with it.

The Upper Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District is beginning sales of seedling for it's 2003 annual windbreak tree program.

A good windbreak goes a long way toward lowering utility bills, and making life easier on both people and animals. But don't be fooled by the name, these trees do more than block wind. Property sided and spaced, they will work as sound barriers and/or privacy screens. Wildlife benefit from food and cover provided by windbreaks. Studies have shown that by softening rainfall, blocking high winds, and holding soil in place order form so that we can windbreak plantings reduce contact you when the trees erosion by as much as 25 percent.

varieties are offered again this year, along with four wildlife packets. Evergreen species include. Afghanistan Pine, Austrian Pine, Eastern Redcedar, and Pinyon Pine. Evergreens seedlings are shipped in tarpaper tubes, and are priced at \$2.25

Hardwood species include: Honeysuckle, Amur Aromatic Sumac, Desert Willow, Flameleaf Sumac, Fourwing Saltbush, Green Ash, Hackberry, Honeylocust, Lacebark Elm, Nanking Cherry, Osage Orange, Russian Olive, Shumard Oak and Sand Plum. hardwoods are bare root seedlings, and are \$1.00 each.

Wildlife packets contain a total of 100 bare root hardwood seedlings (100 12" -18" seedlings) individually tailored for Deer, Quail and Dove, Turkey and Squirrel. Wildlife packets are \$55.00 each.

Order forms can be obtained at the Upper Colorado SWCD office in Snyder. Payment accompany all orders, and checks can be made out to Upper Colorado SWCD. Cutoff date for all orders is Jan. 31, 2003. Please be sure to put a phone number on your arrive.

Delivery should be on or Evergreen and hardwood about Feb. 5, 2003. The Upper Colorado SWCD office is located at 5398 Big Springs Hwy. In the USDA office complex.

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
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
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

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Safety Important consideration selecting gifts

Thinking about getting a on a toy is a choking hazard, portable basketball hoop for the athlete in your family? Does your 10-year-old want to learn soap making? Considering a baby walker or swing for your newest family member?

It is the time of year for thinking about giving and receiving presents. But some of these gifts, according to the Texas Department of Health (TDH), have hidden

A few simple precautions can help people buying gifts for children make the best according decisions, Annabele Dillard with TDH's Product Safety Division.

"Parents should not buy toys with small pats for children under 3," Dillard

"In addition, some toys can how to use them. break, exposing children to the hazards of choking on small internal parts. For example, recent skill level of the child you're product recalls have included plastic toys that can easily break and stuffed toys with parts or seams that can be detached during normal use, children under 3' to guide exposing parts that are small you in finding a safe, ageenough to become lodged in appropriate toy. And keep in a child's windpipe."

parents can use a simple test. Take the cardboard tube from a roll of toilet paper. If the part can pass through the tube, it could choke a child.

In addition to safeguarding children from obvious hazards such a small parts and sharp edges, parents need to train their children to be aware of safety issues, Dillard said. Most adults know that electronics and water don't mix, but children may not recognize dangers of electrical shock.

Many model and art kits contain paint and glue that require knowing about proper use and adequate ventilation. Parents also should train older children to keep their it." toys away from younger siblings who may not know

When selecting toys, pay attention to labels.

"Keep in mind the age and shopping for," Dillard said. "Look for age recommendations on the label such as 'Not recommended mind also that a few months in the skill level of a small child, so it's best not to give an 18-month-old child a toy designed for a 2-year-old."

This year, Nov. 18 to Nov. 22 was "Toy Sweep 2002." When TDH inspectors went out looking for recalled toys and other children's items on retail store shelves.

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"When they find recalled items on the shelves, they notify the retailer to remove the item and sent it to the manufacturer for replacement and refund," Dillard said. "We also educate retailers about the importance of posting the recall notice so that consumers who already have purchased the item can stop using it, fix it or return

This year, Inspectors are concentrating on walkers, baby swings, stuffed toys, children's toys, ride-on toys and cars, bicycles and portable basketball hoops.

Recalls can occur for a variety of reasons. Sometimes, as can be the case with basketball hoops bicycles, sharp edges can injure a child. Some items can be fixed using instructions from the manufacturer; others will need to be returned for repair replacement


Sometimes design flaws or inadequate assembly instructions can cause problems as in the case of some baby swings that malfunction when assembled incorrectly. Some toys or craft kits such as a soap-making kit have packaging that melts when heated. Toys that require heating or microwaving can burn a child if not used properly.

Information on recalls and safe gift giving is available on the Consumer Products Safety Division at 512-834-6773.

"The last thing people want to do when giving a gift is harm a child," Dillard said. "Awareness of dangers and prompt action protects buyers, sellers and children."

Remember: Nine Hours Of Sleep Is Key To Children Doing Their Best

(NAPS)-There is more to school than pencils, binders, and backpacks. The National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI) encourages parents to put adequate nighttime sleep on the list

Getting at least nine hours of sleep each night on a regular basis is critical for children's health, safety, and performance in school and other activities, according to the National Center on Sleep Disorders Research (NCSDR) at NHLBI. Inadequate sleep in children can lead to attention difficulties, easy frustration, and difficulty controlling emotions.

"Adequate nighttime sleep is just as important as healthy eating and exercise for children's development," said NHLBI Director Claude Lenfant, M.D. "A new school year is a great time to establish a good night's sleep as a lifelong habit."

NHLBI and NCSDR are launching a "How I Get a Heap of Sleep" contest with Paws, Inc., the creative studio behind Garfield the Cat and NHLBI's partner in the Sleep Well. Do Well. Star Sleeper Campaign. The Campaign's goal is to educate children ages 7 to 11-their parents, teachers, and health care providersabout the importance of adequate

nighttime sleep.

Sleep Tips For Kids

- Establish a regular bedtime and stick to it. Reinforcing a child's biological clock makes it easier to fall asleep quickly and awake feeling fully rested and alert.
- Eliminate distractions, such as a television or computer, in your child's room.
- Avoid feeding your child a big meal too close to bedtime.
- Avoid sodas and other beverages with caffeine less than six hours before bedtime. They can interfere with a good night's sleep.
- · Build in quiet time before bedtime. Children may want to go outside to play after dinner, but make sure they relax before bedtime.
- Establish a relaxing bedtime routine. Is it a bath in the evening, followed by a book? Or the reverse? Find out what works best, and stick to it.
- Make sure the room is dark and quiet and the bed is comfortable. Use a nightlight if your child finds the dark scary.
- Be sure the bedroom isn't too hot or too cold, and that pajamas are comfortable and
