## **Borden County banking** on wind

Recognizing the ups and downs of income derived from the oil industry, Borden County commissioners' court has quietly put wheels - or blades - in motion to ensure the long-term financial stability of the county.

Cielo Wind Power of Austin has secured leases along the Caprock in the northwest portion of Borden County where plans are rapidly taking place to locate 250 to 320 wind turbines.

"We've hit a home run," said County Judge Van York. "With the oil values going down, we needed to do something to secure the future for this county and its citizens and we believe this is

Borden County rancher Ralph Miller has leased land for the wind turbines and he is as excited as county officials about the long-term benefits for Borden County.

"Just think about what this project will do for Borden County," Miller said as he stood next to a monitoring tower on top of the Caprock.

This slim tower is recording wind direction and speed and is checked once a

week by Cielo employees Power and Light generating from San Angelo.

"This tower will be dwarfed by the wind turbines," said Miller. "Each of those towers will be 250feet high and their blades are 160-feet long."

The elevation where the turbines will be placed is 2,900 feet above sea level and is only 15-feet below the elevation of Lubbock.

The planned project is designed to generate 300 megawatts, and as a comparison, the Lubbock


station on the Slaton Highway generates megawatts, added Miller.

The electricity generated will be transmitted to a TXU site between Snyder and Gail, and eventually sent into the electrical network.

"The electricity that will be generated right here has already been contracted for by the city of Austin," Miller

He said the project would eventually add \$300 million





It is once again time to send out our holiday greetings to \( \ \ Involve the entire family. \) family and friends. There are a number of ways to send a holiday greeting. You may choose to involve your family in preparing homemade cards and enclose a family photo. You may choose to purchase printed cards that have a special verse or message inside, or ones with a photo pocket and message. You may also choose to spend time writing a letter telling everyone all the news that is happening in your family. There are a number of inexpensive preprinted papers with matching envelopes and labels that you can choose from to send your letter on.

No matter how you express your holiday wishes, there are some things that you will want . to keep in mind when sending

♦ Think of your message. Holiday stories and poems, Bible scriptures, memories and quotes from children spark thoughts that convey a message that is uniquely yours. No matter what the message is, your want it to come straight from your

- Ask family members to suggest messages and designs for your card. Also, have every family member sign the greeting.
- Include a recent family photo. This is especially great for the people you do not see often and if you . have growing children and/or a new addition. If possible, select a picture that ties in with the theme or message of your greeting. Vacation and holiday photos are great. When trying to take photos for cards, shoot them horizontally and vertically to allow for options in card design and selection.
- Maximize your greeting card budget. Unfortunately it is too late to buy the sale cards for this year, but after Christmas, watch for sales on Christmas cards and buy them then. to the tax base of Borden County that now stands at \$200 million.

Other landowners who have leased land to Cielo include Martin Parks, Jennie Smith, Steve Beavers and Bob Jordan.

In order to attract the company to Borden County, the commissioners' court did what most entities have to do to attract new industry grant tax abatements.

"The county granted Cielo a 10-year tax abatement, but we will receive \$50,000 per year for the 10 years and then the turbines will go on the rolls at their taxable value," Judge York said.

abatement in increments of 80 units each and each of the four increments will stand alone in the tax abatement process, Judge York said.

"If 80 turbines go on line one year and then 80 the next, we'll reap \$50,000 per year from each 80 units," said the judge.

As part of the process, the county declared a 40-section area as a reinvestment zone.

President of Cielo, Walter Hornaday of Austin, said a time line has not been pinponted to begin construc-

"We're not ready to announce the construction time line just yet as there are still numerous loose ends to tie up."

Hornaday said the project is good news not only for Borden County, but neighboring counties as well.

"We just completed a project in the Panhandle that employed 250 people at the peak construction time."

Hornaday added the project Panhandle employees about 10 people to operate the project, and they are mostly local residents.

The Borden County project is expected to employ 300 at The county granted the the peak construction period, and one person for every eight units when in operation.

> Hornaday was very complimentary of the Borden County officials and the community as a whole in working with Cielo.

> "Without the support of the officials and community members in Borden County, we would not be able to develop the project," said Hornaday.

Cielo has projects in other areas of Texas, including one on King Mountain near McCamey that is billed as the world's largest wind power project.

Other completed company projects are near Pecos, El Paso, Ozona and White Deer.

Miller added that the project in Borden County has involved numerous environmental studies. "You can't imagine the environmental studies that are conducted before a project like this gets underway.

Everyone wants to make sure it is environmentally sound and that no archeological spots are disturbed," he said.

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# Soothing a holiday stomach

Turkey and dressing and heartburn, oh my! This holiday season, many people will unfortunately receive the gift that keeps on giving heartburn and stomach upset.

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"The holiday foods we love best, like Thanksgiving turkey, gravy and pie, are made up almost completely of fat," said Dr. Gulchin Ergun, medical director of the Reflux Center at Baylor College of Medicine and The Methodist Hospital Houston. "The same fat that makes our food taste so good also can give us heartburn."

Heartburn is caused when stomach acid overcomes the barrier between the stomach and esophagus, called the sphincter, which keeps the lower end of the esophagus closed when a person is not swallowing food or liquids. Foods that contain fat cause the sphincter to relax, allowing the acid to come up more easily into the chest.

The result is a burning pain in the chest and the abdomen that can last for hours and is often accompanied by a sour

The simple way to prevent heartburn is to avoid the foods and drinks that trigger it, like high fat foods, foods high in acidity like cranberry sauce, and alcoholic drinks.

But if you just can't give up your favorite treats, the following tips may help soothe your holiday stomach:

Move around. Lying down after a big meal may help trigger heartburn. "Chest pressure is negative, and your body wants to move things from a positive to a negative area," Ergun said. "If you are lying down after a big meal, it makes it easier for stomach acid to move up." Ergun suggests taking a walk, or playing a game of touch football


with your family after prescription your meal.

- immediate relief, over- GERD. the-counter antacids work fastest to reduce the acid that causes heartburn or stomach upset.
- Eat in moderation. If you can't give up your mother's famous pecan pie, then go easy on the ham, or just eat only a portion of everything on your plate.

"Having a small amount of heartburn around the holidays isn't necessarily bad for you," Ergun said. "But you should really see your doctor of you are having symptoms two or three times a week."

Annually, more than 7 million Americans suffer from chronic heartburn, called Gastroesophageal Reflux Disease (GERD). Left untreated, GERD can increase the risk for esophageal


