Coverage and exploitation

Television has been bombarding us for so many years with products promising fast, fast, fast relief for everything that bothers us, it is an ironic kind of justice that the medium is being increasingly exploited by people seeking instant redress for their grievances or instant publicity for their causes

It began with the civil rights and antiwar demonstrations and protests of the 1960s and early 1970s Rather than being mere witnesses to and recorders of a news event, the television cameras, crews and commentators often constituted the event itself

The phenomenon may have reached a climax the other day in Warrensville Heights. Ohio, where television newsmen found themselves active participants in a drama in which a disturbed young man held hostages at gunpoint for 40 hours in the city hall and issued a number of outlandish demands, including a public apology by President Carter for the nation's treatment of

The weekend before. Corey Moore had told friends. "You'll be seeing me on television on Monday

The Ohio episode has occasioned some long overdue soul - searching by news professionals.

"It's time we took another look at our coverage of such incidents." says Virgil Dominic, news director of a Cleveland TV station. "While we are glad it ended without bloodshed, we are disturbed that the media, especially television, overplayed it to the extent that another one is almost guaranteed

'We feel that the coverage we give such incidents is partly to blame, for we are glorifying lawbreakers, we are making heroes out of nonheroes. In effect, we are losing control over our news departments; we are being used Despite the tremendous competition that exists

The voice of business

among local television news teams, and at the risk of losing part of its audience, Dominic's station will no longer automatically grant live coverage to future Corey Moores. In fact, it may not cover them at all

"This does not mean that we are going to ignore news events," says Dominic, "but rather that we are going to report them in reasonable perspective.

Also in the wake of the same incident, one Cleveland newpaper has called for a code of news coverage restraint, agreed to by both newspapers and television, locally and nationally, to stop the exploitation of the media by fanatics.

"Crazy people are of the opinion that they can pull off any kind of terror activity, espeically murder threats and make themselves prominent," says the Cleveland Plain Dealer. This is unfortunately true because of the way the media cover these eipsodes.

But just what is "reasonable perspective" in the reporting of news events like the one in Warrensville Heights — or the even more frightening ones that were staged in Washington. D.C., the same week — is not an easy question to answer. As Dominic indicates, they cannot simply be ignored, especially when the lives of innocent people may be at stake.

Nor is it easy to say just how a code of "news restraint" would be enforced.

Nevertheless, it is becoming imperative that some kind of journalistic code in this area be formulated and be put into practice - even if it means calling the bluff of the next terrorist who threatens to kill someone if his demands are not accorded front - page space and prime - time publicity

Otherwise the news media will find themselves increasingly being held hostage by the fanatics

Our government-made crisis

WASHINGTON - How much are you willing to pay to prevent the oil companies from making a windfall profit?

It's a good idea to ask yourself that question, and to try to come. up with an actual dollars - per year figure. Because only when you have such a figure in mind will you have a rational basis for evaluating our current — and national energy policies

These policies have as their first priority the prevention of windfall profits Everything else conservation, increased supplies, national security — is

secondary

The Carter energy program for example — is designed to raise the price paid by the consumer without increasing the price paid to the producer The net effect, therefore, would be to discourage consumption without encouraging production

We strongly believe the nation needs to eliminate wasteful uses of energy But we're going to need more energy eventually, no matter how carefully we ration it So the Carter program proposes to solve only half the problem

Suppose all the government controls were lifted -- how much would energy prices increase? Experts estimate that gasoline would go up about seven or eight cents a gallon. The cost of

natural gas to the consumer would rise by 20-50 per cent. These increases could be phased in slowly, over a period of years.

The important point is this Price increases that also increase supplies would not have to be as large as tax increases that only reduce consumption Why would higher prices

expand our supplies? First, obviously, a higher return on investment would encourage more investment in exploration for existing energy sources, as well as more investment in the search for economical alternate sources Second, less obviously the amount of fossil fuel available is related to its price Some of it is easy to get out of the ground - that's the stuff that gets produced at a low price But a lot of it is difficult to recover — too sticky to pump. too far down to get to, etc. The higher the price, the more an energy company can afford to spend on going after these

problem deposits There is no shortage of domestic fossil fuel. There is a shortage of cheap domestic fossil fuel

Now about those windfall profits'

Where would they come from? From the increased value of domestic energy reserves, if controls were removed. The world price of oil is about \$12.50 a barrel. The current government ceiling on domestic oil averages \$7.66 a barrel. If decontrolled, the price of

domestic oil would probably rise

to the world price. The effects on

natural gas would be similar

The difference between the two price levels represents the windfall profit


What would the energy companies do with their windfall profits? Most of it would go right back into energy production. Profit, is, after all, the incentive that got us the gas and oil in the first place But, in any case, the government could insure such a 'plowback' with some simple

changes in the tax code. However, it now looks as if the government is going to try to run the energy industry with one hand and the consumer's life with the other. This process will inevitably entail great inefficiencies, as government programs always do.

The inefficiency has a cost, in terms of the damage it will do to the economy. We calculate that cost at about \$400 per family by 1980, plus a loss of 400,000 jobs and a two - percentage - point increase in inflation. This is the cost in comparison to a simple continuation of the existing policies, which are themselves far from sensible

What it all comes down to is a choice between paying higher taxes to the government for more government, or paying high prices to the energy companies, for more energy.

A taxing task

By Don Oakley

Never in the course of human taxation have so many people

been put to so much trouble for so little purpose.

Each year, American businesses spend millions of dollars and devote millions of manhours to assembling tons of documents which, by law, they must submit to the Internal Revenue Service. The documents detail the wages, dividends, interest and other payments they have made to individuals and other corporations.

Contrary to the general belief that the all-seeing computers of the IRS then crosscheck these records against individual and corporate tax returns, 60 per cent of the documents regarding individuals and 100 per cent of those regarding corporations are routinely destroyed without anybody even look-

This year, the IRS will shred, pulverize and burn about 250 million unexamined documents submitted by businesses to assist the service in detecting cheating, says the Wall Street Journal. The IRS is, in fact, buying 11 new pulverizing machines, costing \$80,000 each, to help destroy the documents. It is not that the tax collectors place all that much trust in the honesty of the American taxpayer. They are simply overwhelmed. But if this revelation tempts any individual to fudge a bit in reporting his sources of income next April 15, he should bear in mind that the chances are still four out of 10 that his return will be cross checked against data supplied by

After more than four centuries of being chewed on, scribbled with, sharpened, blunted and snapped, and even used to stir a hot drink on occasion, the lowly pencil is about to make its biggest mark.

- Set end to end, the number of pencils manufactured annually in the United States would extend nine times around the

world at the Equator. - The average pencil can draw a line 35 miles long and will

write approximately 45,000 words. - To produce one pencil requires 40 different raw materials, assembled from 28 countries and put through 125

- And finally, if you gathered all the raw materials and tried to make one yourself, it would cost you \$50 for a single pencil, says the Pencil Makers Association. We think they've made their point

IUDs must warn

WASHINGTON (AP) - Seven years after the federal government said women must be informed of the risks of using birth control pills, it is requiring that similar information be given to those who use intrauterine birth-control devices.

Citing possible harmful side effects of IUD use, the Food and Drug Administration announced Sunday a new regulation which is to take effect Nov 7

The purpose of the regulation, which will affect manufacturers of IUDs and doctors who prescribe them, is to make sure women are well-informed about IUDs before choosing this form of contraception.

The new regulation also will establish uniform labeling for all types of IUDs, which are used by an estimated three million women in the United

"Our goal is to make sure that each woman and her physician have enough information to select the most suitable method of contraception." said FDA Commissioner Donald

TOKYO (AP) - A 25-year-old American was charged with attempted hijacking today after trying to force the pilot of a Northwest Airlines jumbo jet with 261 persons aboard to fly him to Moscow.

The hijacker. Bruce Trayer. held a razor to the throat of a Japanese stewardess until cabin attendant William Vanheuven hit him on the head with the butt of a fire axe. The hijacking attempt lasted about

10 minutes Trayer told Japanese police he was from Prairie du Chien. Wis., and decided to go to Moscow on the spur of the moment. He said he had heard about the Soviet capital from his father. a police spokesman said

The hijacking occurred Sunday about an hour after the jetliner took off from Tokyo for Honolulu. The pilot, Capt. Homer Sutter of Minneapolis, radioed a hijacking was under way and requested directions

Navy may put bell back in sailor pants

By FRED S. HOF FMAN **AP Military Writer**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Adm. James Holloway, chief of naval operations, has just about decided to recommend a return to the sailor's traditional uniform of bell bottom trousers, jumpers and little white hats.

A recent Navy poll heavily influenced Holloway's thinking on how to resolve one of the most fractious internal issues in the fleet.

That official poll confirmed less scientific but clear indications that the new uniform of coats. white shirts, black ties and peaked caps is massively unpopular in the enlisted ranks. The new uniform became compulsory nearly

two years ago The Navy's sampling of opinion among more than 8,500 sailors produced a vote of about 86 per cent or 87 per cent in favor of restoring the old-

Navy officials said sailors of all ratings were polled at major bases in San-Diego, Calif .; Norfolk, Va.; Charleston, S.C.; Yokusuka, Japan; Rota, Spain, and Subic Bay, the Philippines.

Detailed results are not yet available, officials said, because experts are still analyzing replies to rolled up and kept in a sea bag.

36 questions asked each sailor. The questions sought reasons for opinions on uniform style, as well as views on personal appearance, uniform

cleaning problems and related matters.

According to present indications, Holloway may approve the old-style uniform for the five lowest enlisted ranks

That would leave senior petty officers with the coat and tie uniform, which was a cherished badge of distinction for them before Adm. Elmo Zumwalt ordered all enlisted men to wear it.

Holloway's recommendation will go to the new Navy secretary, W. Graham Claytor Jr., who normally can be expected to ratify the admiral's judgment on a matter involving morale

Holloway has told visitors he is not yet sure when the change back to the old style uniforms should start, although he indicated it could come as early as next year. Following a decision, the Navy would have to arrange for production of new supplies of uniforms.

Critics of the new style uniform say it is a bother to keep neat, especially aboard ship. Sailors also say they don't have room to hang the new uniforms. The old style uniforms could be

BALTIMORE (AP) - A Maryland gunsmith who has spent years studying the assassination of President John F. Kennedy believes that a Secret Service agent accidentally fired the fatal bullet, panicking after hearing Lee Harvey Oswald's

Since 1969 I have been unable to turn up evidence which shakes any part of my conclusion." gunsmith Howard Donahue said in an interview with the Baltimore Sunday Sun.

A spokesman for the Secret Service declined to comment today on the Donahue interview, but said, "We concur in the findings of the Warren

Donahue, who has a gun shop in suburban Towson, first became involved with the assassination in a 1967 CBS television show in which he and other marksman fired the type of rifle Oswald is thought to have used under almost the same

Donahue was the only one to score three accurate shots during a 6.5 second period, the time Oswald is thought to have

He accepts the evidence that Oswald was trying to kill the president in Dallas on Nov. 22. 1963. But he says Oswald's first bullet missed the presidential car, hitting the pavement and breaking up in a spray of metal fragments

DEAR DR. LAMB - I tried the exercises of raising my feet up, out, back together and down. I did this 35 times to tighten my belly.

After doing the exercises on two occasions, about two weeks apart, I question what I am doing wrong. After each time my legs felt heavy for about three days.

I am 43 years old, male. weigh slightly under 150, am 5 feet 10 and run a mile in seven minutes five times a week. Does lifting the feet cause

the blood to flow in an unnatural way and therefore cause the problem?

When I lift my legs without spreading them out and back I don't seem to have the tiredness in legs

DEAR READER - It shouldn't affect the circulation to your legs but if you have any tendency to have back problems the way you are doing it may affect spinal nerves to that area.

What are you doing wrong? Quite a bit. First you should start at a low level - perhaps five times a day and gradually increase the amount.

Then you need to be sure you are contracting your lower abdominal muscles and not simply straining your back muscles. You do that by consciously tightening your abdominal muscles as you do the exercise

I think it is better to change the way you do your leg lifts too. First bring your feet up to your buttocks, then push them up, out and back down to the floor. You will be making a circle with your feet. Since your feet will be up with a short lever arm, because of the bent knees you won't put so much sudden leverage on your back muscles as you are doing with a straight lift of your feet from the floor with your current method.

An autopsy at the State Medical Examiner's office in Oklahoma City Sunday afternoon revealed the cause of death as "asphyxia by hanging — suicide." according to Mike Roach, agent at the office.




