Social Security troubled

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Carter administration is preparing to announce plans to increase Social Security taxes and divert general tax revenue into the financially troubled Social Security system. The administration's proposal

was scheduled to be announced today by Joseph A. Califano, secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, at a news conference with Vice President Walter F. Mondale. A Mondale aide said the announcement of the adminis-

tration plan would follow today's Cabinet session.

Trustees of the Social Security trust funds are expected to report that they paid out more in benefits last year than they took in. It would be the first time that benefit payments outstripped taxes paid into the system by wage-earners and their employers.

Because of this, administration officials reportedly favor a two-pronged attack to insure the viability of the Social Security program in the next decade.

Social Security trust funds are financed by a deduction marked "FICA" on nearly every wage-earner's paycheck. FICA stands for Federal Insurance Contributions Act, the original Social Security law.

Administration sources say Congress will be asked to change the Social Security law so employers would have to pay the retirement tax on all wages they pay their workers, not just on a portion, as they do now.

And, under the administration plan, tax-supported gen-

eral revenue funds will be used for the first time for Social Security payments when the national unemployment rate goes beyond 6 per cent. Officials say that when unemployment rises beyond a certain level, contributions to Social Security decline by too much.

Under the current system of collecting Social Security taxes, wage-earners have 5.85 per cent of the first \$16,500 of their income deducted for Social Security. This is matched by employ-

ers. Under the Carter plan, employers would have to pay Social Security taxes on all wages paid out, while the contributions by wage-earners would be increased, but not to 100 per cent of their income.

Presently, a wage-earner paying the "FICA" maximum tax on income of \$16,500 pays about \$965 a year.

The administration wants to raise the \$16,500 wage base by another \$2,400 by 1985, beyond increases already scheduled to take effect. Those automatic tax rate increases already scheduled would be accelerated under the administration plan.

Warden denies prison drug ring

McALESTER, Okla. (AP) — Oklahoma state prison warden Richard Crisp said he has no knowledge of a drug ring that a newspaper says peddled drugs at the state prison here and at prisons in four other states.

But Crisp added, "this sort of stuff doesn't surprise me at all." Crisp said there have been many attempts at smuggling illegal drugs through the mails to the prison here.

But because of staff watchfulness, "there's very little drugs inside this institution," Crisp said.

"We're not allowed to read letters so all we do is open the letter and shake the pages to see if there's any contraband," Crisp said. "We turn each page of a newspaper or magazine because one time we found two pages glued together and discovered 200 amphetamine pills. And another time marijuana was sent in a hollowed-out Bible."

A total of 12 guards at the state prison have been fired or forced to resign in the past year for smuggling, including the most recent case where a guard allegedly smuggled a pistol and marijuana into the prison.

A spokesman for the Okla-

homa Bureau of Investigation, Dick Wilkerson, and Crisp both said there is no indication that the gun and drug smuggling case has any connection with the reported drug network.

The Courier-Journal and Times in Louisville, Ky., reported Sunday in a copyrighted article that the arrest of two persons who allegedly tried to smuggle drugs into the Kentucky State Penitentiary led to the breaking of the five-state prison drug ring that used the U.S. Postal Service as its main transporter.

The racket's collapse began last August, the newspaper said, when a Kentucky prisoner told officials that Thomas Pugh, 39, a native of Oklahoma, was running the network at the prison at Eddyville, Ky.

However, Pugh, a transfer prisoner from the Arizona State Prison where he was serving a 25 to 30-year sentence for armed robbery, escaped from Eddyville on Oct. 25, 1976. He is still at large.

Pugh was convicted in Tulsa in 1972 and sentenced to life in prison for the 1971 shooting death of a Tulsa County grand jury witness. He still faces trial in Oklahoma in connection with the 1970 killing of Mrs. Cleo Epps.

American charged in hijacking attempt

TOKYO (AP) — A 25-year-old American was charged with attempted hijacking today after trying to force the pilot of a Northwest Airlines jumbo jet with 261 persons aboard to fly him to Moscow.

The hijacker, Bruce Trayer, held a razor to the throat of a Japanese stewardess until cabin attendant William Vanheuver hit him on the head with the butt of a fire axe. The hijacking attempt lasted about 10 minutes.

Trayer told Japanese police he was from Prairie du Chien, Wis., and decided to go to Moscow on the spur of the moment. He said he had heard about the Soviet capital from his father, a police spokesman said.

The hijacking occurred Sunday about an hour after the jetliner took off from Tokyo for Honolulu. The pilot, Capt. Homer Sutter of Minneapolis, radioed a hijacking was under way and requested directions for a flight to Moscow.

About 10 minutes later, the pilot reported the hijacker had been subdued and the plane was returning to Tokyo because the hijacker was injured.

Trayer was conscious and shouting, with a bandage on his head, when the Japanese police removed him from the plane. He was treated at a hospital, and the doctors said his injuries should be healed in about two weeks. The police took him away for investigation.

The flight took off again for Honolulu early Monday with all but three of the original passengers and a new crew on board. Capt. Sutter and his crew remained in Tokyo to assist in the police investigation.

Trayer told police he was drafted by the U.S. Army in 1971, discharged in 1973 and worked for a cement company until he quit last December, a police spokesman said.

Summer jobs may be scarce for teenagers

By LOUISE COOK, Associated Press Writer. Youngsters looking for summer jobs this year will find the labor market tougher than ever and their chances of success perhaps hinging on a combination of planning and old-fashioned luck.

The U.S. Department of Labor estimates that two and a-half million young people between the ages of 16 and 24 went hunting for summer jobs last year. The department hasn't issued a firm estimate for 1977, but a spokesman said he expects the number of job

seekers to match last year's total. Herman Fishman of the Youth Services Bureau of the New York State Department of Labor said the summer job situation has gotten progressively worse every year and added that 1977 probably would be "a little more difficult than last year."

He said his office alone had requests from 20,000 youngsters looking for summer jobs last year and was able to help less than 10 per cent of them. This year, he said, he expects more job seekers and fewer positions. Fishman said there is no area

where the demand for summer workers is bigger than the supply. "Getting a summer job is largely a luck situation," he said.

Both he and a federal spokesman agreed, however, that advance planning can increase your chance of success. "If you're just starting now, it's probably too late," said a spokesman at the U.S. Department of Labor.

One of the first things you should know is what you can — and can't — do. Federal law limits employment for youngsters and state laws may require work permits below a certain age level. When state and federal laws conflict, the one that provides the most protection applies.

Here are some of the highlights of the federal regulations as they apply to nonfarm jobs: —Over 18: There are no limits on the kind of job you can take or the number of hours

you can work. —Sixteen to 18: There are no limits on the number of hours you can work, but you are barred from any job which the secretary of labor considers hazardous. (For details, contact the local office of the U.S. Department of Labor.)

—Fourteen and 15: You are barred from hazardous jobs and may work no more than three hours on a school day and eight hours on a nonschool day, and no more than 18 hours in a school week and 40 hours in a nonschool week. You are not allowed to work before 7 a.m. or after 7 p.m., except from June 1 to Labor Day when the evening hours are extended to 9 p.m.

IUDs must warn

WASHINGTON (AP) — Seven years after the federal government said women must be informed of the risks of using birth control pills, it is requiring that similar information be given to those who use intrauterine birth-control devices.

Citing possible harmful side effects of IUD use, the Food and Drug Administration announced Sunday a new regulation which is to take effect Nov. 7.

The purpose of the regulation, which will affect manufacturers of IUDs and doctors who prescribe them, is to make sure women are well-informed about IUDs before choosing this form of contraception.

The new regulation also will establish uniform labeling for all types of IUDs, which are used by an estimated three million women in the United States.

"Our goal is to make sure that each woman and her physician have enough information to select the most suitable method of contraception," said FDA Commissioner Donald

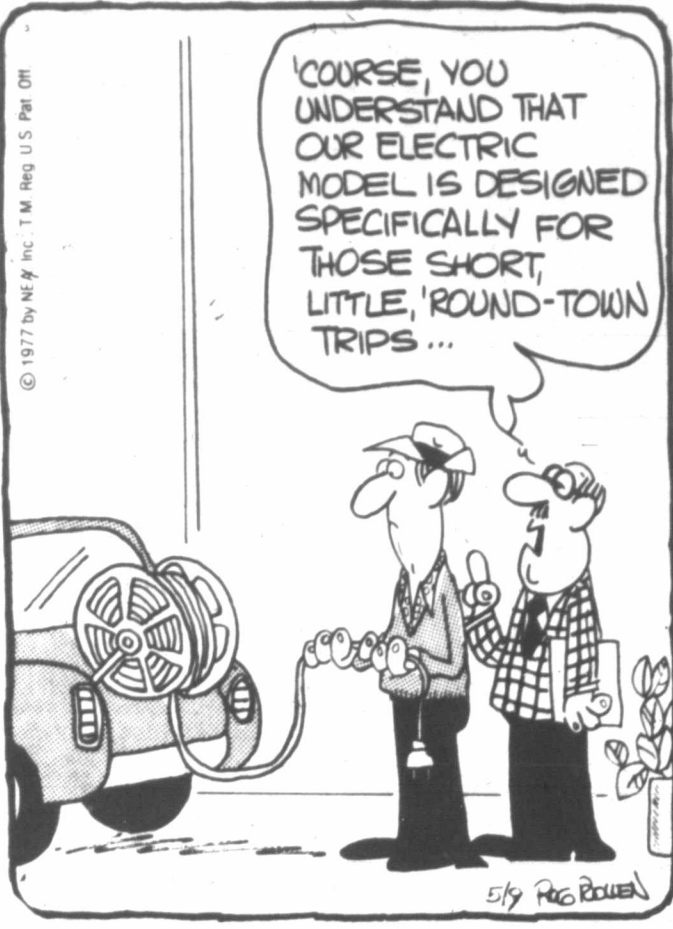

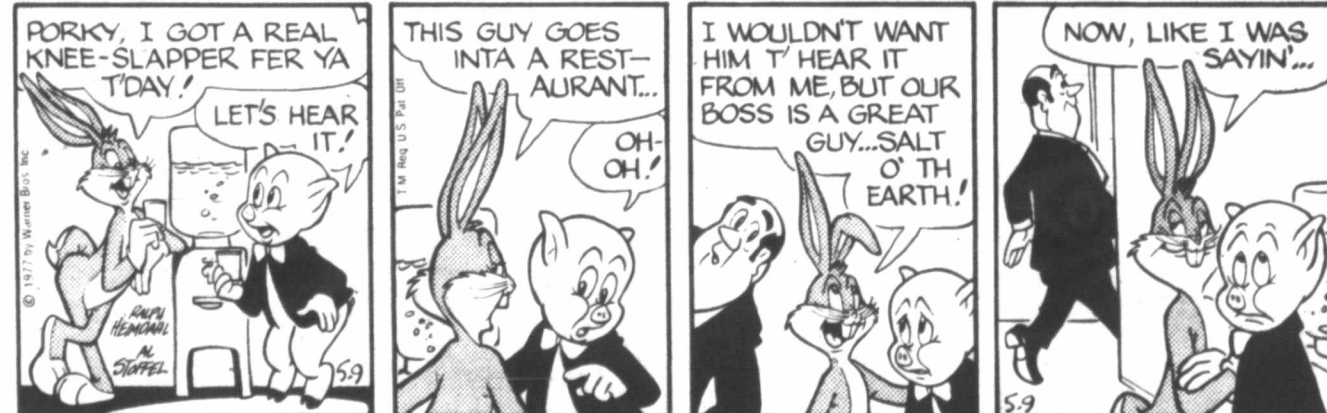

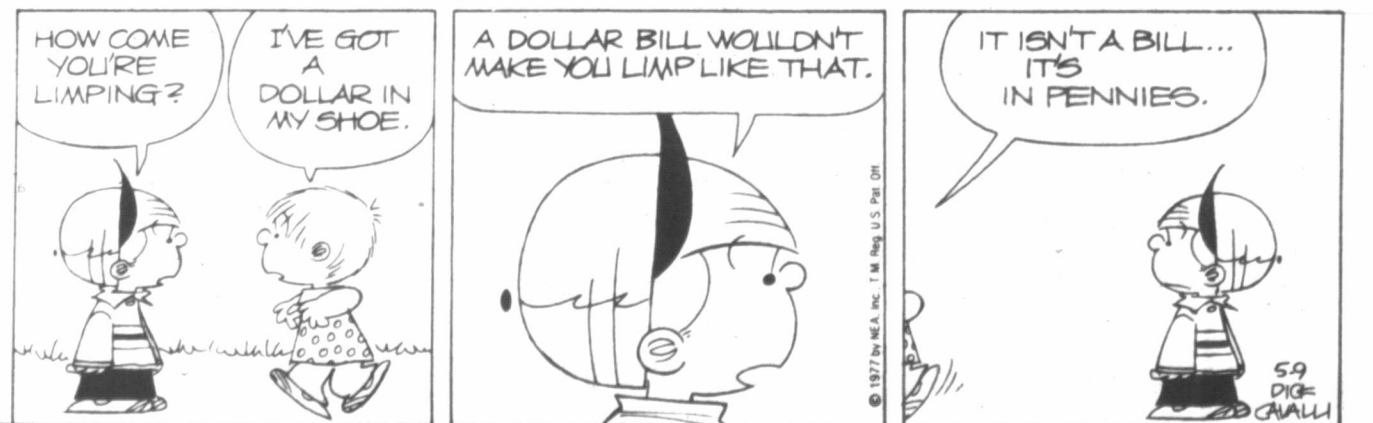

Woman found hanged in cell in Altus

ALTUS, Okla. (AP) — Adeline Daye, 31, of North Dakota, was due to be released from the Altus city jail today after a four-day sentence.

But on Saturday afternoon, authorities found Mrs. Daye dead in her jail cell.

An autopsy at the State Medical Examiner's office in Oklahoma City Sunday afternoon revealed the cause of death as "asphyxia by hanging — suicide," according to Mike Roach, agent at the office.

The woman's body was sent to an Oklahoma City funeral home, but arrangements were being handled by an Altus funeral home.

Benedict said officer Gary Robertson found the woman at about 5:40 p.m. Saturday.

She and her husband, identified as Ted Daye, had been arrested in front of an Altus hotel Thursday on a public drunk complaint, Benedict said. Each had been sentenced to four days in jail.

Daye was released from jail following the incident. Benedict said Daye had been confined in another cell.
